



**NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR THE RE-ALLOCATION OF COUNTY TAXES THE STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF RUNNELS**

To the Resident Qualified Property Taxpaying Voters of Runnels County, Texas: TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held on the 26th day of February, 1955, in said County, in obedience to an order duly entered by the Commissioners' Court on the 25th day of January, 1955, which is as follows:

WHEREAS at the general election held throughout the State of Texas on November 7, 1944, the qualified electors of the State, voting on the proposition approved the amendment to Section 9, of Article 8, of the Texas Constitution, which amendment provides that the Commissioners' Court in any county may re-allocate the county tax levies authorized in Section 9, of Article 8, by changing the rates provided for any of the purposes authorized in said Section by either increasing or decreasing the same, in no event shall the total of such taxes exceed Eighty (80) Cents on the one hundred dollar valuation for any one year, provided that before the Commissioners' Court may make such re-allocations and changes in such levies the same shall be submitted to the qualified property taxpaying voters of such county at a general or special election; and in the event such re-allocations and changes are approved by a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of any such county, such re-allocations and changes shall remain in force and effect for a period of six (6) years from the date of the election at which same shall have been approved, unless the same again shall have been changed by a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of such county, voting on the proposition; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioners' Court of Runnels County, Texas, deems it advisable and to the best interest of said County to re-allocate the county taxes authorized to be levied annually by Section 9, Article 8, of the Constitution, by changing the rates in respect to certain county taxes as herein provided; THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF RUNNELS COUNTY, TEXAS: That a special election be held in said County on the 26th day of February, 1955, which is not less than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the qualified property taxpaying voters, who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, for their action thereupon:

**Proposition**  
Shall the Commissioners' Court of Runnels County, Texas, be authorized to levy and collect in each year for a period of six (6) years from the date of said election, county taxes as follows:  
Not exceeding Forty-Five (45) Cents on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for County purposes;  
Not exceeding Five (5) Cents on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for the erection of public buildings and other permanent improvements;  
Not exceeding Twenty-five (25) Cents on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, to supplement the jury fund of the County;  
In the event that the annual levy of a tax not exceeding fifteen (15) cents on the one hundred-dollar valuation for the further maintenance of the public roads of said County has been heretofore, or shall hereafter be, authorized by a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of the County, voting at an election held for that purpose, nothing herein shall be construed as rescinding or in any manner affecting the power and authority of the Commissioners

Court to levy and continue to levy said tax.  
The said election shall be held under the provisions of the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, particularly amended Section 9, of Article 8, of the Constitution, and Section 3a, Article 6, of the Constitution, and all persons who are legally qualified voters of said County, and who are resident property taxpayers who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election.  
The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

Notice of said election shall be given by posting a copy of this order at the top of which shall appear the words "NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR THE RE-ALLOCATION OF COUNTY TAXES," at the Courthouse door of said County, and in each of the election precincts of said County for thirty (30) days prior to the election, which notices shall be posted by the

Sherriff or a constable, who shall make return on a copy of such notice, how and when he executed the same.  
Notice of said election shall also be given by publication thereof in a newspaper published in Runnels County, once each week for three consecutive weeks, the date of first publication being not less than twenty-one (21) full days prior to the date of said election.

**Shakespeare Club Hears Talk on Oil Development**

"Oil Development in Runnels County" was discussed for the Ballinger Shakespeare Club at a meeting in the library club room last Thursday afternoon. The guest speaker was William L. Williams, III, of Abilene, plant superintendent of Runnels Gas Products Corp.

Mr. Williams gave an informative talk and showed films on the gas processing plant, located five miles north of Crews in the Cree-Sykes field. The plant is known as the Sykes processing plant.  
Mr. Williams stated that Texas had half of all the oil reserves in the United States and has led the states in production since 1920.  
Mr. Williams explained the purpose of the processing plant and how natural gas is separated from crude and sold for commercial purposes. He said that a fifth of the natural gas is routed from the plant into the Abilene area, and that the amount of natural gas pumped out of the plant daily would supply the entire city of Ballinger for ten days. He also emphasized the growing consumption of butane and propane gas by farmers in trucks, tractors, etc., pointing out that they are both inexpensive and free of dirt and oil.

After stating that Runnels county oil was a much higher grade than that found in the North, Mr. Williams, in conclusion said the purpose of the processing plant was primarily to conserve the gas, and return a large portion of it into the earth to help in oil production. The gas in the ground acts as a sweeper or booster to bring out the oil.  
Mr. Williams was introduced by the program leader, Mrs. Paul Petty.


**Methodist W.S.C.S. Packs Boxes for Service Men, Students**

**New Variety Oats Said Well Adapted For This Section**

John A. Barton, county agent, has been asked, since the recent rains, for information in regard to planting oats. He states that the right answer might be the planting of a new variety, the Alamo.

The Alamo is primarily a spring variety and is resistant to stem rust and a number of other diseases. A favorable point of this new variety is that it has a strong, stiff, upright straw that stands until time for combining under many conditions. It matures early, some weeks ahead of the Mustang and other varieties planted in this area. It has a plump, red seed which is practically free of awns and has a very high test weight.

Records show that from February 15 to 25 is plenty of time to plant this variety. The tests also show it to be high in yield.

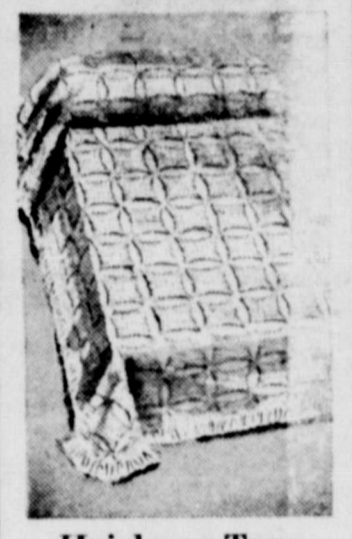

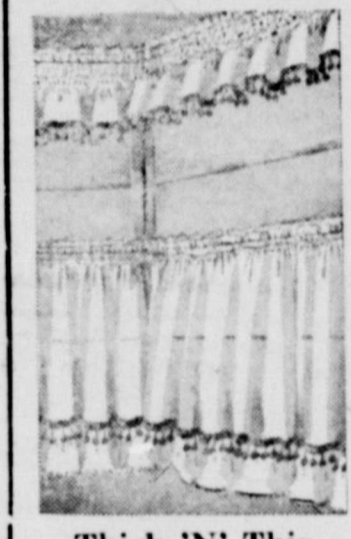

NOTES**

There is about the normal voting strength in Runnels county for an off-election year. The final check-up reveals that about 2,150 citizens paid poll taxes and these added to the over 60 and a few unders who have exemption certificates gives a fair potential. City officials and school trustees will be elected this year and one or more bond issue elections are sure for the southern section of the county. Owning a poll tax receipt will not be a loss this year as the issues are important. Payments of other taxes to collecting offices here were good—possibly better than in previous years.

Rains last Thursday night, Friday morning and Friday night were of considerable benefit to this section and will help small grain and cause planting of additional acreage. In some places the fall was sufficient to put out stock water, several farmers and ranchmen reporting surface tanks full and small streams running. More rain is needed to provide an underground "season" and a hard rain is necessary to run all streams and fill big tanks and lakes. While Ballinger's water supply on Valley Creek was boosted 18 inches, the lake is still low and needs to be filled and washed out before the heavy irrigation period.

We salute the Boy Scouts of America on their 45th birthday anniversary, which is being observed during Boy Scout Week, February 6 to 12. Since being founded in 1910, the organization has enriched the lives of 22,750,000 boys and adult leaders. Today there are 2,700,000 boys in the ranks of scouting and working with them are 960,000 adults who give generously of their time and talents. There are 95,000 scout-

The gas was off on Tuesday of last week at Doole, McCulloch county, and Mr. and Mrs. George Vinyard moved outside their yard, built a campfire and

started cooking their supper. In a short time they were joined by their neighbors and later other couples, also without gas, joined the group until there was a crowd on hand. They kept the coffee pot boiling and showed their hospitality with hot cups of Java as their friends gathered to warm and enjoy the fellowship.

The Stephenville city council discussed plans for a highway by-pass of the city last week and heard a number of visitors express opinions. The state highway department has presented plans to route traffic around Stephenville instead of through the main streets and the business district. Stephenville citizens are divided on the proposal, some wanting traffic routed through town and others favoring the by-pass. A ban on parking on certain streets to help through traffic has been proposed to the council as an alternative.

Home demonstration club members of Concho county attended a special recreation training meeting at Eden last week. Each club in the county was represented by two or more members and they in turn will serve as recreation leaders and give demonstrations for their own clubs. Leaders for the program had attended a recreation planning meeting in Ballinger last November.

The Brady city council has been offered the property of the Brady Country Club if the city government will clear outstanding debts. The property consists of a good club house, a golf course and other facilities. No action has been taken on the proposal but the issue may be submitted to the citizens at the municipal election in April. The council has investigated in a number of towns where club property has been taken over by municipal governments and operated on a fee basis. It was stated that the total owed by

the club would not exceed \$5,000.

Terrell Construction Co., of Amarillo, was moving heavy machinery into Colorado City last week for work on the freeway to be built on highway 80. The first work will be from the Howard county line to Westbrook. This stretch of the divided, four-lane freeway, was awarded the Terrell Co. on a bid of \$379,674. The company will reach peak construction in a short time when it will employ about 80 men including truck drivers.

A contract is scheduled to be let within a few days for a waterworks system for the town of Early, Brown county. Bids were opened last week by the city commission and Mayor W. E. Horner stated that a San Antonio firm submitted the low bid of \$123,270. A bond issue of \$175,000 has been authorized and the securities sold. The project will include digging a well, installing pumps, storage and a distribution system for 300 homes.

L. T. Youngblood, president of the First National Bank of Bronte, was reelected president of the Upper Colorado River Authority at the annual meeting last week, held at San Angelo. Youngblood will begin his tenth term as president of the authority. Other officers elected were Porter Henderson, of San Angelo, vice-president, and Gerald Allen, of Robert Lee, secretary. Two directors will be named as soon as they are approved by the legislature.

The last feature in connection with the March of Dimes will be held at Winters Saturday night when a talent show is to be presented. Mr. and Mrs. Frank Merriell are directors for the performance and the ugliest man will be selected in a voting contest. Several organizations in the Winters area have selected talent to represent them in the show and a full house is expected to greet the performers. Homer Hudgins, Winters chairman, has revealed that the fund for the northern section of the county is still short.

A small Brownwood crowd attended a meeting last week when members of the charter commission explained the changes suggested in the 1916-

model city charter. The committee chairman detailed major changes proposed in the charter and a question and answer session of the program was directed by a lawyer who gave the legal information necessary. It was voted to send a complete copy of the proposed changes to every voter in Brownwood prior to the election, set for April 5.

J. H. Bryant, a farmer who lives in the Sidney community of Comanche county, registered his model T Ford at the Comanche court house last week for the 32nd time. The Sidney Add WEST TEX News farmer paid \$5.04 for his license plates and stated to court house employees that his car still performs fine and gets more than 25 miles to the gallon of gasoline. Bryant, 75, says his car keeps ticking along and will outlast him.

Coleman county March of Dimes workers tabulated a total of \$5,500 on January 31 and several other programs were to be held. Chairman C. L. Newton stated that it appeared certain the goal of \$6,000 would be attained. The chairman said all communities in the county had responded in a fine way and that talent programs scheduled the first week in February probably would provide the \$500 lacking.

A 126 per cent increase in the population of Andrews in a 4-year period was revealed last week in an unofficial scholastic census report. The population was estimated to be 7,349, an increase of 4,655 over the 3,294 counted in the official government census taken in 1950. The total population of the county was estimated to be 9,162, 2,122 children of school age having been counted. This was a gain of 257 over the scholastic census total in 1954.

## February 15 Final Date for Ordering Feed Through ASC

The county ASC office announces that February 15 is the deadline for placing an application for FHA feed. Until February 15, orders may be placed for a feed supply to last 60 days or until April 15. The applicant must use the purchase order for feed before the 120-day limit, which is May 15. No application can be placed after February 15.

The office has been advised that the railroads' 50 per cent reduction in rates for hay hauling will expire in February but the government will continue to pay half the cost on transporting hay up to \$10 per ton on all deliveries to eligible farmers and ranchers until midnight March 31.

Publicity has been requested on 1955 wool, explained below. The department of agriculture states that payments under the new program, for wool on animals marketed will be made on lambs or yearlings sold for slaughter.

Producers, in applying for wool payments, must have owned the animals at least 30 days. To be eligible for payment, the shorn wool and the lambs and yearlings must be marketed on or after April 1, 1955. In the case of shorn wool, it cannot have been shorn before January 1, 1955.

In qualifying for payment for wool on lambs or yearlings the producer must present to the ASC office a bill of sale showing the number of head sold, their total live weight, the date of sale and a certification that the animals were bought for

slaughter and had full wool pelts. The purpose of making wool payments on lambs and yearlings marketed, is to guard

against unusual shearing of animals prior to sale for slaughter. The actual payment rate will not be known until mid-1956 when the shorn wool incentive allowance will be determined.
