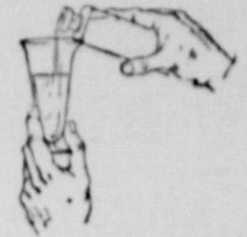

**A. C. McNelly**  
A. C. McNelly, 37, died at 2 a. m. Saturday at the Ballinger Clinic-Hospital a short time after he was injured in an oil rig accident. He was a driller with the Caraway Drilling Co. of San Angelo who have started a well on the Scales farm about one mile northwest of Ballinger city limits.

McNelly suffered a broken neck, fatal head injuries and others when he was caught in a rope and crushed against the cathead while he and other members of the crew were finishing making a drillstem connection.

Robert Kresta, Leonard Willingham and John Eider Jr., also of Ballinger, stated that the accident happened so fast that none of the men were sure how it occurred. "We looked up and saw McNelly tangled in a rope against the cathead. The motor was cut off and the machinery was put into reverse to release the victim," said one of the eye witnesses.

One man went to summon an ambulance and he was rushed to the hospital but died a short time after arrival.

Decedent was born November 30, 1919 and came to Runnels County in 1950. He was married to Mary O'Dell Stark on June 3, 1946 at Breckenridge.

Funeral services were held at 3 p. m. Monday at the Grace Baptist Church with Rev. Hershel Smith officiating. Burial was in Evergreen Cemetery with Newby-Davis Funeral Home in charge.

Beside his wife he is survived by three sons, Roy, Henry and Ronald, all of the home; his father, Oscar McNelly, and his stepmother, Mrs. Oscar McNelly, both of Ballinger; his mother, Mrs. Maggie Hines of George West, Texas; two grandmothers, Mrs. J. D. Fite of Moran and Mrs. S. E. McNelly of Houston; two brothers, Henry of Huntington Beach, California, and Loy of Spearman; one step-brother, Freddy Ray Derrick of Barstow, California; and two step-sisters, Mrs. David Arnold of Hobbs, New Mexico, and Mrs. Wesley Owens of Cameron.

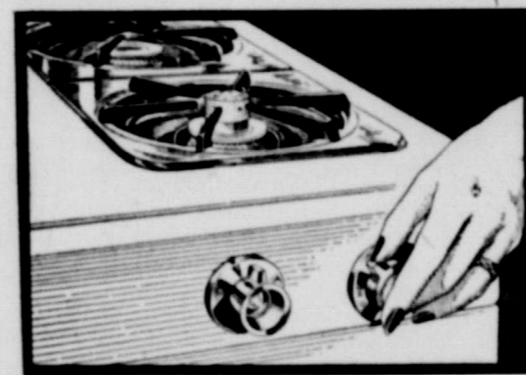

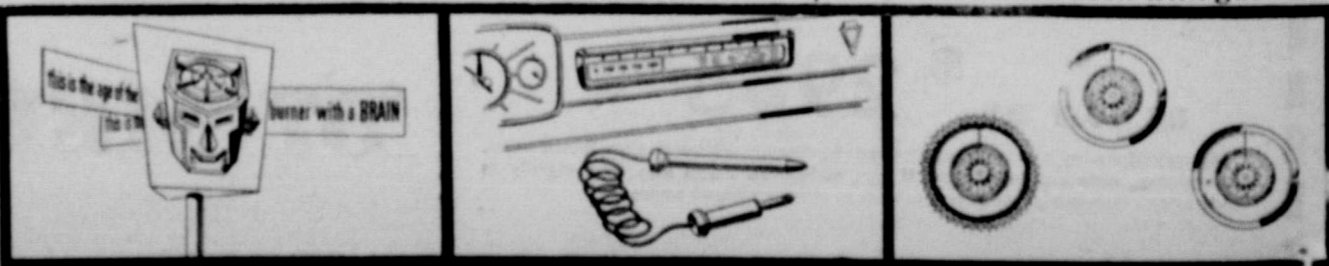

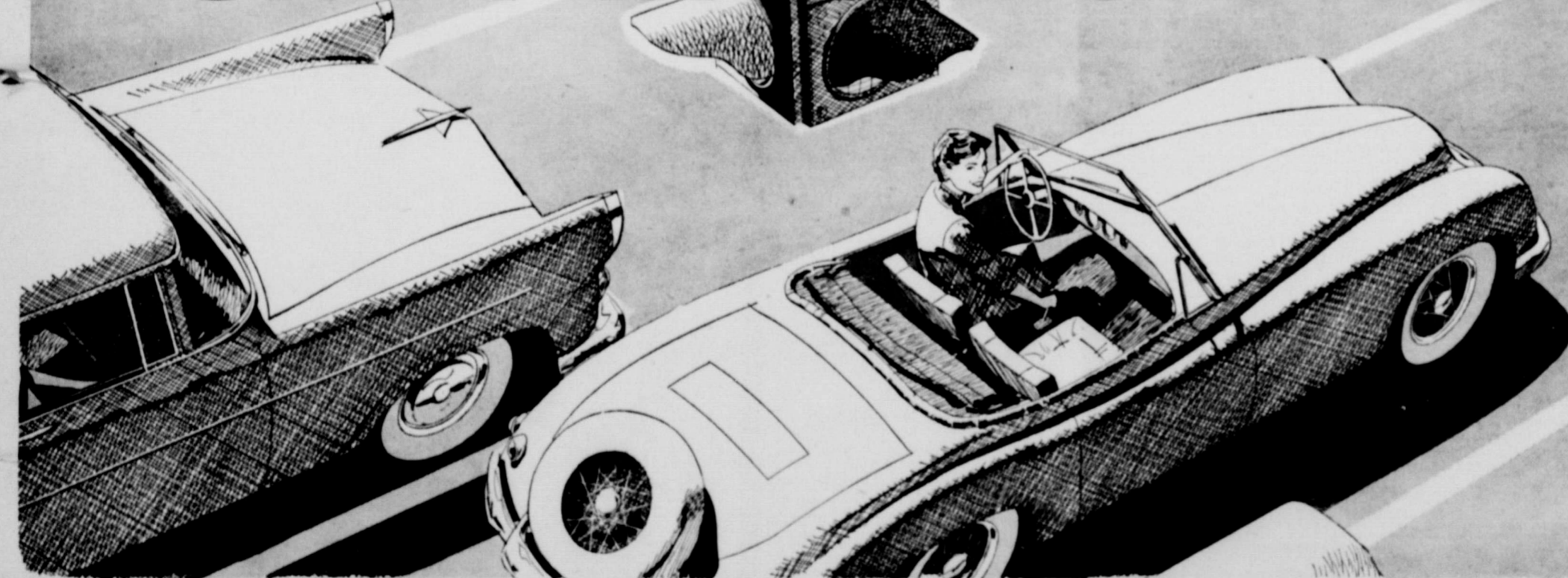
