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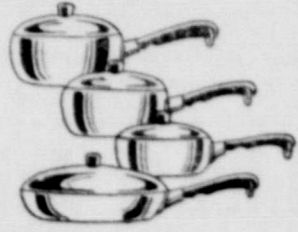

**Large Group View Laguna Art Exhibit at Open House**  
Approximately 300 persons, including Ballinger school students, viewed the 23 paintings done by Texas artists, from the Laguna Gloria Art Gallery at Austin and sponsored by the Texas Fine Arts Association, Wednesday and Thursday of last week. The paintings were obtained by the Shakespeare Club.

Mrs. J. B. Dankworth, club president, discussed the paintings exhibited the two days

and on Thursday afternoon members of the Fannie Stephens Study Club joined members of the Shakespeare Club in a program. Miss Flora Reeves, Tom Green County librarian, spoke on the cataloging system.

Last April the two Ballinger federated clubs decided to go into action to bolster the library program. They also had an added motive besides their civic pride. They were striving for a \$10,000 prize offered in the Sears Roebuck Community Improvement Project contest.

The Ballinger library was

opened in 1909. It was taken over by the American Legation in 1922 and converted into a community center. During World War II, Legionnaires remodeled the building for entertaining cadets stationed at Bruce Field. The Ballinger Civic Garden Club has also assisted in maintaining the library.

George Clements, now of Greenville, was the first president of the library board. He was succeeded by Mrs. Chester Cherry, who served as head of the board from 1942 until 1955.

Presidents of the two Ballinger clubs are Mrs. J. B. Dankworth, Shakespeare Club and Mrs. B. J. Williams Jr., Fannie Stephens Study Club. Mrs. Paul Petty is chairman of the contest committee.

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## WEST TEXAS NOTES

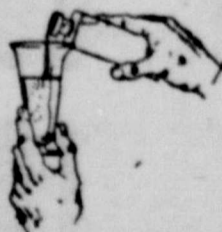
In this day when there is a shortage of qualified school teachers and leaders, Ballinger has been fortunate in retaining their staff of school administrators from year to year. Those in charge of various buildings and departments have been here so long that they have become a real part of Ballinger with an understanding of local problems and conditions which make them far more valuable than newcomers to the jobs. Largely because of this leadership, Ballinger schools operate with few problems of any consequence. They go about the job of educating the youth and those who enter colleges and universities from the Ballinger school have shown the type of foundation given in their climb to a degree and higher education. The Ballinger schools have met the needs in a commendable manner and have provided instructions in the subjects wanted by local students. Next fall the West Ward school will be housed in a new and modern plant which will give facilities for much better work. Good progress is being made on the new building, which is expected to be ready before the opening of the September semester. All school administrators, including superintendents, principals, coaches, band and vocational instructors, have been given contracts for another year.

The Easter season is here and all next week special church services will be held at a number of churches which will be climaxed on Easter Sunday, April 1. In addition to the church religious observance, there will be a number of special events which will include the annual Sunrise service, an Easter egg hunt for the kiddies and numerous other events for children. Easter is also time for a change of clothing and the spring fashions show up during the Easter season. While Ballinger does not have a special Easter parade, new costumes will be in evidence at all gatherings this Easter.

Plans are being completed for the observance of Ballinger's 70th birthday anniversary. This is a job that is too big for any committee and the interest of the entire citizenship is desired. Ballinger store managers are urged to start thinking about window decorations for that event and perhaps have on display some of the styles of the 1886 period. Old pictures, old relics and other items make interesting features for the pioneer crowd that will be assembled here. Those who have the address of a pioneer who lived here 55 years or more ago, are urged to start writing letters, inviting these people to return on June 29 and be among the honored guests. The Rowena Lions Club is working with the Rowena firemen in an effort to secure a fire station with a meeting room which can be used as a community center. At a meeting of the club last week, a plan for the 30 by 30 foot building was presented and approved. It would be located on the east side of the public square and Lions favored starting construction at once. The firemen have raised some money and boy scouts also have a fund for a permanent home. A large number have agreed to donate labor and when construction is started, those in charge feel that the rest of the needed money can be secured.

Members of the Winters Round-Up Association are making plans for the 1956 Showdeo to be held on June 28, 29 and 30. The membership committee announced that 97 members have been signed up for this year and the campaign will remain open for several weeks. At a meeting last week, new directors were named and a meeting of the full board was held. Officers will be announced some time this week and plans will get underway for the 1956 program.

The Methodist young people at Miles will again sponsor the annual Sunrise Easter Service. It will be held at the Jim Weatherby ranch west of Miles, and is expected to attract a large crowd. Young people at Miles will make up the choir to provide the special music for the occasion and a number of rehearsals have been called before that date. The Lutheran Church will provide the guest speaker. At the close of the service, all those attending will be served coffee and doughnuts at the Weatherby ranch home.

The Coke County commissioners court last week called an election to authorize \$130,000 in bonds to be used to provide recreational facilities for the people of that county. The action was taken by members of the court after petitions bearing more than 200 signatures were presented asking that the election be called. The tentative plans call for the creation of parks and construction of swimming pools at Bronte and Robert Lee. It was pointed out that it was legal for commissioners to set aside 5 cents of each tax dollar for recreation and this amount would retire the bonds and no tax increase would be necessary.

A wild hog, better known as a javelina, was captured at Coleman last week. The angry javelina was discovered in a backyard giving two dogs a tussle. A man roped the animal and pulled him into the air by using the rope over a tree limb. He was soon placed in a metal cage for safe keeping. The mystery of how the wild hog got into town has many talking, however, two javelinas have been seen in the rural section west of Coleman recently.

The Centennial committee for McCulloch County will hold a mass meeting tomorrow for all merce so that invitations can be sent for the one-day program. With everybody working together, the 70th anniversary can be made a great day in the life of Ballinger.

College will assist in the program. A feature will be 4-H club and F.F.A. chapter dairy judging teams in a number of contests. The high individual will receive a \$150 scholarship from Howard Payne College to be used the first semester following their high school graduation.

For a number of years crows have been doing considerable damage in Erath County and this year hunters are starting a contest to get rid of many of the destructive birds. Elaborate prizes have been offered for the hunter turning in the largest number of crows' feet by January, 1957. In past years heavy damage has been reported by farmers to melons, peanuts and pecans and this year the hunters of the area have promised help. Hunting will start now and be continued all through the year.

W. H. Ellis, rancher in the Henderson community of Concho County, has filed with the Texas State Board of Water Engineers a request to irrigate 83 acres of land. The water would be secured from a lake having 193 acre feet of water and his application will be heard on April 16. The lake is on a tributary of the Kickapoo Creek where the Concho Soil and Water Conservation district have made preliminary plans to build a \$750,000 dam.

One of the oldest landmarks as Melvin was torn down last week and the material converted into sheds at a ranch near that town. The building was erected in 1910 and served as the first telephone exchange in that area when only 76 subscribers were included on the switchboard. The telephone exchange changed hands a num-

ber of times during the years and several times bad weather which caused heavy ice deposits completely wrecked the system. The plant was bought about four years ago by the Central Texas Telephone Co-op, which now has a network of wires in all parts of the Melvin community.

The annual program sponsored by the Comanche County 4-H boys and girls will be staged in Comanche on March 26. The "Share the Fun Program" was started several years ago and has grown into an annual event which is looked upon by many as one of the highlights of the year. During the years the programs have become better with more talent entered each year. The performance will be staged at the high school auditorium and an admission charged, which will be used by the clubs of the county in their regular work.

Voters at Anson have turned down a bond issue which was called to approve bonds for a 10 million dollar power plant. 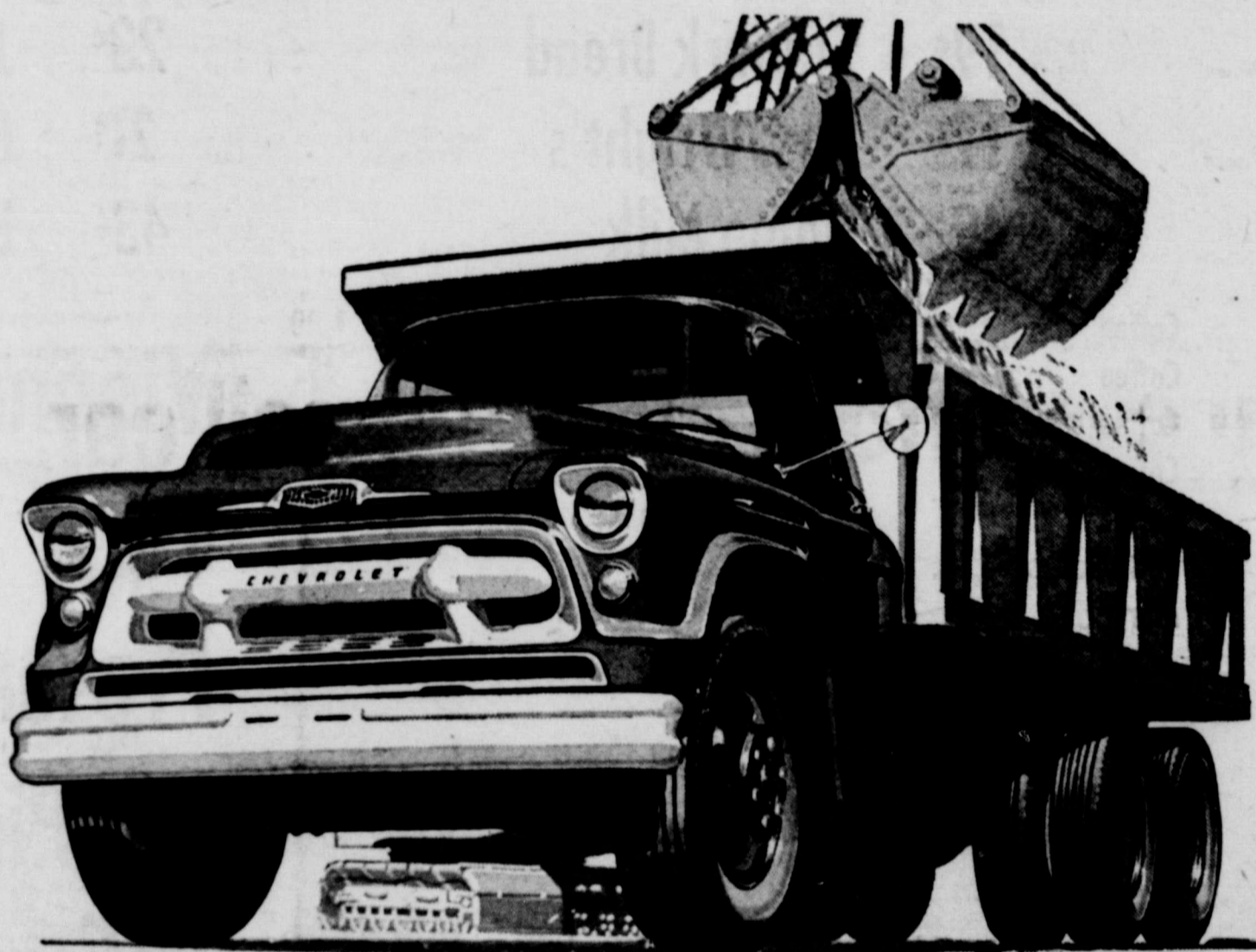

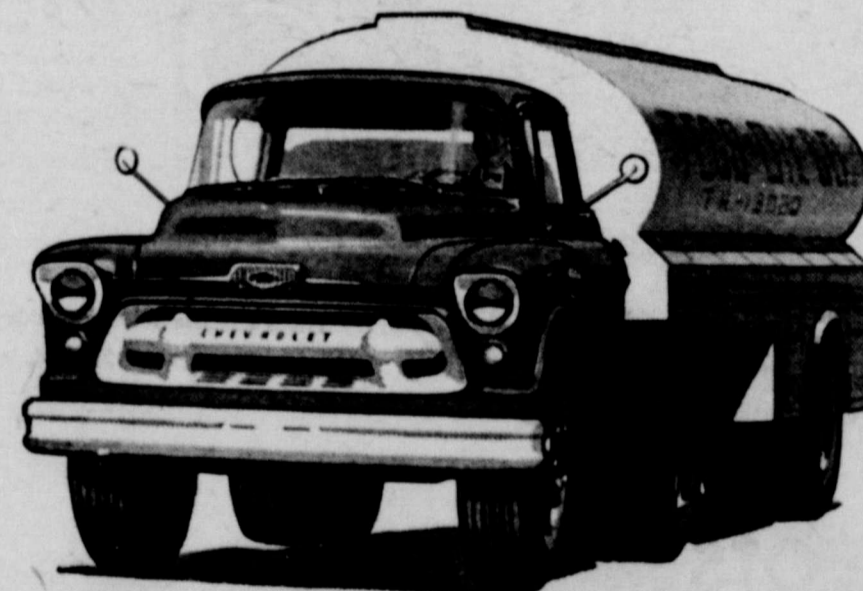

**The Gospel of Christ**

**EXPLANATION OF TERMS--**

The term "OF CHRIST" is easily understood and explained. It means "that belonging to" or that "derived from Christ." The "gospel" or "good news" of this column is taken not from man but from Christ's teachings as found in the Bible. By "Christ," of course, we refer to Jesus Christ, the divine Son of God, (John 3:16) who was born of the Virgin Mary (Luke 1:27).

The word "GOSPEL" was not originally a Christian word. Gospel is a contraction of the Anglo-Saxon word GODSPEL (leaving out D and L). Their word "god" referred to any god, heathen or otherwise, but, of course, to us it refers to the One and Only God, Jehovah; the divine Father of Christ, the creator of the universe (Genesis 1:1). The last part "SPELL" meant a "saying, tale or speech." The literal translation of GODSPEL would be: 1. saying, tale, or speech of God, or, 2. God-story, or 3. good tidings through the God-story.

Our English word "GOSPEL" is a translation of the New Testament Koine Greek word EUANGELION. The New Testament use of the word "GOSPEL" is literally: 1. the Christ-message, or 2. the God-story, or, 3. the good news, or glad tidings of Christ's teachings.

In Mark 1:14 and Luke 7:22 Christ's preaching is described as the gospel. In Mark 1:1 Christ's life and teachings are called the Gospel of Jesus Christ. The four Gospels (Matthew, Mark, Luke and John) are parallel accounts of the life and teachings of Christ while on earth. The remainder of the New Testament gives the teachings of Christ both before and after his resurrection as revealed to inspired men through the Holy Spirit. (See John 14:25-26; Galatians 1:11-12; Revelation 1:1; 2 Peter 1:20-21 etc.)

The teachings of the New Testament of Christ are called the GOSPEL OF CHRIST in Mark 1:1; Romans 1:16; 15:19; 1 Corinthians 9:12, 18; Galatians 1:7; and 2 Thessalonians 1:8.

The Gospel of Christ, then, is the message of the New Testament. Our aim in this column is to give and explain to you the message of the new Testament on vital subjects pertaining to our soul's salvation.

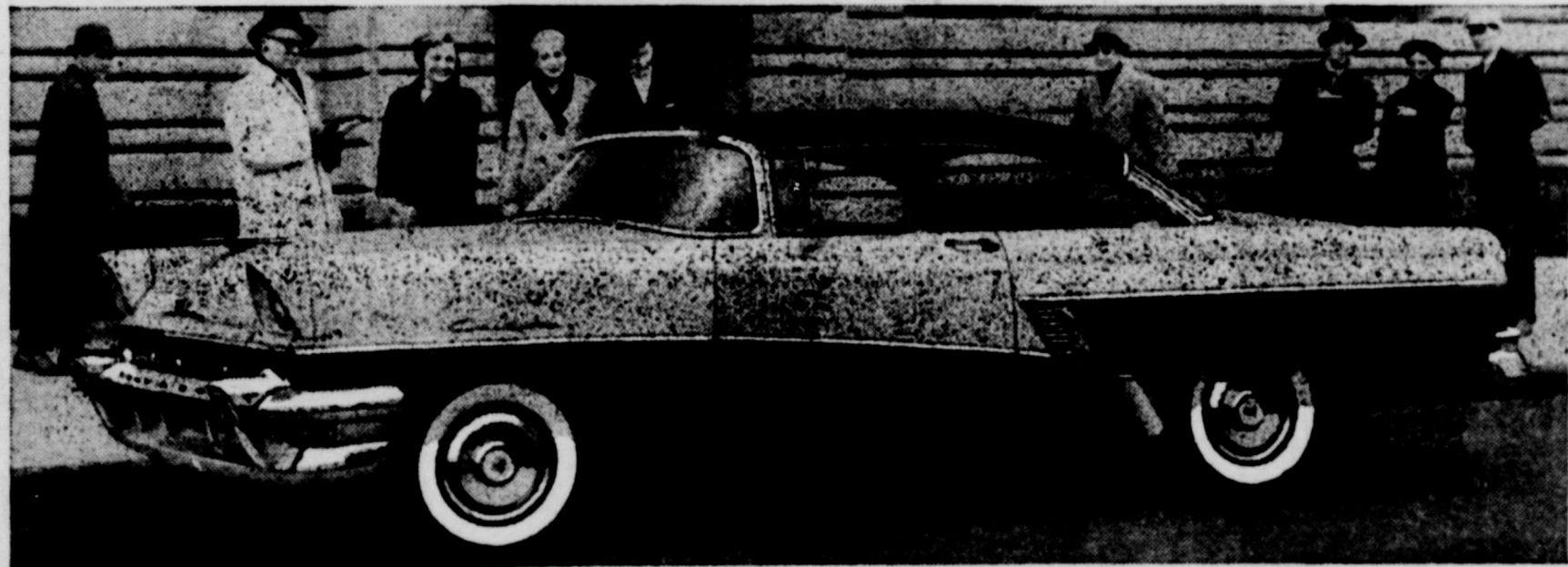

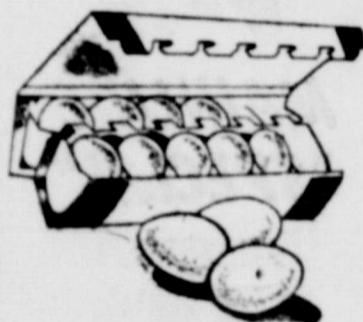

**At the Texas . . .**

The story of the last of America's great buffalo herds, which roamed the Dakota Territory in the early 1880's, has been brought to the screen by M-G-M in CinemaScope and color, in "The Last Hunt." Sunday, Monday and Tuesday at the Texas Theatre. One of the studio's most ambitious offerings of the 1956 season, the picture stars Robert Taylor and Stewart Granger as partners in a project to wipe out the buffalo, with other starring roles played by Lloyd Nolan and Russ Tamblyn, as a veteran and a young half-breed skinner, and by Debra Paget, as the Indian girl who comes between Taylor and Granger. 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
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
