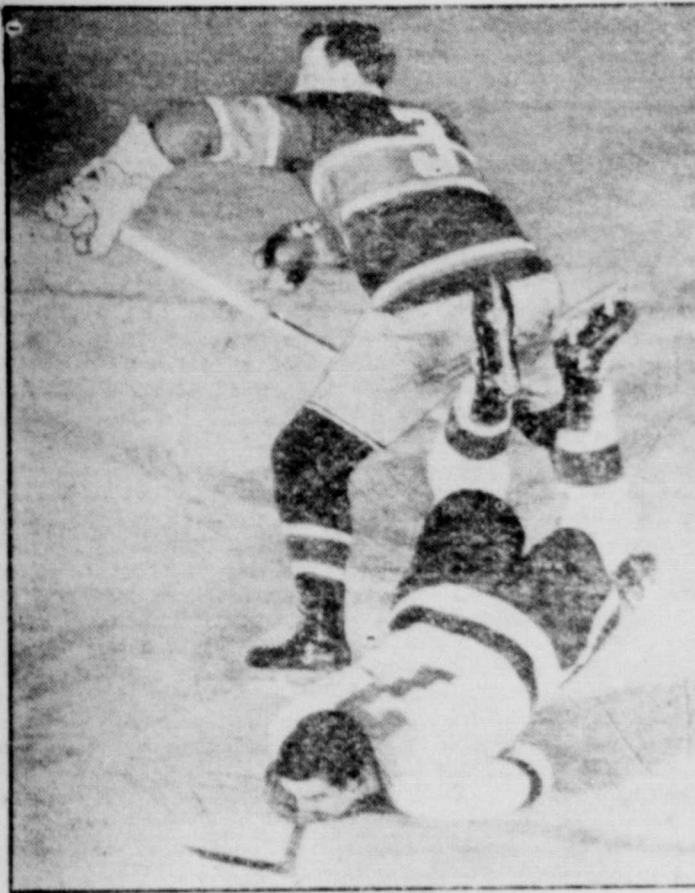

## WEST TEXAS NOTES

Pupils of the first and second grades in Runnels county received their first inoculations of polio vaccine last Thursday and will get the other "shot" on the afternoon of May 5. Only two "shots" will be given and parents who want their children to take the "booster shots" in the fall will make arrangements with their physicians for them. The clinics were held at Ballinger and Winters and with doctors, nurses and women's committees assisting, excellent time was made. This is the second big test for the Salk vaccine and a close check will be kept on all who received the inoculations. Last year only second grade pupils in the large cities were given the "shots." The results of the first test were astounding and brought speedy licensing of the 1955 program. The vaccine is being guarded against black market sales and it is believed there will be some in commercial channels in the near future.

May 8 will be Mother's Day. This observance has become one of the big gift-giving events of the year and stores feature special merchandise for the occasion. Mother's Day also is a special day for churches, music and sermons honoring mothers of the land. Attendance at religious services is possibly the largest of any day of the year.

The first big event at Ballinger's city park in 1955 will be held Tuesday night when the Rotary Club serves its annual pancake supper. This occasion has been well attended the past three years and the club has acquired permanent equipment to enable it to take care of big crowds. Special cooking equipment has been built to serve the meat and hot-cakes and experience gained in previous years has been valuable to the club members. The proceeds go to park improvements and the public is offered good fellowship while helping a worthy project.

The Ballinger national guard company was far ahead of the national average in the mobilization test alert. Within 20 minutes a majority of the company was at the armory and ready for the assignment. Others arrived shortly afterwards and the men were standing guard duty with automatic weapons set up in very quick order. In fact, the company test would have been practically perfect had it not been that a number of members are in college elsewhere. These will be credited for attendance in other cities and the local unit will have a still better record when reports are received on the out-of-town members.

HMS "Victory," Lord Nelson's ship is in dry dock at Portsmouth, England, and can be inspected daily until sundown.

Good progress is being made on a paving program at Bronte and last week some of the surfacing was finished on the first section. On a number of sections caliche has been applied and most of the base work has been done. Curbing has been started and this is helping the appearance of the pavement. When the project is completed, there will be at least 111 blocks and possibly 125 blocks of pavement. Almost every residence in the city will have pavement on at least one side. The hard-surfacing is expected to eliminate some of the blowing dust which has troubled housewives.

The 1955 Winters Showdeo is set for June 23, 24 and 25 and officers are arranging an attractive program. "Fat Boy" Wright, of Breckenridge, arena director, is promising outstanding performances each night. John W. Norman, president of the rodeo association, stated last week that a number of specialty acts would be offered, most of them new and not seen at previous shows.

A city-wide clean-up campaign was conducted at Miles Tuesday of last week, the city council furnishing free hauling of trash from all residences. Mayor H. J. Kasberg stated that all that was required was to put trash outside in containers that could be handled. Sacks were furnished those who did not have other containers. All city trucks and men were on the job and citizens cooperated by cleaning their premises.

Mayor Oswell Brightman has announced that the Comanche swimming pool, located at Lake Eanes, will be opened on May 15 unless weather is unfavorable. A modern filtration plant for the pool has been installed since the end of the 1954 season. City employees will do a general clean-up at the park to have it in good condition within a few weeks. Built at a cost of \$25,000 as a community-wide project, the pool was turned over to the city council for operation. Ertle Mayo, resident state highway engineer at Coleman,

stated last week that three-fourths of the concrete work on overpasses and bridges has been completed on the cut-off on highway 87 south of Coleman. Mayo also said grading of the roadbed was underway and good progress was being made. An elaborate system of islands and dividers will be set up to control traffic at the overpass, just west of Santa Anna, where three highways merge. This is the largest concrete job on the new route and contractors are still pouring columns.

More than \$200 in merchandise will be given by Colorado City merchants when a "good neighbor" party is held tomorrow (Friday) for citizens of Silver. Sponsored by the good neighbor committee of the Colorado City Chamber of Commerce, a number of entertainment features also will be presented. Invitations have been mailed to more than 400 people. Supper will be served at the Silver school at 7:30 p. m. and the program is to follow. A motorcade, with police escort, will make the trip from Colorado City.

Closing programs of the Paint Rock public school have been announced. On Sunday, May 15, Rev. Felix W. Keys, Jr., Presbyterian minister, will deliver the baccalaureate sermon. This service will be held in the high school auditorium. At 8:00 p. m. on May 20, the commencement program will be held. May 19 is the date for the graduation program of eighth grade students. Nine members of the senior class are candidates for

graduation this year.

Dr. Maurice Hyman was designated Menard County's "Distinguished Citizen of 1954" at the annual party sponsored by the Rotary Club for women and teachers. A secret committee selected Dr. Hyman on letters submitted by citizens of the county in which four other persons were nominated for the honor. The program was presented at Camp Sol Mayer and Dr. W. W. Jackson, of San Antonio, was the principal speaker. This is fourth year the award has been given for noteworthy community service.

Supt. K. O. Ellington states that the Melvin school will be closed on May 19. The baccalaureate service is scheduled on May 19, the grammar school graduation on May 17 and the seniors will receive diplomas on May 19. Speakers for these programs were not announced. Members of the three vocational classes spent considerable time last week cleaning the school grounds.

Rev. Ernest Rippetoe, of Stephenville, was elected president of the Texas Singers Association for the 16th consecutive time to conclude the annual convention at Stephenville last week. An estimated 7,000 singers from Alabama, Oklahoma, Tennessee, New Mexico and Texas attended the two-day convention. Twenty-five quartets and other singing groups rendered special numbers. In the final business session Stephenville was again chosen for the meeting place, in April of 1956.

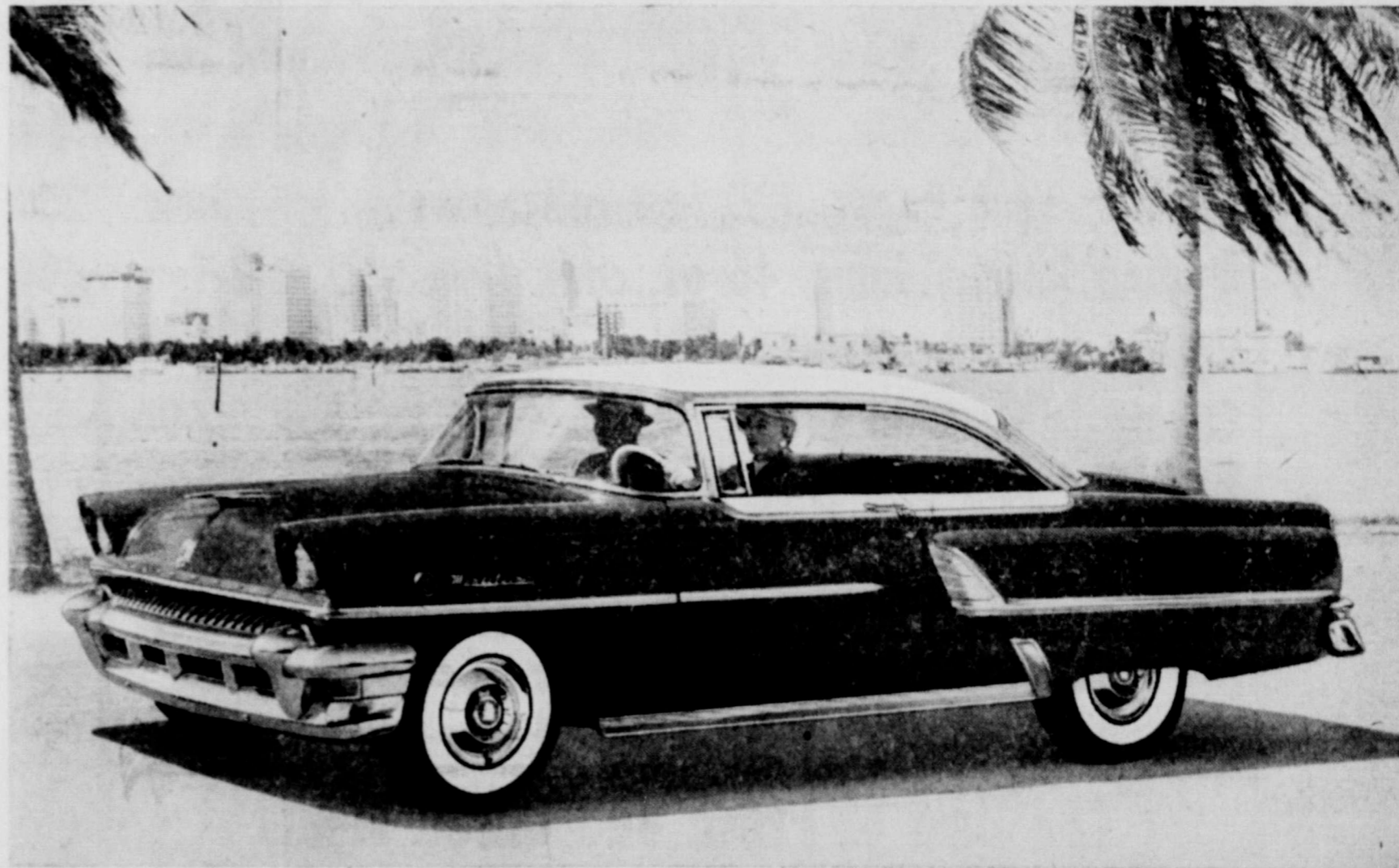

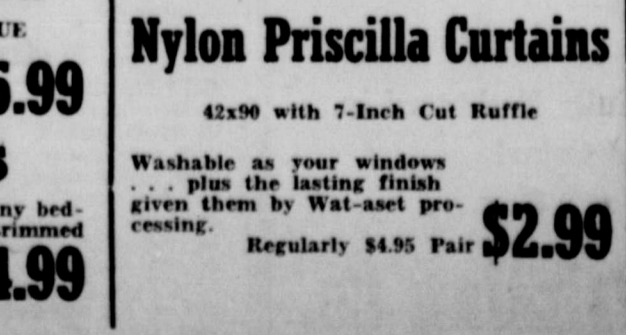

A formal program dance followed the banquet at the Acaduleto Cafe, at which the entire student body and dates were included.

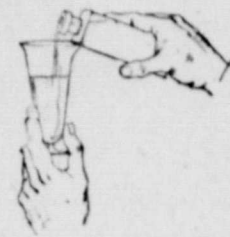

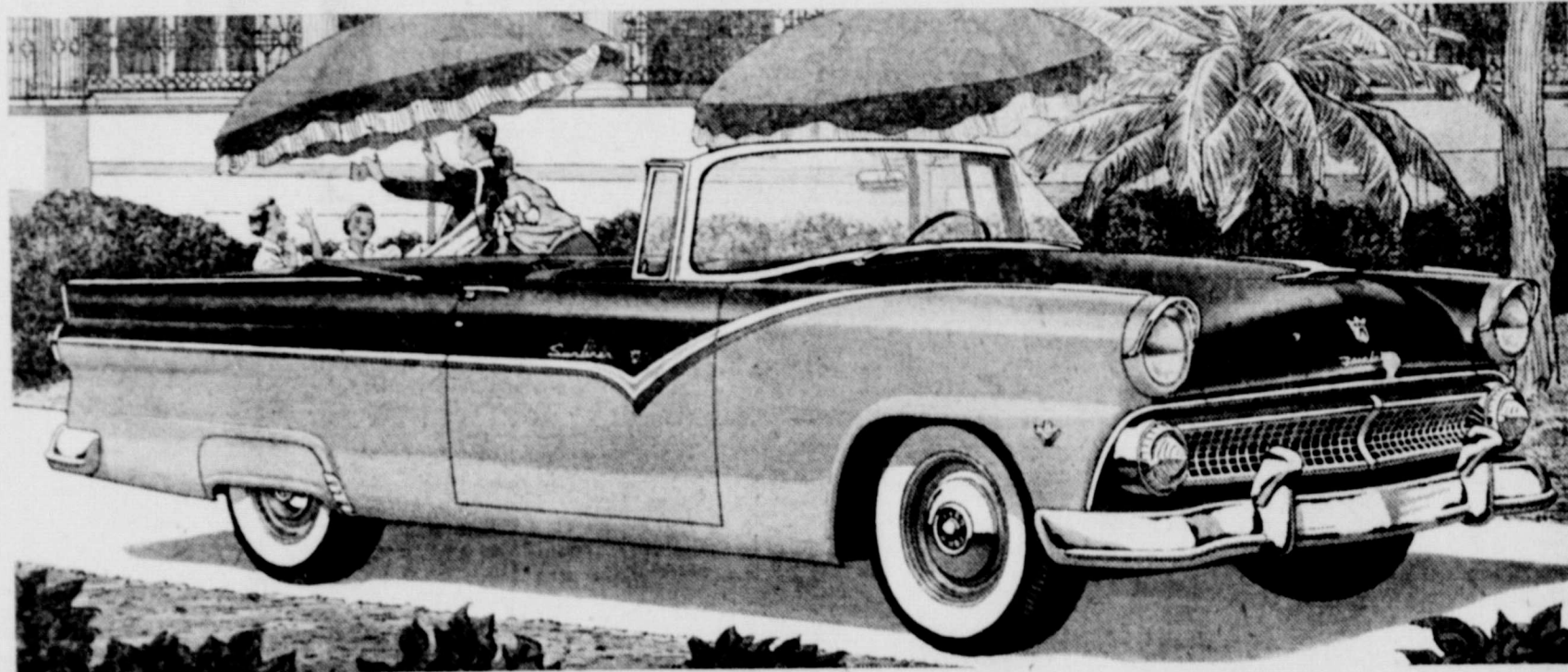
