Mrs. Green and Mrs. W. F. Lange extended courtesies in the living room and directed guests to the dining room.

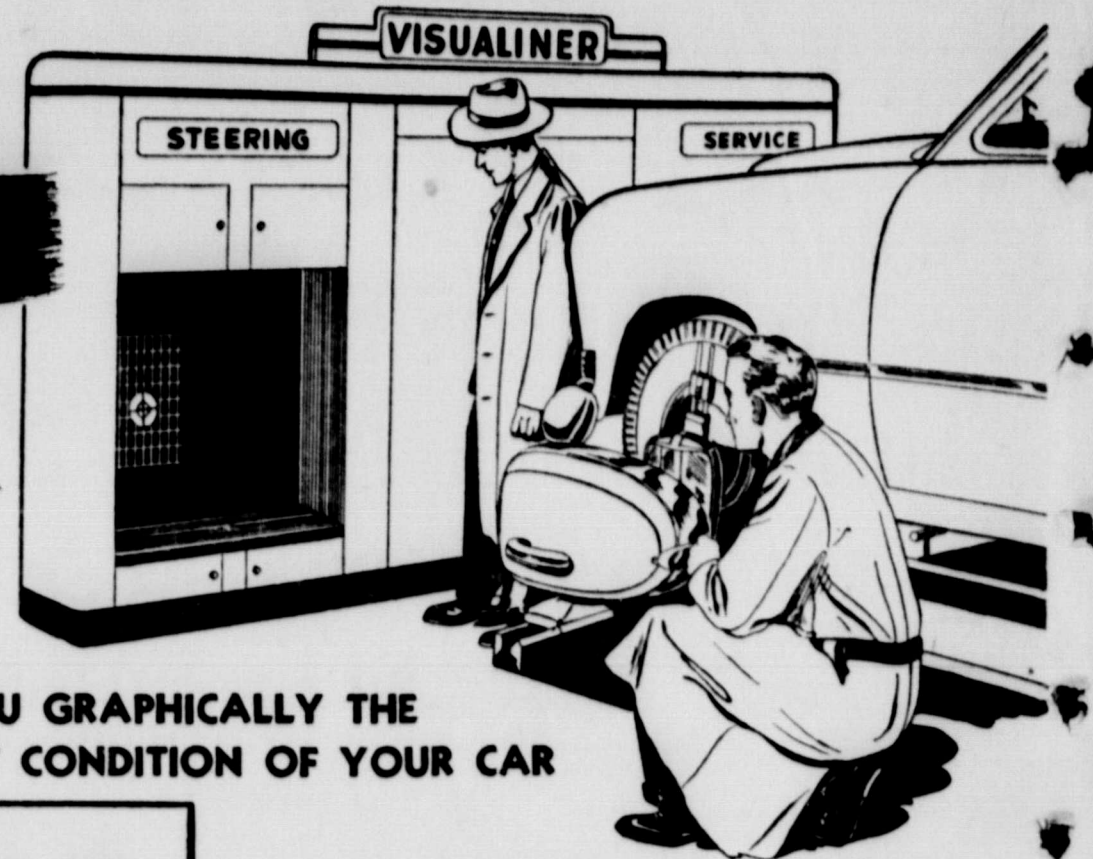

Humble Man Talks At Lions Luncheon, Shows Rare Coins

L. R. Goodwin, of Cisco, was the guest speaker at the Ballinger Lions Club meeting Friday noon. Goodwin is with the pipeline division of Humble Oil & Refining Co. and for the past 27 years has been a collector of coins.

Mr. Goodwin spoke briefly on the history of money, beginning some 700 years B. C. and outlined the main changes in the various systems down through the ages. He also answered questions on the value of coins and discussed what determined the value.

Most interesting was the showing of seven different groups of his collection. The first group comprised 12 coins, 11 of which are mentioned in the Bible and the other, only 600 years old, obtained by Mr. Goodwin at an auction in Switzerland. Most of these were in use before the birth of Christ and are the same kind of money Judas accepted in betraying the Christ.

A second collection showed every half-dollar which has been coined by the United States.

Another interesting collection was dollar sizes of money from practically every nation of the world, except Russia and countries controlled by Russia. Some of these were current as far back as 1548.

A group of coins the size of a 50-cent piece and smaller, also collected from practically every part of the world, dated back to 489 B. C.

In a book of coins were those issued by merchants during the Civil War.

Another interesting collection included all the metal coins used by the 13 original colonies.

Mr. Goodwin stated that he had disposed of some 14,000 coins during his 27 years of collecting. These were mostly duplicates. He showed coins made of glass, porcelain, leather and other materials besides the metals commonly used today.

Information Concerning the Duties Of Your County Commissioner

In making my canvass for Commissioner of Precinct 1, I have found a number of people who have asked "just what does the duties of a commissioner consist?" I thought I might try to tell you a little about the many duties of a person filling this office, or at least so far as my knowledge goes.

In the first place, we have four commissioners in our county, who with the county judge, constitute the commissioners' court. Not only does a commissioner need to know how to operate and maintain the heavy equipment used in grading and taking care of our public roads, he must also be a man of good business judgment. He must be able to look ahead, and be capable of delving into the many problems of a financial nature that have to do with the court governing the finances of the county.

It is before this court that the tax rate is set. It also has the responsibility of purchasing all supplies for the use of the several other officers of our county, and this is no little item. Also all bills due by the county are presented to the court for audit and allowance or rejection, as the case may be. The matter of establishing new roads, or closing old ones is another duty that rests with this court. There are other road matters of such concern that limited space will not permit a detailed discussion. The matter of filling vacancies in county offices is within the power of the court, which at times is of considerable importance.

There are many other duties. I'm sure, some of which I am not familiar enough with to properly describe to you. To say the least, this is a very important office, both inside and out, and requires much thinking as well as action to fill properly. If elected, there are many things I would need to know, but there are many matters, such as road work and the equipment used, that I am familiar with. I have a fair knowledge of the work of the county as concerns the court's duties, and the many important things that are handled. I shall diligently try at all times, if elected, to improve my work, and the limited knowledge that I possess now so that I may make you a better commissioner as time moves on.
