Runnels County was named for Hiram G. Runnels, once governor of Mississippi and later a member of the Texas Legislature.



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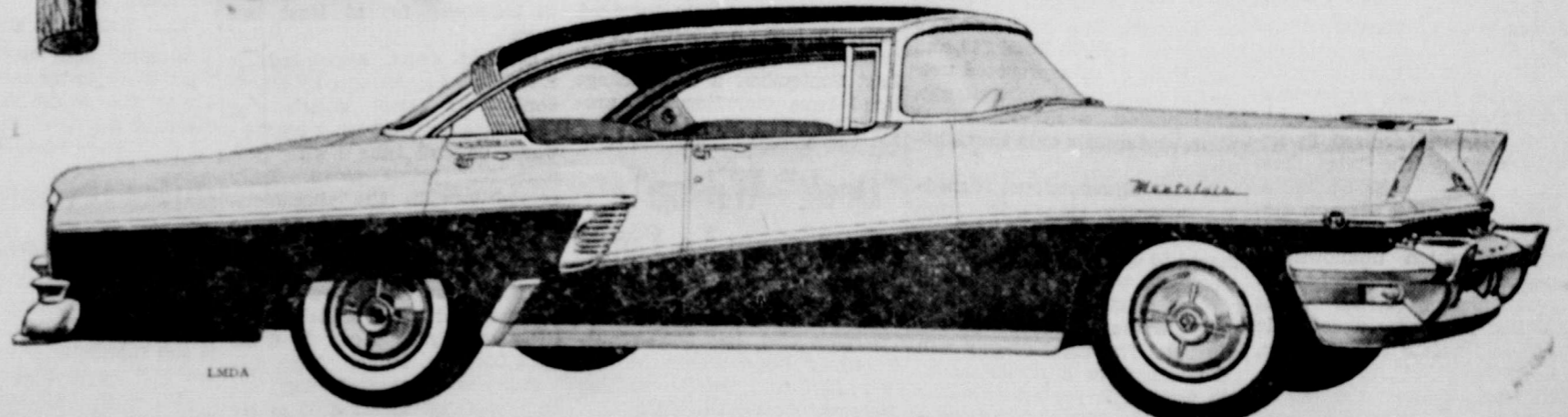

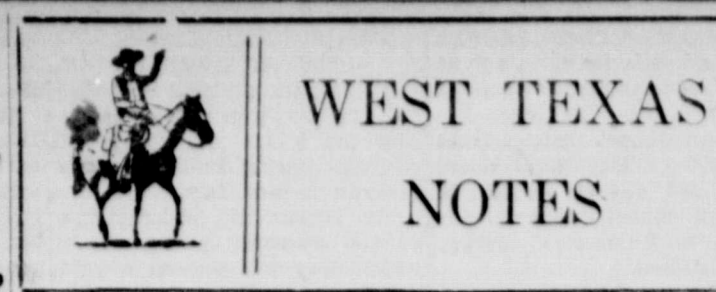
Now that the precinct and county conventions are over, it's time to reflect on some of the happenings, understandings, and misunderstandings.

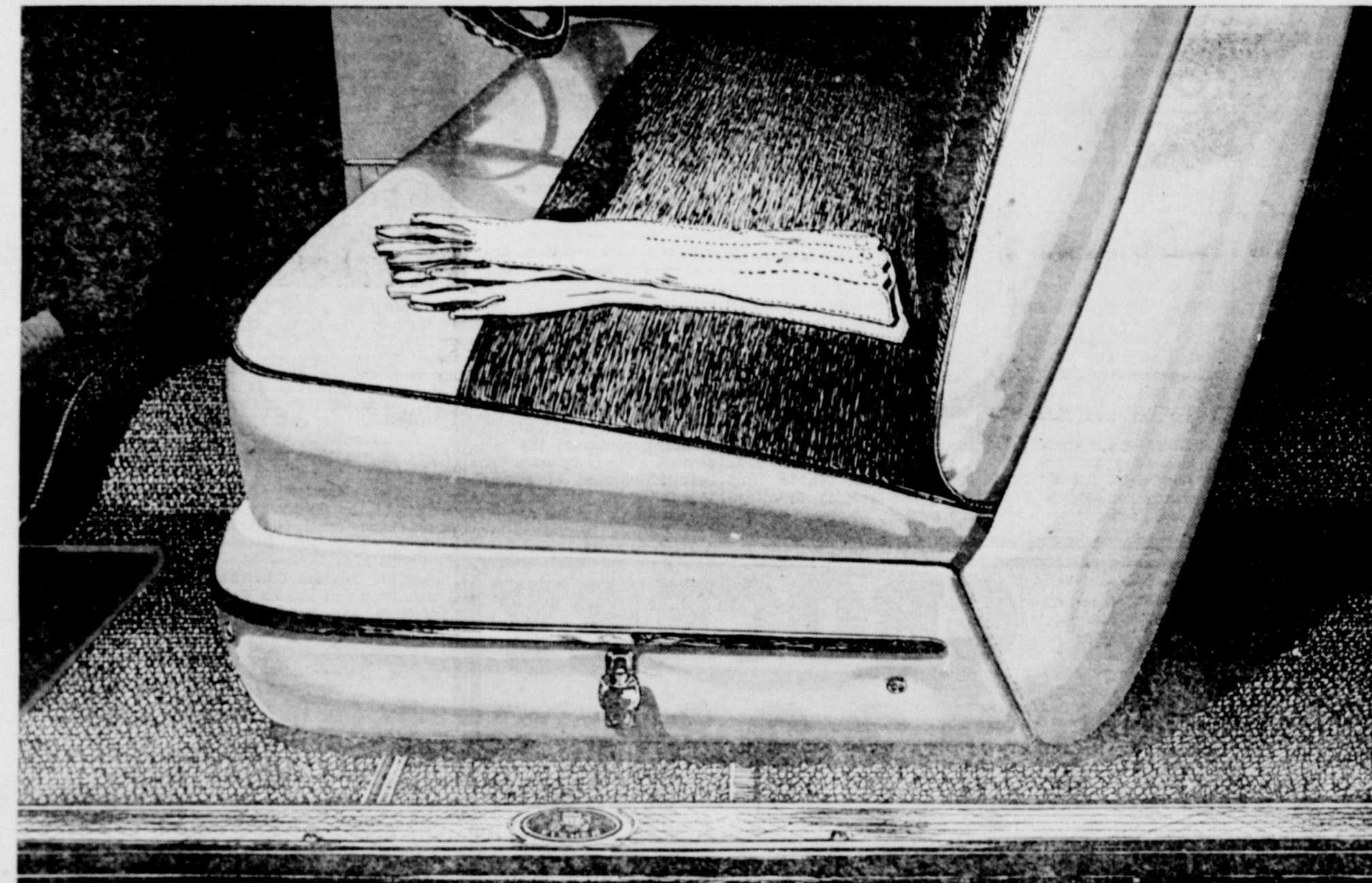

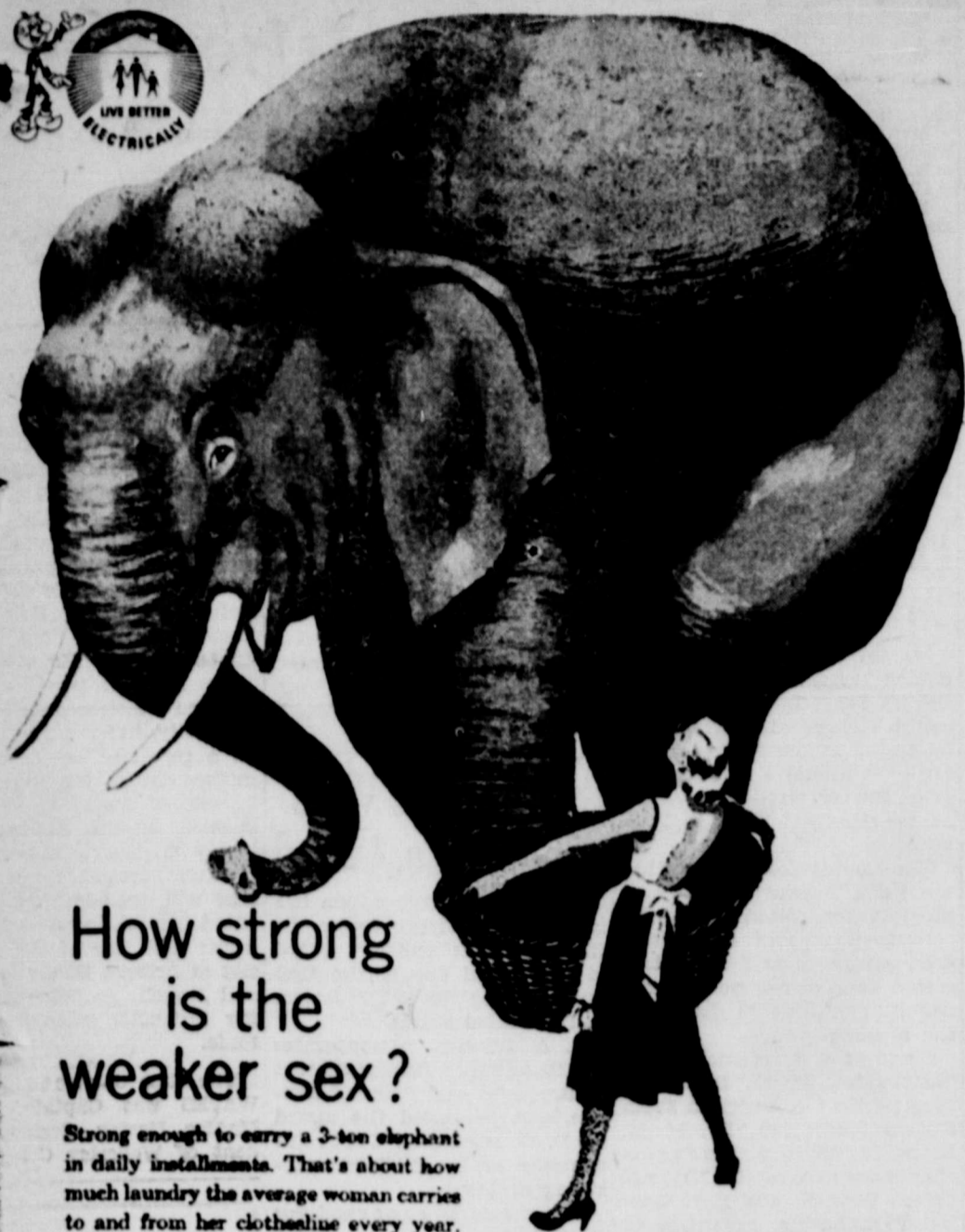

Timely Tips Hints on Freezing

By Otis Chenoweth, County RD Agent

(The following hints on home freezing of fresh vegetables and other food preserving suggestions were prepared for the benefit of readers who are concerned about this seasonal work.)

Here's how to freeze those surplus greens easily and quickly. For best flavor and highest food value, freeze as soon as possible after gathering.

It's easy to do—simply wash, remove tough stems and imperfect leaves. Cut, if desired, Blanch greens by heating in boiling water for 2 minutes (very tender spinach requires only 1½ minutes). Then cool, drain, package and freeze immediately.

For latest information on how to cook frozen foods, get the Extension bulletin "Frozen Foods" from my office.

Freezing is a quick, easy way to preserve fresh greens, asparagus and other spring

vegetables. Freezing keeps the natural color, fresh flavor and food value of most vegetables and fruits better than other methods of food preparation.

For best results, select fresh, tender vegetables right from the garden while they are at the right stage of maturity for eating.

Other factors that influence quality are preparation, packaging, freezer loading and length of storage.

CAN BERRIES EASY WAY

Berries will be ready to can soon. Save time and energy by using the new one-step cold-pack method for canning them.

Here's the new method: Wash berries and drain well. Fill jars to ½ inch of top. Shake while filling to give a full pack. Cover with boiling syrup, leaving one-half inch head space at top of jar. Adjust lids. Process in boiling water bath—pint jars 10 minutes, quart jars 15 minutes. Remove jars from water bath and complete seals if lids are not of self-sealing type.

will depend on the natural sweetness of the fruit and your own taste.

Keep your plastic dishes free from food or beverage stains. Simply mix a chlorine bleach, baking soda and vinegar into a solution using this ratio: Three-fourth cup chlorine bleach, one fourth cup baking soda and one cup vinegar.

Prepare enough of the solution so dishes can be soaked in the liquid. Allow them to stand for five minutes in the solution, then wash them as you usually do. Repeat the treatment when necessary.

Once acclimated pasture is established, management largely determines its productivity, says E. M. Trw, extension pasture specialist. Good management includes rotation grazing, cross fencing, making hay or silage from excess growth, mowing as needed, using temporary pastures, using plenty of fertilizer and supplementing succulent grazing with dry hay.

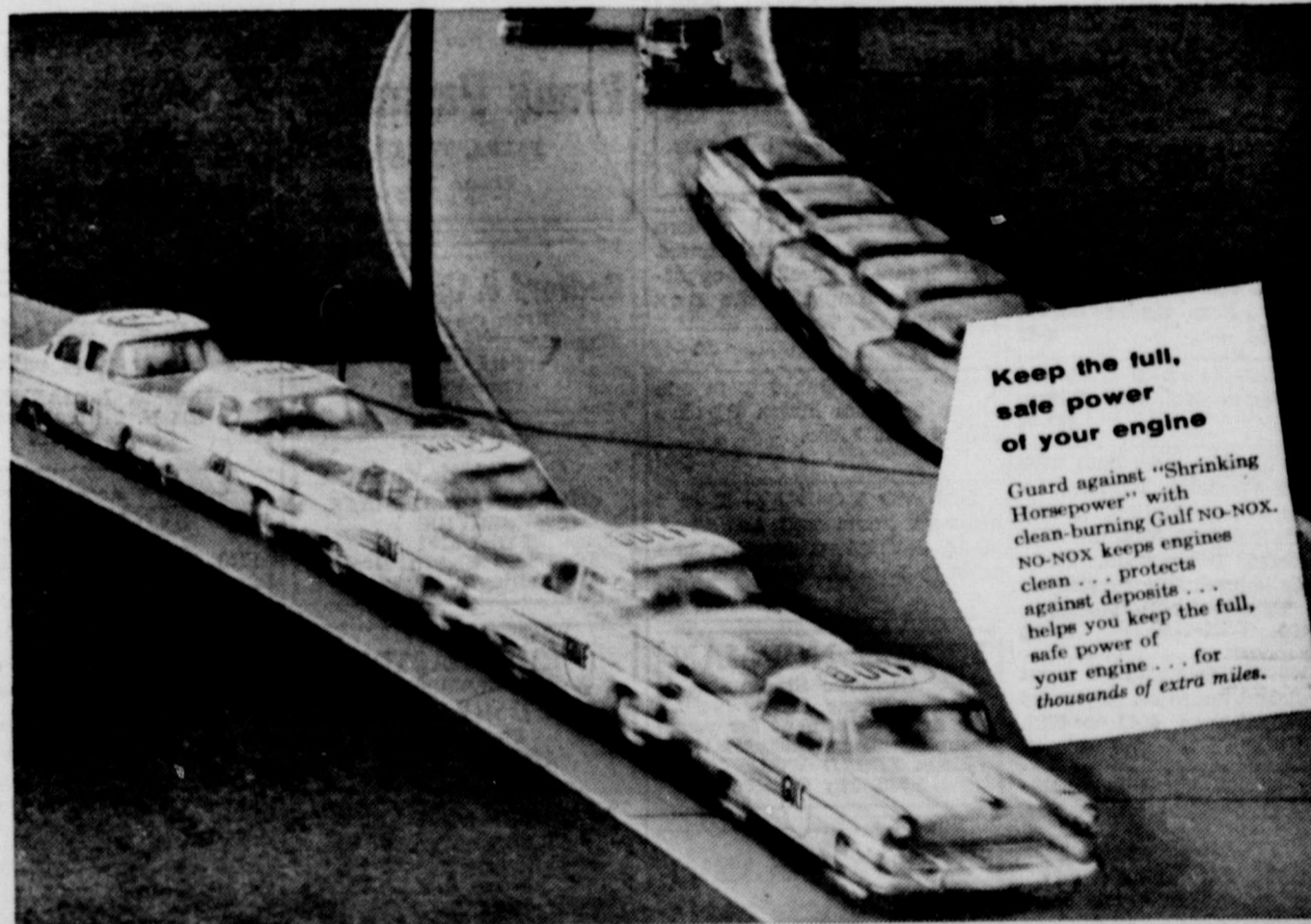
