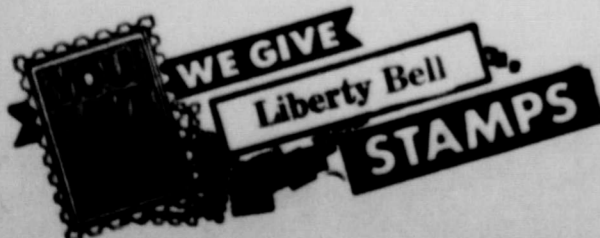

**DISABLED PERSONS
MAY HAVE BENEFITS**

December 31, 1957, is an important deadline date for a number of disabled persons who have not yet inquired about their disability rights, according to Floyd B. Ellington, Manager of the San Angelo Social Security office.

Former regularly employed workers, who are at least 50 years old, who have been disabled for at least 6 months, and have not been able to work because of their disabling condition may lose disability insurance if they do not file an application by December 31, 1957. The loss of payments could very easily run into hundreds of dollars depending upon the length of time the person has been disabled, his former social security income, and how long he delays filing his application.

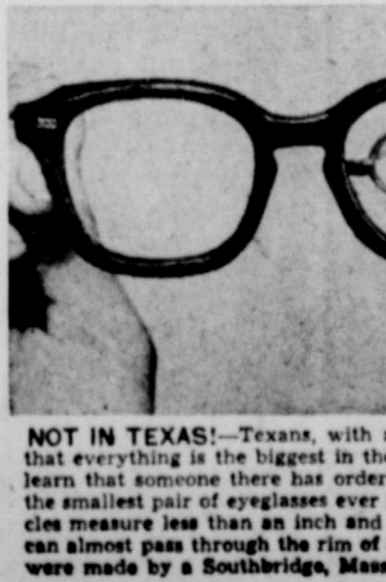
TURKEY SHOOT RESET AT TALPA DECEMBER 1
