One building will be used for grading, one for the machinery and the third for a warehouse.

Cage Bros. Construction Co. was the low bidder for constructing six bridges in Coke County. Bids were opened by the commissioners' court last week and the contract awarded on a bid of \$49,295. Three of the bridges will be in the Olga community and three will be north of Bronte on Kickpaw Creek. The money for this work was made available last year when \$160,000 in bonds were approved for road work in the county. All the concrete bridges will replace dips at highway crossings.

Colorado City Jaycees have received a large shipment of lady bugs from a California dealer and they have been released on the Jaycee demonstration farm near the city limits to chase undesirable insects from plants.
