#### Runnels County Proposed Lake

Editorial Abilene Reporter-News April 8, 1957

Several years ago when the idea of a lake to serve towns as far apart as Snyder and Odessa was proposed there were those ready with wisecracks about "pipe dream." It was a far-fetched idea, but dire need for such a supply of water kept the idea alive. Town leaders of Snyder, Big Spring and Odessa refused to give up. As they climbed over one obstacle after another they had the guidance and support of a man who also refused to believe the lake couldn't be built, J. B. Thomas, president of Texas Electric Service.

The lake was built-and named for Thomas-and now has proved itself a sound economic proposition.

Another big idea for a water development is being put forth by the folk of Runnels County. They think they have a site on the Colorado River west of Ballinger which, if they could get someone interested, would provide a whopper of a lake-one as big as Possum Kingdom or Buchanan. They can't be sure of the facts and figures because, as yet, they have to depend on incomplete engineering. But, they would like to explore the possibilities. Two rivers serve this part of the state-the Brazos and the Colorado.

Possum Kingdom is the only upstream dam on the Brazos, since quality of the gypsum uplands leaves much to be desired. Municipalities along the upper reaches of the river, such as Abilene, have had to content themselves with dams on "sweet" tributaries.

The Colorado is highly developed "midstream" with the chain of lakes just above Austin. But there in no dam on the main stream between there and Lake Thomas, southwest of Snyder.

It's pretty much of an open secret that there will be another development somewhere in between these two. And, it's accepted that there is room for only one more. Where it will be is the big question. Various water districts are looking at various sites.

The Runnels County water district, an "authority" newly organized, is seeking now a loan from the state to finance some study of its proposed site. This move is in line with that taken by scores of other water districtsexcept that in most cases they have asked for grants rather than loans.

There should be customers aplenty for this lake or any other big one which will be constructed. Municipalities from the size of Abilene on down are always in need of still more water during this era of Prowth. Ballinger, the nearest town, will have a crist soon if good rains don't fall on the watershed of its city lake. Farmers who couldn't get very interested ', years ago have seen the effect of irrigation on the High Plains during the drought and might now think more seriously about contracting for water from such a reservoir.

The best site for a new lake on the Colorado can't be determined until there's more study. But, all possibilities should be explored. The location of it would affect a lot of people. The good of the whole area should be constered. It seems that this would be the ideal time for all the various water districts to join forces and come up with something to help them all.







TODAY, THE FEDERAL Civil Defense Administration recommends that every family keep a minimum of a seven-day supply of food in the home for instant use in an emergency. This has become known as Grandma's

To estimate how much food is needed for seven days, multiply the number of per-sons in the family by the amounts shown in the adjoin-ing list for one person. A two or three weeks supply would be more desirable. Foods listed are merely types rec-ommended, not necessarily those which must be stocked
