## Dove Season Promises Best Hunting In Years

Dove hunters are looking forward to the opening of the season, just a little over three weeks away. This year promises to be the best hunting in recent years and if doves remain in the area as they are now, it will require a very short time for any hunter to get his daily bag limit.

Doves have not been so plentiful for many years and with plenty to eat there is no reason why they should leave the area. If no rain comes between now and September 1, water hole shooting will be perfect with the exception of the high weeds about most tanks and streams making it hard to find the dead birds.

It is nothing uncommon to see a hundred birds together at water holes or along the country roads where there is plenty of gravel.

Hunting in this area will start on September 1 at noon and continue until sundown. The daily bag limit will remain the same, 10 to a person and no more than 10 birds are to be in possession of a person at anytime. Birds should be fat and good eating as crops have provided plenty of food all during the summer months.

There will be special game wardens in this area for the opening of the season and they will be especially concerned with those who shoot from the roads. In the past, many people have been driving along country roads and shooting and this is strictly a violation of the law. Hunters are also reminded that they cannot shoot from a motor vehicle and that they must get out of a car and have both feet on the ground when they shoot. This applies inside of private ranches and farms. All farms and ranches are private property and hunters must secure permission from the owners before shooting birds.

## Methodist Pastor Will Be Assigned Here September 1

Dr. J. W. Whitefield, Methodist district superintendent from Brownwood, was here Sunday to bring the morning sermon at the First Methodist Church. The main reason for his appearance here was to inform the church that the pastor, Rev. Garland Lavender, had left the church and resigned from the ministry. He stated that the action of the pastor was for personal reasons and that no local person, group or the church had anything to do with his decision.

Dr. Whitefield stated that it would require some time before a regular pastor could be sent here and asked the congregation to give the Bishop and his cabinet the remainder of August and that a new minister would be assigned September 1. He explained that a number of moves would be involved in filling the place here and several churches must be disturbed before the matter was solved.

During August there will be special guest speakers provided for each service and all work of the church will be continued without interruption. Rev. Lavender had been with the local church since annual conference two months ago.

## Postoffice Does Rushing Business During Past Week

W. M. Patterson, assistant postmaster, stated that the last four days of last week looked like Christmas in July at the Ballinger post office.

On Thursday, July 31, 10,000 pieces of 3 cent mail were canceled through the machine and on Friday, August 1, there was a constant line of patrons to purchase one and four cent stamps. Saturday was again like Christmas buying.

New sales include an air-mail book that will cost 85 cents for twelve stamps. The only four-cent book of stamps at the local office will cost 97 cents and contains 24 stamps. Coils may be purchased in 100 or 500 in the four cent denomination. The regular four-cent Lincoln series will be the regular stamp used on letter mail. The four-cent Simon Bolivar stamp that was placed on sale last week is a commemorative stamp and will soon be sold out.

Any class of mail that is deposited in the office without sufficient postage will be forwarded to its destination and the deficient postage collected there. It will not be returned to the sender for short postage, neither will the addressee be notified that the mail is being held for postage. The purpose of the new plan is to speed up the delivery of short-postage mail.

On and after September 1, a five cent penalty on all short postage mail will be collected when it is delivered.

## Rally Day Plans Being Perfected Here August 10

Plans are being perfected for the annual Home Demonstration Club rally day which will be held at the national guard armory in Ballinger on August 19.

This year 4-H club girls will present a part of the program and these girls will meet Miss Ollie Chenoweth in Ballinger next week to plan their parts on the program and start rehearsals.

## County Democrats Meeting Saturday 9 Delegates Named

The Runnels County Democratic Convention was held here Saturday afternoon with 29 delegates attending. The convention voted to send their nine delegates to the state convention next month bound by the unit rule but otherwise uncommitted.

The 29 delegates attending voted resolutions including: Support Price Daniel for governor; condemning the usurpation of the name of "Democrats of Texas" as used by the splinter group and demanded the use of this name to cease; to stand pat on state's and works rights and a vote of thanks to Homer Hudgins, county democratic chairman.

An argument ensued when Hudgins suggested that one voting box be set up at Ballinger for the second primary. Delegates said the votes would be illegal if cast outside the county precinct. In the meantime, all precinct chairmen were being polled with postcard ballots to get their desires in holding the second primary.

The nine delegates elected to attend the state convention are: Bob McGarvey, J. B. Gladden, H. D. Jones, Fred Young, W. H. Rampp, L. C. Adair, W. G. Bedford, E. J. Grindstaff and W. H. Hudgins.

## Farm Bureau Barbecue Queen's Contest Set

The selection of a Farm Bureau queen will again be a feature part of the program at the annual Farm Bureau barbecue to be held in City Park at Ballinger on August 14.

Plans are being perfected for the annual barbecue which will be for all the members of the farm bureau and their families. This attraction usually draws a crowd of some twelve hundred people.

Letters have been mailed to daughters of farm bureau members in the county inviting them to enter the contest. The contestants will appear before the judges in formal dress, be interviewed by the master of ceremonies, and then judged on three main points, appearance, poise and personality.

The winner of the contest will represent Runnels County at the district contest later. The contest will continue to a state and national level.

To be eligible to enter, each girl must be the daughter of a farm bureau member actively engaged in agriculture, single, and between 16 and 22 years of age.

Some entries have already been received and more are expected before entry in the contest closes. All girls who are eligible are invited to enter.

A stage will be arranged at the park so that all girls can be seen at the time of the judging and interview.

The complete program for the annual barbecue is being arranged and the time of each event will be announced soon.

## No Second Primary Will Be Held In This County

Homer Hudgins, county democratic chairman for Runnels County, announced Tuesday that no second primary would be held in this county. His announcement came after a majority of the precinct chairmen had been polled with a postcard ballot in regard to whether they desired a second primary or not for 1958.

With only one race to be listed on the ballot, and that for Associate Justice of the Supreme Court, members of the county executive committee felt that there was not sufficient interest to attract many votes to the polls on August 23. They also pointed to the cost to the county candidates who have been assessed money for the expense of holding two elections. Mr. Hudgins estimated that it would take between \$1,200 and \$1,500 to cover the cost of the election.

The money collected for the expense of two elections will be prorated back to the candidates after all costs of the first primary have been paid.

Most counties in the state will hold second primaries, but in most instances, there are local races which have not been settled. Some counties have announced a second primary but with only about four voting boxes operating.

Tuesday morning 19 precinct chairmen had voted on the matter of a second primary and 14 were opposed to having one this year.

## Richey Resigns As Coach Here; Henderson Hired

Dick Richey, popular basketball coach and math teacher in the Ballinger schools, has tendered his resignation to the board. He also announced that he will move to Brownfield where he has been employed on the coaching staff and a math teacher in the school. Richey will handle basketball at Brownfield and will assist with the football program.

Joe Forester, high school principal, announced that James R. Henderson has been hired to take Richey's place here. Henderson has no experience but is a graduate of Howard Payne College at Brownwood and was a basketball star there. He has been in the navy for the past five years and has continued his athletics and was also an instructor in officers training school.

He will handle the little boys in the junior high school football program and will act as a scout for the Bearcats. In the spring he will assist with the track program and will be head basketball coach.

Coaches Paul Steward, C. W. Bettis, Alton Patterson and Henderson left Sunday for Houston to attend the annual meeting of the State Coaches Association and school.

The Alliance, in cooperation with radio station KRUN sponsors two regular programs. A five minute devotional is conducted Monday through Friday at 7:00 p. m. Fifteen minutes of world-wide religious news is broadcast each Saturday at 12:15 p. m.

All ministers of the Ballinger area are invited to participate in the Alliance. The organization meets each month for the purpose of coordinating the interdenominational work of the churches.

## Voters-Attention

In this issue of the Ledger there appears the full text of four of the Constitutional Amendments to be voted upon at the forthcoming general election on November 4. So that you may be fully informed we urge that you read each proposed measure in its entirety, and study all of them carefully before you go to the polls to cast your vote.

We will carry a brief digest of two of the amendments each week in this space for the next four weeks.

Number 3 on the ballot (HJR 30)—Provides that vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justice of the Peace shall be filled by the commissioners' court only until the next general election.

Number 4 on the ballot (HJR 31)—Provides that any district, county or precinct official serving a four-year term must resign before announcing for a different office if there remains unexpired more than one (1) year of the term for which he was elected.

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## Cub Leaders Need More Den Mothers For Program Here

Cub leaders are preparing for the start of a new year of work and are in need of den mothers and assistants. Last year a number of successful dens were operated in Ballinger but there were more boys wanting cubbing than could be handled because of the need of den mothers.

A school of training will be arranged for the latter part of August and then cubs will be enlisted soon after the start of the school year in September.

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## A PRESS BOX

The football season is just a short ways off and Ballinger coaches will be striving to make a good team that will represent the town in a fine way. If the sale of reserve seats is any indication, the support of the fans will be in keeping with their past records. Ballinger has a fine football plant and ample seats for the present. The most needed thing is a press box and at least one local organization has become interested in seeing this provided. A good press box gives a town and school good publicity that cannot be bought. Games have a better coverage now than ever before and each game draws radio, newspaper, scouts and others who are in position to spread good publicity. In the past it has been impossible to accommodate those who visit our games and this often leaves a sour taste. A press box is different from what was needed a few years ago when maybe three newspapers were represented at a big game. Now an ordinary game draws five and more reporters who come expecting a seat, a desk and good working conditions. In addition, there is usually at least one broadcast and the radio people with a couple of spotters must have room. Next is the public address system with a couple of spotters. There are two or more persons on hand to give the between half activities. Next is a battery of movie cameras with each team making a picture of the game and likely one scout also taking pictures. Then there are several scouts on hand watching the two teams and diagramming the plays of each. A representative of the local bench is also in the box to telephone down to the bench what information



## WEST TEXAS NOTES

Winters Blizzard football coaches have announced a camp to start on August 25 and they expect a large number of boys to attend. Coaches are expecting a good team for the 1958 season although they lost some 15 boys by graduation in the spring. They will have 11 lettermen from the 1957 team returning with six men in the backfield. They also have a number of good prospects coming up from the B team and junior high and, while experience will be needed, the coaches feel that they have plenty of depth and the best prospects for some time.

Coke County piled up a record vote for the first primary and county races were responsible for the heavy turnout. W. W. Thetford was elected as county judge when he defeated two opponents including the present judge, Jeff Dean. J. L. Tinkler was named county and district clerk and Mrs. Gertrude Gray was returned to the office of county treasurer over two opponents. The county also gave a good majority to Price Daniel, Ralph Yarborough and A. J. Bishop.

A hearing is being held today before the commissioners' court of Concho County on the organization and establishment of the Concho County Water Control and Improvement District No. 2. The proposed district is located in the Millersview area and contains approximately 112,422 acres. If the proposed district is approved, the construction of from 8 to 20 dams on Mustang Creek will be built in the detention program. Cost of the proposed project has been set at about \$1,000,000 to be furnished by the federal government. The petition asking the hearing was signed by 79 property owners.

water restrictions this week when the city asked even numbered houses to irrigate three days each week and those with odd numbers to irrigate on three other days. The city water superintendent stated that the customers were using more water than could be pumped each day. Consumption has mounted to around four million gallons per day and all four deep wells were in operation last week. The city water head stated that the pumps were being used 24-hours per day but that ground was being lost in the storage.

The annual meeting of the United Fund for Mitchell County was being held last week and officers and committees were named for the 1959 campaign. It was decided to conduct the campaign this fall with no outside hired help and an all-local staff will handle the raising of the fund. A quota will be worked out within a short time and will provide the annual money for a large number of organizations. The publicity committee will start their work some month in advance of the actual solicitation and all areas of the county will be covered.

A crowd of 200 Brownwood citizens heard Knox Banner and Ray Hedges of Little Rock, Arkansas, last week when they explained Urban Renewal and discussed its possibilities for improving Brownwood. The men explained that although federal funds are responsible for two-thirds of Rural Urban financing, the administration of the program remains in the hands of local citizens. They showed slides of some of the improvements in other areas of the south in which the federal government handled two-thirds of the cost and the city government one-third.

The Miles Lions Club has announced that 44 swimmers have completed the lessons given at the Ballinger Municipal Pool. The club paid the cost of the lessons for the non-swimmers and those who could swim and still wanted the courses paid their own way. The school board provided busses for transporting the kiddies to and from the Ballinger pool each day. This has been an annual project of the Miles club and each summer a large number of children have learned to swim under the plan.

Work is progressing nicely on Comanche's new hotel and the completion date is expected about September 1. The modern, fire-proof, one-story brick building will have sixteen bedrooms in addition to office, den, lobby and a 4-room apartment for the manager. Cost of the hotel was listed at about \$42,000 with furniture and fixtures to be in addition to that amount. It is air conditioned and has central heat. Each room has private bath and is well furnished to make perfect comfort for the guests.

The Rural Electrification Administration has approved plans for the Coleman County Telephone Cooperative to purchase the Burkett Telephone Co., to rebuild the Santa Anna exchange and to convert the Santa Anna exchange to dial equipment. The Coleman manager stated that the Burkett exchange work would be completed in about 12 months but a little more time would be needed to complete the work at Santa Anna. The completion of the two projects will give the cooperative 100 percent dial operation in its county system.

Dr. Hubert Larson arrived in Menard last week to open his medical practice in the physician's offices in the Menard Hospital. He has been in the service for the past two years and moved to Menard from Buffalo, New York. Dudley Thomblinson, hospital administrator, has returned from California where he interviewed nurses interested in moving to Menard. He also stated that a laboratory technician and a chef were to arrive there shortly to be associated with the hospital. Completion of the hospital in the old Bevans Hotel is expected the latter

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an amendment to Section 5 and 24 and authorizing a new Section of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas as to provide for annual Sessions of the Legislature; changing the composition, per diem and travel expense of the Members of the Legislature; authorizing temporary residence of the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House in the Capitol; providing for an election prescribing the form of ballot and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

SECTION 5. That Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows: "Section 5. The Legislature shall meet every year, under the condition and limitation hereinafter set forth, at such time as may be provided by law, and at other times when convened by the Governor. "During the First Regular Session of each Legislature, which shall convene in January, and each succeeding two (2) years thereafter, the first thing (80) days thereof shall be devoted to the introduction of bills and resolutions, acting upon emergency appropriations, passing upon the confirmation of the recent appointees of the Governor and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor; provided that during the succeeding thirty (30) days of the First Regular Session of each House shall hold hearings to consider all bills and resolutions and other matters as may be submitted by the Governor; provided further that during the following sixty (60) days the Legislature shall act upon such bills and resolutions as may be then pending and upon such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided, however, either House may otherwise determine the order of business by an affirmative vote of four-fifths (4/5) of its membership. "During the Second Regular Session of each Legislature, which shall convene in January 1960, and each succeeding two years thereafter, the Legislature shall be authorized to consider and act upon the following only: "a. Make annual appropriations for the general operation of the State government, which appropriations may be passed by a majority vote of each House.

"b. Consider emergency matters submitted by the Governor; bills embodying such matters shall become law only if the same shall be passed by a two-thirds vote of the Members elected to each House. "Whenever the term 'Biennial Session' appears in Article III of this Constitution, it shall be construed to mean 'First Regular Session.' "Any bill considered in the Second Regular Session of the Legislature must be introduced in that session. "Section 24. That Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows: "Section 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the public Treasury a salary of Seven Thousand, Five Hundred Dollars (\$7,500) per annum and expenses of office in amount and manner as determined by law. The Legislature shall not provide for any per diem for a greater number than Five Hundred Dollars (\$500) per annum during the First Regular Session, six (6) days during the Second Regular Session, and thirty (30) days during any Called Session. SECTION 4. That Section 4 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows: "Section 4. The Legislature shall meet every year, under the condition and limitation hereinafter set forth, at such time as may be provided by law, and at other times when convened by the Governor. "During the First Regular Session of each Legislature, which shall convene in January, and each succeeding two (2) years thereafter, the first thing (80) days thereof shall be devoted to the introduction of bills and resolutions, acting upon emergency appropriations, passing upon the confirmation of the recent appointees of the Governor and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor; provided that during the succeeding thirty (30) days of the First Regular Session of each House shall hold hearings to consider all bills and resolutions and other matters as may be submitted by the Governor; provided further that during the following sixty (60) days the Legislature shall act upon such bills and resolutions as may be then pending and upon such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided, however, either House may otherwise determine the order of business by an affirmative vote of four-fifths (4/5) of its membership. "During the Second Regular Session of each Legislature, which shall convene in January 1960, and each succeeding two years thereafter, the Legislature shall be authorized to consider and act upon the following only: "a. Make annual appropriations for the general operation of the State government, which appropriations may be passed by a majority vote of each House.

## CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6 proposing an amendment to Section (b) of Article VI of the Constitution of Texas, authorizing each county to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for appointive officers and employees of the county or precinct, or for appointive and elective officers and for employees of the county or precinct, providing for the submission of the proposed amendment to the voters qualified to vote thereon, and providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, promulgation, and publication.

Section 1. That Subsection (b) of Article VI of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to read hereinafter as follows: "(b) Each county shall have the right to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the county or precinct, or for the appointive and elective officers and for the employees of the county or precinct, provided same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters of such county and after such election has been advertised by being published in at least one newspaper of general circulation in said county once each week for four consecutive weeks, provided that the amount contributed by the county to such Fund shall at least equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of such person and shall not exceed at any time seven and one-half per centum (7 1/2%) of the compensated pay of each such person by the county.

Funds provided from the compensation of such person, or by the county, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund as are received by the county, shall be retained in the State Treasury, and the State Treasurer shall issue bonds in the State Treasury, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States government, the payment of the principal and interest on which is

guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said bonds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due and payable out of said Fund, such amount of bonds to be kept on hand to be determined by law to administer said Fund; and provided that the recipients of benefits from said Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension, retirement fund or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, established by the county, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the General Election to be held on November 4, 1958, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words: "FOR the amendment of subsection (b) of Article VI of the Constitution, to authorize each county to establish, after approval by its voters, a retirement, disability and death compensation fund covering the appointive officers of the county or precinct, as well as the appointive officers and employees of the county or precinct."

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation and shall have notice of said proposed amendment and of said election published as required by the Constitution of Texas and laws of this state.

## CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 17 proposing an amendment to Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 64, to provide that the Legislature shall have authority to provide a system of retirement and disability pensions to certain retiring Texas Rangers and their widows, stating the maximum of such pensions, and providing a fund from which such pensions may be paid.

Section 1. Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, shall be amended by adding thereto a new Section 64, to read as follows: "Section 64. The Legislature shall have authority to provide for a system of retirement and disability pensions for retiring Texas Rangers who have not been eligible at any time for membership in the Civilian Conservation System of Texas as that retirement system was established by Chapter 166, Acts of the Fifth Legislature, Session 1847, and who have had on such as has in any service as a Texas Ranger, and to their widows; provided that such pensions shall not exceed fifty dollars (\$50) per month to any

such Texas Ranger or his widow, provided that such pension shall be paid only from the special fund created by Section 17, Article VII for a payment of pensions for service in the Confederate Army and Navy, frontier organizations, and the militia of the State of Texas, and for widows of such persons serving in said armies, navies, organizations and the militia of the State of Texas, and the maximum of such pensions shall be submitted to the vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for pension to retired Texas Rangers who are eligible to participate in the Employees Retirement System of Texas, and their widows."

Section 2. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation and shall have notice of said proposed amendment and of said election published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

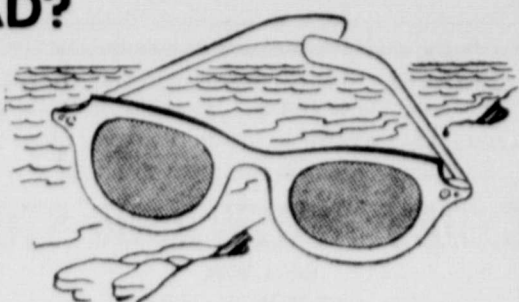

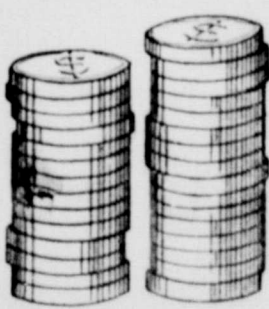
