## Highway Bond Issues Hearing Set Tuesday

The public hearing on the proposed road bond issue will be held at 10:00 a. m. on May 10 at the court house. County Judge W. H. Rampy stated that if attendance justified the meeting would be held in the district court room.

The petition recently presented to the commissioners' court asking that an election be called will be read and the court will check the list of signers to see that the required number are attached and that each is a qualified voter.

The petition is for two issues. The first requests the issuance of \$275,000 in bonds to be used for work on highway 67. The court would be required to purchase a 200-foot right-of-way from the Colorado River west to the Tom Green County line. In some places this will require an additional 120 feet and in others only 80 feet.

The court also would be asked to secure additional right-of-way east from Ballinger to the Coleman County line to make

the roadway 120 feet wide.

In the second proposition \$75,000 is asked in bonds, the money to be used for the purchasing of a 120-foot new right-of-way on highway 83 from Hatcher to a point east of Ballinger, intersecting highway 67.

Court officials pointed out that the voting of the two issues for \$350,000 would not mean that all that amount would be spent. Bonds would only be sold for the actual amount needed to purchase the land required in the several projects.

In case the petition is legally drawn, the signatures are those of qualified voters and the required number and the proposals seem economically sound, the court has no alternative but call the election. This can be done within 30 days following the public hearing, which would make the date about June 11.

The two propositions would be submitted on separate ballots and citizens could vote for one and against the other or against or for both.

## Tri-District Scout Camporee To be Held at Painted Rocks

Boy Scouts of the Colorado River, Heart of Texas and East Ranch districts will hold a camporee near Painted Rock this week-end. The groups will assemble on the Concho River under the Painted Rocks Friday and Saturday to demonstrate outdoor skills and crafts essential to good camping.

Participation will be on a patrol basis. All registered scouts, regardless of age, are eligible to participate, provided they are not registered in any explorer unit.

The boys will arrive tomorrow afternoon, set up camp and cook their evening meal. They will all participate in a campfire Friday evening. Members will take part in the following events Saturday: flapjack cooking, water boiling, compass reading, fire by flint and steel, knot tying, nature study, uniform and insignia contest.

About 200 scouts are expected to attend and the public is cordially invited to visit the camp any time.

Gene Heidenheimer, chairman of camping activities for the Colorado River district, will direct the meet. All local troops will be represented at the camporee.

The second supply of Salk polio vaccine, due to be administered to first and second grade pupils today, has not been received. Dr. O. H. Chandler, county health officer, stated it would be here later and the date for the next clinic will be set then.

Children of the two grades who failed to get the first "shot," will be inoculated today. There was enough vaccine in the first shipment here to take care of all who were missed because of illness or other reasons.

## Dual Discovery West of Winters Makes 425 Bbls.

Runnels County gained a dual discovery, 4 1/2 miles west of Winters, for a daily potential of 425 40 barrels of oil. W. W. West, of Midland, No. 1-Lillie B. Fennell was finished for production in the King sand and the Pennsylvania reef. From the King sand 198.75 barrels of 43.7 gravity oil was made and from the Pennsylvania reef 226.65 barrels of 43.8 gravity oil. The prospector originally was slated for a 5,000-foot Ellenburger test and was drilled to 2,986 feet.

Delaware Drillers, Inc., of San Angelo, is preparing to run casing and gauge production in its No. 1-Vernon Dankworth, six miles east of Ballinger. Cores indicated possible production in the Fry and Serratt sands. This was originally a wildcat failure.

Henson Drilling Co. has filed an application for a permit to drill its No. 1-Fred W. Graham, 1/4 of a mile north of production in the Enoch Johnson (Morris sand) field. Drilling will go to 4,500 feet when the permit is issued.

James K. Anderson and Keith D. Graham have filed an application for a permit to drill a 2,500-foot wildcat, ten miles northeast of Ballinger. It will be their No. 1A-Claude Brookshier Burger-Rayborn Drilling Co., of Coleman, has the contract.

J. H. Rhoden and Rhodes Drilling Co. No. 3-Hamp Byler, in the Ballinger (Palo Pinto) field, has been gauged for a daily flowing potential of 221 barrels of 40 gravity oil.

The state railroad commission, oil and gas division, has approved two additional fields in Runnels County: The Kendrick (Gardner) field was opened on April 14 and the Crews, South (lower Fry west) was opened April 7.

B. F. Phillips No. 1-Dr. Hale, Morris sand opener in the Lindemann multi-pay field, has been recompleted as the fourth Gardner sand well in the area. Its daily flowing potential is 106 barrels of 42 gravity oil. Top of pay was picked at 3,343 feet and the hole was drilled to 3,965 feet. Hole No. 1 was first completed as a Morris sand opener in June, 1953.

Thomas D. Humphrey & Sons No. 1-Otto Spreen was finished for a daily pumping potential of 35 barrels of 44.6 gravity oil in the Morris sand. Top of pay was encountered at 3,324 feet.

Gulf Oil Corp. No. 3-Sanford, three miles northeast of Wintgate, has been completed for a calculated flowing potential of 729.44 barrels of 44.2 gravity oil. Top of pay is at 4,509 feet.

Kenner Bros. Drilling Co. has filed an application for a permit to drill a deep wildcat at a location 9 1/2 miles southeast of Ballinger. It will be the company's No. 1-Hattie M. Harris.

## Local School Band Hits First Division In Area Contests

The Ballinger high school band scored high in the contests at Abilene Saturday. For the first time in a number of years the Ballinger musicians were awarded a first place in concert playing and second place in sight reading.

Director Gary DeShazo accompanied about 70 musicians to the contests, part of the interscholastic league meet. In the class AA division there were twelve bands and only the Ballinger and Coleman bands were awarded firsts. In all there were about 55 bands and orchestras competing. The bands represented all sizes of schools from class B to class AAAA.

The Ballinger band has made notable progress this year and of the 70 regular members, Mr. DeShazo said only 12 would be lost by graduation. In addition there will be several junior members ready for the high school organization in the fall.

The band has been lacking basses this year, only one playing in this group during the football season. The director expects to have at least four ready for this slot in September.

## \$325,000 School Bond Election Here Monday

Monday will be election day here, citizens of the Ballinger independent school district voting to authorize or reject \$325,000 in bonds. The bond issue election was called by the board of trustees after plans for a new school building were approved.

The floor plan for the building will be found elsewhere in this issue of The Ledger. The building would be located on the campus of the junior high school in West End and cover the entire frontage on two sides of the block. The one-story brick structure would extend down Broad Street and down Ninth Street. At the corner of Eighth and Broad streets the building would tie into the new elementary school, completed two years ago.

The Ballinger board states that passage of the bond issue will not increase property renditions or raise the tax rate. The bonds would be retired on the present rate and valuations, it was said, by transferring ten cents more from each tax dollar into the sinking fund.

The new building would add 25 classrooms and at the same time would modernize the Ballinger educational system. The old junior high school building is in bad condition and this would be eliminated, cutting the building down to one story and converting it into an auxiliary gymnasium and music hall. The old building on the central elementary campus also would be remodeled into a one-story building that could serve as an assembly hall.

If the bonds are authorized work on the new building would be started as soon as bonds are approved and sold and the contract can be let.

School officials are looking forward to the peak of scholastics, expected about 1960. They believe the new building will take care of requirements for a number of years and will modernize the system for all classes and departments.

All voters in the district are urged to go to the polling places next Monday and cast ballots. Election supplies have been secured and judges designated.

A new event is the all-school rodeo to be held on May 16 at the arena on the Bronte highway.

Mrs. Sim Cottelle will present her piano students in recital on the evening of May 17.

Joe Forester, high school principal, states that final examinations will begin at 9:00 a. m. on May 18 and continue until noon on May 20.

May 20 will be Senior Day and the last day of school work.

The baccalaureate service will be held at the First Baptist Church on May 22 and graduation exercises are set for the evening of May 23. Graduation exercises for junior high school students are scheduled at 10:00 a. m. on May 23.

## Telephone Office To Close Saturdays Effective on May 21

John D. Allen, division manager for the Southwestern States Telephone Co., announces a new policy regarding the closing of the local business office here. ## Plans for Future Mapped By District Soil Supervisors

W. J. Halfmann, chairman of the Runnels County soil conservation district, presided at the regular meeting here last week. The supervisors had invited Rev. R. H. Cagle, president of the Ballinger Ministerial Alliance; John H. Curry, farm home administration supervisor; and Joe Droll, Audra L. Mitchell and Clifton Davis, committeemen; to attend the meeting. Supervisors present were Mr. Halfmann, Kirby Robinson, Bill Minzenmeyer, Joe Pressley and H. Giesecke, Jr. Also present was Woodrow Hoffman of the soil conservation service.

John Curry explained the FHA loan for soil and water conservation. He said, "to be eligible for a soil and water conservation loan an applicant must:

1. Be a citizen of the United States.
2. Be a farm operator.
3. Be unable to obtain the necessary credit on reasonable terms and conditions from private or cooperative sources.
4. Have enough experience or training to indicate reasonable prospects of carrying on a successful farming operation.
5. Plan to improve a farm on which the operator is engaged primarily in farming."

Mr. Curry also stated that the loan fund may be used to pay the cash costs of making improvements directly related to conservation of soil, water development, conservation and use.

Kirby Robinson, vice-chairman of the board, explained how once a year one Sunday is set aside in May as Soil Stewardship Sunday. This year Sunday, May 15, will be observed throughout the United States. Those present were reminded that farmers are stewards of the soil for only a little while and should take care of it so the nation will remain strong.

Rev. Cagle took the soil stewardship packets and will distribute them to the ministers who belong to the local alliance. The packets were compiled by the national association, sponsor of the special Sunday.

Arrangements also were made by the supervisors to get the packets into the hands of other ministers who do not belong to the Ballinger alliance.

The board selected A. F. Albrow, who operates the F. E. Berryman farm at Wilmeth, as the outstanding conservation farmer of the district. He will be honored and presented a plaque at a luncheon given by the Ballinger Lions Club on Friday, May 13.

Conservation plans were approved by the supervisors for Eugene White, Winters; Charlie L. Chapman, Winters; Clarence Book, route 1, Rowena; H. E. Phillips, route 2, Bronte; Chester McBeth, route 2, Winters; M. L. Dobbins, route 4, Winters; Walter Holik, route 2, Miles.

The board made plans for a district-wide field day to be held sometime in July.

## B.H.S. Seniors Leave on Trip To Corpus Christi This a. m.

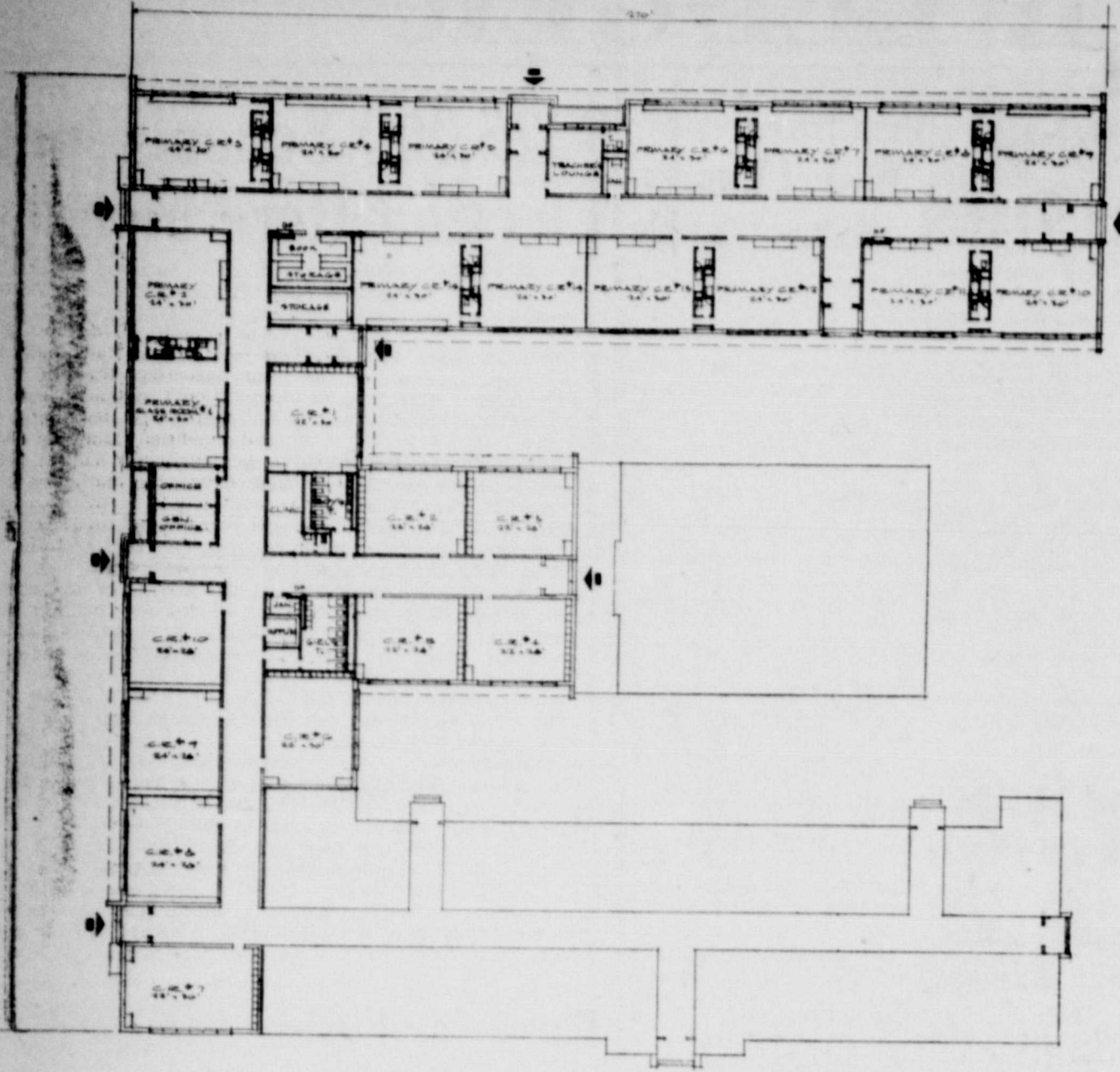

Above is the floor plan of the proposed new school building here for which a \$325,000 bond issue election is scheduled on May 9. Looking at the building from Eighth Street, the immediate section above, which is shown blank, is the building completed three years ago and now occupied by the elementary grades. The new building would extend one block on Broad Street and one block on Ninth Street with a center section extending back almost to the old junior high school building. It would provide 25 additional classrooms, several offices, book rooms, rest rooms and clinic. The old two-story building would be remodeled into a one-story structure to serve as a gymnasium and music rooms.
