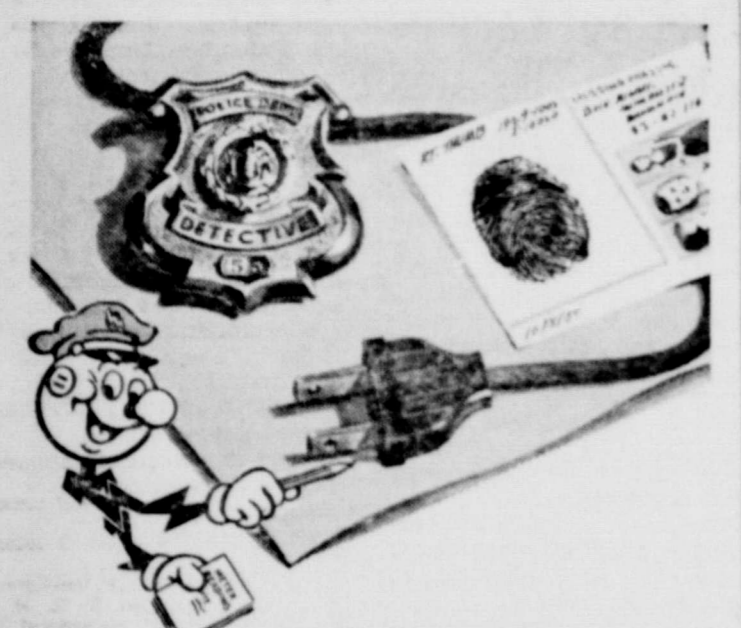

**Bearcats Upset Bulldogs To Gain First-Place Tie**

Ballinger Bearcats clinched back into a tie for first place in the district 7AA standing Friday night by defeating the big Brady Bulldogs 13 to 0. The Bearcats turned in their best game of the year, playing almost perfectly both on offense and defense to stop the heavier and more experienced Brady team.

After the first few Brady plays, the Bearcat line gave

notice that it could handle the situation and time and time again went through the Brady forward wall to give the backs trouble behind the line.

The Bearcats started their first touchdown drive when Glenn Lisso pounced on a Brady fumble on the Brady 36. One running play fizzled and Jerry Candler lofted one to the waiting arms of Dwayne Patton, who took it and worked his

way to the Brady 8. Patton carried into the line three times, going over for the score on his third attempt. Patton added the extra point with a place kick.

The final score came in the early minutes of the fourth quarter. LeRoy Rollwitz and Clarence Wellbrock broke through to block a punt and cover the pigskin on the Brady 24. Patton and Holloway lugged the ball to the 11 and Wesley Stokes on an end-around play got into the secondary and went to the 1-yard marker before he was knocked out of bounds. On the next play, Charles Holloway crashed over. Patton's kick for the extra point was wide and the scoring for the night was over.

The Bearcats made one beautiful goal line stand after Brady had passed and run the ball inside the Ballinger 10 with four downs left to score. Attempted running plays were thrown for losses and two passes were broken up by the redshirted defenders.

In the first down department Ballinger led with 12 while Brady chalked up 6.

Ballinger's Bearcats will journey to Coleman tomorrow (Friday) night for the third straight year and will meet the Bluecats in an important game. The Bluecats have lost to both the Brady and Comanche teams while the Bearcats have defeated both of the latter.

Friday will be homecoming day at Coleman and the Bluecats are likely to be "high as a kite" for the night game. The Bearcats ran into the same situation at Lake View two weeks ago and encountered a team they could not handle.

Reserved seats are on sale at the Keel Drug Store and will remain there until some time Friday afternoon. All fans going to the game from here are urged to purchase tickets before they leave town.

The Bearcats against the Brady Bulldogs was by far the best ball club they have been this year. They played as a

team and when some particular player started it was because of some other player throwing a key block or opening a hole. Continued play of the same nature could bring the Bearcats a district championship. By defeating the Coleman and Winters teams, the Bearcats could be tied with Brady for the district honors and because of the win over the Bulldogs would be selected to represent the district.

Kick off time at Coleman is 8:00 p. m. This was originally scheduled for an afternoon game but changed later because of the home-coming and no holiday at Coleman.

The Comanche and Winters teams will square off at Winters at 2:00 p. m. Friday in the nearest afternoon game to Ballinger. A large number plan to see this game and go on to Coleman for the night contest.

The men give of their time, train for their special duties, are always ready to leave their places of business or get up from a warm bed to rush to a fire and render efficient fire fighting. Their attendance at meetings, drills and fires runs high in the 90 per cent bracket and not only the men, but members of their families feel the same loyalty to the department. The good they do annually cannot be estimated and they can be put at the head of all organizations in Ballinger for unselfish service. Citizens should not need a reminder to show appreciation for the volunteer firemen but it is not often that they are slapped on the back and told they are doing a fine job. When they need finances for their training program, expenses to attend fire schools and conventions, Ballingerites should only be too glad to help. Let's remember how much we owe the group that makes our low insurance rate possible and which trains every week of the year to protect lives and property in Ballinger.

December 1 has been designated by President Eisenhower as S-D Day (safe driving day) in an effort to increase public awareness of the possibility of making reductions in traffic accidents. In support of the program, Gov. Shivers has issued a similar state proclamation that calls on citizens of Texas to join in the cooperative movement for greater traffic safety both on December 1 and every other day of the year. Col. S-D Day is not an end, but a means to an end of death and destruction on our streets and highways." The special emphasis program aimed at marking a 24-hour period without traffic accidents will begin on November 20 and culminate in S-D Day on December 1.

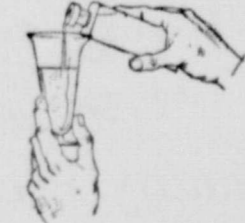

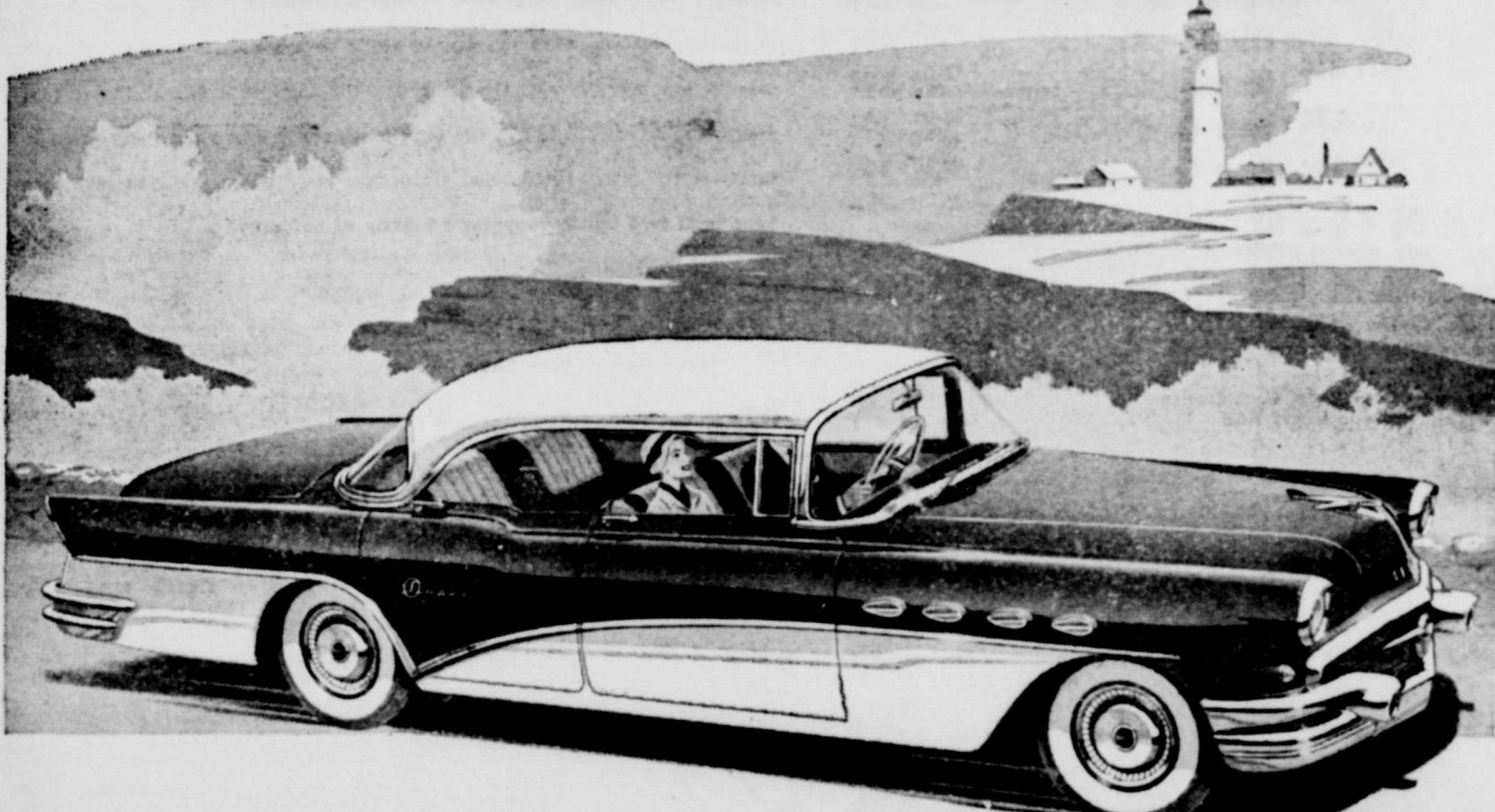

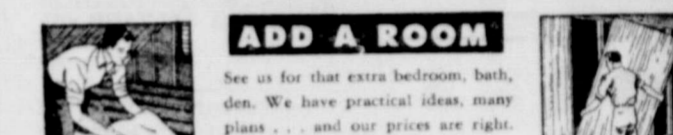
