## Salt Water Pollution Lions Program Friday

Elmer Simpson, supervisor of the Texas Railroad Commission, Oil and Gas Division at San Angelo, was guest speaker at the Ballinger Lions Club Friday noon. He was brought here to speak to the club in regard to the salt water pollution in Runnels County and discussed that subject, most of which showed a bad picture but with a few bright spots.

In answering questions, Simpson said that Runnels County was by far the most serious county in his district from salt water damage. He described the area and talked of streams that are being ruined by salt water and the many wells in the county that have become affected.

The bright spot in the picture was a statement that on the Valley Creek watershed, some 80,000 gallons of salt water per month, which has been going into open pits, is now being placed back in the ground through wells at the depth from whence it came. This and other actions may protect the Ballinger city lake for some time in the future.

Another bright light in the report was that corrections were being made on the watershed of Mustang Creek which was expected to eliminate salt water pollution there. Simpson cited this as a stream which might eventually become Ballinger's source of water.

The visiting speaker gave no encouragement in regard to the old oil wells that are producing salt water. In most instances the operators are gone, broke or have died and there is no one to call upon but the landowner for proper plugging. Simpson said the department was doing everything possible but most of their accomplishments were by threat and that they had no legal way of forcing such measures.

The speaker discussed the surface casing requirements in this county and said that the required 50 feet was not sufficient. He urged property owners to see that surface casing was set deep enough to protect fresh water sands in the area and to also see that surface pipe was properly cemented and that the proper amount of time be given for the cement to set before drilling was started. Two engineers of the commission accompanied Mr. Simpson here and both in short statements urged that property owners notify the office at San Angelo when a violation occurs on their places.

All three speakers said that public opinion was stronger than any law and urged all people to become informed and aware of the serious situation in Runnels County.

Runnels County groups are making a careful study of salt water pollution and have pinpointed many locations of wells, springs and streams that are now involved.

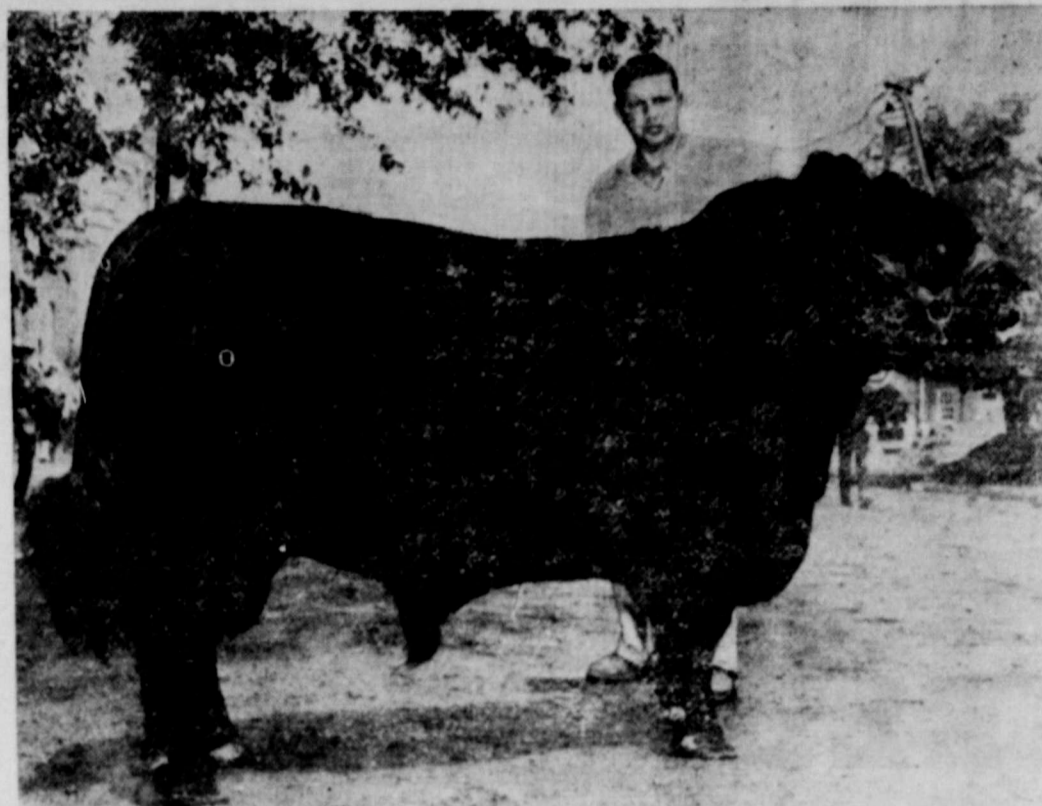

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## C-C Directors Meeting Monday To Hear Reports

The directors of the Ballinger Chamber of Commerce were in session Monday night for their regular September meeting. A number of routine committee reports were given at the start of the meeting of events in the past.

The directors authorized Tom Caudle, manager, to attend the West Texas Chamber of Commerce school for managers in Big Spring this week-end on Friday and Saturday.

A report was given that the chamber had paid Geo. Pruser Jr. \$25 as premium for the first 1957 bale of cotton ginned locally. The bale was picked near Hatchel and was ginned at the Ballinger Co-op Gin on August 19 and weighed 400 pounds.

The directors also authorized the payment of dues in the United States Chamber of Commerce and a check for \$40 was forwarded to that organization.

Reports on highway work in the area were made by members of that committee.

The agriculture committee reported that forms were ready for those who will enter stock in the annual livestock show in January. These are for those who purchase stock for show purposes.

Both the Gas Building and the Women's Building are fully air conditioned.

Theme of the Gas Building exhibit will be "Appliances of the Stars," following the current Hollywood trend of using gas kitchens and appliances almost exclusively in the new movies. A movie marquee over the main entrance announcing the "Kitchen Show" and signs and photomurals throughout the building will carry out this theme. ## County Receives Needed Moisture

General rains fell over a wide section of West Texas Wednesday night with Runnels County getting varying amounts from about one-half inch to as much as two inches.

The rain came with some high wind and scattering hail but no damage from either was reported here early this morning.

Ballinger gauges showed 1.50 to 1.80 inches with the heaviest rain around 8 p. m. An electrical storm was reported from many places in the rain area.

Rain in the north part of the county was lighter with early reports from Winters and Wingate showing around one-half inch. Rowena, Miles, Paint Rock, Talpa, Bethel and other places east, west and south of Ballinger reported good rains.

The moisture will be a great help to ranges and will benefit some crops that were badly in need of rain. Many small streams were up to flood stage and surface tanks caught full in some sections of the county.

Areas in McCulloch and Concho Counties reported the heaviest downpours for this section of West Texas with some places receiving from 3 to 4 inches.

There was a good run of cattle and sheep in the weekly sale at the Runnels County Auction Barn Monday afternoon. A good crowd of people was on hand with bidding fast and strong.

Fat calves brought 21 cents, stocker cows \$10.75 to \$11.75 and stocker lambs 18 1/2 cents.

Sales are held each Monday afternoon and ranchmen with surplus stock are invited to use the sale at any time.

## County Sets Tax Rate Approves 1958 Budget

The Runnels County Commissioners' Court was in session Monday to close their work as a board of equalization, approve a budget for next year and set the county tax rate.

With all work of the board of equalization completed, the values for tax purposes in Runnels County was shown at \$29,300,000 which is some five million less than the county's peak in 1953 when values were over \$34 million.

The tax rate was set at 78 cents on the \$100, an increase of 6 cents over last year when the rate was 72 cents. In road district No. 3 an additional 20 cents will be added to take care of the \$300,000 bond issue authorized last year to provide money for the purchase of right-of-way in the district.

Only \$200,000 of the bonds have been issued and sold and for those who live in the district the tax rate will be 98 cents to the county.

The taxes on a 78 cent rate are expected to bring in about one-half the funds necessary to take care of the approved budget of \$483,206.60. The rest of the money will come from fees, auto registrations and other sources.

The court also signed a contract with the state whereby the state will participate in the purchase of new right-of-way by paying 50 per cent of their appraised value of the land. This also includes expenses of fencing, moving property from acquired land but should the county pay more than the appraised value of the land, the county must take care of the difference.

Announcement was made that Mrs. Joe Forester will be an employee in the office of the county judge starting on September 16.

## Legionnaires Continue Bids on Local Property

The American Legion met in a business session Tuesday afternoon at the office of the chamber of commerce. Bids on their Bruce Field property were opened and studied and the group recessed without taking any action and will meet again on September 24. In the meantime the sales committee has been instructed to accept other bids. The Legionnaires reserve the right to reject any and all bids filed with the post on their property.

Persons who wish to file bids or those who wish to change bids already filed, may do so any time before September 24. Members discussed the possibility of moving equipment from Bruce Field to a downtown location and opening quarters for club facilities and meetings. A committee of John Bradley, Tom Caudle and Jack Moore will look into this matter further and make a report at the next meeting. A large number favored the creation of a downtown club and several locations are being inspected with this in view.

The meeting closed with the election of new officers to handle the affairs of the legion for the next twelve months. Bob McGarvey was named post commander for the next twelve months and Dick Holstead was named adjutant to work with him. Other officers are: D. B. Crockett, first vice-commander; Hugo Braden, second vice-commander; Troy Simpson, finance officer; Price Middleton, child welfare; Jack Moore, chaplain; D. G. Posey, service officer and C. L. Armstrong, sergeant-at-arms.

Entries will be judged and winners submitted to the National Tuberculosis Association during the succeeding thirty days. National winners will receive a Certificate of Honor from the NTA.
