

LEDGER 73 YEARS OLD

The newspaper now published as the Ballinger Ledger began operations at Runnels in 1884 and came to Ballinger in 1886. It has been published under several different managements and names but has file copies dating back to the Vol. 1 No. 1 in 1884. Since 1900 the files are at the office in Ballinger and all those in the 1800's are in the 11brary at the University of

Texas in Austin.

BALLINGER 1886-1957

Ballinger is recognized as a good town. We, of today, take that for granted and few. if any, give thought to what made it a good place to live.

Those who founded Ballinger back in June, 1886, planned well from the beginning. So colorful was the advertising on County, Payments on the wheat waerflow project on the east the new town in West Texas, that on the day of the town lot sale, the first train brought a crowd of some 5,000 here to buy lots and start business careers.

On that first day leaders met and organized a strong bank. So strong was this bank that it has weathered every storm and today is the one local business as old as the town

Other businesses sprang up almost over night to supply the needs for the people who had come to Ballinger to make their home. Building material was piled on the streets, builders were on the job and a community started which has ditions. grown into the Ballinger of 1957.

Schools were planned and buildings started so that the boys and girls might receive an education.

Families met in worship services even before churches were provided and soon houses were constructed and dedicated to God. Today Ballinger has 24 operating churches within its

Schools taught reading, writing and figures but the extra curriculum was very light. There were no athletic teams. When boys played baseball they had to furnish their own equipment and no games were played because there were no other teams to play, and had there been, transportation would have been a problem too big to handle

There were no youth programs such as Little League, park playgrounds, swimming pool and numerous other items today. The ole swimming pool, known to a few here as "Old Slicky," was about the only diversion from work.

Entertainment for all ages was small in the pioneer days. It was before movies or other types of shows, Radio and television had not been dreamed of and about the only social life was the getting together of friends, a good thing that should still exist. The old Opera House, where the Masonic Hall is now, was the first real entertainment spot in Ballinger. When the road dramatic companies came to town, the population was at the train to see them arrive and the house was always a sell out. Day Spooner, the Payton Sisters, Uncle Josh in the "Saw Mill Play." and the numerous one-night stands were always popular with Ballinger folks.

The horse and buggy was too slow for out of town trips and a train trip was quite an event in anyone's life. Trading at home was not the problem that it is today for local merchants. Other markets were too far away and a visit there for a pattern or a bolt of piece goods would have required a three day trip and considerable expense.

Saturday nights were always big events in the pioneer county seat. The cowboys came to town, some wearing guns, and in that day of open salcons, the fireworks usually got underway shortly before midnight. Being a peace officer was an unwanted job by most men, however, there were always men on the job in Ballinger and Runnels County, ready to take care of law violators. Selecting a sheriff meant picking

a good shot and a brave man. The school master did not have a student council or an honor system but depended on a large bundle of properly seasoned switches which they knew how to use.


