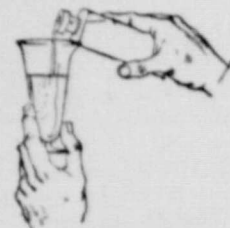

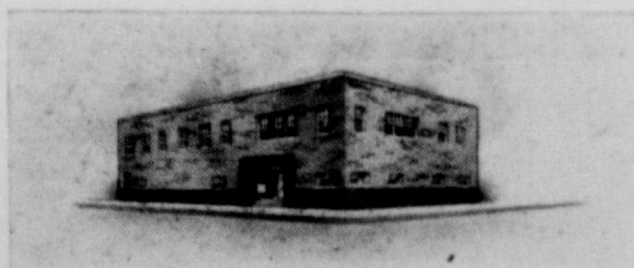

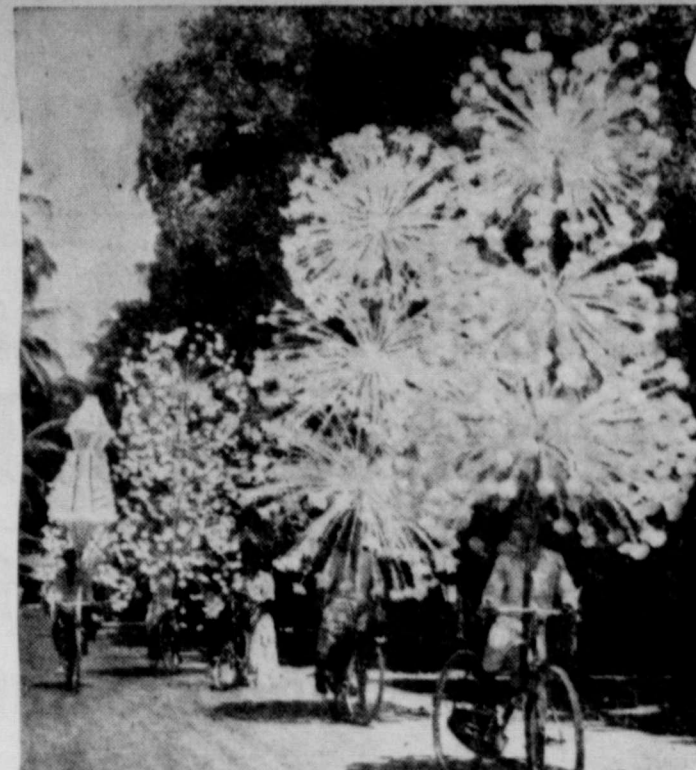
The Winters Manufacturing Company started a new building last week as a part of their expansion program. The company makes evaporative coolers and is rated as one of the three largest plants in the country.

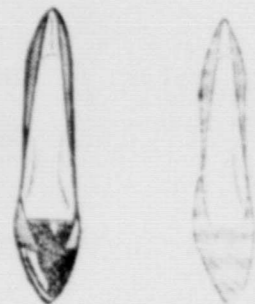
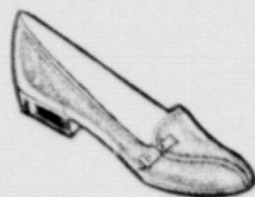
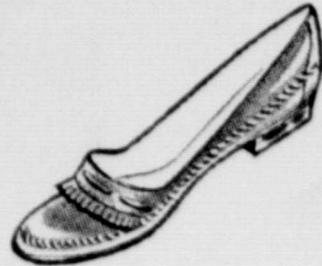
making his home in Brownwood since 1951.

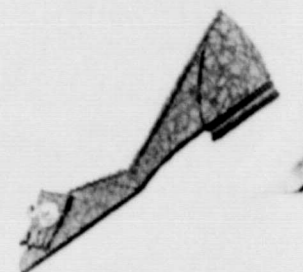

**SOCIAL SECURITY MAN HERE SEPTEMBER 4**  
Floyd B. Ellington, manager of the Social Security District office in San Angelo, stated that Neil Tarvin, field representative will be in Ballinger in the County Office Building, Wednesday, September 4, at 9:30 a. m. to assist anyone wishing to file application for social security benefits.

Ellington said that one of the most frequently asked questions is, "What proofs do I have to have to get social security." As to proof of age, he explained, "Bring an old and reliable document." The old family Bible or an old life insurance policy—in fact any

document that is both old and reliable will be of help. Women applying as widows, who have never filed as wives, should also bring proof of their marriage. If the marriage certificate has been misplaced, you may obtain a certified copy of the marriage record from the county courthouse of the record. In some instances, widows are also required to submit proof of age—so bring some proof when you come to file an application.

### County Schools Ready To Start On September 3

Supt. W. E. Elkins stated Monday that all schools in the county have completed their facilities and are ready to open on September 3. Transportation will be rolling on that date and all drivers of busses have been hired for the year.

A fairly heavy enrollment is expected in most of the schools on opening day with others to start later in the school year. Lunch rooms will start operations with the first day of school and continue to serve noon meals during the entire school year.

Supt. Elkins stated that he had been advised of food shipments for this county to arrive about September 15. As soon as they are delivered here they will be prorated to the schools of the county on the basis of how many are being fed at each lunch room. The early shipment will include the following:

- 15 bags of milled rice, 100 pounds to the bag
- 29 ballers of corn meal, 50 pounds to the baller
- 61 ballers of flour, 50 pounds to the baller
- 71 cases of butter, 32 pounds to the case

The awards were made by the Texas Safety Association with one for public safety education by the community wide effort which has had an effect on traffic safety. Ballinger has received a similar award each year since 1949, the first four being by the National Automobile Association, 6 from the National Safety Association and for the past two years from the Texas Safety Association. This makes 12 awards received locally.

### Double Holiday To Aid Hunters Opening Season

Dove season for Runnels County will get underway at 12 noon Sunday and with conditions remaining good, many shots will be fired Sunday and Monday. With a double holiday all hunters will be free to go two afternoons on the first two days of the 1957 season.

If weather remains as it has been, shooting will be the best for several years in this area. There is a heavy crop of doves this year and with ample feed to keep them around, shooting will be good.

In this immediate area, water hole shooting will be fine in the late afternoons. Most small streams have dried up and doves are watering at surface tanks. There is a heavy crop of sunflowers in most sections which are ripe at this time and doves are plentiful in the patches but will be hard to find after they are shot down. Many tanks have heavy weeds and grass about them which will make dead birds hard to find.

Extra game wardens are expected in the area for several days after the opening of the season. Hunters are warned to obey the laws in regard to where they hunt, the daily bag limit, not shooting before noon and after sundown and not to fire a shot while on a public road. Persons hunting outside their county must have a license.

### New Fishing Law Effective Next Sunday, Sept. 1

New fishing laws will become effective in Texas on September 1 which will require most people to obtain a fishing license, even when they are fishing in their own county. The new license will cost \$2.15 per year.

There are a few exceptions to the law:

1. If you are under 17 or over 65 years of age.
2. If you fish on property which you own or reside.
3. If you fish with a trotline, throwline or ordinary pole and line and have no reel or other winding device attached and you are fishing in the county where you reside.
4. If you have a commercial fisherman's license.

Heretofore it has been legal to use artificial bait if the person was fishing in their home county. After Sunday those who use reels and other equipment for artificial bait must have a license unless they are excluded by age.
