

## Baseball Season Opener Now Only 12 Days Away

Tony York, manager of the Runnels County Westerners, continued work this week with most of the crew going to San Angelo for workouts with the Colts.

Monday seven men were on hand to continue work this week. York said that several pitchers were due to be here before work started next week. Douglass Allford, a left handed first baseman and outfielder, came in the past week-end to join the local squad. Allford has been working out in the New York Giant camp in Florida and is in fair condition. He also pitches some but Manager York plans to use him mostly in the outfield.

Dale Seales, a six-foot left handed first baseman is getting in shape here and is looking good. He is a limited service player and a hard hitter.

Joe Ziel, veteran second-baseman, was the first player to arrive here and is getting in good condition for the opening of the season.

Nick Cappelli, short stop, is also a veteran and an excellent fielder and a good hitter.

Kenneth Jones, veteran catcher, is well known in the area, having played with the old Longhorn League.

Skipper York is taking care of third base to complete the field.

York stated Monday that players would continue to arrive almost daily as the big league camps are broken and trips started back to their home parks. Some players that will be sent here later will be retained by the club for a few more weeks.

Getting the park in condition for the opening of the season is being rushed as fast as possible and it now appears that it will be a race to get everything done by April 17.

Other pressing work is with the sale of box seats and season tickets. York stated that the season ticket sale would likely be stopped on April 16 and after that date tickets will be worth 75 cents per game.

There are also a few more fence signs to be sold and painted and advertisers who want these signs are urged to contract space as soon as possible.

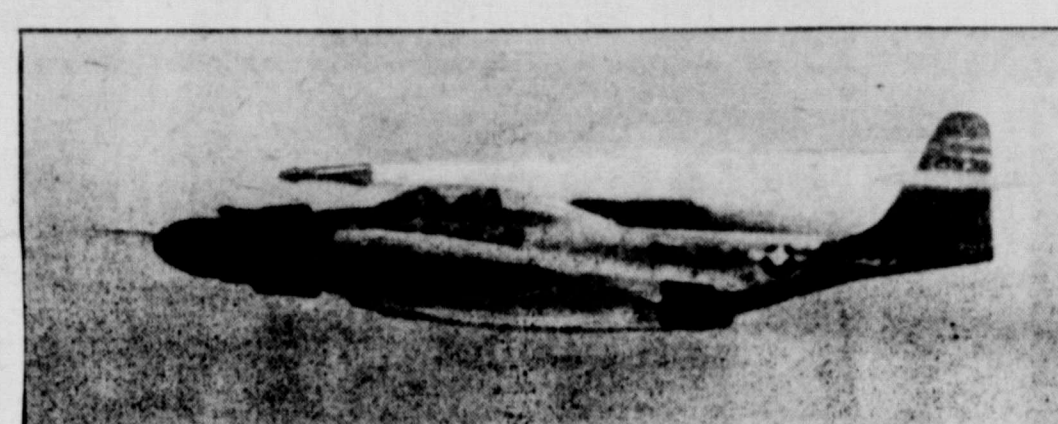
Practice sessions for each team will be announced later by the managers.

## Dual Completion For 514 Barrels in Norton Field

The fourth pay in the Goen lme was opened in the Norton, North field with dual completion of the M. C. Account of Kansas and Murray Petroleum Co. of San Angelo No. 5-A. C. Minzenmayer. It was finished for a combined daily flowing potential of 514.40 barrels. From the Goen it gauged 313.98 barrels of 43 gravity oil and from the Gardner it gauged 200.42 barrels of 44 gravity oil. The nearest Goen producer is 1 1/2 miles south of the new well. The Kendrick (Gardner) field has gained its fourth producer and an east extension with completion of Girchrist Drilling Co. No. 1-Tom Armstrong, two miles northeast of Winters. It was finished for a daily pumping potential of 71.58 barrels of 41 gravity oil. Top of pay was encountered at 4,322 feet.

Bert Fluids has filed application to drill his No. 5-J. W. Smith, one location south of production in the Norton, West (lower Fry) field. Application calls for a 4,800 foot test.

Hoblitzelle & Perkins of Dallas have filed application to drill their No. 3A-R. H. Herring Jr., 7 1/2 miles southeast of Norton. Application calls for a 4,950 foot test. The new well is 933 feet north of their No. 2-Herring, an active wildcat which flowed oil during drill-stem tests in the Canyon sands. Casing has been set in the No. 2 and production will be tested.

The Ballinger (Gardner) field has been extended to the south with the completion of the Geochemical Surveys No. 1-W. H. Ahrens. The well was finished for a daily flowing potential of 167.91 barrels of 42 gravity oil. It is located 1.7 miles southwest of Hatchel Top of pay was picked at 4,171 feet.

**New Method for Laundering Blankets**

Soak it will be time to clean and blankets. A new "soak" method for blanket washing developed by laundry research at Ohio State University gives excellent cleansing results and helps prevent shrinkage, according to research workers. The soak method involves no agitation. Here are the instructions for

soak method: Shake out all loose dirt and remove unusually soiled spots by rubbing with a soft brush and a solution of one-half teaspoon controlled sudsing detergent in 1 cup of warm water. The next step depends on the kind of washing machine you use. In a top-loading washer, fill

the machine with lukewarm water and add 1 cup of controlled sudsing detergent. Let the washer run until the detergent dissolves. Turn off the washer and put the blanket in for a 15-minute soak. Turn the blanket over a few times by hand. After the soak, turn the washer to "spin" until water has drained out. It is not necessary to spin the blanket for a long time. Fill the washer with warm rinse water, soak the

blanket in the rinse 4 to 5 minutes and then spin. Use a second rinse in the same way. If you use a front-loading washer, fill it with water to the bottom of the door level before dissolving one-half cup controlled sudsing detergent in the water. Add the blanket and continue filling the machine in full level. Stop the tumble action immediately and soak the blanket for 10 minutes. Now refill the machine for rinse and advance the dial to drain. The final spin can be shortened to one or two minutes. Electric blankets can be laundered in the same way if the label says they are washable. Follow the manufacturer's instructions to remove the control from the blanket. To protect the plug, the edges of the blanket are turned over the plug and secured with a few stitches.

**Grass Seed Shows Good Income for Farmers-Ranchers**  
According to information furnished by the Runnels County Soil Conservation district, grass seed production can be a profitable business. The demand for grass seed has been increasing yearly. Rumors of the soil bank program, being considered by Congress, is affecting the market and seed prices are increasing. Grass seed production is new to the county district, but interest is increasing.  
Last year Bill Moore harvested 500 pounds of blue panicum seed on his Maverick place. Harold Mueller harvested about 1,100 pounds of blue panicum from twelve acres. He says that a yield of 200 pounds per acre can easily be obtained by harvesting the crop several times during the growing season.  
Technicians point out that farmers should consider the soil improvement that grasses planted on cropland can bring about. Deep rooted grasses let on crop land for five years will greatly increase the organic matter content of the soil, improve the tilth, help prevent erosion, increase the water intake rate and consequently greatly increase the yield of crops grown after the grass is plowed up.  
At the soil conservation service office it was reported that one 14 acre irrigated field of indian grass near Big Spring yielded 14,000 pounds of seed. The normal yield for indian grass is about 200 pounds per acre. Sideots grama, another adapted grass, can also yield about 200 pounds per acre. K. R. bluestem may produce about 100 pounds per acre. All these grasses produce more seed under irrigation.

Why preach the gospel of Christ and not those doctrines originated by men because: I. CHRIST COMMANDED IT. After his resurrection Christ said: ". . . Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature" Mark 16:15. God no longer speaks to man directly. Today men who know the truth must tell it and reach to others. "But we have this treasure in earthen vessels." 2 Corinthians 4:7. ("The treasure" is the gospel; "Earthen vessels" are men who know the truth). ". . . the things thou hast heard of me . . . the same commit thou to faithful men, who shall be able to teach others also" 2 Timothy 2:2. It is the great work of the church today to preach the gospel. Paul called the church "the pillar (support, upholder) and ground (source, foundation) of the truth . . ." 1 Timothy 3:15.

II. IT IS THE ONLY GOSPEL THAT WILL SAVE. "For I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ, for it is the power of God unto salvation . . ." Romans 1:16. ". . . I declare unto you the gospel . . . by which also ye are saved" 1 Corinthians 15:1-2. We are "begotten (born again) . . . through the gospel" 1 Cor. 1:15. We are "born again . . . by the word of God" 1 Peter 1:23. Human gospel will not save (Matthew 15:9; Galatians 1:6-12). Faith in Christ is one of the requirements for salvation (John 8:24). ". . . Faith cometh by hearing . . . the word of God" Romans 10:17; therefore, ". . . if our gospel be hid, it is hid to them that are lost" 2 Corinthians 4:3 (See also Mark 16:15-16). We seek the salvation of souls, not the damnation; therefore we preach the gospel of Christ, not the gospel of men.

III. IT IS SUFFICIENT. We preach no more nor no less than the gospel of Christ because it is sufficient to save as it is. It is ". . . the PERFECT law of liberty" James 1:25. That PERFECT divine law would become imperfect with human changes—additions, subtractions or substitutions.

The Atom Bomb has not been perfected yet, so far as we know, but it will serve to illustrate our point. Those who made it, know far more about it than any of us, don't they? They probably have it to almost perfect precision. What improvement could you make on it? Any changes you made, any additions, subtractions or substitutions would HARM rather than HELP. Just so with God's dynamite, God's Atom Bomb, His gospel, "the power of God unto salvation" Romans 1:16. If we say it worked out to perfection and any changes we humans would make would harm rather than help. Concerning the human doctrines of the Pharisees and all such today, Christ said, "Thus ye have made the commandment of God of none effect by your tradition" Matthew 15:6. "of none effect" means powerless, worthless, no given unto us. "If ye have said, 'BUT IN VAIN THEY DO WORSHIP ME, TEACHING FOR DOCTRINES THE COMMANDMENTS OF MEN' Matthew 15:9.

Inspired men wrote the Bible (2 Peter 1:19-21). The Holy Spirit inspired men to write all the truth; "Howbeit when he, the Spirit of truth, is come, he will guide you into ALL TRUTH" John 16:13. The Bible is complete, perfect, whole and finished. "According to his divine power hath AND GODLINESS . . ." 2 Peter 1:3. "All scripture is given by inspiration of God . . . that the man of God may be perfect, THOROUGHLY (completely, thoroughly) FURNISHED UNTO ALL GOOD WORKS" 2 Timothy 3:16-17. Since the gospel of Christ is perfect, the power of God unto salvation, gives us "all truth", "godliness" and furnishes us "unto all good works" what need do we have for human changes?

IV. BY CHRIST'S GOSPEL WE WILL BE JUDGED. ". . . the word that I have spoken, the same shall judge him in the last day." Christ said in John 12:48. Although men might meet the requirements of men's gospels, unless they obey the commands of Christ's gospel they will be lost; therefore we preach the gospel of Christ at every opportunity.
