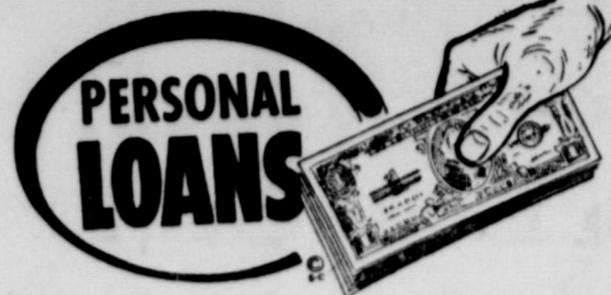

Our Night Depository

This night depository is for the convenience and protection of our customers and friends. The equipment includes a steel screw-door safe, a heavy steel door which may be opened from the outside, and a chute, which conveys deposits and other communications to the steel screw-door safe. We have a supply of keys and locker bags for the convenience of the merchants and other commercial accounts.

The steel door to the chute is provided with what we call a letter slot covered by a steel flap, similar to letter-mailing slots which are found in all of our post offices. This letter-mailing convenience may be used by our customers after hours, at night, on holidays, and Sundays. If checks are included in the deposit, they should be endorsed and a note should be enclosed in the envelope telling us what to do with the funds thus deposited. This convenience may be used for paying notes or installments; moreover, letters to the bank concerning any matter of business may also be deposited.

We want our friends and customers to make more liberal use of this night depository facility.

**WEST TEXAS
NOTES**

Interest is growing in the bond election set for September 24 in road district No. 3 of Runnels County. Highway officials will watch the election with interest as engineering plans are perfected and funds appropriated for construction of three of the projects. If citizens of the district fail to approve the bonds the money will be transferred in the near future to other counties where contracts can be let for road building. There probably will be a larger vote in the election this month than in the one held on July 2. There was considerable confusion in regard to who was eligible to vote in the previous election and a large number who were qualified did not go to the polling places. Any person who pays real or personal taxes and is otherwise qualified may cast a ballot. The rendering for taxes of an automobile, furniture, watch or other personal belongings will make the voter eligible. The Ballinger Chamber of Commerce is trying to furnish accurate information on the issue and the proposed highway program in the district. Any person who has a question he would like to have answered is asked to send the query to the chamber office and it will be answered. The chamber is not seeking to influence anyone on how to vote, but is asking that all inform themselves on the issue and then cast ballots.

Ballinger schools are in operation again and local police are using full precautions to prevent traffic accidents. Large signs have been erected on streets leading past the school grounds and during the rush periods police are stationed on the streets to assist in directing traffic. For a number of years patrolmen have kept watch at all schools with the result that no injuries have occurred. About 1,400 students go to and from the buildings daily. Most of these cross busy streets or highways each morning, at noon and in the afternoon and the cooperation of police, children and public is needed to prevent accidents. All drivers are urged to obey

The Stephenville Chamber of Commerce has employed L. B. Howard as manager and he will assume his duties at once. Howard succeeds Richard Spradley, who resigned to accept a similar position at Dallas. Howard, who retired as manager of the J. C. Penney store at Stephenville in July, has lived there since 1939. During his residence there has been a civic worker and is familiar with projects before the chamber at this time. One of his first big jobs will be the 1955 county fair, scheduled in October. A screening committee had been interviewing and investigating applicants for the position several weeks. The committee was unanimous in selecting the Stephenville man for manager.

The first bale of 1955 cotton was ginned at Miles last week, the Kasberg Gin doing the work. J. P. Balch, who lives 4 1/2 miles southeast of Miles, gathered the first bale. The cotton came from a small irrigated field. Balch brought 1,720 pounds of lint cotton to the gin and received a 424-pound bale. Merchants gave a bonus of \$63.

William Schwertner ginned the first bale of cotton at Rowena last week. The bale was turned out by the Runnels County Gin Co. and ginning was free for the first bale of the season. The Rowena Lions Club handled the bonus for the first bale, more than \$50 having

been donated Friday and there were still a number of others to make contributions. Henry Pustka bought the bale, paying 35 cents per pound. The bale weighed 540 pounds and was the largest of the first bales ever ginned in the community.

Coleman citizens approved the forming of a permanent water fund in a special election held last week. The light vote was 156 for and 20 against. This will permit the city council to set aside each year a stipulated amount from tax collections. The money cannot be used except for a future water source for the city. A total of \$5,000 will be deposited in the fund at the end of the tax collecting period and will be added to each year. This in time will create a fund which would make a new source of water possible without a bond issue.

The annual amateur talent show sponsored by the Paint Rock Lions Club will be held at the high school auditorium tomorrow (Friday) night. Cash prizes of \$15, \$10, and \$5 have been posted for the three top winners. Ben Sims, program chairman, stated that a large number of acts are to be presented in a highly entertaining program. Proceeds will be contributed to the crippled children's camp at Kerrville.

Uranium centers at Comanche are growing fast and taking on style. The new places are much different from the first ditch where a few customers came to put their bare feet in the dirt. New sitting places have been added in theatres where patrons watch the films, hear entertainment and are even served while they wait. The Cactus Inn building has been turned into a center with air-conditioning and every possible comfort for customers. Some farmers are shipping dirt to other sections where centers are being established. Last week was the busiest for the Comanche County centers since they were opened.

Dr. and Mrs. A. C. Briere and family left Melvin last week to make home at Pecos. For the past year Dr. Briere has been manager and surgeon of the McCulloch-Concho Hospital at Melvin. His departure has caused

the hospital to be closed as of August 31. The board of directors stated the institution will be reopened as soon as a doctor can be secured as manager. Several applicants have been interviewed but to date none has been accepted.

A large group of Bronte property owners met last week to discuss flood control and endorse the projects proposed for Kickapoo Creek. The idea was expressed that the project could be completed for only a fraction of the first estimated cost. In order to get an expression from everyone, a ballot has been prepared and circulated and all citizens have been asked to execute the information on the ballot and return it to the newspaper office. Those who wish to make special remarks have a space on the ballot for that purpose.

The Winters school board last week announced that the high school would be opened to negro students this fall. There has been a negro school at Winters for a number of years but only offered 8 grades. This year there were seven graduates who desired to continue their education. The number was not enough to provide a new school

and a teacher and under state laws the students were entitled to continue classwork. After a study of the situation trustees and school administrators stated that the high school would be open to the negro students. Citizens of precinct No. 3 in Coke County will vote September 17 on a \$62,000 bond issue. If the bonds are approved, the money will be spent to construct 3 1/2 miles of paving on highway 158. The proposed surfacing would extend two miles north from the Pecan Church to connect with a newly paved road in precinct No. 1. On the route would be two concrete bridges and a culvert, accounting for a large portion of the cost.

The Brady Herald, published by Mr. and Mrs. Robert I. Bray for the past nine years, was purchased last week by L. B. Smith and C. D. Reed, owners of the Brady Standard. The new owners stated that the Herald would be published each Tuesday and the Standard would be published each Friday starting at one. The Standard has been published each Tuesday and Friday. Equipment of the Herald will be used in publishing the two papers but all

work will be consolidated in one building and under one ownership. Mayor C. E. Harris, of Eden, stated last week that a fifteen-day extension would be given dog owners to secure license numbers and register their dogs. A city ordinance recently passed set September 1 as the final date to comply. The vaccination of dogs and other details made the extension necessary. A check-up by the city secretary revealed only 9 dogs had been registered but that 50 had been vaccinated to that time. After September 15 all dogs not registered will be subject to conditions of the ordinance. Menard County citizens refused approval of a \$23,000 bond issue to be spent in constructing a swimming pool. Menard city voters favored the issue by a wide margin but residents of practically all the rural communities were opposed. The final vote was 295 for and 307 against. The pool would have been located in Menard but would have belonged to the county. The election was called several weeks ago after a petition was presented. A joint meeting of all Colorado City civic clubs was held last week to launch the annual

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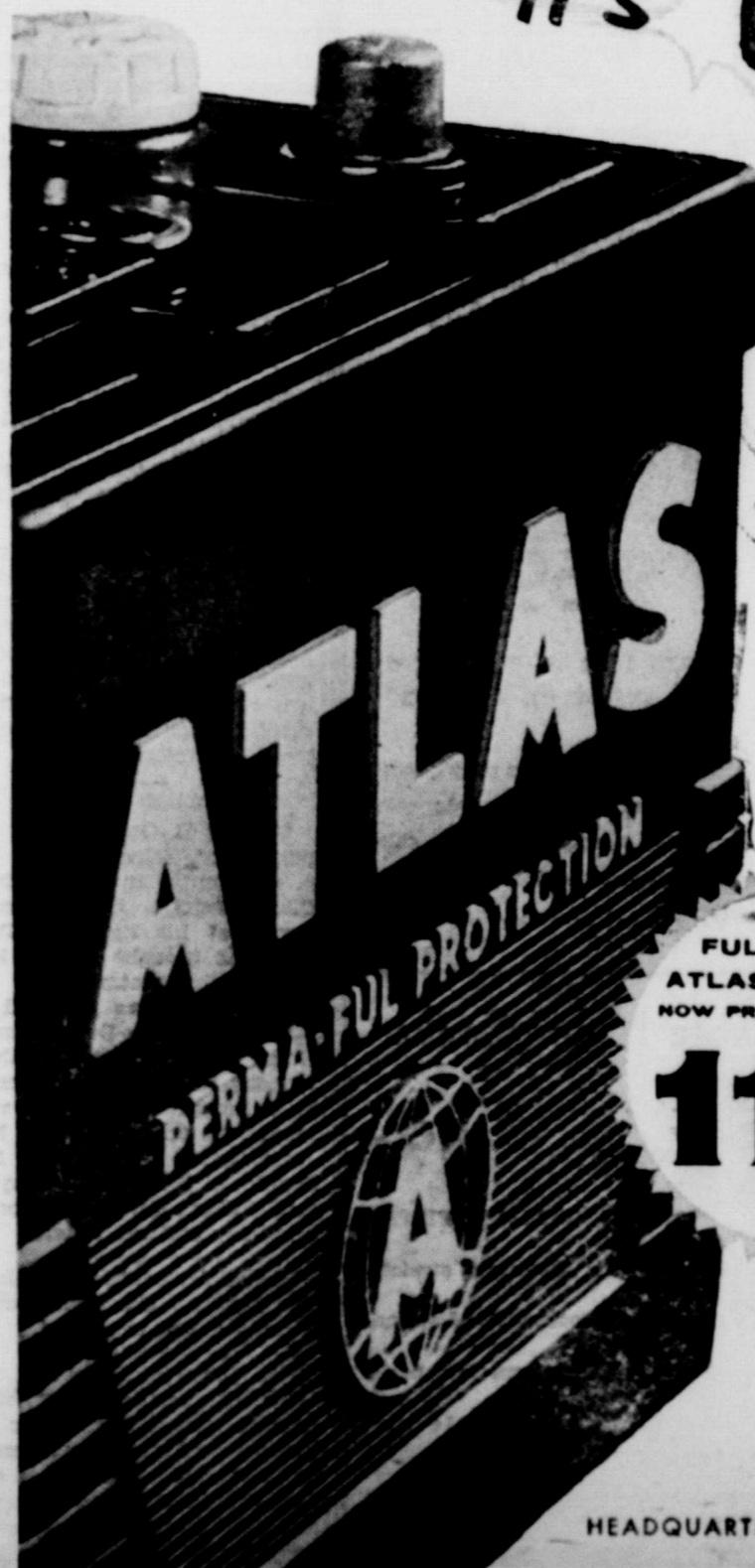

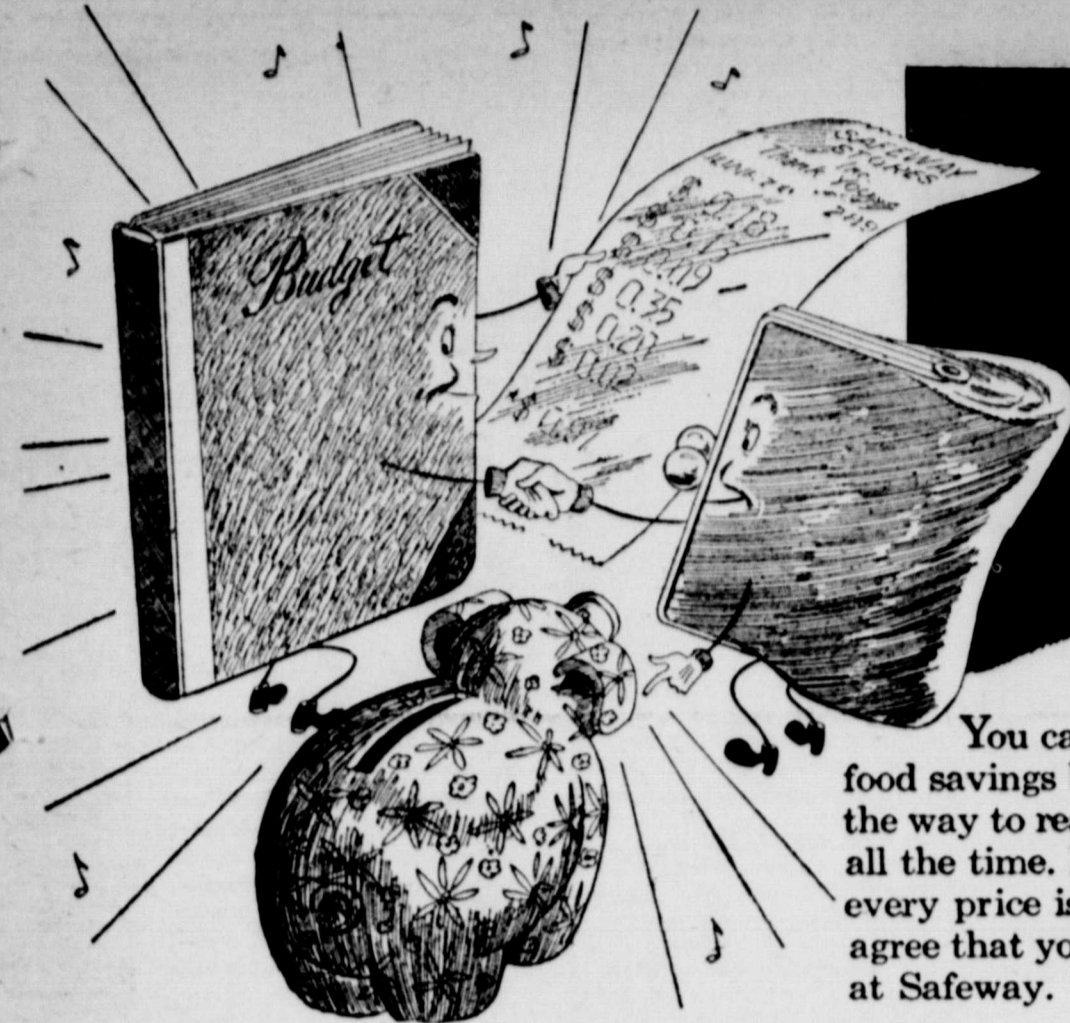

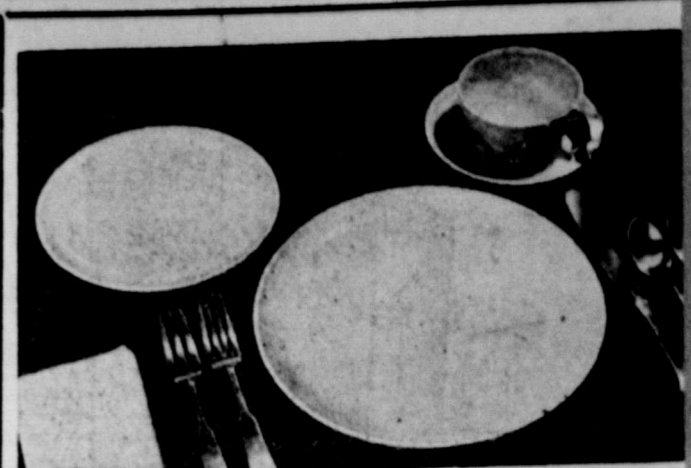

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INFORMATION ABOUT **ROAD BOND ISSUE**

In Order to Give Accurate Information on the Road Bond Issue, With No Intent to Persuade Anyone How to Vote, the Following Questions and Answers Are Given:

Question—What will become of the present road on highway 83 from Ballinger to Hatchel?

Answer—If the highway is constructed from Hatchel to a point east of Ballinger, it will be designated as the route for highway 83 and the present road will be turned over to the county and maintained in its present condition as a county road.

Question—Why buy additional right-of-way to the Coleman County line on highway 67 if only 8 miles is to be improved?

Answer—It is planned to improve the entire section of road in the near future and the county commissioners' court believes it is best to secure the right-of-way now, rather than to have a special bond election later.

Question—Why is the \$275,000 bond issue less in this election than the \$350,000 sought in the election held on July 2?

Answer—In the first election it was estimated that \$350,000 would be needed to meet the requirements. Later the State Highway Department agreed to reduce the width of the highway through Rowena from 200 to 150 feet. An agreement was reached with the Santa Fe Railroad Co. whereby additional land could be secured from its right-of-way at Rowena. This eliminated the moving of a gin and other buildings on the south side of the highway and cut the expense \$90,000 to \$100,000. This saving is why the issue is for only \$275,000 in the September 24 election.

Question—What about parallel parking on Hutchings Avenue in Ballinger?

Answer—Parallel parking will become effective on Hutchings Avenue when the highway is built. The Ballinger city commission has agreed to this stipulation of the state highway department. Parking meters will be changed for the new style of parking and every effort will be made to keep four lanes of traffic open through Ballinger.

Question—Why not widen and straighten the present highway 83 from Ballinger to Hatchel?

Answer—The location of a highway is up to the engineering division of the state highway department. It has designated the new route from Hatchel to an intersection with highway 67 east of Ballinger.

Question—How would traffic on highway 67 be routed while the bridge across the Colorado River was under construction?

Answer—The plan is to route all traffic down South Seventh Street on highway 83 to the Horseshoe Theatre. Highway 67 traffic will turn northwest there on the present road and reenter highway 67. 8 of a mile west of the Colorado River. The present dirt road from the Horseshoe Theatre would be surfaced to the intersection with highway 67.

Question—What is the exact territory of Runnels County included in road district No. 3?

Answer—Road district No. 3 includes all the land in commissioner's precinct No. 1 and that part of commissioner's precinct No. 4 which lies south of the Colorado River. It includes four voting precincts in Ballinger and precincts at Bethel, Olfen, Rowena, Brookshier, Miles, and Benoit.

Question—What is the present taxable valuations as shown by renditions in road district No. 3?

Answer—According to figures in the office of the tax assessor-collector the total values of property rendered for taxes in the district is \$8,188,000.

Question—Is it true that a person who pays taxes on a car or watch may vote in this election?

Answer—This is true. If you are a qualified voter, that is have a poll tax receipt, or are over 60 years of age, or have an exemption certificate showing you were under 21 years of age on January 1 and pay taxes on any real or personal property, you may vote.

Question—Does the state pay any part of the amount it takes to obtain right-of-way?

Answer—No. This is the obligation of the county with no help from any source other than the proposed bond issue.

Question—Does the county pay any part of the construction on highways?

Answer—No. The state pays this entire cost with the federal government providing part of the money. Both the state and federal funds come from the taxes on gasoline which we pay.

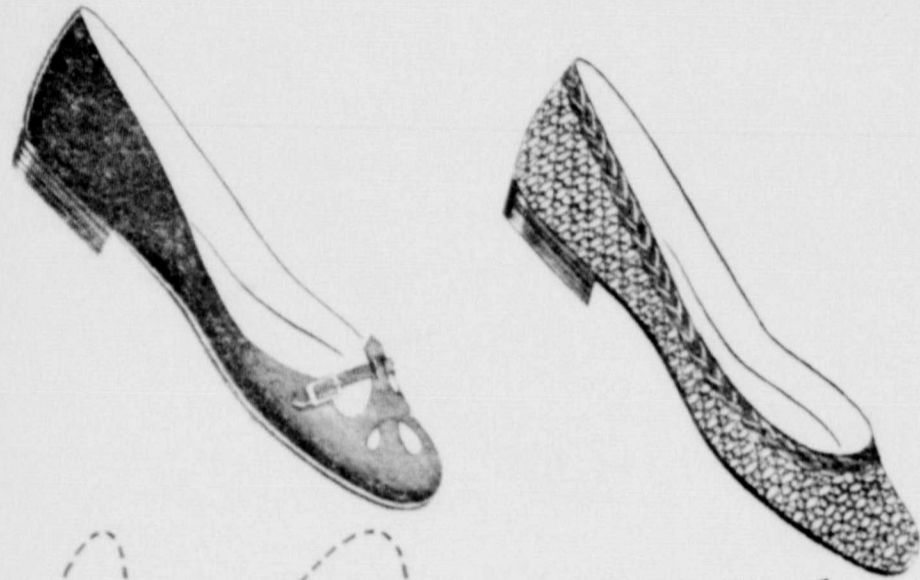

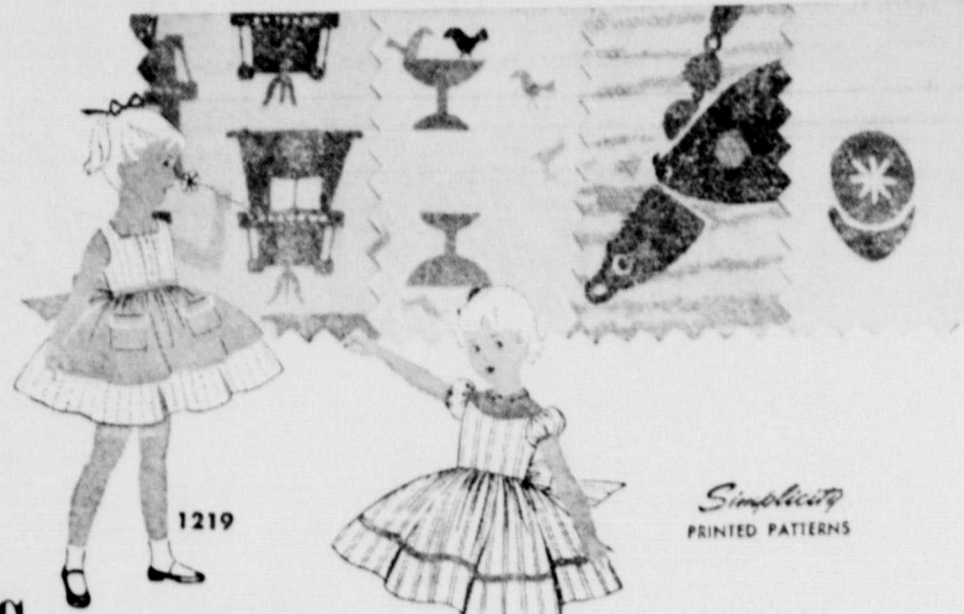

Mrs. Rena C. Worthington, in charge of occupational therapy at McKnight State Hospital,

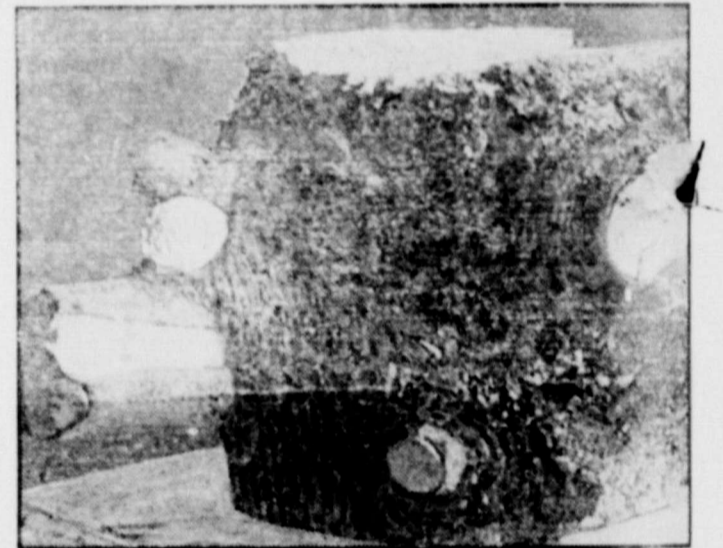
