## Final Polio Inoculations To be Arranged Shortly

Salik polio vaccine for Runnels County was delivered here Monday and plans will be set up as quickly as possible for giving children of this county their second "shot." County Judge W. H. Rampy went to Austin Monday morning to get the vaccine and deliver it here. Runnels County was allowed 90 per cent of the amount received for the first shot. Dr. O. H. Chandler, county health officer, stated that he felt sure that would be enough to take care of the needs here. All children who received the first inoculation will be eligible for the second but there will be no additions to the list. Dr. Chandler said he would contact co-workers and that arrangements for the clinics

would be made as soon as possible. It is hoped to set dates and locations of the clinics by next week. In the previous inoculations clinics were held in Ballinger and Winters. It is probable that this procedure will be followed in the second and children will report at the place where they received their first inoculation. The program was greatly delayed after the first "shots" because of condemnation of some vaccine manufactured by one company. After an investigation shipments have been made to state health authorities for issuance to county units. As soon as clinics in this county can be organized, children within the age limits will receive the final inoculation.

## Three Ballinger F.F.A. Boys Get High Awards

H. B. Edmondson, vocational agriculture instructor for the Ballinger chapter of Future Farmers of America, received word this week that three local boys had been selected to receive the Lone Star Farmer award. The boys selected and certified by the state association are Kirk Brunson, Gene Davis and Dwane Patton.

Earl Barr was also selected by the state association to receive the honorary Lone Star Farmer award. He will be presented with a pin and certificate when the district banquet is held in the fall at Coleman. This is the highest award the state association can give. Mr. Barr did much work last year in helping to present the annual livestock show and in other chapter activities.

Mr. Edmondson stated that local boys were now feeding about 25 head of lamb and that by the time school starts some 150 head will be on feed. There are also 14 calves on feed and all are making the best progress noted in several years. Two of the calves will be entered in the livestock show at the state fair, Dallas, in the fall.

Some of the lambs may also be entered in the junior show at Dallas if they progress enough and are ready for show purposes. The 1955 vocational agriculture class here is expected to be one of the largest in several years a large number of "greenhands" signifying they will enter.

## 125-Member Venire Called to Get Jury For Rape Case Here

Judge O. L. Parish issued orders for a special venire of 125 men on the petit jury here on August 8. Names of the veniremen were being assembled in the district clerk's office Tuesday afternoon and the sheriff's department will mail a card to each one of the veniremen this week-end. The venire will be used in selecting a jury to try Willie James, of San Angelo, charged with rape. While the crime was committed at San Angelo, James was indicted by a Runnels County grand jury and the case will be heard in the 119th district court.

## County Clubs' Rally Day Scheduled Next Thursday

Rally Day for all members of home demonstration clubs in Runnels County will be held here next Thursday, July 28. Plans for the one-day program have been in the making for several weeks and every club in the county will have a large delegation present and participate in the activities. The sessions will be held at the American Legion hall and more than 100 women are expected to attend. A picnic dinner will be served at noon. Each club in the county will bring a certain part of the meal, which will consist of meats, vegetables, salads and

desserts. Entertainment for the day will be provided by the clubs. Each group has been rehearsing a special stunt to be staged during the morning and afternoon. The skits are all original and some will deal with club work. Miss Thelma Casey, district home demonstration agent, is expected to be present for the entire program. Mrs. Dick Holstead will be in charge of the singing groups during the day. A few special guests will be included for the noon meal and may remain for the afternoon program if they desire.

## General Rains Benefit Majority of the County

Spotted showers to hard rains began falling in Runnels County Friday and continued three days until most sections got some moisture. Some parts of the county received heavy precipitation, around Rowena as much as four inches falling. Water ran over the highway in places and state highway patrolmen were called to assist in directing traffic. Fields in the area were filled with water, terraces holding most of the moisture on the growing crops.

Winters and vicinity received about 1.50 inches late Friday afternoon and rain fell there again Saturday. The rain Saturday extended west over considerable territory, most communities getting from one to two inches. Good rains also fell in the Norton-Maverick section. A light shower in Ballinger Saturday afternoon was supplemented by a shower Sunday morning and a continuous slow rain Sunday night beginning about midnight, all of it totaling more than an inch.

The first good rain in the Lowake section and extending into Runnels County fell Friday. Several other showers fell in the vicinity Saturday and Sunday. Runnels County crops were at a crucial stage and will be greatly benefited by the moisture. No wind or hail was reported and while some farmers still need rain, many have been helped.

Ballinger got an additional supply of water from heavy rains on the Valley Creek watershed. The rise hit the city lake Sunday morning and before night water was pouring around the spillway. A rise on Elm Creek also put water over the spillway at the lake in city park. The Colorado River was up several feet Sunday and Monday and most streams in the county were running, according to reports received here.

A small section in the vicinity of Norton, Maverick and Valley Creek received very little moisture, totalling only a few tenths of an inch. South Ballinger and into Concho County the rain was heavy, ranging up to five inches.

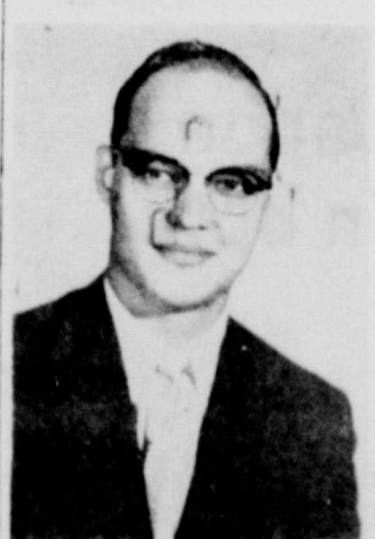

## Citizens' Petition Asks Highway Bond Election

A new petition has been filed with the Runnels County commissioners' court asking that a road bond election be called in road district No. 3 of this county. The new petition differs from that asking the recent election in that all needs are included in one proposition, whereas in the recent election two separate proposals were submitted.

The new petition asks approval of bonds for the purchase of right-of-way on highway 67 from the Coleman County line to the Tom Green County line and on highway 83 from Hatchel to Ballinger.

The court has filed the petition and set a public hearing for August 1. At that time the provisions of the proposed issue will be discussed and afterwards the court will pass on the legal-

ity. If the court finds it legal in every respect, an election can be called and a date set.

While the amount of bonds mentioned in the petition at \$350,000 it is expected that this amount will be cut about \$75,000 as the court believes that \$275,000 will be ample to meet the requirements.

Prior to the filing of the petition, the commissioners' court passed a resolution that if a second election was sought, that the proposals be submitted in one issue. This was announced at a mass meeting held here last Tuesday afternoon when J. A. Snell, district highway engineer, spoke to the citizens.

In checking signers on the new petition it was observed that about two-thirds were citizens of the rural sections of the district.

## 40 Baseball Prospects Attend Ballinger Camp

Buddy Hankins, scout for the Pittsburgh Pirates, opened his two-day baseball school at Cat Park Wednesday morning and will break up this afternoon shortly after 2:00 o'clock. Forty boys registered at the beginning of the school Wednesday morning from 17 West Texas towns.

Hankins stated late Wednesday that in the group trying out here were a number of nice looking pitchers. He was not too well impressed with fielders and the hitting ability of the entire school. Players were registered here from Winters, Talpa, Miles, Goldthwaite, Monte, Abilene, Snyder, San Angelo, Brady, Robert Lee, Tuscola, DeLeon, Comanche, Gorman, Rowena, Eden and Ballinger.

Speaking of the pitchers, Hankins stated that Claude Sikes, 16, of San Angelo, was one of the best looking young boys he has seen recently. Noel Winner, of Goldthwaite, a 6 foot 4 inch, 200-pounder, also showed good form and plenty of stuff for a second look. Richard Boyd, student at Hardin-Simmons University, was a righthander that impressed the scout.

In other positions, Hankins mentioned Jimmy Tierson, of Tuscola, at third base and Marcel Kallina, of Rowena, as a catcher. Hankins was delighted with the school and the fine attendance from such a wide area. He commenced his last workouts this morning at 10:00 and will close about 2:00 p. m. Names of boys who show promise will be kept and when they are finished with their schooling they will be looked at again by the scout.

## Oil Production Assured For Zappe, Lynn Wells

A discovery on the Zappe farm, six miles northwest of Ballinger, was indicated the past week-end when the H. L. Hunt No. 1-Mrs. Ida B. Zappe was completed in the Morris sand. When brought in the well flowed 109 barrels of oil in three hours and has been shut in, awaiting additional storage. Oil was moved by truck from the one small storage tank Wednesday afternoon. The wildcat is the first producer in the immediate vicinity and a second location is expected.

Rhodes Drilling Co. No. 1-Harry Lynn was drilled into the Palo Pinto at 3,434 feet Wednesday night. Reports are that there was a good formation, about 15 feet of oil bearing lime, and structures are similar to those in other producers in the Ballinger (Palo Pinto) field. Operators will go deeper to test the Fry sand, after which casing will be set for production.

Superior Oil Co. No. 1A-Nora McCaughan has been recompleted as a Palo Pinto producer. It was finalized for a daily pumping potential of 40 barrels of 50-plus gravity oil.

E. P. Thomas, of Abilene, has filed an application for a permit to drill his No. 1-J. Milten Clayton, five miles northeast of Talpa. The project will go to 2,500 feet to probe the Serratt. A second producer in the new multi-pay Fennell (Cisco reef) field was assured the first of the week. Sinclair Oil & Gas Co. No. 1-Tennie Wilson flowed 5.87 barrels of oil in a seven-hour period from between 2,782 and 2,865 feet opposite the Cisco reef. Breckenridge lime production was indicated when the project flowed 23 barrels of oil in three hours between 2,691 and 2,707 feet from the King sand. Operators are preparing to gauge production. Two new field designators were made in Runnels County last week. The Ballinger (Gray sand) field was opened by Drap Goodale & Wimmer No. 1-G. I. Henniger, a Gray sand discovery, two miles southwest of Hatchel. The daily allowable is 100 barrels of oil. The Vogelzang (Gardner sand) field was opened by Wes-Tex Drilling Co. No. 1-J. M. Barnhill, four miles east of Norton. It was completed on July 2 for a daily flowing potential of 116 barrels of 46.6 gravity oil.

Approximately 150 boys are taking part in league baseball games being played here this summer. With late afternoon and night games at Cat Park, crowds are large and no difficulties are encountered in meeting expenses. Hat collections each night take care of the expenses and a little more. Sponsors and team managers are doing a good job. The games are operated like professional baseball, there is never a row with an umpire and good sportsmanship is being taught the youngsters. This summer program is comparatively new in Ballinger and it will require some time before local teams can make a good showing in the district and perhaps fight their way into district and state tournaments. If no more than the regular summer schedule is played, the project is worthy and should be well supported. It is hoped that by next year teams can be uniformed and an outfield wall added to make it possible to hit 'em over the fence at home run distance.

Those who think members of the city commission have it easy should attend a few meetings and hear the requests that come in which were not anticipated when the annual budget was made up and approved. At practically every meeting a water main or sewer extension plea is presented. These are regular and show growth in the town but at the same time cost money and in most cases are expenses not planned at the beginning of the year when the tax rate was set. Then there are such items as a new fire truck, which is before the commission at this time. The truck is an absolute necessity—unless it is added it will cost all citizens in the form of insurance boosts. The Ballinger equipment is all old. The big pumper has seen many years service and is now

The Lower Concho River Authority was reorganized at Eden last week after four years of inactivity. Officers and board members were named and plans are to be made for projects in the area. Walter Pfluger was elected president of the board and will serve as member-at-large. A check-up revealed that the authority still had money in an account. Back in 1939 the state appropriated \$2,100 and the county \$1,000. It was also found that a small grader, plows and other equipment was unknown when the meeting was held. Members of the

at an age that it could fall during a big fire and cost many times the price of a new one. The commission is constantly facing unforeseen demands and while it tries to settle each satisfactorily, it has only a limited amount of money to spend.

Runnels County farmers again are at a crucial stage. Up to now cotton and feed in most sections had been doing well but a general rain is needed now to make crops grow and mature. Each summer for the past five years crops reached this stage but rains failed to come. It is making some ponder the results that could be obtained from a large irrigation project which would water 35,000 to 50,000 fertile acres of this county. The county has the good earth and the know-how farmers and lacks only moisture during the growing period. The county has been designated a water and soil conservation district, making it possible for a board of directors to seek a large dam on the Colorado River. The group voted to hold only one meeting each in July and August and in September will resume the regular schedule. Reports on the operation of the softball league were given, which showed interest high and a large number of people playing in the games each Tuesday and Friday night.

The Winters fire department has purchased a new fire truck and it was on display last week. The Ford truck with Howe equipment arrived on July 4 and has been tested by the firemen to see that it will perform according to agreements. Cost of the new equipment was \$9,500. The truck is the first purchased since 1953, when a Chevrolet truck was put in service. The department also has a LaFrance truck which has been in service since 1927. The fire chief stated that the department is fully equipped and can meet any emergency.

The annual meeting of the Comanche County Electric Co-op is being arranged and will be held on August 2. Officials expect to set an attendance record with the show planned for this year. The "big top" again will be featured. Included will be entertainers, a display of modern electrical appliances

and other articles. As in the past a period from 6:30 to 10:00 p. m. will be set aside for Comanche town people to attend the shows. Members of the co-op will be present all day.

The 1955 Coleman rodeo had ideal weather last week for the four big night performances and new attendance records probably were set. The daily parades were also bigger and better than in previous years and people from a wide section of West Texas were attracted. An old car contest added much to the interest of the parades, many of the pioneer period being entered. Riding clubs of several West Texas towns were at Coleman on Friday of last week to take part in the parade and the grand entry.

A crowd of 250 attended a barbecue at Fort Stockton Friday evening honoring 23 boys and their leaders from Boys Ranch near Tankersley. The group was on a tour of West Texas and arrived at Fort Stockton at 4:00 p. m. The boys swam for an hour at Comanche Springs and were then served the barbecue dinner. The group camped in the park for the night and resumed their tour Saturday morning.

The Rowena Lions Club voted last week to assume sponsorship of a Boy Scout troop in the community. Two meetings of boys already had been held and a number indicated they would join. After an explanation of how a troop is organized and register, Rev. Drury talked on scouting and its principles and urged that the club sponsor the troop. He also offered the parish hall as a meeting place. A troop committee was named to initiate the work and boys will be accepted and the troop registered as soon as possible.

Stanley Brown, of Fort Worth, has been employed by the Stephenville school board to draw plans for a \$30,000 band hall. The purpose was to discuss the proposed flood control project on the Kickapoo Creek watershed. H. N. Smith, of Temple, state conservation service representative, had previously made a survey of the watershed and was present to offer information he had compiled. A number of Coke County groups have signed applications for the project and are willing to sponsor it.

E. B. Thomas closed a deal last week in which he sold his gin at Melvin to D. R. McDonald, of Brownwood. The plant will be operated under the name of McDonald Gin. Frank Beck, of Pear Valley; and Joe Peel, of Melvin, have been employed and will have the equipment in good condition when the first ginning begins in the fall. Mr. Thomas had operated the Melvin gin since purchasing it from Swift & Co. nine years ago.

Permanent military personnel of Webb AFB, Big Spring, will be assigned to the jet auxiliary field at Colorado City. A fire truck and crew and an ambulance and crew arrived this week to take up their stand at the landing field and from 10 to 15 men and their families are assigned at Colorado City. They will commute to and from the base daily until living quarters are found at Colorado City. Flyers in T-33 jet planes began taking off from and landing at the auxiliary field Monday. A group of Brady men met last week and formed an agricultural workers' conference. All are with organizations that deal with farming and ranching and they plan to hold a breakfast meeting once a month to talk over problems common to all. Credit associations, federal loan agencies, conservation workers, members of the county agent's staff and others are eligible for membership. A contract for a new school in the Ector County system, at Odessa, was let last week to R. G. Farrell & Co., of Odessa, on a bid of \$999,311. The new building will be a combination senior and junior high school. The

Different Plan Now Offered On Season Football Tickets

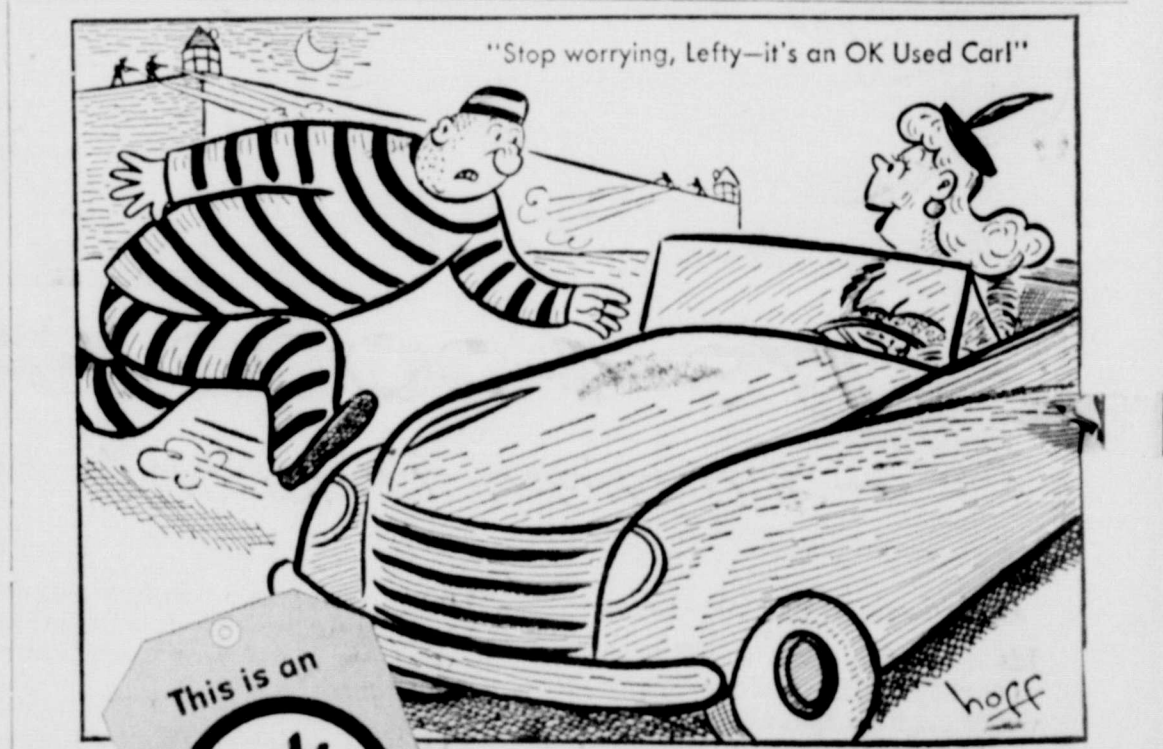

In 1887 they moved to their stock farm at Bowman and it was here that Mrs. Holliday organized a Sunday school in her home. Later church and Sunday school was held at the Bowman school house, which was built by Mr. Holliday, I. Vancil and C. W. Duke.  
Ten children were born to this couple. The deceased are Oscar Holliday, George Holliday, James F. Holliday and Mrs. Mary Nunn. The six living children are: Mrs. Maggie McDonald, Winters; David P. Holliday, San Angelo; Robert J. Holliday, Houston; Fred P. Holliday, Ballinger; Mrs. Mildred Watson, Houston, and Mrs. Ruth Grantland, Colorado City.  
Mrs. Holliday, herself a twin, also had a set of twin sisters and two sets of twin grandsons, Bill and Bob, sons of Mr. and Mrs. David Holliday; and Fred and Robert, sons of Mr. and Mrs. Fred P. Holliday.  
Mrs. Holliday says that living conditions now are quite different from the horse and buggy days.  
Mr. Holliday, with Frank Miles and Sterling Hathaway, moved many of the homes from Rannels City to Ballinger in 1886 after the town lot sale was held here. He also did much freighting to other towns, bringing back lumber, groceries and other items from Abilene, Brady, Fort Chadbourne, San Angelo and other points. Mrs. Holliday referred to the Baptist mission for Latin-Americans on Strong Avenue, saying the building was constructed in 1884 and moved to Ballinger from Rannels City. Mr. and Mrs. Holliday helped to organize the Hatchel Baptist Church.  
Mrs. Holliday was a Sunday school teacher for 47 years and worked in the junior department of the First Baptist Church here 22 years. She was an active member of the Woman's Missionary Society until a fall injured her arm and shoulder in 1948. Tributes have been paid Mrs. Holliday by the W.M.S. and by her church. Mr. Holliday died on August 12, 1913. There are 20 grandchildren and 30 great-grandchildren.

Frank Holliday and a great-granddaughter, Kay, of Brownwood; Mr. and Mrs. H. Keifer, Houston; Mrs. Pauline Harvey, Colorado City; Mrs. George Holliday, Garland; Mrs. Grace Smith and son Jerry; Robert Holliday and Mrs. and Mrs. H. K. Corum, all of Ballinger.
