City Cancels Contract For Lease of Airport

The city commission was in session Thursday morning for the regular weekly meeting. One of the highlights of the meeting was the voting of the entire commission to have M. H. Cook advised by registered mail that his lease of the municipal airport was canceled as of the date of July 8. The commission took this action because Mr. Cook had failed to fulfill terms of his contract with the city.

On the advice of the city attorney, the commission voted that the city would honor tax receipts regardless of errors on the books.

Mayor Moore reported that the city had authority to sell 310 acres of cultivated land at the airport and bids will be asked on this tract of land in the near future.

There have been no complaints so far in regard to parts of the city being low on water in the safe afternoon. Last year by this time, restrictions on irrigation were necessary with odd numbered houses watering three days each week and even numbered houses the other three days.

Several building permits were approved by the city Tuesday morning.

C. R. Owens received a \$200 permit for the building of an open carport on Murrell Avenue between 11th and 12th Streets.

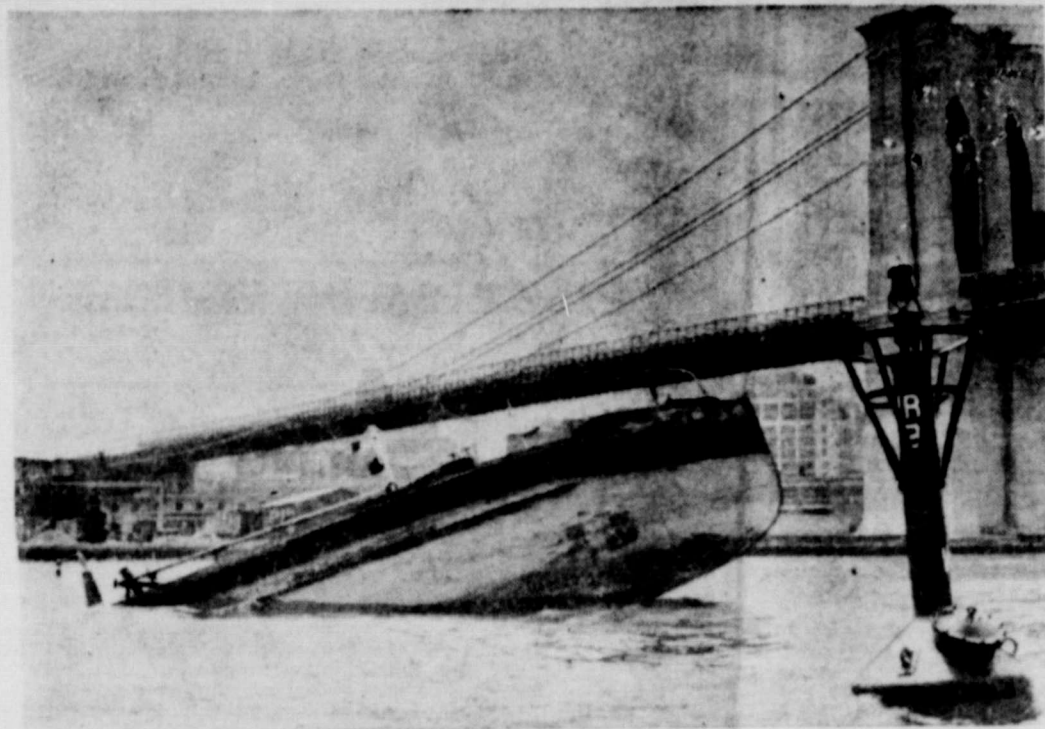
H. K. O'Neal received a \$500 permit for an addition to a building on Fifth Street between Murrell and Bousall Avenues.

County Drivers Set Record For Holiday Period

Runnels County drivers hung up a record for the long July 4 holiday as far as traffic accidents are concerned. A check-up with law enforcement officers Monday revealed that not a single wreck was investigated in the county and that other violations were fewer than usual.

There were four tickets issued for speeding and four others for no driver's license. This is less than for the usual week-end.

Officers reported that a close watch was kept and that all drivers in this area were observing the traffic rules, staying within the speed limit and otherwise being careful along the highways. Local people returning from trips reported that they saw no rank violations and while traffic was heavy, everyone was driving safely.

The record for this county and this area did not hold up nationwide as the road deaths are mounting to a near-record for one week-end. There were no arrests during the period for driving while intoxicated.

Routine work is underway in the local school plant to get all buildings cleaned and ready for use by the first Tuesday in September. Other workers are keeping the grounds and the athletic field in the best of condition for the summer.

Supt. and Mrs. Ernest Caskey are on their annual vacation and will visit Glacier National Park in Canada before returning home. They plan to return about July 25 in time to vote in the democratic primary.

State returns will be heard on radio and television all during the evening and by midnight the number of votes counted and reported should give a fairly accurate picture of the election in all state races.

Rotary Governor Will Make Visit Tuesday, July 15

The Rotary Club of Ballinger will be host on Tuesday, July 15, to Ray Erlanson of Trinity University, San Antonio, governor of the 584 district of Rotary International, who is making his annual visit to each of the 36 Rotary clubs in South Central Texas. He will address the local club and confer with President Charles Hambrick, Secretary Howard Hamner, and committee chairmen on Rotary administration and service activities.

Mr. Erlanson is chairman of the Department of Business Administration of Trinity University and is a member and past president of the Rotary Club of San Antonio. He is former president of the San Antonio Chapter of the American Red Cross and of the National Association of Music Merchants. Before going into teaching, he was the owner of the San Antonio Music Company for many years. He was elected as a district governor of Rotary International for the 1935-36 fiscal year at Rotary's 49th annual convention in Dallas last June. He is one of 258 district governors supervising the activities of more than 9,800 Rotary clubs which have a membership of 462,500 business and professional executives in 110 countries and geographical regions throughout the world.

Wherever Rotary clubs are located, President Hambrick asserted in discussing the governor's visit, their activities are similar to those of the Rotary Club of Ballinger because they are based on the same general objectives—developing better understanding and fellowship among business and professional men, promoting community-betterment undertakings, raising the standards of business and professions, and fostering the advancement of good will, understanding and peace among all the peoples of the world.

Each year, this world-wide service organization continues to grow in numbers and in strength. President Hambrick added: During the past fiscal year, 350 new Rotary clubs were organized in 51 countries and geographical regions, bringing the total number of Rotary clubs to an all-time high of nearly 10,000, and eight countries were added to Rotary's roster—British Honduras, Eritrea, French Guinea, Laos, Martinique, Papua, Virgin Islands and the West Indies Federation.

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Nationwide Dialing Due For Local Telephone Co.

The Ballinger telephone exchange goes on the nationwide operator dialing network early Sunday, July 20. A. J. Lacy, division manager for the Southwestern States Telephone Company, announced today.

As a result, Ballinger long distance operators will be able to dial direct and without the assistance of any intermediate operator, more than 38 million telephones in more than 8,000 cities and towns in the United States.

Paint Rock, Talpa and Winters telephone exchange subscribers will also go on the network at the same time since Ballinger operators handle the long distance operating functions for those towns.

Lacy said that in order for Ballinger to join the nationwide operator dialing network it will be necessary to add the prefix numeral 2 at the front of all Ballinger telephone numbers in the 7000 series. As an example, the telephone number 7310 will become 27310 after July 20. None of the other telephone numbers in town will change.

"We regret that the change in numbers of those in the 7000 number series was necessary," Lacy said, "but we had to have all four or five digit telephone numbers in Ballinger in order to make the new, improved type long distance service possible."

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C of C Directors Plan For Membership Drive

The directors of the Ballinger Chamber of Commerce met Monday for the regular July business session. Most of the meeting was taken up with routine reports and general discussions of local projects.

The chamber is without a manager at the present time. Tom Caudle terminated his contract on June 30 and no action has been taken by the board in regard to replacing him.

At the meeting Monday plans were made for a citywide membership campaign to be staged in the near future. This will be done in an effort to enlist every citizen behind the chamber of commerce and also to secure additional income before a contract is made for a new manager. Directors are anxious to secure a new head for the organization before the fall business season gets underway.

The directors also discussed the planning and staging of a citywide cleanup campaign this fall. They pointed to the need for such a project and also discussed the failure of past campaigns because of many not cooperating. The plans to be made will attempt to secure the full cooperation of every person in the city.

The group heard a report on new road contracts to be let in this county in the near future for construction of farm-to-market highways and also the building of one new bridge. A report was also given on the request for an 18-month extension for the survey of the proposed water project on the Colorado River northwest of Ballinger.

Mrs. Kermit Parish is in the local office at all times and will attend to any business coming before the chamber of commerce. On matters that need outside work, a committee will be assigned to the job by the president and, in the absence of a manager, nothing will be left undone.

Hoppers Inflicting Heavy Damage to Crops of County

Farmers of Runnels County have reported that grasshoppers are doing considerable damage to crops at this time. The hoppers are grown and are leaving the fence rows and pastures for the greener fields.

One man here this week reported hoppers eating all the leaves from his corn and stated that he counted 38 hoppers on one stalk. C. T. Parker, county farm agent, said that a large amount of damage had been reported this week to maize and cotton.

The agent warns farmers to watch their fields every day. "There may not be a one today and tomorrow the field will be full," the agent stated.

A number of farmers started spraying this week in an effort to curb the damage. Mr. Parker stated the best chemicals to use

- and the rate per acre are:
1. Dieldrin, $\frac{1}{2}$ to 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ pints per acre.
 2. Aldrin, 1 to 2 pints per acre.
 3. Heptachlor, 1 to 2 pints per acre.
 4. Toxaphene, 1 to 2 pints per acre.

Where Aldrin or Toxaphene is used on pastures, cattle and sheep should not be grazed on the grass for at least 30 days. If Heptachlor is used stock should be kept off for seven days.

Mr. Parker stated that now that the hoppers are grown and well scattered the job of killing them will be much harder than several weeks ago when the first warning was given. At that time the hoppers were very small and in concentrated areas and could have been wiped out with a hand spray. He advocated that during the heat of the day will be the best time for a good kill.

Few jumbo hoppers have shown up in the county so far this year.

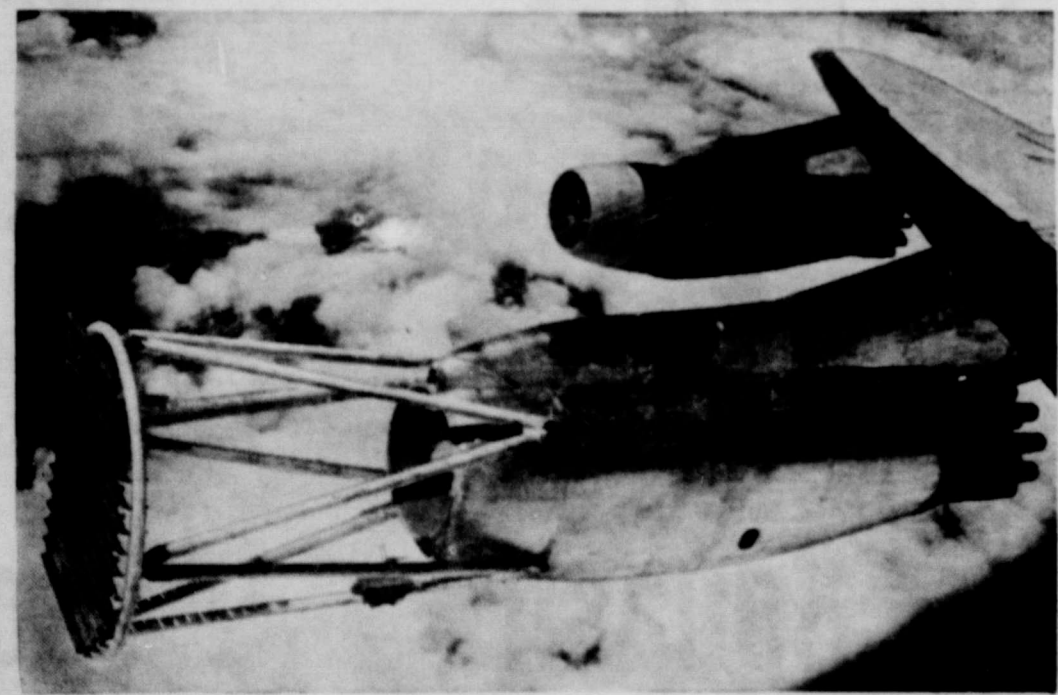

FORT CHADBOURNE STORY TOLD TO ROTARY GROUP

Mrs. Don Atkins was guest speaker at the meeting of the Rotary Club Tuesday and her subject was "History of Old Fort Chadbourne." Her talk was interesting throughout and showed the result of a lot of work, study and careful research. She started from the establishment of the post in 1852 and traced the progress of the community for the past 100 years.

Only three of the original sandstone buildings remain, the larger one of the group and the only one in a good state of preservation being used by the owners at the present time for storage of grain. Stone for nine of the buildings was quarried about four miles from the post and lumber was hauled from Bastrop. Native post oak was used in some of the smaller structures and live oak was the chief source of fuel, she said. Hundreds of Comanche Indians roamed the Southwest in the 50's and Chadbourne, named for an early day com-

mander, was established in order to protect settlers and travelers throughout the wild country. The fort, later used as a station on the old Butterfield Trail, was abandoned in 1867.

Car drivers were warned that deaths would be high on national highways during the long July 4 holidays. In spite of all the warnings, deaths and destruction exceeded the national report is sickening. Just when and how this slaughter can be stopped is hard to tell. Public Safety heads have done everything possible to make driving safe. Billions have been spent in making highways the best and as safe as possible. Many are four to eight lanes divided but wrecks still occur which take a heavy toll of life and millions in property damage. The modern highway is marked to give a driver every warning necessary and if they would watch the signs and obey them, there would be very few wrecks. One thing for sure—holidays are a good time to stay home and live to enjoy days after the holidays are past.

Bank deposits were up in Runnels County on the last call for statements on June 23. This was largely due to the small grain crop and the sale of wool. While some oats have been sold and the farmers have received their money, many of the payments are to be made later and practically all the wheat payments are just getting started. This, plus some late wool sales, should add more money to the deposits of many people. There is a fine maize crop in prospect but it is beginning to suffer for rain and will lose in yield and quality fast unless a general rain hits this county. Pastures and all growing crops are needing moisture now.

An effort to do something constructive about the huge taxpayer subsidies that have been given the postal service—and to have the users of mail come nearer to paying for what they get. This is especially true in the rate increases scheduled for third-class matter.

But the new post office bill, as approved unanimously by Congress and signed by the President, does not do anything about fourth-class mail, which is parcel post. And it is here that further reforms are needed. Parcel post is, and almost always has been, a producer of deficits. That is simply a way of saying that the people who don't use parcel post must pay a part of the cost of providing service for the people who do. And it can't be argued that parcel post contributes to public knowledge and enlightenment, as do other mail categories. Parcel post is a 100 per cent commercial service. It competes directly with taxpaying private package carriers, both national and local. It didn't even exist until 1913.

The direct deficits—all taxpayer supported—accountable to parcel post have run into hundreds of millions of dollars over the years, and are still mounting. On top of that, parcel post is responsible for indirect costs which make a material contribution to the over-all cost of operating the post office department.

There's certainly nothing unfair or unreasonable in suggesting that the people who use parcel post pay for value received.

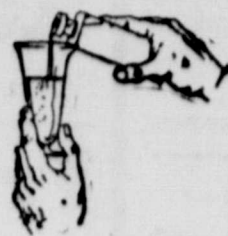
LOCAL GROUP PLANNING FOR TRIP TO NEW YORK
