

## Completion New School Expected Here Aug. 15

Supt. Ernest Caskey is a busy man these days with school opening only seven weeks away and a new building to be completed, another repaired and equipment moved from West Ward to the central elementary building.

In the meantime several other jobs are underway which must be completed before the start of the fall semester. He still needs one teacher to complete the local faculty and has made a number of trips trying to fill this place.

Last week-end he hired Billy Don Manhart to teach general science in junior high school. He is looking for an industrial arts teacher to take the place of Billy F. Brown who resigned at the close of school last May.

Progress in the new elementary building at West Ward is said to be on time and the contractors declare they will turn the new structure over to the school authorities on the contract date, August 15. After the building is accepted, furniture and fixtures must be placed in each room to have it ready for teachers and students on September 4. This will require the moving of all the furniture and fixtures from the

old central elementary school to the new building, the uncrating of new furniture and placing it in the new classrooms at West Ward.

There is also much work to be done in the central elementary building which will become the junior high school. All furniture and fixtures at West Ward must be moved there and workmen are trying to refinish floors in all classrooms and halls before the move is made.

Work at senior high school has about been completed and that building is ready for the opening.

The wrecking of the old two-story section at the central elementary is underway but cannot be completed for the opening of school. When completed it will be used for girls' physical education classes. Until it is ready these classes will be held in the regular high school gymnasium.

Repairs are being made on the stands at the football field and everything will be ready there when the first game is played.

The time element will be short but Supt. Caskey expects to have all classes in their regular rooms by September 4.

## Runnels County Has 11 Highway Wrecks In June

Runnels County led all counties in the 8th district during June for car accidents. The highway safety department reported a total of 11 accidents in this county, 8 persons injured and property damage amounting to \$16,330.

District 8 is composed of 21 West Texas counties. The total number of accidents in this district for the month of June was shown at 87. These resulted in 4 deaths, 52 persons injured and property damage of \$53,122. Concho and McCulloch Counties had more people injured than Runnels and McCulloch reported 1 death.

From 9 p. m. to midnight continued to lead as the time of day when most accidents occur. Drivers 29 to 30 years of age had the most wrecks and speed continued as the cause of the most accidents. One and two car accidents were the same with 33 each.

For the first six months of 1956, the district has reported 444 accidents, 50 people killed, 254 injured and property damage of \$330,040. For the same period in 1955 the district had 354 accidents, 30 killed, 181 injured and property damage of \$220,671. This shows an increase in all four items for 1956 over the first six months of 1955.

A total of 28 per cent of all accidents in 1956 was due to speeding and in second place with 18 per cent were drunken drivers. Defective vehicles were responsible for only 2 per cent of the accidents.

## Four New Producers Reported Past Week

The Rowena (Capps lime) field has been extended one location north and west with the completion of Humble Oil and Refining Co. No. 32-W. H. Dierschke, 1 1/4 miles northeast of Rowena. It was finished for a calculated daily flowing potential of 446.54 barrels of 46.2 gravity oil. The potential was based on actual flow of 226.87 barrels in 12 hours. Top of pay was found at 3,709 feet.

The Paul Thomas (3060 sand) field has gained its third producer with the completion of the E. P. Thomas and Keith Graham No. 1-W. B. Reeves, six miles west of Winters. It was finished for a daily flowing potential of 270.06 barrels of 46 gravity oil. Casing was cemented at 3,034 feet.

Lower Fry production has been extended one location south in the Norton, West multipay field with the completion of the Texas Co. No. 1-T. J. McCaughan. It was finished for a calculated daily flowing potential of 177.66 barrels of 45.6 gravity oil. Top of pay was encountered at 4,336 feet.

The Fennell multipay field gained its second Goen lime producer last week with the completion of Sinclair Oil and Gas Co. No. 6-Tennie Wilson, three miles west of Winters. It was finished for a daily flowing potential of 339 barrels of 44.9 gravity oil. Perforations were between 2,764-82 feet.

Humble Oil & Refining Co.

has filed application to drill a 5,000 foot Ellenburger wildcat, 7 1/2 miles northeast of Ballinger. It will be their No. 1-Jorita Duke Taff.

Murray Petroleum Co. has filed application to re-enter and deepen to wildcat depth of 4,800 feet at T. B. Poe et al No. 1-Jerry Hoch, five miles southwest of Winters. Operations are to begin at once and the Concho Drilling Co. of San Angelo has the drilling contract.

Warren Petroleum Corp. No. 1-T. W. Hord, five miles west of Winters, has been completed for a daily flowing potential of 70 barrels, gravity unreported.

Humble Oil & Refining Co. has filed application to drill their No. 3-Frank and Isabella Lange, one location north and east of production in the Rowena (Capps lime) field. It will be drilled to 5,000 feet with rotary.

Gulf Oil Corp. has filed application to drill their No. 2-Tennis Puckett, four miles northeast of Wingate. Application depth calls for a 5,000 foot test with operations to start at once.

The Texas Railroad Commission, oil and gas division, has announced the designation of another field in Runnels County. It will be the Hatchel, North (3500 lime) field which was opened on March 20 with completion of the Joe Ralls No. 1-J. R. Harris.

## City To Enforce Local Ordinance For Dog Owners

The city commission at their meeting next Tuesday will take up the matter of enforcing the dog ordinance locally. During the past several weeks many complaints have been filed with city officials regarding vicious dogs in certain parts of town.

The city has an ordinance which, among other things, requires that all dogs be vaccinated, that they be registered with the city, a tag be purchased from the city and placed on a collar and that vicious dogs be kept up so that they cannot run loose on the streets.

So far in 1956 there has been only six dogs registered with the city and annual tax paid on them. It is estimated that there are perhaps 1,000 dogs within the city limits at the present time.

Mayor Bill Moore stated this week that it was likely that a dog catcher would be hired and a pound opened. It will be the duty of the dog catcher to pick up all dogs without a tag and place them in the pound. Vicious dogs will also have to be placed in enclosures so they cannot get on the street to bother people, especially children.

City officials stated that several dogs have attacked people passing on the street and have also killed smaller dogs in the neighborhood.

Every effort will be made to start rigid enforcement of the local ordinance and dog owners are warned now that they should have their animals vaccinated at once and register them with the city and secure a tag.

## Heavy Vote Expected Saturday for County

The first democratic primary will be held in Runnels County Saturday with all voting boxes open from 8 a. m. to 7 p. m. The potential vote in the county is the largest in several years and a record number of voters will be polled Saturday, according to prediction of election managers.

Interest centers in the governor's race where six candidates are seeking the nomination. There are also enough county and precinct races to cause a heavy vote this year.

Results of the first primary will be tabulated Saturday night at the office of the Ballinger Ledger. No bulletin board will be used on the street this year, but results of the election will be heard at regular intervals over station KRUN and announcements will be made on local races at the Ledger office.

Results on state races for Runnels County will be sent to the Texas Election Bureau at Dallas and included in state totals released from there during the night.

Homer Hudgins, county democratic chairman, will be on the staff at the Ballinger Ledger and has requested all election managers to call in as soon as they have counted all the votes. A staff of workers will be on the job to handle boxes as they are received and include them in the county totals.

This year there are more than 80 candidates seeking 40 places and in addition there is a vote on a referendum in which three propositions are listed dealing with segregation and interposition.

As a precaution against mutilated ballots, voters are asked to either use the check square in front of the candidate name or to scratch all candidates except the one voted for in the ballot. A check mark in front of the candidate for whom the vote is intended is sufficient.

Election managers are urging all voters to visit the polls as early as possible and cast their ballot. This will permit workers to start counting and make it possible for the results to be announced early in the night. The length of the ballot is the reason for requesting as many morning voters as possible.

## School Lunch Room Supervisors Attend Special Workshop Training Programs

Mrs. Bernie Cervenka and Mrs. Bill Wade returned from Lubbock last week where they attended the School Lunch Workshop at Texas Tech College. Outstanding teachers in the field of nutrition, sanitation, and supervision from Texas, Louisiana and Arkansas were on the teaching staff. A college credit course for supervisors was offered for the first time and was deemed a great success and will be included in the future. More than three hundred women from West Texas and New Mexico attended the school.

Outstanding figures on malnutrition among school children were brought out and the result that this will have on the health of the future generations. Too many of our school children exist on a "litterbug" diet consisting of "Hot dog, potato chips, and soda pop" when for the same amount of money they can have a balanced meal of meat, vegetables, fruit, whole milk, bread and butter in their local school cafeterias. The U. S. government helps to support these cafeterias.

The instructors felt that it would be well to renew in the mind of the public some of the basic principles of the lunchroom program and answer some of the questions most often asked. 1. The lunchroom program is designed with the school child in mind. It is to supply one-third of his daily food requirements. 2. The program is non-profit. 70% of the money is spent on food and the other 30% for labor and equipment or cleaning supplies. 3. The U. S. government supplements the program by offering U. S. D. A. foods. Some of these foods are surplus products that have been bought by the government to supplement the farmers, others are products that have been bought because of their nutritional value for children. The supplies to be offered this year included butter, cheese, dry milk (used in cooking only), dry beans, rice, flour, corn meal, shortening, pork and gravy lard. The lunch program will receive canned tomatoes, concentrated orange juice, green beans, peas, apricots, cherries, grapefruit sections, and frozen hamburger meat. These products are always top quality and second to none offered through our usual food channels.

School officials said: "The lunchroom program is your program and it is big business in Ballinger. Thirteen women plus a supervisor are employed to feed your children. You, as a tax payer, own two well-equipped lunchrooms which last year fed an average of six hundred seventy-five students per day. Visit your lunchrooms and inspect the modern equipment you have, the attractive dining rooms and facilities that you as a community own. This past year the operating budget for the lunch program was approximately \$50,000.00."

The lunchroom program is still in its infancy. Its rapid growth has astounded everyone and it, like all other industries that make such growth, has "growing pains," but experts in the field of equipment, food service, and many others are rushing to meet the needs. Last winter at the peak seven hundred seventy-five children were served each day. Lunchrooms are here to stay and are no longer the type we associated with the W. P. A. feeding program. All constructive criticism is welcomed and if you have an idea that will improve your lunch program, offer it. You owe it to your educational system to help improve it in any way you can.

This coming year the menus for each week will be published so you, the public, may know what your child is being offered.

The lunchroom offers these foods and you as parents can help to encourage your children to eat these balanced meals.

## Absentee Voting Heavy This Year 121 For County

There were 121 absentee votes cast in Runnels County for the first democratic primary election this year. The absentee voting period came to a close Tuesday at midnight and a check on the number Wednesday morning showed the above figure.

These ballots will be counted Saturday night in a special box and reported as an absentee box Saturday night after the close of the election.

The heavy vote here indicates the interest in the first primary and should be the forerunner of a heavy vote for the county Saturday.

In order to complete the tabulations for this county early Saturday night, election managers are urging as many people as possible to cast their ballots Saturday morning. This will give most of the morning and the entire afternoon for counting. Boxes that have a heavy late afternoon vote will have to go into the night before the tabulations are complete.

## Football Reserve Seats For Season To Sell August 1

Season reserve seat sale for five football games this fall will be held all day August 1 at the Keel Drug Store. This announcement was made the first of the week by Joe Forester, high school principal.

The sale will be the same as last year with the advance sale being for the grandstand seats only. The seats will sell for \$1.25 each and holders of reserve seats will have to purchase their general admission tickets for entrance into the park before each game.

A block of 448 seats in the center of the North stand will be included in the sale. This will include all seats between 31 and 70 from B to 0.

## Baseball Appreciation Night Here August 11

Saturday, August 11, will be Baseball Appreciation Night at Runnels Field honoring W. J. Green, president of the Southwestern League, who has made baseball possible in Ballinger this year.

This is not a plan to raise money but a concentrated effort of local fans to have a capacity crowd on hand for the game with Clovis that night. It will also include a short program, the raising of the flag and recognition of Mr. Green and Tony York.

Fans pointed out in a meeting Wednesday that Ballinger is one of the few towns in the league that has not had financial troubles this season. At the start of the season many thought baseball was impossible for this area and that patronage at games would cause the team to be shifted in a short time.

Mr. Green assured fans that if baseball was started in Ballinger the team would finish the season. He has made good on his word and has given the area excellent baseball all the way.

The plan to show appreciation from all fans in this area is to sell a large number of admission tickets for the game on August 11 at 50 cents each. This is 25 cents cheaper than tickets can be purchased at the gate. The ticket would be good for this night only and those in charge of the special event have pointed out that a big crowd is wanted, rather than just the sale of tickets. They are hoping that some 3,000 tickets can be sold in advance and that every ticket holder will be on hand to show their appreciation for professional baseball.

All the 50 cent tickets will be sold in advance and those who wish to attend and do not have the special appreciation night tickets can purchase the regular 75 cent admission tickets at the gate the night of the special program.

It was also pointed out that those who have the special tickets and would like to secure box seats, can purchase them at the gate at 25 cents per chair.

The ticket sale will start early next week and all communities in this trade area will have them for sale. Some 50 local fans will be selling tickets and urging local people to attend this one game.

Fans also hope that baseball will be continued here in 1957 and the rest of the season may decide if Green and others will continue here.

## Farm Safety Week Stressed Locally By Organizations

This is National Farm Safety Week and a number of organizations are stressing the fact over the entire nation. The Farmers Home Administration points out that in one year farm accidents took a toll of 14,500 killed and 1,250,000 injured.

Walter T. McKay, state director of FHA said: "It is the policy of the FHA to promote safety among its borrowers as part of its service to farm families. We don't think of safety as separate and distinct but as an inseparable part of our entire program."

Members of the Soil Conservation Service are also featuring safety this week and reminding people that when it's hot and dry, crops twisting and dying, livestock losing weight because of short dry pastures, it is a time when people become irritated and more accidents occur.

In a prepared article they state: "We read of highway accidents daily, yet twice as many accidents happen in the home as on the road. Be careful, slow down and think before you do anything."

"Remember tires get hot at high speeds on warm pavement. A blowout can take the wheel away from you and kill you. Don't depend on the driver in the car ahead of you, he may be asleep also."

"The dependable old tractor can become an outlaw, bucking, rearing, and even falling backwards to crush you. Watch power take-off shafts, keep them covered. They can cripple and kill. A set of horns in your middle can ruin your digestion. Cows and bulls are also grouchy in hot weather."

"One dollar invested in a snake bite kit might save your life. Poisonous snakes, the rattler in particular, seem to go heat crazy in late summer. They frequently strike at anything without warning. The range portion of the eastern part of the district reports a good crop of rattlesnakes this year, so watch your step."

"Several towns in the state report a rabies outbreak. It could happen here so don't become friendly with strange dogs."

"Air conditioners are fine when in good working order. Remember wet electricity is a powerful force. Be safe, hire an electrician if anything goes wrong."

There are hundreds of hazards around the home. Look for them and correct each one you find.

## 3 Ballinger Boys Leave For 18 Day Trip Into Canada

Buddy Stasney, Skeeter Pearce and Paul Price left Saturday for Camp Sol Mayer where they met 27 other explorers to start a trip which will take them into Canada.

They left Sol Mayer for the 18 day trip in an air-conditioned chartered bus. They were scheduled to spend their first night at Perrin Air Force Base at Sherman. The second night will be spent at Grandview Air Force Base, Kansas City, and the third night at the Minnesota State Fair grounds. They will reach the Sommers Canoe base at Ell, Minnesota about noon of the 4th day.

The following day after their arrival they will begin a full day of classes in handling a canoe. After these classes they will be outfitted with canoes and camp gear and will leave for Canada. The final destination will be the Quetico Proventional Park in Ontario, Canada. This park is composed of 4,000 acres and 2,000 lakes. The group will have an experienced guide with them all the way.

The park is exclusively for canoes and no motor or other type boats are allowed. The boys will not be contacted unless there is some emergency and in such case will be flown out from the park area by helicopter. Hiking, canoe trips, fishing and other water sports will make up most of their program while they are in Canada.

Buddy Stasney and Skeeter Pearce made the \$150 to cover the cost of their trip. They worked as delivery boys for the Ballinger Ledger, did yard and odd jobs around town until they had enough to pay their expenses.

## Water Rationing Plan Solving Local Problem

Water rationing here in its present form is proving satisfactory and is expected to keep water in the storage tanks during the peak load. A number of people misunderstood the request made by the city officials last week, some thinking that only a half-day three days per week was permitted.

As the request was made all water users may irrigate each morning and all day Sunday. Houses with odd numbers will stop watering lawns at noon on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays. Houses with even numbers will stop irrigation at noon on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays. This will permit houses with odd numbers to irrigate all day on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays and on Sundays. Those with even numbers will have use of water for irrigation on Tuesdays, Thursdays, Saturdays and Sundays.

This arrangement will give pumping facilities an opportunity to keep water in the storage tanks during the afternoons when the peak load is heavy.

Water superintendent R. E. Harris stated the past week-end that the water lines from the lake to the filtration plant would not carry enough water to meet local demands. Last summer an extra pump was placed in operation at the lake and the pressure has been kept high this year resulting in several breaks in the line, one of which caused the water to be off for several hours.

There is plenty of water in the lake at the present time but facilities will only permit some one million six hundred thousand gallons to be pumped through to the distribution system each day. The city is using more than that amount which is impossible to deliver. Before this condition can be relieved, another line will be necessary from the lake to the pumping and filtration plant. Local users are urged to abide by the request of the city in regard to irrigation so that all parts of the town will have water during the late afternoon and early evenings.

**SOCIAL SECURITY MAN OFFERS FREE SERVICES**

To avoid losing social security payments there are three most important times for action, according to Ed Bowers, manager of the San Angelo District Social Security office.

First, when a worker dies his survivors should get in touch with the Social Security office or local representative.

Second, when a worker is between the age of 65 and 72 and retires, he should contact the Social Security representative.

Third, when he reaches age 72, regardless of retirement he should contact the Social Security representative.

Through this agency you can get virtually every form of insurance protection you need for your family, your home, your automobile and your business.

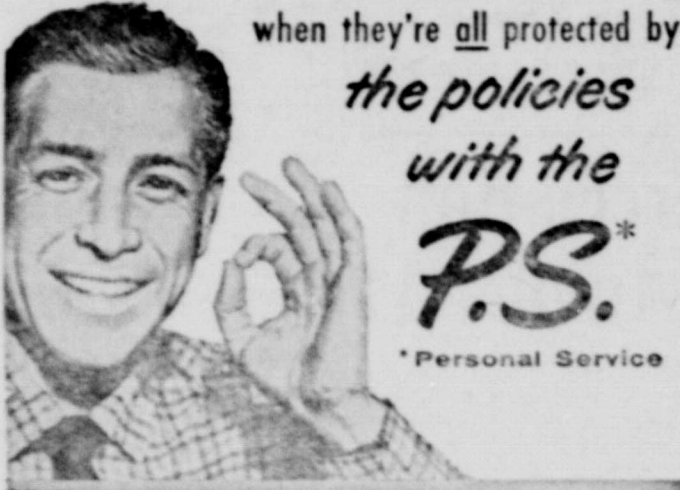

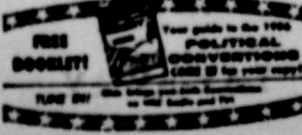

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WEST TEXAS NOTES

Saturday will go election day. Voters will go to the polls to name the democratic nominees for the general election this fall. The list of candidates is long and important and every eligible voter should have a say in who will be placed in the important offices of the state, district, county and precinct. Voters are reminded that there are two ways to vote a ballot in this election. In front of each candidate's name is a small square. This can be used by placing a check-mark in front of the candidate for whom the vote is intended. When this method is used, the check in the square is all that is necessary. The other method is that of scratching all candidates except the one to receive the vote. Voters should use one method or the other and not attempt to use both. In the past the two ways of voting has caused a good number of ballots to be thrown out as mutilated and not counted in the tabulations. Voting boxes will open at 8 a. m. and remain open until 7 p. m. Counting of ballots will start early Saturday and every effort will be made by the staff in each box to keep up so that results of the box can be reported early Saturday.

Ballinger people are experiencing water rationing, not because of a shortage of water in the lake, but because facilities will not store enough water to keep pressure in the lines. Last week before the rationing was announced, some of the sections of town on the highest points were without water in the late afternoons and early evenings. City officials have ordered that houses with even numbers may water three afternoons each week and those with odd numbers may water on three other afternoons. All may use water in the mornings and on Sunday. By cutting out

The Llano city commission has passed an ordinance raising residential water rates and cutting all household usage down to household purposes only. The new ordinance does not include commercial users. According to the ordinance, residents may still have a minimum of 2,000 gallons for \$1.50, with a charge of 75 cents for each of the next 2,000 gallons. The commission ordered all seepage which collects in front of the dam to be pumped back into the reservoir, in view of the water emergency.

A contract has been let at Pecos for the building of a new wing to their elementary school building, for repairs and modernization of another elementary school. The total bid for irrigation at one-half of the houses each afternoon, it is hoped that enough water can be placed in the storage tanks to keep a fair pressure in all sections of town. Large commercial users are also stopping irrigation at noon each day in order to help during the peak period of consumption.

The sale of government bonds dropped in Runnels County for the month of June. Total sales for the month amounted to only \$8,484 in E bonds and no H bond sales were reported. The county has done well in overall sales for the first six months of the year. Total sales for the period amounted to \$257,088 which is 51 per cent of the total quota of \$500,000. E. C. Grindstaff is county bond sales chairman and he urges people with idle money to give government bonds consideration as an investment. Complete information and the purchase of bonds can be made at any bank.

the construction plus the electrical work and plumbing was \$128,759. It will be financed from a \$400,000 bond issue which was recently authorized by the voters of Pecos. The remainder of the issue will be used to build a new auditorium with a seating capacity of 1,200 for the Pecos High School.

The Brady Mills, Inc. has increased the capital stock from \$50,000 to \$100,000 and officers of the corporation have been elected for another year. The business of the firm is shelling and processing peanuts and operating a feed mixing plant. Currently the plant is processing 1,500,000 pounds of peanuts which were purchased in Oklahoma. H. V. Stokes has been named president of the company and is moving with his family to Brady from Uvalde. He was formerly mayor of Sonora, and interested in the feed and seed business there.

The annual water show was held at Ozona Friday night with a large crowd attending. A beauty contest for teenagers and toddlers was a part of the show and one which gave the judges plenty of trouble. A precision swim team was on hand to provide water entertainment. Miss Wool, Jan Turbeville of Lockhart and Miss Mohair, Nancy Bryan Hunt of Sonora modeled for the audience showing a part of their famous wardrobes. The Ozona Lions Club sponsored the annual event.

The early construction of Diablo Dam at Del Rio will be stressed in a meeting to be held in Mexico City. A group of men from Del Rio and other points in West Texas are meeting with Mexican President Ruiz Cortines to discuss the matter. They will present a report stressing loss of life, property, agriculture products and land depreciation caused by the June 1954 floods on Devil's River. Other points stressed are the cities along the Rio Grande which depend on the river for drinking water and that no underground water is available. The dam is expected to be constructed four miles below the confluence of Devil's River and Rio Grande. Comanche went under water

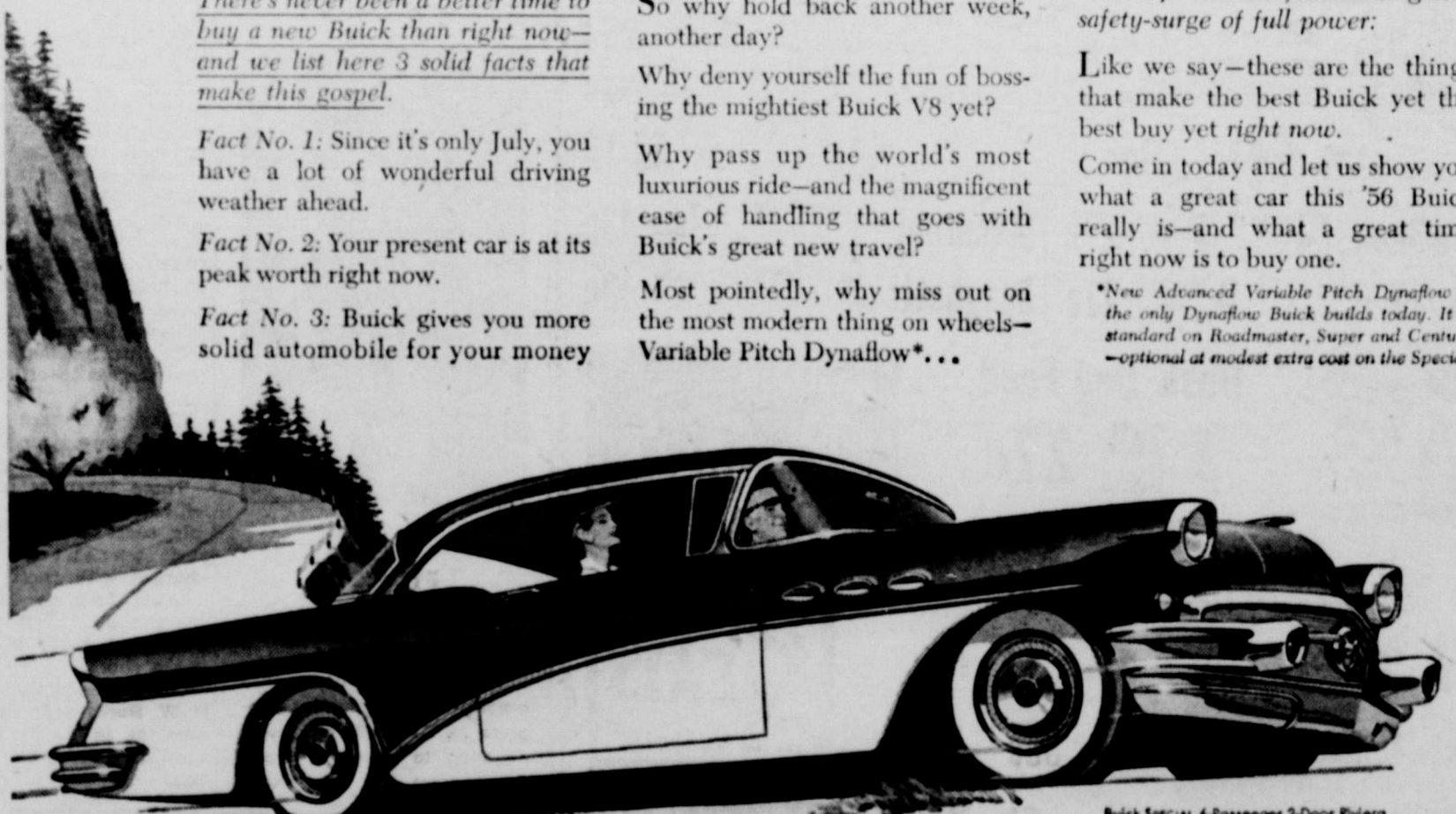

### Electronic Brain Handling Records Social Security

The work of keeping current social security records on the Nation's 126-million social security account number holders is being shifted to an electric brain, announced E. M. Bowers, Jr., district manager of the San Angelo social security office. The use of the "brain" in the central offices of the Bureau of Old-Age and Survivors Insurance in Baltimore, Mr. Bowers pointed out, will speed up this gigantic record keeping operations, and will save untold amounts of storage space.

The newly-developed brain, which uses magnetic tape, capable of compressing records of great length into a matter of inches, or fractions of inches, was installed recently in Baltimore headquarters, Mr. Bowers, said. But the conversion of the mountain of punch card earnings records to tape was begun late last August, and has been proceeding at the rate of about 3 million cards each week. Beginning July 1, the brain began posting all the 1955 earnings reported to the Bureau of Old-Age and Survivors Insurance to individual social security accounts.

The versatile electronic computer will find the correct social security account numbers for people whose earnings have been reported under a number which does not match with the name of the individual to whom records show that number has been assigned. About 9 million incorrectly reported account numbers are received each year, and the cost of finding the correct numbers, either through a clerical check of records on hand, or through correspondence, is about 2½ million dollars a year. Bureau technicians have devised a way of using the brain to locate the correct number in about 90 per cent of the cases, and look forward to possible savings of as much as a million dollars a year.

Plans are now being developed to use the new "Thinking" machine to figure social security benefits, and to make statistical analyses.

## Building Surface Tanks Boon to Livestock Men

Adequate water is always a necessity to the stockman, and properly distributed livestock water is a boon because it tends to increase even grazing of pastures and helps prevent overgrazing near the water hole.

Small farm ponds are the answer to many livestock water problems where proper soil and location can be found. Ponds may vary in type and size according to need or site.

The best type pond for this

part of the country is one with a small surface area and plenty of depth. It is depth of water rather than quantity that remains through a long dry summer. For example a pond 10 ft. deep with one acre of surface area will have more water longer than one 6 ft. deep with 5 ac. of surface area. Evaporation takes more water than livestock from most any pond, and particularly so from the large shallow one.

Drainage of the area contributing water to the pond is important to the life of the pond as well as the spillway. Extra large drainage areas in excess of 300 acres are likely to cause problems in silting and spillway control, and thus reducing the effective life of the pond. Most dams constructed on large creeks in past years have given their owners no end of trouble in spillway erosion. Spillways can be designed and constructed to safely discharge water from ponds on large drainage areas, but the expense is greater than the average farmer or stockman would care to pay, and they are not practical if any other site is available.

In January of 1956, a small pond was constructed on Robert L. Tyree's farm about five miles north west of Ballinger. This pond is on a 40 acre drainage area, and contains 1370 cubic yards of earth in the dam and stores 1 1/2 acre feet of water. It is 11 feet deep with about 0.8 acre of surface area. The yardage is a little lower than the average pond, however this is considered to be one of the best inexpensive farm ponds in the Runnels Soil Conservation District.

The Soil Conservation Service has engineered the construction of 2255 farm ponds in the Runnels Soil Conservation District since August of 1951, according to John Rhea, local technician.
