First Methodist Church Dedication on June 26

Formal opening and dedication of the First Methodist Church has been announced for Sunday, June 26. Rev. Wayne Reynolds, pastor, announced the opening Monday before he left to attend the annual meeting of the Central Texas conference, Fort Worth.

Bishop William C. Martin, of Dallas, will deliver the first sermon at the 11:00 o'clock morning worship hour and will also direct the dedication in the afternoon. Rev. Reynolds will deliver the evening sermon.

Arrangements have been made for dinner at the church, the new kitchen and fellowship hall to be used for the first time.

In addition to the service of dedication in the afternoon, an open house will be held and all friends of the church invited for a tour and inspection of the new building and facilities. An organ program will be presented in the main sanctuary.

A large number of former pastors and members are being invited to return for this occasion and many out-of-town guests will be here for the day.

The fellowship hall will be seated and in case of an overflow the congregation will be able to hear the service over the public address system.

Rev. Reynolds stated Monday that as soon as he returns from Fort Worth, the first of next week, he will be able to supply the complete program for the opening.

The church has all complete this week except a small amount of work on the installation of the pipe organ. This work has been underway three weeks and is expected to be finished this week-end.

The new church, built at a cost of half a million dollars or more, is one of the finest in this part of the state.

Bogus Checking Tops Criminal Cases for Week

Local officers had a comparatively quiet week-end, most of their work concerning worthless checking complaints.

Warrants were issued for Glenn Powell and O. M. Yarborough for fines which have not been paid.

Two drunks were fined in the court Monday morning.

Robert E. Stuart has been arrested in San Bernardino, California, and will be returned here for trial. He gave a check for \$148 to the Dallinger Hardware Co. in payment of an outdoor motor.

D. E. Flanagan has been arrested at Carlsbad, New Mexico, for local officers and will be returned here. He is charged here with forgery.

The West Cafe, on Strong Avenue, was entered Monday night and cigarettes and pennies were stolen. Officers are working on the case but no arrests have been made.

Fred Harwell, Jr., a spring graduate of the Olney high school, will spend the summer with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Fred Harwell, of Ballinger. He will enroll as a student at Texas Technological College, Lubbock, next September.

Park Repairs Made To Permit Baseball For Little League

H. B. Edmondson, in charge of the Little League for the sponsoring Jaycees, said practice would begin this week for all boys interested.

The board of directors, composed of Doyle St. John, T. J. Mansell, Bill Moore, Joe Forrester and Clayton Jay, will meet tomorrow night at the city hall. Bill Greer, league president, also will meet with the directors and if the boys show sufficient interest, teams will be formed for the sponsors and a schedule made up.

At the last meeting the board of directors approved two negro teams if available. These teams would operate as separate units but would play the regular league schedule.

Mr. Edmondson stated that there were more sponsors than teams and that firms and individuals who sponsored teams last year would be given preference. He also stated that he expected many more boys to sign up after practice sessions were underway and the park assured for games.

Officers of the Ballinger Baseball Association have completed numerous repairs and are taking out insurance so games can be played at Cat Park this summer.

The fence was damaged by high winds recently and this has been repaired and some work done on the stands. Several requests have been received by the officers for use of the park on week-ends and the grounds and facilities also will be made available to the Little League.

Only 45 boys had signed up for play in this league Monday morning and about 60 are needed to have four teams. Sponsors have been secured and workouts can be started as soon as teams are formed.

Boys who desire to play in the Little League are asked to sign up at the Ballinger Chamber of Commerce office this week-end. Unless more sign up it may be impossible to maintain a schedule this year.

T. J. Mansell stated that he had had requests from negro teams to play games on Sundays. The park was not used last summer because no liability insurance was available.

Two-Day Rodeo Opens Tomorrow At Local Arena

The Ballinger junior rodeo will get underway tomorrow with programs scheduled Friday and Saturday nights. The big show will open at 4:00 p. m. tomorrow with a downtown parade in which a large number of riders will participate.

Performers are scheduled to begin at 8:00 p. m. daily and boys from a number of West Texas counties will enter. There will be bareback riding, steer riding, tie-down calf roping and ribbon roping. A special feature each evening will be a goat scramble for boys 10 years old and under.

The rodeo will be held at the arena on the Bronte highway just northwest of Ballinger. The arena is well lighted and there is parking space to serve a large crowd. All officials have been secured and the various events will be run off in fast time.

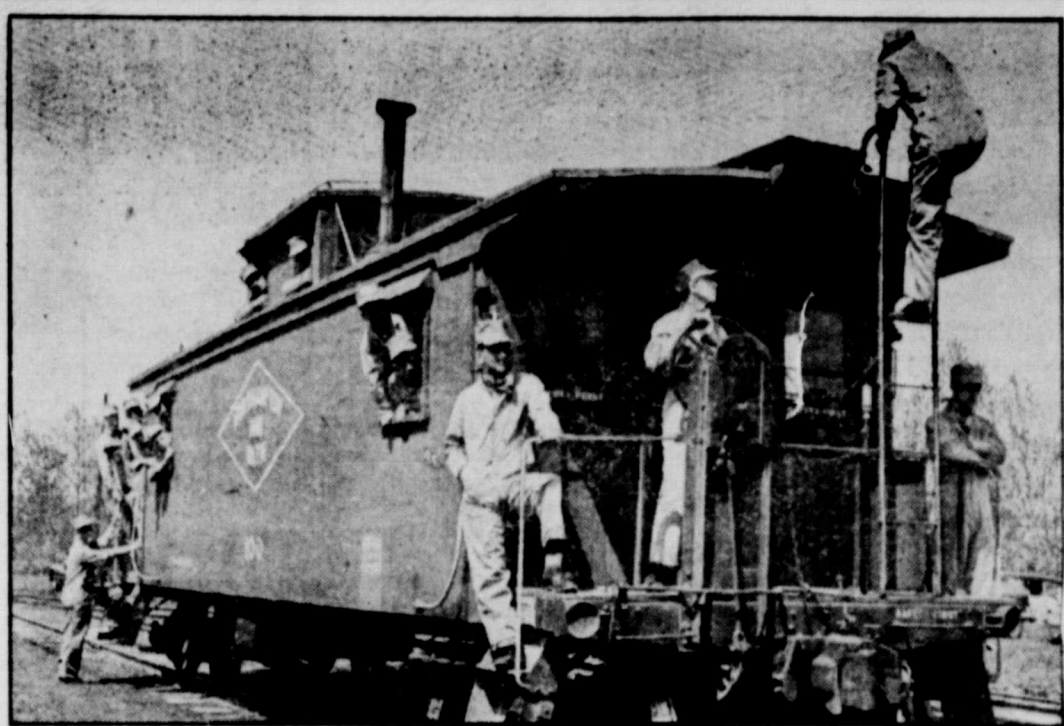
A public address system will be in service and an announcer will keep the audience informed on time made by each performer and the winner of each event.

First Section of Pavement For City Park Completed

The first section of pavement for city park has been completed, all driveways being topped with asphalt last week. The new spreader owned by the county, for use in commissioner's precinct No. 1, was used for the first time and after the "bugs" were overcome the operators got good results. Approximately 4,000 gallons of asphalt were applied and as soon as more material is received the entrance road from the Coleman highway to the swimming pool will be topped.

When this work is finished the spreader will be moved to Eighth Street to connect pavement with the Bronte highway. Completion of this short stretch is expected to take much traffic off Broadway and route it to Eighth Street.

Later, pavement will be built on two sides of the school campus in West End to give paving all around the property.

Clyde Chapman, commissioner for precinct 1, will soon start base work on the country club road, which is to be surfaced from Eighth Street, by the city pumping plant and country club to the precinct line. This road is serving heavy traffic and when completed, as a county project, will be the same type of construction as farm-to-market roads.

Several other projects in the corporate limits are being prepared and will be topped when the base is ready for surfacing. Both city and county equipment was operated at city park for base building, curbing and surfacing. The entrance from the bluff on Crosson Avenue was curbed and guttered before the base was built, and surfacing on this section was completed Wednesday.

It is planned to erect an attractive entrance and a sign at the intersection of the park road and the Coleman highway.

Orahoods Return From Youth Camp Near Brownwood

Rev. and Mrs. C. B. Orahood, of the First Christian Church, returned home Friday from the Lake Brownwood Christian Retreat, where they were "Pop" and "Mom" to 123 boys and girls for one week. This was the annual Chi Rho encampment for Christian churches in this 20-county area of West Texas. There were 8 men and 9 women counselors and guest leaders. Youths attending were 12, 13 and 14 years of age.

Six Ballinger youths, Sue Ann McAllister, Paul Price, Wade Clifton, Glorianna Crawford, Linda Dankworth and Gay Johnson, attended.

The retreat is a 33-acre tract on the north shore of the largest part of Lake Brownwood and is three-fourths surrounded by water. The main part is 20 to 30 feet above the high water level. It is owned by a corporation authorized and directed by district 11 of the Disciples of Christ in Texas, operating through an annual convention. Dormitories, guest house, chapel, central dining hall and kitchen are all modern, have air-conditioning and accommodate 270 people.

The daily schedule included quests, lakeside worship and numerous other activities such as organized play, social fellowship on a Christian level and much personal counseling that is sought by the campers. Mr. and Mrs. Orahood stated that the youth camp was the highlight of the year for them.

Recreational leaders of Runnels and Coleman counties and 4-H club girls of the two counties who will attend the district encampment at Buffalo Gap were here for a meeting last Thursday. Sessions were held all afternoon at the American Legion hall to practice games, songs and other recreation to be presented at the district gathering.

Runnels County girls who are to attend the district camp, along with the recreational leader and Miss Ollie Chenoweth, county home demonstration agent, will plan and conduct the 1955 county encampment program, scheduled June 29 and 30. More than 100 of the county's club members are expected to attend and each day and one evening will be filled with activities.

Concho County 4-H club girls will meet in Ballinger on June 28 and 29. They will be at the Legion hall one night and on the second day will move to the city park so that the Runnels County girls can move into the Legion hall on the afternoon of June 29.

The Runnels County encampment will reach a climax at noon on June 30 when a dinner is served at which there will be a number of invited guests.

Western Company Will Close Station Here This Month

The Western Co. oil well servicing concern, with office and warehouse here the past two years, will close the Ballinger station this month. C. R. Pannill, district manager, stated that a new station would be opened by the company at Lindsey, Oklahoma, but he did not know whether the local personnel would be transferred there.

Church of God's Vacation School To Start June 13

The annual vacation church school of the First Church of God, Broad and Thirteenth Streets, is scheduled June 13 through 24. This was announced the first of the week by the pastor, Rev. C. W. Jones.

Director of the school will be Mrs. W. H. Beard. Members of the board of Christian education of the church have been selected as assistants. These include Rev. Charles Jones, Mrs. Ronald Cooper, Miss Fae Harrington, Mrs. Jesse Collins, Mrs. Carl Fouts, Mrs. Gene Green and Mrs. M. J. Keel.

The school will consist of ten sessions on the theme of "Worshiping God." Daily sessions are from 8:00 to 9:30 a. m. and will provide for study, recreation, activities and worship. Classes are being arranged in four departments from ages 3 to 14 years.

CONY MEDICAL SOCIETY SETS LIMIT ON POLIO SHOTS

The Runnels County Medical Society met Tuesday and it was decided to limit the administration of polio vaccine to the age group of 5 to 9 years of age. This is in accordance with the recommendation of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

The society also voted to sponsor an essay contest, details to be worked out with school administrators of the county.

Berry-Campbell 3 Is Big Producer From Palo Pinto

Paul E. Berry No. 3-Hugh Campbell was finished Wednesday morning and is believed to be the biggest producer in the Ballinger (Palo Pinto) field. The initial production was at the rate of more than 20 barrels an hour with a strong flow of gas. Operators stated that the pay formation was the thickest yet found in the field. The new well was an eastern and southern extension of the field.

Warren Petroleum Corp. will drill a 5,200-foot wildcat, one mile west of the Jim Adams field. The project is known as the No. 1-Bill Harmon. This field produces from the Fry sand at approximately 4,377 feet.

Caroline Hunt Trustee Estate has staked No. 1-Zappe for a 5,300-foot Cambrian wildcat, seven miles northwest of Ballinger. The location is three miles northeast of the Tyree (Goen) field. A rig is being set up and tours will start work at once.

Duster Precedes Rain in Section; Damage Slight

Black dust rolled into Ballinger late Wednesday afternoon riding a 65-mile wind. It was the worst duster in many years, if not in history, and turned day into night almost instantly after it struck. Rain followed, about half an inch falling in Ballinger and immediate vicinity.

The approach of the black, swirling clouds caused many people to leave the downtown district and rush to their homes and to cellars where available. Small damage resulted in most sections of the city, tree limbs being blown off, television antennas bent down and some water damage resulting to homes.

Most places in this section received good showers, Millersville getting two inches and Abilene 1.65.

Electric service was off for a short time in Ballinger but was quickly restored.

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TURNER WINS TICKET ON PLYMOUTH AUTO

D. W. Turner was the winner of the \$1,000 on the 1955 Plymouth car given away by the Bell Grocery & Market here last Saturday afternoon. Mr. Turner's name was drawn and he was there to receive the gift.

Vote on \$350,000 Road Bonds Scheduled July 2

Citizens of road district No. 3, Runnels County, will go to the polls on Saturday, July 2, to cast votes for or against two road bond issues. The two issues total \$350,000 and the money would be used to provide right-of-way for proposed highway improvement programs in the district.

Rain Saturday Covers County; Streams Rise

Showers to heavy rains fell in Runnels County Saturday and will greatly boost crops planted after previous recent moisture. While Ballinger got only about a quarter of an inch, rains in every direction were heavier but spotted.

North of Ballinger from 40 to 1 1/2 inches were reported. Within a short time after the rains, Valley Creek, Elm Creek and the Colorado River were up and water again went around the city lake spillway.

South of here rains were much heavier, 1 1/2 inches being reported at a number of places. Two inches fell at Paint Rock and ranches south of the Concho County capital got as much as four inches.

In the Gouldskus community, southern Coleman County, hail wrecked houses and destroyed crops, stones the size of a baseball falling. This hail and wind-storm was accompanied by four to five inches of rain. There was heavy tornadoic wind damage at Brady, Brownwood, Cross Cut and a number of other places. Tornado warnings for this section remained in effect until 3:00 a. m. Sunday.

Farmers in most sections of the county stated the rain Saturday was about what they needed.

Membership Award To Ballinger Lions For Topping Quota

A citation from Lions International was presented the Ballinger Lions Club Friday noon. The certificate was for exceeding the new membership quota during the campaign in January.

An invitation from the Wingate club was read, asking the Ballinger Lions to attend the charter night program Monday, June 13. Several members of the local club indicated they would attend.

Roy Terry, of Paint Rock, had charge of the program for the local club and showed motion pictures taken at recent bullfights in Mexico. The pictures, made by Mr. Terry, were explained by him during the showing.

The local club is making plans for the installation of officers at the first meeting in July and is also preparing a water show to be presented within a few weeks. This supersedes the formal opening of the municipal swimming pool which was cancelled because Lions were at San Angelo attending the district convention.

TWO BALLINGER BOYS GO TO SALVATION ARMY CAMP

John and Joe Alkerson left Sunday morning for Duncanville to attend the Salvation Army camp all this week. They will return home next Sunday.

The two local boys were sent to the camp by the Ballinger chapter of the Salvation Army and all their expenses will be paid by the local unit. John is 12 years of age and Joe is 11.

The program of activities starts early in the morning and is carefully planned until "lights out" at night.

Valuations of property within the district total less than first anticipated. A tabulation shows about 8 million dollars in reductions and this will make the issues cost more than originally calculated.

Bonds which could be retired in 25 years and sold for 3 per cent interest would cost 26 cents on the \$100 to retire.

Twenty-year bonds sold at 2 1/2 per cent interest would cost 29c on the \$100 to retire.

County officials now believe that they can meet the right-of-way requirements with only \$200,000 to \$250,000 of the bonds being sold. If this can be done, they also think only about a 20-cent raise on the \$100 in taxes will be necessary.

While the two issues total \$350,000 it is believed that only about \$250,000 will actually have to be sold in order to take care of the district requirements. A compromise is being worked out on right-of-way needs at Rowena on highway 63 which is expected to save the district \$90,000 to \$100,000 in cash. A short section of the highway would be only 150 feet wide and it is possible to obtain the needed land without having to move two gins and a number of other buildings.

County officials also believe the bonds can be sold at a lower interest rate than quoted in the above schedule. If this can be done it will take care of part of the taxes necessary to retire the bonds.

If both issues are approved by the voters, they will be advertised and sold to the best bidder. After they are issued, only the bonds that are actually needed will be sold and taxes will only be collected on the amount issued and sold.

Road district No. 3 was formed in 1928 and at that time bonds amounting to \$425,000 were approved. No taxes have been assessed for this issue, the state taking care of the retirement. At present only \$97,000 of that issue is unpaid and it will be retired by the state.

The two propositions to be voted on July 2 are \$75,000 for securing new right-of-way from Hatchel to Ballinger and \$275,000 to secure additional right-of-way on highway 67 from the Coleman to the Tom Green county line.

Car Overparking Increasing Here, Records Disclose

The number of overparking tickets issued in Ballinger has been on the increase the past two months. Previously, when a driver who received a ticket could square the charge by returning a nickel to the city police office, traffic officers were issuing more than a thousand tickets a month. After it was made a requirement that 25 cents be returned instead of 5 cents the total was greatly reduced for a time.

During May traffic officers issued 1,475 tickets for overparking. From this number \$338 in quarter fines were collected and those who failed to make returns were assessed fines of \$1.00 each. The cash income from parking meters last month totalled \$831.

The police department's report for May shows 14 arrests, 2 for affray, 1 for disturbing the peace, 3 for operating a motor vehicle without a license, 6 for drunkenness and 2 for unlawful use of the registration seal. A total of \$189 in fines was collected.

During the month 7 accidents were investigated, the property damage being \$2,252. Two fires were reported in the corporate limits on which the insurance loss has not been determined.

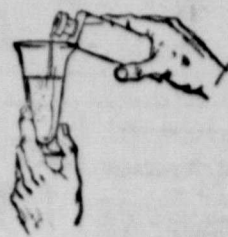

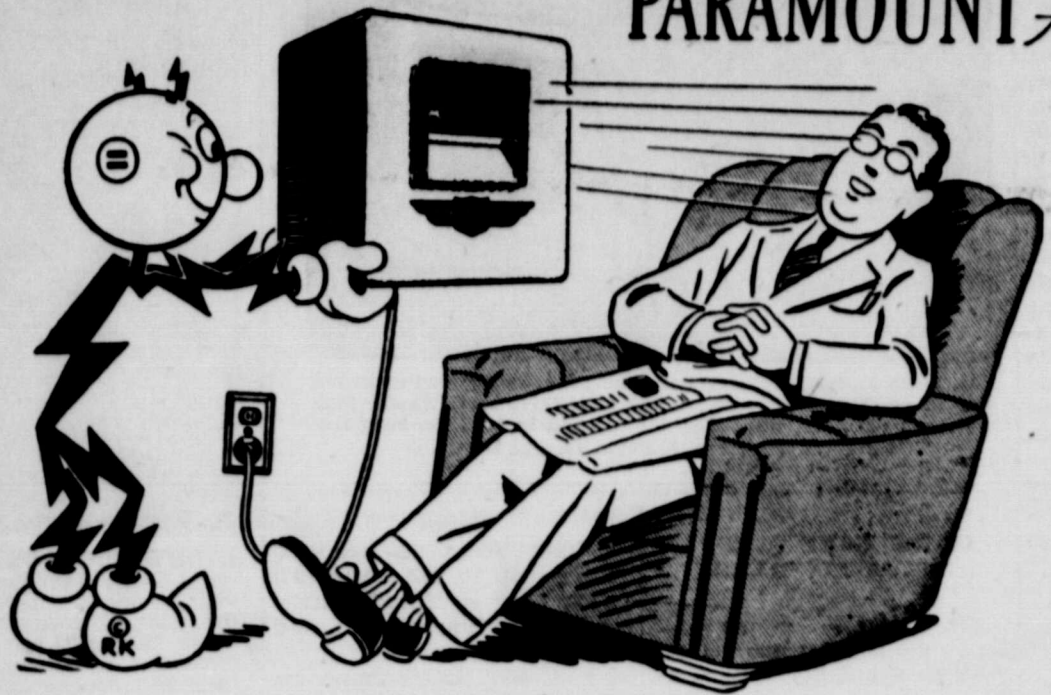

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WEST TEXAS NOTES

The sale of United States savings bonds is being pushed all over the nation this month. Leaders point out that the national defense program is expensive and bond purchases are important. During war, when people are excited, it is easy to build up campaigns and many citizens will help by buying bonds, but in times of peace only a few continue to buy—these being mostly people with plenty of money who acquire bonds as an investment. Leaders are asking that salaried men and women be encouraged to buy a bond a month to help the cause and to make sound investments. These are difficult to make—it is different when the country is actually at war. Any bank will be glad to take applications for bonds and issue them in any denomination from \$25 up.

People who live in road district No. 3, the southern section of Runnels County, will participate in a bond election on Saturday, July 2, to determine if the district will provide its part of the money for a big highway improvement program. The various issues involved include practically all the designated state and federal highways of this section. In addition to making the highways ultra-modern and providing right-of-ways that will take care of traffic for many years, it would also cause four to six million dollars to be spent in this immediate area. This can all be obtained by citizens of the district authorizing the issuance of \$350,000 in bonds. Authorization of the issues requires a two-thirds majority of all votes cast. Numerous items have entered into the propositions and considerable opposition has been expressed. Some are opposed because taxes would be raised slightly. Others are not in favor of the location of the highways as announced by the state highway department. Many are strong for all the proposed roads because they want to improve the system and save lives and property. Others look to the vast amount of money to be spent locally and the long-time jobs that will be made available. At any rate it is now up to the people and record totals should be polled in the 11 voting boxes on July 2.
