County Bank Deposits \$16,326,362 March 4

Bank deposits in five Runnels County banks on March 4 amounted to \$16,326,362. This was only a decrease of \$56,595 since December 31 and during that same period loans were decreased in the five banks by \$155,425. Total loans on March 4 amounted to \$2,993,619 as compared with \$3,148,160 on December 31.

The decrease in deposits was expected, due to the heavy payments of taxes, with many dollars going out of town for settlement of income tax accounts.

Conway Given Plaque For '57 Farm Practices

I. W. Conway has been named the outstanding soil conservation farmer for Runnels County. He was selected by the district board of supervisors in February and Friday of last week was presented a plaque by the Ballinger Lions Club.

Woodrow Hoffman, soil conservation technician, made the presentation. He stated that Conway was selected from a list of more than 800 farmers and ranchmen who have working agreements with the district. The supervisors made their decision, not only for the conservation work that he has carried out on his farm but for the assistance he has given the district with its program.

Mr. Conway familiarized himself with the Small Watershed Protective and Flood Prevention Act by attending a tour of the Brady Creek watershed last year. He, along with other members of the Runnels County Farm Bureau, gathered flood damage information on the various creeks of the county. This information was incorporated into an application for assistance under the Small Watershed Protective and Flood Control Act, which the Lions Club, Farm Bureau and others sponsored in the county.

Mr. Conway operated a 250 acre stock-farm near Hatchel. He signed a working agreement with the district on July 23, 1951, only 7 days after it began giving assistance to the landowners. Since that time he has carried out the following conservation practices:

1. Reseeded four acres of pasture land.
2. Constructed 5.1 miles of terraces.
3. Built 2,539 feet of field diversions.
4. Built one stock pond and one waterway.
5. He farms all his cropland, 177 acres, on contour.
6. Uses cover crops for soil protection and improvement.

In addition, he is an active leader in the Farm Bureau, is a past president and is now serving on the board of directors.

After receiving the plaque, Mr. Conway expressed his appreciation to the Ballinger Lions for the honor and to all others who have assisted in making his accomplishments possible.

George Ruppert of Rowena, deputy district governor of this Lions District, was present for his annual visit, and spoke briefly, reviewing the record of the Ballinger Club since last July. He complimented the club on their attendance, their completed projects and numerous other activities planned for the future. He urged a large attendance of representatives at the annual conference in McAllen about the middle of May.

Boys To Register Now For Baseball Here This Summer

Boys who want to play baseball in either the Little or Pony League this summer should go to the chamber of commerce office and register at once. G. A. Morrish, president of the two leagues, has announced that registration will run until April 15, at which time players will be assigned to teams. Those who register after that date will be placed in a pool and used when they are needed.

Mr. Morrish remains as president for another summer and Jack Fry has been named treasurer and Mrs. Virginia Parish is secretary.

Blanks have been prepared which each boy must take home and get his parents to sign, giving him permission to play in the leagues this summer. No boy will be used who has not returned the blanks properly signed by his parents.

Some boys who are already on teams for this summer have the opinion that they are not required to register. This is not true and every boy placed on a team must register and get the proper papers signed.

Mr. Morrish stated that a directors meeting will be held soon to set the starting date and make up the schedule. This cannot be done however until it is known how many boys will play and how many teams will be in each league.

Arrangements have been made for the operation of the concession stand at games during the entire summer. Work on the park will be started soon and completed before the opening of the season.

Parents are urged to remind their sons to register as soon as possible so that officials of the league can proceed with their plans to start the season. First 1958 games will likely be played the latter part of May.

Parallel Parking Set With Bridge Opening

Mayor J. W. Moore and Tom Caudie, manager of the Ballinger Chamber of Commerce, were in San Angelo Friday for a meeting with J. A. Snell, division highway engineer. The meeting was in regard to the action of a recent mass meeting of merchants asking that parallel parking be delayed on Hutchings Avenue.

Mr. Snell stated that he had been advised of the meeting but that nothing could be done in regard to the matter. He reminded the mayor and manager that a definite agreement was reached in regard to parking when Hutchings Avenue was designated as the highway route through Ballinger. This was agreed upon and entered into a contract along with other provisions for the highway designation on Hutchings Avenue. He explained how it would be unfair and a break of faith with property owners along Strong Avenue, another route considered by the highway department for Highway 67 traffic through Ballinger.

He asked Mayor Moore to have an ordinance passed establishing parallel parking and have it ready to operate by the date of the bridge opening, expected between April 1 and 10.

Mayor Moore stated Monday that a meeting of the commission would be called to pass the ordinance and that work would be started as soon as possible to get ready for the change. He stated that parking meter heads would be removed from every other meter and that the street would be marked, designating the amount of parking space to be used by each car parallel with the curb.

While no definite date has been set for the bridge opening because of the weather, Mr. Snell stated that he believed the job could be completed by noon after April 1. The Ballinger mayor and Mr. Caudie are anxious to have the opening on April 8 as Herb Patrice, a member of the State Highway Commission, will be in Winters on that date and could be brought to Ballinger as the speaker at a short program.

Much of the remaining work on the bridge will be governed by weather and it will be impossible to set a definite date until the job is almost finished.

As soon as parallel parking is started here, there will also be no double parking on Hutchings Avenue. Parties will not be permitted to stop on the street and let someone run into a store as has been the practice. Law also prohibits any parking on the bridge and this will be watched by officers.

Monday afternoon the city commission was in session to read and pass a city ordinance setting up parallel parking in Ballinger. The area set out in the ordinance is from Broadway to the Colorado River Bridge along Hutchings Avenue.

Mayor J. W. Moore stated that it would require only a short time for the city to set up for the change in parking. The meter head will be removed from every other meter along the route and the street will be painted, designating the space to be used by each car.

The ordinance sets up a fine of not less than \$1.00 and not more than \$100.00 for violation.

The Ballinger High choral club will go to Abilene Friday to take part in the regional contest. Mrs. Wm. Postlethwaite will direct the Ballinger group in their numbers.

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Red Cross Fund Drive Launched Here Monday

The Red Cross fund campaign got underway in Ballinger this week with members of the Ballinger Rotary Club working the downtown business solicitation. Later it is planned to have a door to door campaign in the residential area with ladies making the calls.

Jay Garrett, fund chairman for the county, announced that members of the ladies auxiliary of the Veterans of Foreign Wars at Winters would handle the campaign in that city and that a quota of \$1,000 had been assigned.

Johnny Agnew has been named chairman at Miles and given a quota of \$300 to raise.

Mr. Garrett stated he had experienced trouble in a number of communities in getting chairmen or workers and that a number of places are yet to be organized. Every effort is being made to get all sections of the county solicited in March and the quota of \$5,000 raised by the first of April.

This will be the first Red Cross campaign here in two years. No drive was made in 1957 because of trouble experienced in getting workers and because of other conflicts. This year Red Cross officials are

anxious for a good response to help show appreciation for the assistance given by the Red Cross during the flood in Ballinger last October when more than \$5,000 was spent locally for emergency expense and rehabilitation of a large number of people.

Mr. Garrett has asked that persons who are not contacted please mail a contribution to the Ballinger Chamber of Commerce and make check payable to Red Cross.

Ralph Kettler will have charge of the fund campaign at Rowena and will organize his helpers there and get started within a short time.

Mrs. Buddy Gray, retiring president of the Jaycee-Elites, will organize the campaign in the residential section of Ballinger and plans to use other members of the organization and high school girls for the solicitation. Date for the drive will be set as soon as sufficient workers are secured.

Mrs. C. Y. Lewis will have charge of the entire colored sections of Ballinger and will use women from the various churches to assist in their campaign.

School Census Shows District Gain of 36

Supt. Ernest Caskey announced this week that the annual school census for the Ballinger Independent District has been completed and shows a gain of students over last year.

This year there are 1,441 white students in the district as compared with 1,405 last year, a gain of 36. There were 73 negro students enumerated this year as compared with 76 last year, a loss of 3.

Total enumerations this year are shown at 1,514 as compared with 1,481 last year. First grade students who will enter school in September will be 111, as compared with 109 last year.

Special effort was put forth this year to try and enumerate every child of school age in the district. In addition to the efforts of the enumerators, publicity has been given asking that any person missed please call the school office. By this means several have been added to the census rolls recently.

School officials expect the enrollment for the next school year to be just a little larger than the present year and that faculty requirements will be similar. It is likely that some new teachers will be added to meet new state requirements.

Religious Census Sunday Afternoon By Church Groups

A large number of church workers will be on the job Sunday afternoon to make a religious census of the entire town.

Friday night zone captains will meet at the First Baptist Church to complete all plans for the census and the town will be divided into 30 zones with a captain and a group of workers assigned each territory.

Sunday afternoon all workers will meet at 1:30 p. m. at the Ninth Street Church of Christ. Here they will receive census cards and their captains will assign the pairs to their territory. The visitations will be made by pairs and all Ballinger people are asked to remain at home until about 4 p. m. so the workers can contact every family and get the desired information.

People who cannot be at home will find a copy of the census card printed in this newspaper. They are asked to fill it out and mail to W. J. Leach, Ballinger, or pin the blank to their screen door and the enumerators will get it when they call.

After the work is completed, the cards will be returned to the committee and they will be divided and handed to the pastor of the church where the families are members or have a church preference.

Those in charge of the enumeration feel that they have enough workers to cover the entire town in about two hours. In case of weather too bad for workers to be out, census will be delayed one week.

MOORE IS APPOINTED ON STATE COMMITTEE

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Plans have been completed for the 1958 summer season for boys' baseball in Ballinger. Officers of the two leagues have been elected and a number of special committees appointed to look after the main jobs. Team managers and sponsors are available and most of the equipment is good for another season. No definite date has been set for opening the season but boys who wish to play are registering now and will be included in the teams when the schedule is made. Officers of the league pointed out that every boy who plays must register, get slips to be signed by their parents and return them before April 15. Slips are available at the office of the Ballinger Chamber of Commerce. Those already assigned to a team must register and get these slips signed. The park will have some work done on it before the first games and plans are being made for the best summer of Little and Pony League baseball since the project was launched in Ballinger.

Other summer recreation is being planned now and the city has announced May 30 as the official opening of the municipal swimming pool. Ballinger coaches, Paul Stewart and C. W. Bettis, have been secured to operate the pool this summer and plans are underway for a big

opening with members of the Ballinger Lions Club in charge. Opening day is a holiday in Ballinger and Lions hope to present a program which will provide a day of excellent entertainment and one which will bring a big crowd to the city. April 15 is also the deadline for securing the safety check up required by the state on every car. Any garage will be able to make the check up and place a new 1958 safety sticker on the windshield.

He has made a good record at Menard, winning the basketball championship of District 8 A without a conference loss. In football he was tied with Junction last fall for third place. The board had recently extended his contract for one year along with that of assistant coach Gerald Centilli. The coach has made no announcement of his future plans.

Workers at Bronte last week launched the annual fund drive for the American Red Cross with fair success reported the opening day. 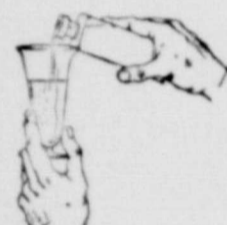

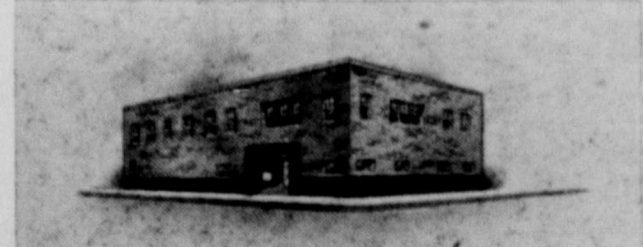

AN ORDINANCE RESTRICTING PARKING TO PARALLEL PARKING ONLY ON HUTCHINGS AVENUE

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF BALLINGER TEXAS:

Section 1: Any person operating a motor vehicle, motor scooter, motorcycle, or bicycle, farm tractor or any other farm machinery, who desires to park said vehicle on Hutchings Avenue in the City of Ballinger, from the Intersection of Broadway Street to the Colorado River Bridge, shall park said vehicle parallel to the curb within the area designated by the curb or street marker lines. The term "intersection" for the purposes of this ordinance shall include both sides of the streets and avenues mentioned.

Section 2: That all ordinances and parts of ordinance in conflict with this ordinance be and the same are hereby expressly repealed.

Section 3: Each and every provision paragraph, sentence and clause of this ordinance has been separately considered and passed by the City Commission and each said provision would have been separately passed without any other provision and if any provision hereof shall be ineffective, invalid, or unconstitutional for any cause, it shall not impair, nor affect the remaining portion nor any part thereof, but the valid portion shall be enforced just

as if it had been passed along.

Section 4: That any person who may violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not less than One Dollar (\$1.00) nor more than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00).

Section 5: This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the 7th day of April, 1958.

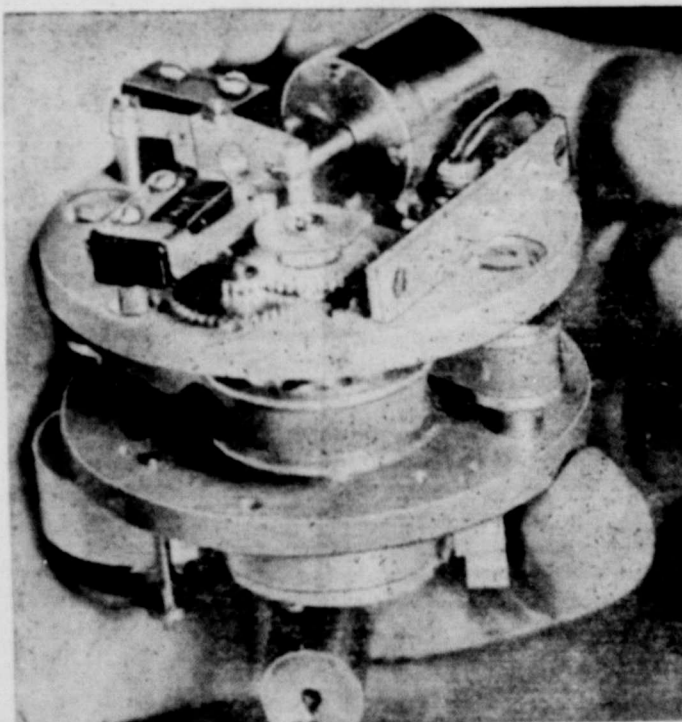

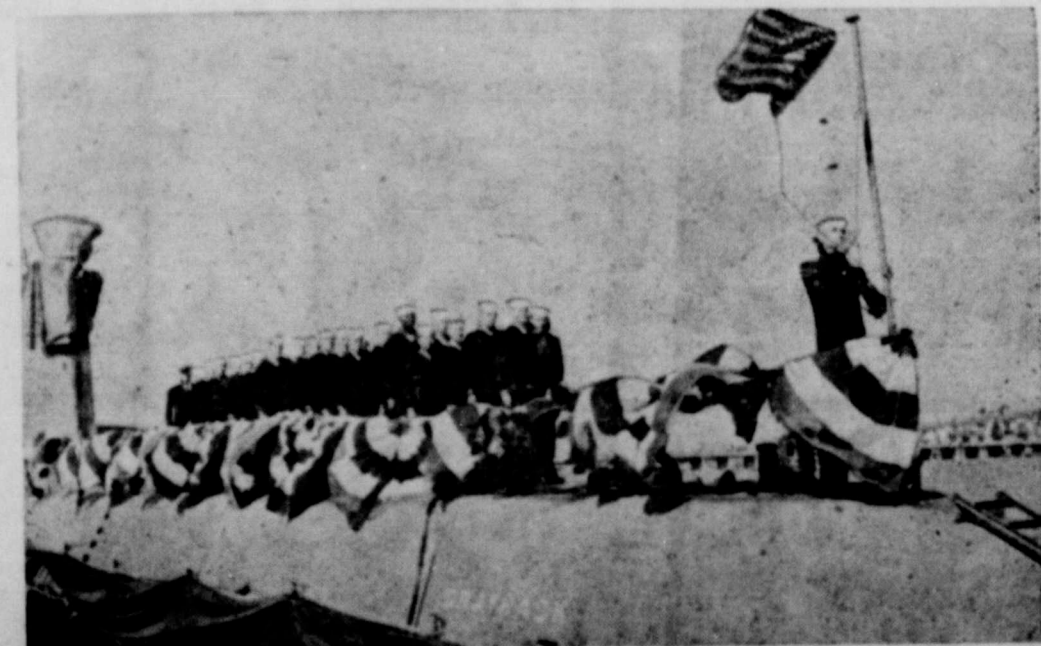
