## Marion Hays Is Named County Farmer of Year

Marion Hays received the honor of the farmer of the year in a special program at the Ballinger Lions Club Friday night. The award was made by Andrew Hoffman of the soil conservation service after Mr. Hays was selected for the accomplishments of the past year. Since 1951 such an award has been made by the Runnels County Soil Conservation District each year. The following men have been selected for those awards: 1951, H. J. Zappe, 1952 Frank Gully, 1953 Frank Greger, 1954 E. F. Albro, 1955 Lawrence Jacob.

In making the presentation, Mr. Hoffman reviewed some of the projects which have been stressed by Runnels County farmers and ranchmen by the district. Mr. Hoffman stated that we hear a lot about water and soil conservation and added we was afraid we know very little about plant conservation. He added that the three are inseparable and that without one it is almost impossible to conserve the other.

In the review of what Mr. Hays has accomplished on his place in soil, water and plant conservation, he pointed out that Mr. Hays was a past president of the Runnels County Farm Bureau and that his leadership in that organization has shown outstanding progress. He is now vice-president and a director of the county organization.

1,587 acre stock farm 4 1/2 miles southeast of Ballinger on the Colorado River. He was one of the first operators in this area to start planting old cultivated fields to sub-soiling grasses. In this he has had successes and failures. The failures were mainly brought about by the seven years of dry weather. He uses the grasses and small grains to supplement grazing of his pastures.

All of his crop land, 623 acres, are terraced and farmed on the contour. He practices stubble mulching, leaving the residue of the previous crop on or near the surface of the soil. He has carried out brush control on 150 acres of his pasture. He rotates the grazing of his pasture land to give the grasses a chance to regain their vigor.

He helped the Runnels County Soil Conservation district by working on a committee, set up by the farm bureau, to gather flood damage information on Elm Creek. This information will be incorporated in an application that is being prepared on the Elm Creek watershed. This application will be submitted for assistance under the watershed protection and flood control act.

At this point the speaker presented the plaque to Mr. Hays as the outstanding co-operator for the year of 1956. Mr. Hays expressed his appreciation for the honor bestowed on him for his completed practices of the past year.

## Dual Production Second Rowena Well Is Finaled

The Rowena multipay field gained its second lower Capps lime producer and a location northeast extension to that pay with dual completion of the Humble Oil & Refining Co. No. 1-L. Lange & Dierschke, three miles east of Rowena. It was finaied for a daily flowing potential of 157 barrels of 46.5 gravity oil. The project was finaied in 1956 from the upper Capps for a daily flowing potential of 598.12 barrels of 46.5 gravity oil.

Humble Oil & Refining Co. and G. W. Strake No. 1-D R. Russell, Jennings lime discovery, 4.6 miles northwest of Hatchel, has been completed for a daily pumping potential of 33.12 barrels of 35.12 gravity oil. Production was through perforations between 4,311-15 feet.

Completion is underway at a dual prospect of the Ambassador Oil Corp. No. 1-A. B. Davis, two miles west of Hatchel. Capps lime production was indicated with recovery of 30 feet of oil and gas-cut mud on a test between 3,793-3,815 feet. On a test between 3,830-48 feet the recovery was 1800 feet of oil and 600 feet of heavily oil and gas-cut mud. Gardner lime production was indicated with recovery of oil and gas-cut mud on a drillstem test between 4,211-22 feet. A test of the Palo Pinto also showed oil and gas-cut mud between 3,561-65 feet.

W. U. Paul of Houston has filed application to drill No. 2-Harry Lynn as a 2 1/4 mile west and slightly north outpost to a recently discovered Gardner discovery, two miles north of Ballinger. It will be drilled with rotary to 4,300 feet and work is scheduled when application is approved.

The Hollekirk (Capps lime) field and the Nevins (upper Fry) field are a new designation for the county by the Texas Railroad Commission, Oil and Gas Division.

Bridwell Oil Co. of Abilene will drill their No. 1-T. B. Poe, a wildcat, located one mile west of Winters, West Field and 1 1/4 miles northeast of the Norton, North Multipay field. The well will be drilled to 5,000 feet with rotary equipment.

M. E. Body, R. R. Bloomer and Skinner Corp., Abilene, will drill a 4,450 foot rotary five miles south of Winters to be their No. 1-D J. Goetz.

## Rainfall for Year 6.24 At U.S. Weather Station

According to rainfall tabulations at the U. S. Weather Station here, rainfall for the year up to Tuesday morning amounted to 6.24 inches. The rainfall at the close of April last year amounted to 2.88 inches. May last year brought 2.92 inches of rain which would still be behind the totals for the first three months of 1957.

Some new equipment is being installed at the local station with the rainfall being measured by weight. A machine also shows the wind conditions and each machine registers for a 24 hour period so that any change is recorded as to the time it happens.

The local station is located at the Witt home on the Ballinger-Bronte highway. In many instances the small glass rain gauges in the downtown area will show more rain than is recorded at the station with the more modern equipment. So far this year rainfall has been recorded as follows:

Runnels County has been extremely fortunate in that no damaging rainfall has occurred during the storm period, no damage has been reported by hail and no windstorms have hit the county. The area has been alerted for storms several times but nothing has developed.

So far the rainfall in the county has run from around 3 inches to more than 6 inches in spots. Small grain, pastures and other crops that have been planted have been benefited and many farmers will start planting as soon as they can get in their fields.

Many people put in much time trying to make their lots beautiful and growing shrubs and flowers have been planted and cultivated in many sections of the cemetery. Officers of the association will appreciate any information which might lead to stopping the abuse.

## City Commission Talk Violations Of Water-Sewer

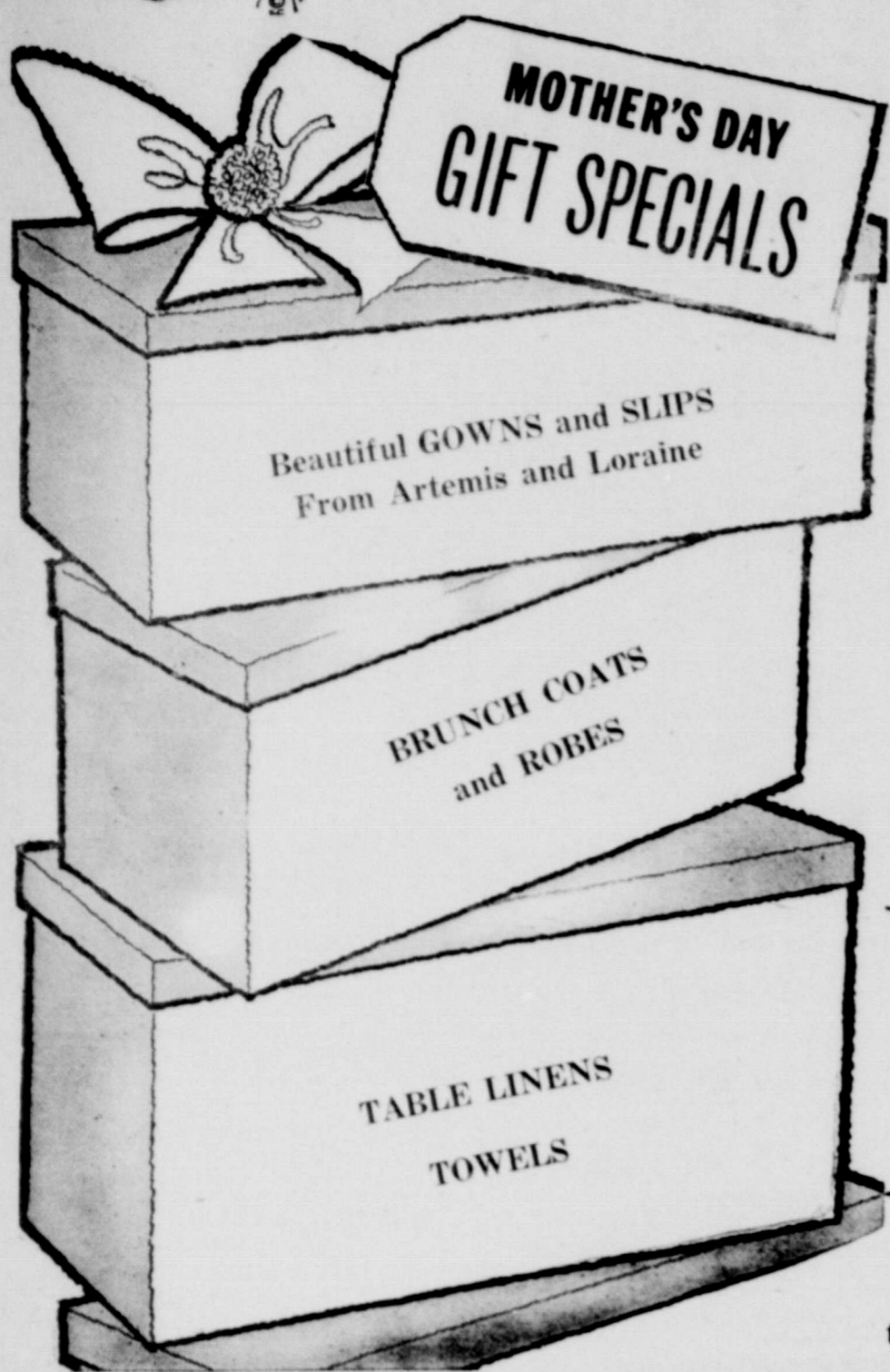

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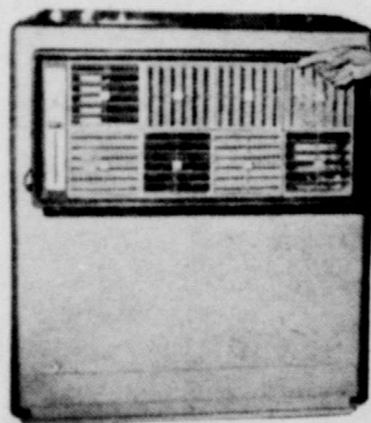

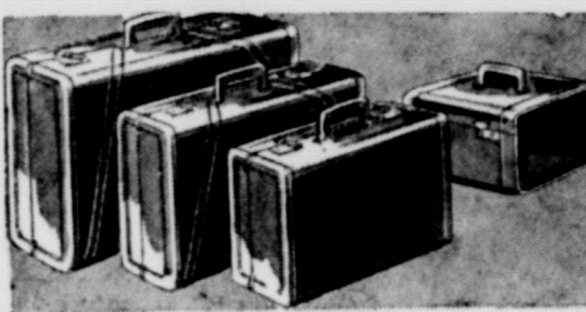

## Mrs. Alfred Multer Winner District Homemaker Award

Mrs. Alfred Multer of Offen has been notified that she is first place winner in the State Conservation Homemaker of the Year contest. This contest is sponsored by the Fort Worth Press and Mrs. Multer has been declared winner in District No. 2 which is made up of 47 West Texas counties.

She and Miss Ollie Chenoweth will go to Uvalde on May 23 when the award will be presented. She will receive a silver tray.

The Multers have been married 10 years and have four children, Jerry Don 7, Ellen Jo 5, Brenda Kay 4 and Norma Jean 2.

They purchased their 250 acre farm on which they now live in March 1955. The nearness to school, the neighborhood and the type of land influenced them to make the big step. Because of the drought, the couple has cut livestock to only 6 head of cattle, 55 hens, 19 turkeys and 2 hogs.

Butane gas is used in the home for cooking and heating. They have running water in the kitchen, bath and half bath located on the back porch. They have electricity in their home

as well as in the barns and sheds. Mrs. Multer's story makes interesting reading and shows what can be done where there is teamwork and full cooperation from all members of the family.

She writes: "Now to begin my conservation story! First, let me introduce you to our home, which consists of living room, dining room, kitchen, three bedrooms, and a bath. There is also an upstairs room, all sealed out, with linoleum on the floor, which is the children's playroom. In other words, a doll house for our three girls so that they might practice to be good homemakers in the years to come. I teach them many of the things which I learned in 4-H work, as I was a 4-H member from the time I was old enough to join until I was married and joined the Home Demonstration club. Many of the things I learned in 4-H work have proved very helpful to me in home-making work.

"Each member of our family has his responsibility in the care and storing of his clothes. This is possible because the

three girls have their room and Jerry Don has his own, too. Alfred has rebuilt all clothes racks and shelves low enough that the children can reach all of their things without assistance. The racks are built so they may be raised as the children grow older. Our shoe and hat racks are made from patterns given us by home demonstration agents several years ago.

"Most of our clothing is made from materials that are washable, so as to cut down on cleaning expenses. Doing my washing, ironing and mending is a weekly affair, so that clothes are always ready when needed. I find the re-making of used clothing an exciting hobby, as well as a very profitable one, for a family of growing children. I have made all the clothes the children wear except those that have been given to them as gifts, or hand-me-downs. Only during the last three years has Jerry Don been wearing store-bought jeans and suits.

"Before sewing a garment, whether from new or used material, I wash the material in lukewarm water to make positive there will be no shrinkage later. In this way, I am able to clean all their clothes, including winter coats, without having to spend money on cleaning bills, or worry about ruining clothes by washing them. I have adequate space upstairs

in a closet and trunk for the storage of seasonal clothing. It is always cleaned before packing away to keep moths and the like from harming any of the material.

"We raise, butcher and freeze all our meat supply, which consists of pork, beef and chicken. I have been able to keep a fair supply of home canned vegetables on my basement shelves and in our food locker, thanks to my dad, who owns a truck farm in Gillespie County. Then, too, I try to have my own fresh vegetables in a garden at home. We plan to have a larger garden this year because it will be possible to irrigate with a new well. Also we have more help. How the children do enjoy helping to plant, water, and pick the vegetables, and what a thrill it is to plant a seed and later watch the little plant grow.

"In our home we have a little device which serves as a time saver and also affords us a lot of family pleasure—a family bulletin board.

"Our family is examined annually, and suggestions made by our family doctor are carried out.

"As for recreation, I believe our children are fortunate in having a dad who enjoys building and planning with and for them. He has built them a gym set, a hobby horse, merry-go-round, and a sand box, which he made from a worn out tractor tire. Other recreational activities we enjoy include reading and telling stories, listening to records, and learning to do little dances that go with some of the songs. Television provides lots of entertainment, if the proper programs are on for the children. They also enjoy my playing the piano and teaching them a few notes. As they grow older, I hope to teach them all enough music that they will be able to play at church meetings, school and for their own amusement.

"Alfred is active in community life as trustee of the school, and also as church trustee. We are both members of the P.-T. A. and assist in its work. I belong to the home demonstration club in our community, and serve as secretary. I also belong to two church organizations, being secretary in one of these. During the past few years, I have held almost every office in these groups. I was fortunate enough last year to be chosen a delegate to the District Recreation School, conducted by the state recreation leader for the Extension Service of College Station. Hence, I feel more capable of doing the work I enjoy most in these organizations—serving on the recreation committee.

"It has been our practice since we began home-making to keep a complete and accurate account of all our purchases, expenses and income.

"The safety of the home plays a large part in the happiness of its members. The Press Battles for its Freedom

JOHN PETER ZENGER was arrested for printing and publishing several seditious libels dispersed throughout his journals or newspapers.

Zenger was a New York printer in the days when Governor Cosby ruled the colony. Governor Cosby ruled in such an autocratic, overbearing manner that several indignant citizens started a newspaper to arouse the public against his tyranny. Zenger undertook to publish the newspaper.

Zenger was thrown into prison, and his bail was fixed at 500 pounds, a large sum for those days and quite beyond his ability to furnish. He stayed in jail for months, and his situation appeared hopeless.

The case finally was called to the attention of Andrew Hamilton, a distinguished Pennsylvania

lawyer, who took up Zenger's case as a public service. Hamilton forced the case to trial, and his speech to the jury, which led to Zenger's acquittal, is a ringing statement of what the press in America must still vigilantly fight for.

All men have the right, Hamilton maintained, "publicly to retrace the abuses of power... and to assert with courage the sense they have of the blessing of liberty... and their resolution at all hazards to preserve it."

Today in our country encroachments by governments and private interests alike upon freedom of the press are counter to law. Nevertheless, even today the press must battle constantly to keep that freedom intact.

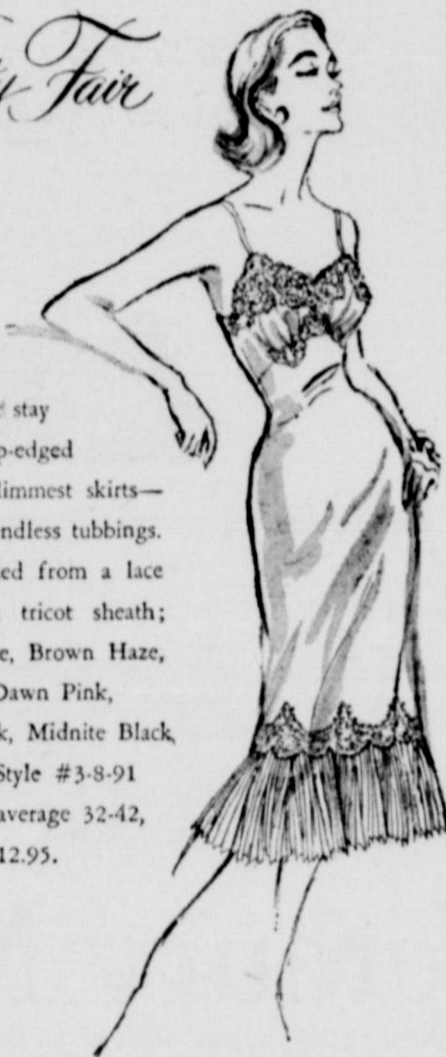

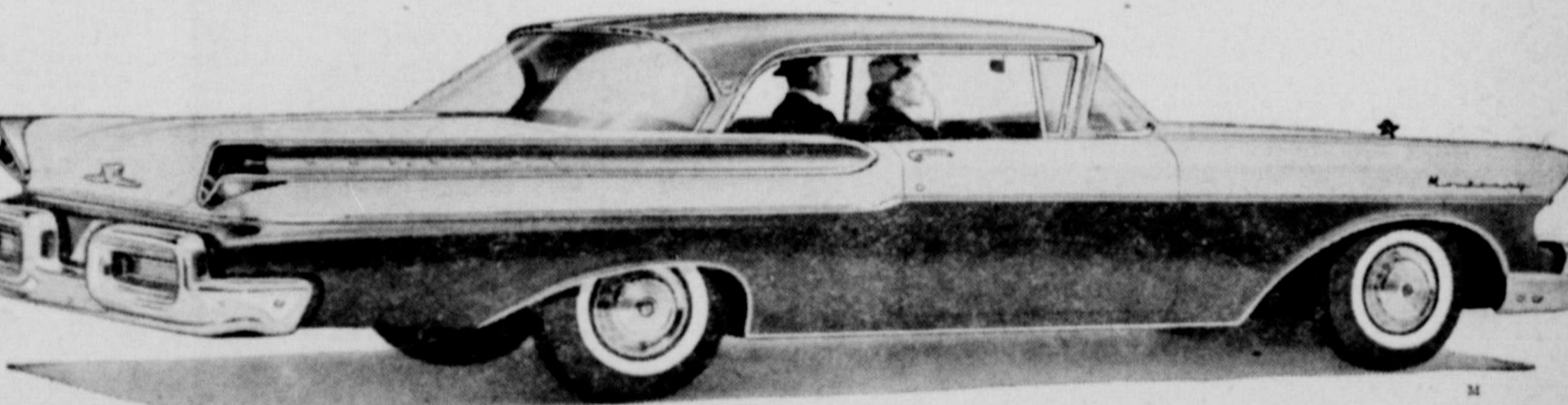

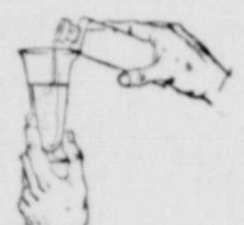
