Highway Bond Issues Fail to Get Majority

Citizens of road district No. 3, Rannels County, defeated two proposed bond issues in a special election held in ten precincts Saturday. Approval of the bonds required a two-thirds majority of the registered voters applied, but in the other boxes of the district a big majority registered against the issue.

The action of the voters will cause the county commissioners' court to be unable to provide the required right-of-way for highway improvements in the district which would eventually have amounted to about five million dollars.

The first proposal was for \$275,000 in bonds to provide a four-lane right-of-way from the Coleman County line to the Tom Green County line on highway 67. This also would include a new bridge across the Colorado River in Ballinger to eliminate a bad curve and provide four lanes for traffic.

The second proposal was for \$750,000 to provide new right-of-way on highway 83 from Hatchel to Ballinger.

The total count on the first proposition was 516 for and 398 against. On the second proposition there were 459 votes for and 420 against.

Since the election was called, commissioners had announced that a saving had been made on the right-of-way at Rowena which would make it possible to meet the requirements with \$250,000 of the \$350,000 total. It was estimated that the issue could be retired with an increase of 20 cents on the \$100 valuation of property in the district on a 20-year basis.

Red Cross Gives Disaster Relief To 24 Families

The Red Cross disaster office at Winters was closed Friday afternoon and a report was made by the field representative to county chapter officers.

According to surveys made by the Red Cross worker there were two major damages and 498 minor damages in the hall storm at Winters two weeks ago. The mid-western Red Cross office at Kansas City sent \$2,500 in relief funds to Winters to take care of those who did not have insurance coverage and were unable to do repairs without hardship.

All applications for assistance were taken and these were investigated and the reports submitted to a Red Cross committee made up of Winters citizens. Twenty-four families were given assistance, two of which were for household furnishings and two for clothing. The remainder were mostly roof and window repairs and replacement. A total of \$2,158 was spent by the organization for disaster relief.

George Hill, Jr., is the disaster chairman at Winters and soon after the storm had an office open and ready to take applications. He was assisted in the work by Fred Young and Robert Walker.

Workers at Winters stated everyone was satisfied with the aid furnished by the Red Cross.

New School Plans Being Completed For Trustees' OK

Fred Buford & Associates, architects for the new Ballinger elementary school building, have notified Supt. Ernest Caskey that plans will be completed by the end of July. Mr. Buford will bring the plans here for a meeting of the board and final approval.

After the plans are accepted it will require three weeks to advertise for bids and a contract is expected to be let some time in August for construction of the \$325,000 building.

In the meantime a full program of repairs and improvements is going on in the entire school system.

The homemaking cottage has been roofed and the entire interior redecorated.

All the halls in the high school building have been refinished.

Halls in the negro school have been redecorated and floors refinished.

A crew is working at the central elementary building and will redecorate halls and rooms where necessary and will refinish all floors.

The walls and ceiling in the gymnasium have been repainted and within a short time the floor will be refinished.

Three sides of the junior high school block are being curbed and this work will be completed within a few days. Caliche is being spread on the streets and paving will be started in the near future.

Teachers' reports are being made up and supplies will be ordered this week for all departments of the system for the semester opening in September.

Two Car Crashes Occur in County During Holidays

State highway patrolmen for this area reported only two traffic accidents during the long Fourth of July holidays.

The first occurred at 7:30 p. m. Saturday five miles southeast of Bronte in Rannels County. O. B. Haight, of Lubbock, and members of his family were traveling in a 1955 Buick when the car hit a cow in the highway. The animal was killed and damages to the car totaled about \$500 but no one was injured. The family had started on a vacation.

At 8:15 Sunday night, near the Horseshoe Drive-in on the Paint Rock highway, two cars collided and two of the occupants were given treatment at the Ballinger Clinic-Hospital. A 1953 Oldsmobile, driven by Quincy Ray Traylor, of Winters, collided with a 1940 Ford driven by Stephen Galavan, of Ballinger. Galavan and Ramon Luera were taken to the local hospital for treatment and Patrolman Joe Perry stated Tuesday that driving while intoxicated charges would be filed against Galavan. Passengers in the Oldsmobile were not hurt but both cars were damaged.

Rhodes Will Drill On H. Lynn Place, South, East of Pay

Rhodes Drilling Co. made a location Wednesday afternoon on the Harry Lynn place, three miles northwest of Ballinger, and began moving in rotary equipment to start the company's No. 1-Lynn. The location is south of the Hugh Campbell lease and east of the Hamp Byler place, both with Palo Pinto production.

Second and third pays in unidentified limes and one in the Gardner sand have been indicated in the North Norton (Fry sand) field. M. C. Account et al, of Wichita, Kansas, No. 1-A. C. Minzenmayer, located 4 miles north of Norton, has the three showings. On a 10-minute drillstem test in an unidentified lime, between 4,555 and 4,562 feet, gas surfaced in one minute, mud in four minutes and oil in five minutes. The flow was not gauged or estimated. The operator also cored from 4,562-75 feet in lime for recovery of 11 feet of highly porous limestone. The top three feet was oil productive and eight feet was dense lime. The Gardner sand was topped at 4,668 feet. The operator plans to drill to 4,743 feet and set casing.

Bob Brinkerhoff and Wallace Bohannon, of Houston, have filed an application for a permit to drill a Serratt sand prospector on the Wesley Wood place, six miles north of Ballinger. The application calls for a depth of 2,500 feet.

Wes-Tex Drilling Co., of Abilene, No. 1-M. J. Barnhill has been completed for a daily flowing potential of 116 barrels of 46.6 gravity oil. The location is four miles east of Norton. Top of pay was drilled at 4,546 feet.

Henson Drilling Co., of Abilene, will drill a 4,500-foot wildcat, one mile west of the Don (Fry) field, southeast of Winters, to be known as the company's No. 1-V. E. Fisher. Operations will start as soon as the permit is approved.

Seth Henderson, who is in charge of the vocational therapy at McKnight Hospital, Carlsbad, was the guest speaker at the quarterly meeting of the Rannels County Tuberculosis Association directors' meeting, held at the Acapulco Cafe last Thursday night.

Mr. Henderson discussed the current problems at the state hospital and outlined vocational planning which was being done for the patients. He stated that 40% of the patients do not go home to take up some form of work, but the 60% who do go home and work are given an opportunity at the hospital to learn some occupation after they recover sufficiently. He discussed the needs of organizing a volunteer council in the county to help patients at the hospital.

Rev. Felix Keys, president, was in charge of the business period.

The bride was given in marriage by her father. She wore a

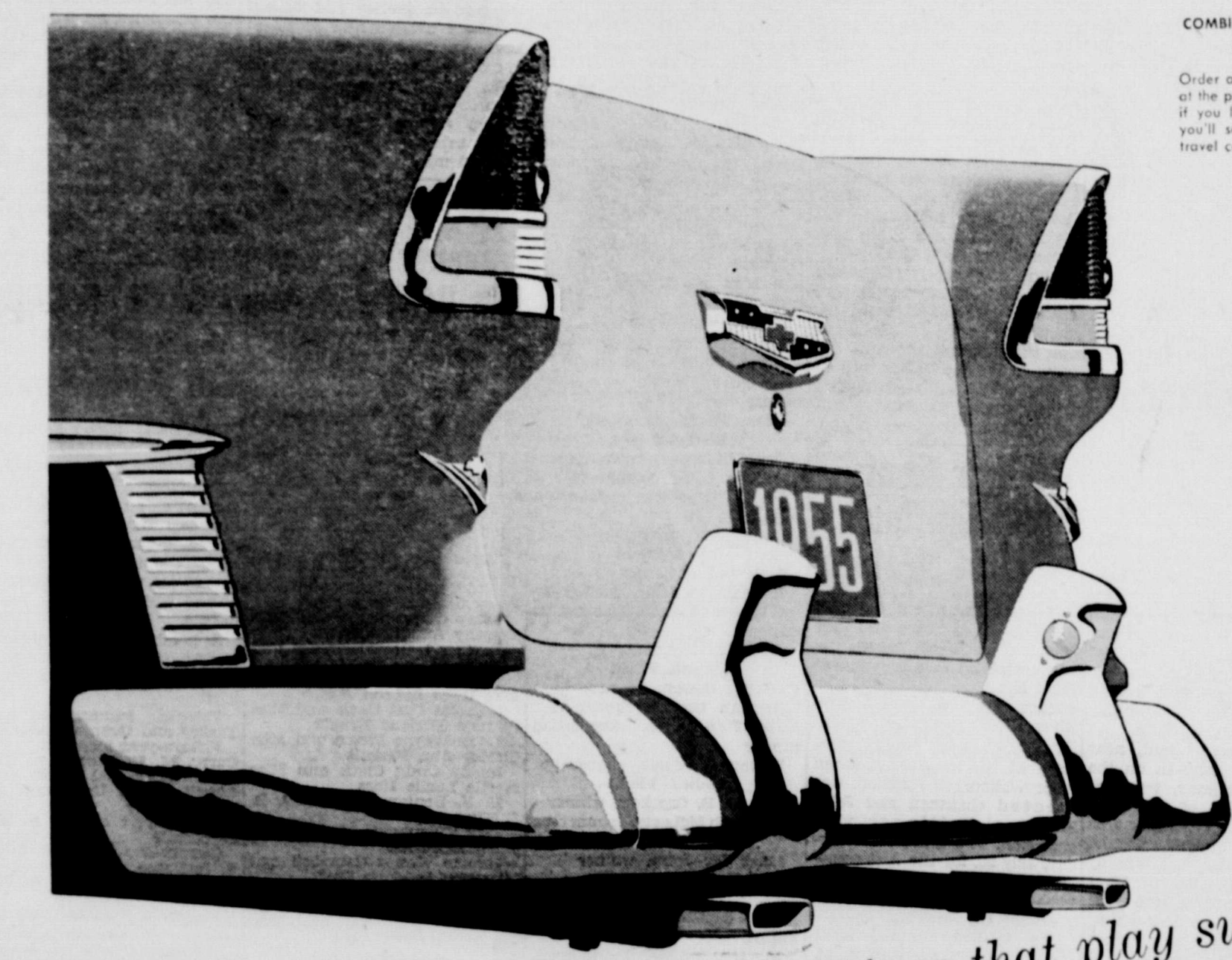

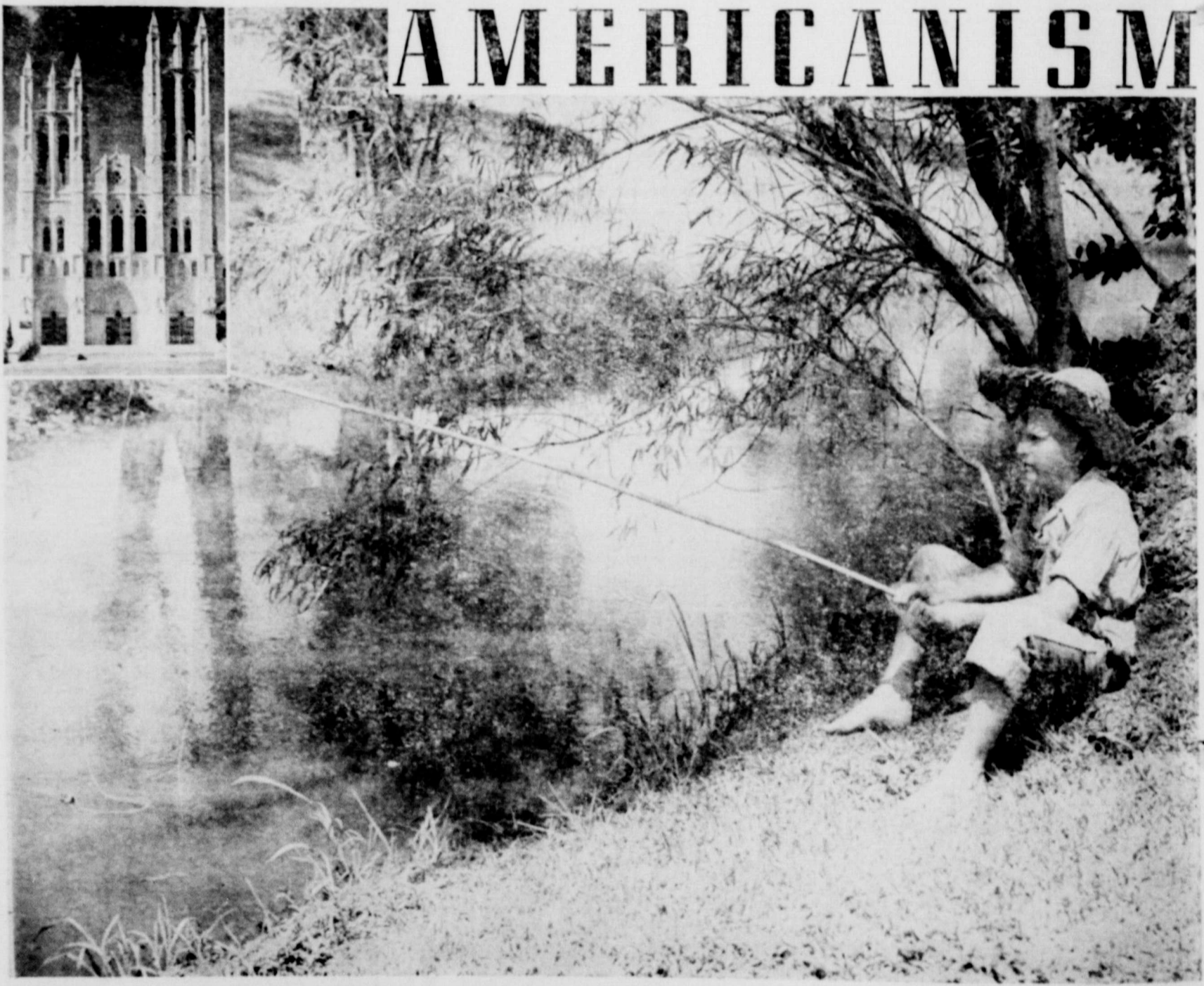

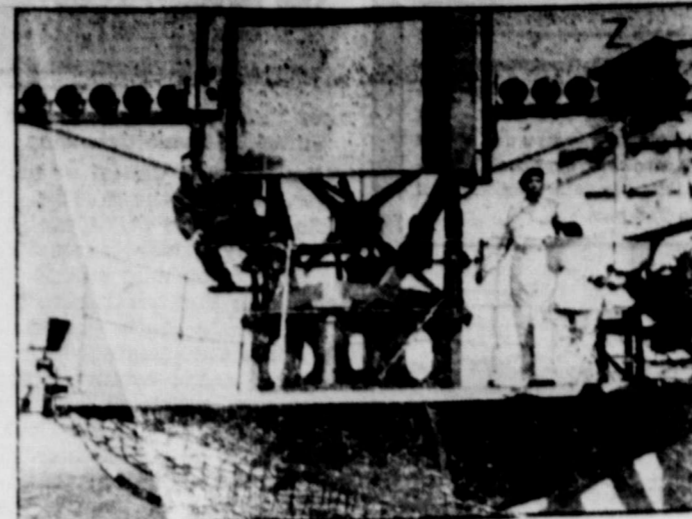

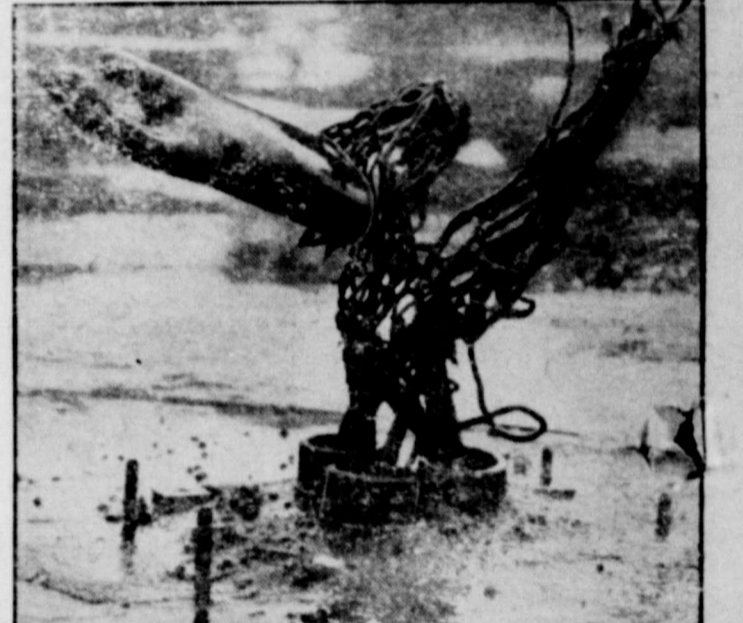
