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July 4 passed without a traffic accident in this immediate area which cost a life. Patrolmen reported that drivers were acting sane and very few were called down for any violation. There were also no other accidents other than a few children with powder burns from fire crackers, a few fish fins and the usual mosquito bites and chiggers. In all it was a good July 4 locally and all Ballinger people were able to be back on the job Friday with no ill effects from the holiday.

We Americans were generous when we contributed millions of dollars to fight paralytic polio. We were triumphant when, after years of research, our scientists developed a vaccine against it and the number of cases dropped 47 per cent last year. Now we are shocked to hear that, according to a recent estimate, 56 million Americans under 40 years of age who should get this simple, effective protection have neglected to do so. What is the word for this neglect? Polio authorities, like the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, call it apathy. The dictionary defines apathy as "lack of interest or indifference." Can anybody be indifferent about polio? When it strikes it leaves ruin in its wake—crippled bodies, disrupted homes, wage-earners unable to go on with their chosen work.

Indifference in the face of this kind of risk is folly. Better roll up your sleeve and vaccinate before it is too late.

Visitors coming into Ballinger from any direction feel that there is a great amount of highway building going on here. There are detours in almost every direction or roads torn up and under construction. In fact there is a big program underway right now within a few miles of Ballinger. Highway 83 north of Ballinger is receiving a large amount of work and further north in Taylor county the entire road is being rebuilt. East of Ballinger on Highway 87 a huge sum is being spent to make that road meet standard requirements. A new bridge on the Colorado River at Ballinger is about ready to start and a four-lane highway west of Ballinger on 87 is getting started. In all, more than a million dollars is being spent within a few miles of Ballinger in three directions.

Some one said that there were few celebrations on July 4 where orators spoke and declared our independence and praised those who gained it for us. There were plenty of celebrations but most of them were strictly entertainment without the speeches. The same person said there were plenty of orators but that listeners are few and the political speaker has lost his appeal in these modern times. This does not mean that the people are less patriotic, but today better facilities make it possible to enjoy the observance of such occasions by staying at home where it is cool and comfortable, or waiting inside an air-cooled theatre for the program. It used to be that thousands spent summer holidays on streams fishing and picnicking.

WEST TEXAS NOTES

Colorado City held its second annual July 4 celebration with activities planned on a county-wide basis for many people. The affair opened with a mass religious service on Sunday night with all churches cooperating in the program. On July 4 there were fishing contests countywide and numerous swimming and diving contests for the juniors at the municipal pool. The program closed at night, July 4, with a street dance for all ages.

Ernst Tetens received a decoration from his government last week at a special program held at Brady which was some 40 years past due. During World War I he was recommended for the Purple Heart and the Silver Star for gallantry in action. The request was filled back in 1919 but the papers were never processed until recently. Brigadier General Earl Rudder made the presentation to Tetens at a meeting of the Brady Rotary Club last week. The honored veteran served in France with the 90th Infantry division during World War I and received his medals for action on the night of September 26, 1918. In bringing his commanding officer back to safety he was wounded in the arm for which the Purple Heart was issued.

Brownwood closed a week-long celebration last Saturday with the county observing its 191st birthday. "Brown County Memories" was the theme observance and that idea was carried out in the parade and other features. One of the highlights was the honoring of pioneers of the county when some 300 gathered for a dinner and program. R. Wright Armstrong, speaking for the pioneers said: "If there are any unpleasant events for me in Brown County, they have been washed away and forgotten." Armstrong's mother was the oldest woman attending the celebration.

A public hearing on a proposed \$75,000 bond issue in precinct No. 3 of Concho County has been called for July 15. County Commissioner T. T. McGuffin stated to reporters that the money was to be used in special work in the precinct and would be spent for improving water crossings on creeks and their tributaries in the area. He estimated that 25 to 40 jobs were needed in the area now and that some 60 jobs have been scheduled for work in the future. The proposed work will also tie-in with proposed flood control projects in the area.

Miss Laura Sharp, home demonstration agent in Concho County, held an all day meeting of club leaders at the American Hall in Eden last week. At the session she gave demonstrations in the making of playground equipment for parks and backyards. She also gave suggestions

Curtis E. Norman of Brady bought the Bevens Hotel in Menard last week at a public sale. The amount paid was just the amount of the debt owed by the hotel, \$24,403. The sale was held at the courthouse in Menard at the request of R. T. Trail, for the benefit of Norman, on a deed of trust and note given originally by Mrs. Maude Bevens Green. Norman stated that he wanted to work with the people of Menard in making something out of the hotel which would help the community. He suggested maybe a hospital or a convalescent home or a combination of both.

Members of the Winters F. F. A. chapter voted last week to stage a rabies vaccination program in the north end of Runnels County. The boys voted to sponsor the program when 50 members met for a business session. They plan to call at every home in the north part of the county and urge people to have their animals vaccinated. They will remind those who took part in the program last year that animals must have the shots once each year to make them safe.

A Catholic Church for Stephenville will be started early in September when work will begin on a \$25,000 building on a lot just south of the campus at Tarleton State College. E. A. Blanchard is in charge of the work for the Stephenville people and was in Dallas last week conferring with members of the building committee of the Dal-

las Diocese, which covers the Stephenville area. Local members will contribute \$5,000 towards the air-conditioned building and the rest will be provided. Members of the church have been holding services in the city library.

Those sponsoring the softball league at Miles have announced that unless more interest is shown by players and fans the league will be closed. Fans have been very few and at most games not enough players have reported for any team to have a starting lineup and players have been borrowed from other teams in order to have a contest. Members of the Miles Lions Club sponsor the league and operate the park and concessions. They announced last week that unless more interest was shown, especially by the players, the league would be closed for this year.

Admissions at the municipal swimming pool at Bronte passed the 5,000 mark last week. The high day of the season was last week when 184 swimmers paid their way into the pool. The new pool and park at Bronte was authorized by a countywide bond election. It was completed for a formal opening at the end of the school year and since that time has enjoyed a good patronage from the people of that area. Another pool and park was established at Robert Lee under the same bond election in Cooke County.

The summer recreation program at Coleman launched a fund drive for \$800 last weekend. The money will be used to pay for swimming tickets and play ground equipment used in the Junior Olympics which are to start there soon. The city and school pay salaries to eight instructors but the additional money is necessary if the full program is carried on by the leaders. Those in charge explained last week that the money was not included in the community chest, a plan used at Coleman for raising money for worthwhile organizations.

The city council at Comanche has just completed a much needed community project at a cost of \$1,100 in which they provided sewage facilities to a section of Comanche that for



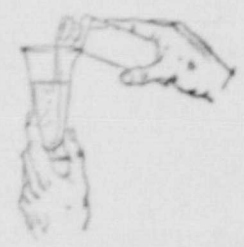

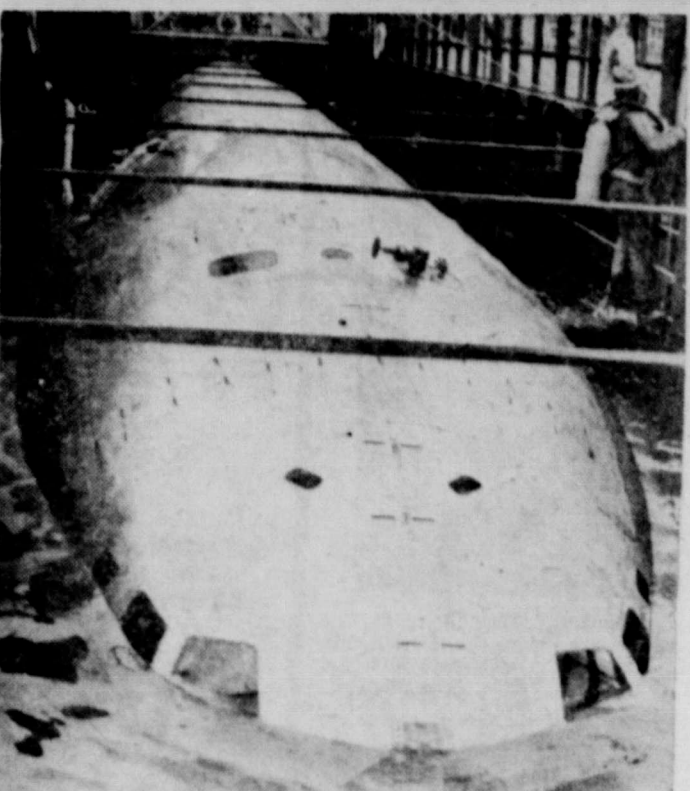

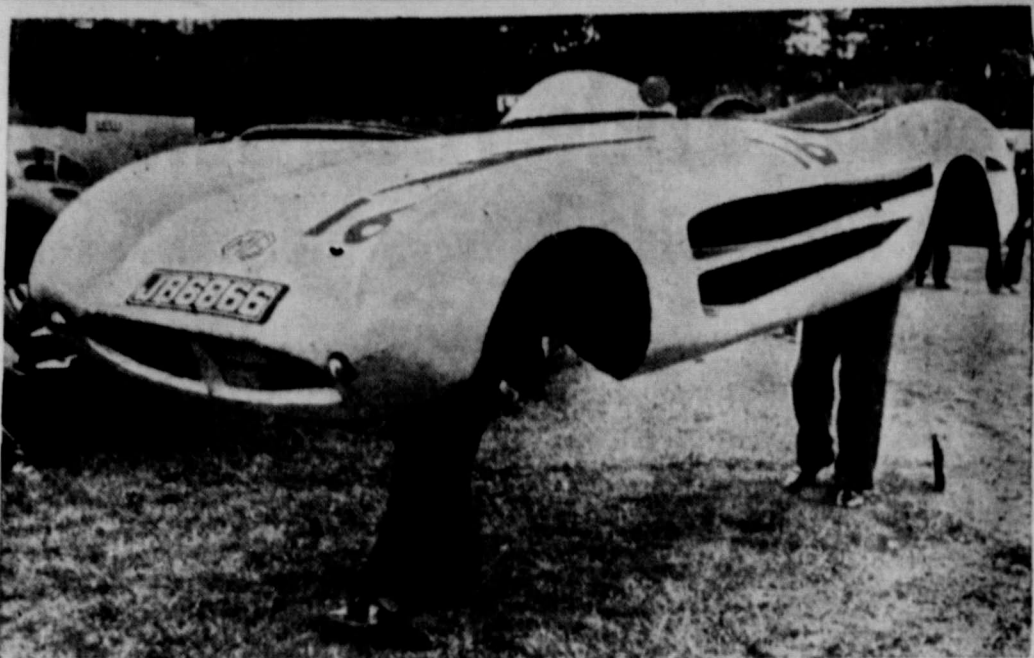

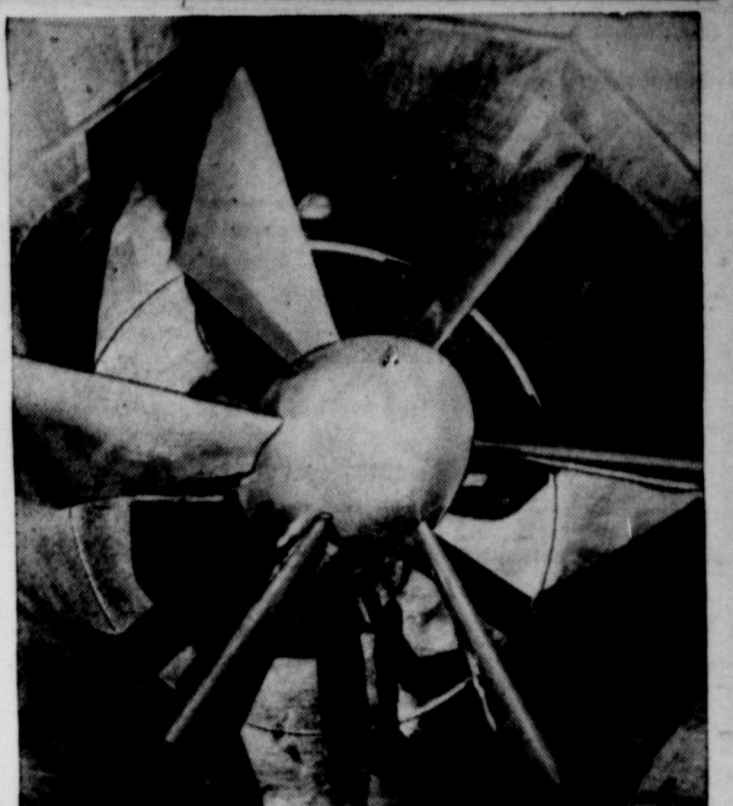
