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WEST TEXAS NOTES

Ballots for the first Democratic primary have been arranged and some of these will be ready for absentee voting beginning July 4. Interest in the first primary is greater than for a number of years, due to several races in the county as well as state and district competition. This is expected to bring a heavy turnout at the polls and there will be much interest in the unofficial tabulations on the night of the election. Plans are being made by the Ledger for an election by "party" and a large board probably will be used to post the first returns. The county Democratic executive committee met here Monday to draw candidates' names for places. These were added to the arrangements for state and district candidates made up at Austin. All election managers have been designated and most of these have secured assistants.

Ballingerites are to be called on for a general clean-up in the interests of health and general beautification. Committees have made general plans for the campaign and in doing so have sought information from a number of West Texas towns where successful campaigns have already been held. A committee, accompanied by police and others, made an inspection tour of the city the first of the week and found much that needs immediate attention. Weeds have been permitted to grow very rank here and there and vacant lots, yards and sections of alleys need cleaning at once. Health officials point out that there has not been a polio case to develop in the county this year and it is hoped to maintain this record. The city will be sprayed, as soon as equipment is repaired, to kill flies, mosquitoes and other insects. Leaders point out that the success of the clean-up drive depends on the whole-hearted cooperation of every resident of Ballinger. To make the community safe from a health standpoint everyone must see that his premises are clean. Ministers of the city have agreed to help

The field was approved by Trans-Texas Airlines a few years ago, but work on the field was halted before the runway was completed. Mr. Davis stated that many requests were received for landing by planes that were too large for the runways.

It also improved the building which was given to Brown county crippled children by the city.

The contract of Supt. Olaf Smith was extended to July 1, 1959. White has served in the past as superintendent and principal of schools at Roby, Longworth and Sweetwater.

Miles citizens engaged in a city-wide clean-up Wednesday, June 30, and trucks were moved all day picking up the trash piled in the alleys. BALLINGER GOLFERS WIN IN MATCHES AT WINTERS

The Ballinger golf team took a 17 to 12 decision from the Winters team Sunday afternoon in games played on the Winters course. It was a regular meeting of the Tri-City League but Coleman players were not present.

Sam Conner led the attack for the Ballinger team with a 74 for the 18 holes. Par for the course is 68. Twenty-three Winters players were registered but Ballinger had only fourteen representatives for the afternoon.

Safe Driving Theme Of Program Given At Lions Luncheon

J. C. Wilson, of the West Texas Utilities Co. safety department, brought the program for the Ballinger Lions Club Friday noon.

Mr. Wilson spoke on traffic safety and called attention that 11,500 fatal accidents on Texas roads have occurred within the past five years. Of these more than 60 per cent were on rural roads and in a large number of cases, only one driver was to blame. He blamed excessive speed and drunkenness for a majority of the fatal wrecks.

The speaker brought a message based on company records of the smaller and minor causes of crashes which represent a heavy expense annually.

Back-up was listed as one of the main causes of small accidents. He stated that most people had a blind spot and could not see behind them and urged them to look before they entered their cars.

Improper turns to the left was the second cause in this classification and illustrations were given of people turning to the left into alleys and drive-

ways. Failure to yield right-of-way at intersections was third in this listing.

Divided attention was fourth and Wilson pointed out that driving any kind of a motor vehicle was a full time job.

The speaker condemned double parking and said that the law could enforce this violation when the citizens wanted it eliminated.

A short description was given of new radar equipment which will soon be in use by state highway officers. This equipment will give the exact speed of cars on highway lanes and will cause many arrests with accurate evidence for securing indictments.

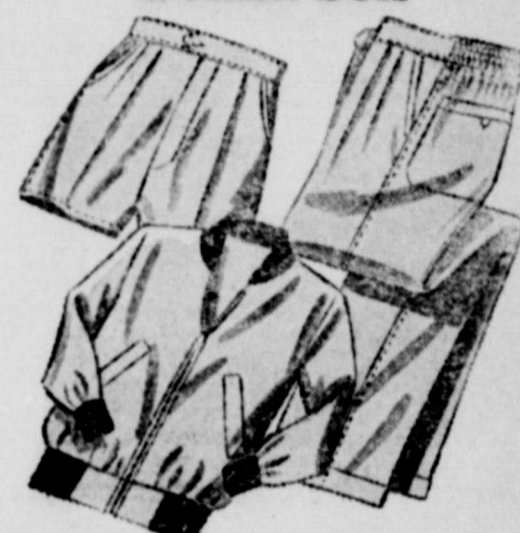
