Gonzales Warm Springs Is Faced With Closing

An urgent appeal for willing workers from Ballinger to give a single evening of effort to an emergency statewide "Citizens' March" for the Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation (now the Texas Rehabilitation Center) is being made by R. I. Payne of Dallas, Foundation president.

Unless financial help is forthcoming in the very near future, the famous Texas rehabilitation center is faced with the probability of having to close its doors.

"We earnestly hope there is a civic, church, women's, Scout, or school group in Ballinger which would like to volunteer for this one evening's March," Payne said. If so, its officers are urged to contact the Foundation's executive director, Walter H. Richter, P. O. Box 58, Gonzales, Texas, as soon as possible.

"It would be a tragedy," Payne observed, "if these remarkable facilities, built by and for all Texans, were lost to the thousands of citizens crippled in car wrecks and other accidents and by strokes, arthritis, cerebral palsy, and many other handicapping conditions."

Only about 30 per cent of the patients still at the center are still polio victims, and there are few agencies, such as polio's March of Dimes, which can help finance the non-polio patients. Of the non-polio patients, more than 90 per cent must have some, if not total, assistance from the Foundation's welfare program.

The Citizens' March will be scheduled some night in September and will follow an intensive public information campaign designed to tell the people of Texas about the Foundation's new program.

"We believe a lot of Texans who want to keep this fine work going will turn on their porch lights when the signal is given," Payne said.

Baptists Announce Special Programs For Fall Season

Plans for the fall program of the First Baptist Church are underway. The church has approved a Sunday school enlargement campaign which will begin on Sunday, September 7. The emphasis of the campaign will be to enroll and enlist new members, as well as to stimulate faithful attendance among the regular members. The plan calls for an average attendance in the Sunday school of 404 for 13 consecutive Sundays in conjunction with the campaign, an extensive visitation program will be inaugurated and the entire Sunday school will join in the study of the book, "Using the Sunday School in Evangelism," taught by the pastor.

The fall revival will begin on Sunday, October 5, and will close the following Sunday with the pastor, J. B. Fowler Jr., doing the preaching, and Bob Allford, the Minister of Music, directing the singing for the meeting.

The graded choir program of the church will begin with registration of the Cherub and Carol Choirs on Saturday, September 6. These choirs will meet regularly on Friday afternoons during the school term. The church choir will rehearse on Sunday afternoons.

A backyard fellowship honoring the college students who are going away to school this fall will be held Sunday night, August 31. Then, on Friday night, September 5, following the Brady-Ballinger football game, the first of the football fellowships for all Ballinger High School students will be held at the church. This will mark the third year that the fellowships have been held, and last year the average attendance was 77.

Many other activities will be held during the fall months. The regular worship services of the church are held at 11:00 a. m. and 8:00 p. m. on Sundays and at 8:00 on Wednesday evenings. The public is cordially invited to attend any of the services of the church.

Cox Gets Master Degree This Week From University

Among candidates being granted degrees this week by Hardin-Simmons University is Elson Cox, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ed F. Cox of Ballinger, who Friday receives the degree of master of arts. Scarcely past his 23rd birthday, Elson is the youngest person ever to receive a masters degree from the university, and is believed to hold a record unequalled in the state, according to Abilene college officials.

Edson is a government major, minoring in English, and received his bachelor of arts degree at the close of school in May, 1957, and was employed as an English teacher in a Lubbock junior high school and worked during spare time on his masters degree. When his school closed in May of this year he requested Hardin-Simmons for the summer term. Graduation in the arts field required the writing of a thesis which embraced many hours of research. This thesis, which consisted of some 90 pages, was approved by his graduating committee last week and his oral examination showed a high standing.

During his four years at Hardin-Simmons, following his graduation from Ballinger High School, he was prominent in many activities of the university, was a member of the famous Cowboy Band, ROTC band and stage band, winner of merit scholarship awards and placements in honor societies.

He has been rehired by the Lubbock school system at a substantial increase in salary and has been offered a lieutenant's commission through the ROTC Reserve Program, to complete his military service and start work on a doctor of philosophy degree which he hopes to attain within another year.

Korea Is Subject For Rotary Club Program Tuesday

The strategic importance of the peninsula of Korea and its development over the past ten years was pointed up in a talk Tuesday before the Ballinger Rotary Club by Major Melvin Holt, stationed there during the past two years as an administrative officer with a U. S. Army advisory group. Major Holt is a former Ballinger boy and has had 18 years of military service.

Speaking of South Korea, Major Holt traced the progress of the people particularly during the past 10 years when, he said, with U. S. aid many agricultural developments have been started, textile mills established, mines developed, and the citizens taught how to better their condition through their own efforts, and he said it was gratifying to note how they are enjoying their new found independence.

The peninsula is 512 miles long and about 219 miles wide at the widest point. The southern portion is known as the "breadbasket" and is devoted almost entirely to agricultural pursuits. The northern half which is Communist controlled abounds in timber, factories, mining, and power dams. The Japanese held the peninsula for 35 years before the recent war and during that time all past Korean progress was destroyed and the people reduced to slavery.

For hundreds of years Korea has been known as the springboard for wars, a noted one being the Japanese-Russian conflict in 1905.

Former Citizen Is Given Award By Austin Group

The following story was taken from the Austin American in regard to John B. Robertson, son-in-law of Mrs. Gay Edwards and the late Mr. Edwards.

He and the former Miss Pauline Edwards were married on July 28, 1944 in Winters. They resided for a short time in Ballinger before he was called into the service during World War II. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. D. C. Robertson of Winters.

The story follows: "John B. Robertson, administrative officer in the reserve personnel division of the Adjutant General section of Headquarters VIII Army Corps (reserves) has been selected 'Civil Servant of the month of July' during the anniversary year of Civil Service Act.

"An award was presented Robertson at a meeting of the Austin Exchange Club by a member of the committee which selects the 'Civil Servant of the Month.'"

"Major Gen. Robert S. Gard, chief of the two-state VIII corps described Robertson as a key civilian official in the personnel division. He has received a sustained superior performance award and numerous letters of appreciation and commendation for his contribution to the reserve program.

"Originally from Winters, Robertson has made his home in Austin since 1948. He attended public school at Winters and later attended Tarleton State College, Stephenville and the University of Texas at Austin.

"During World War II he served in the European Theatre as a member of the 5th Tank Destroyer Group and later in headquarters of United States forces in Austria.

"He has been an active member of the reserve since 1946. He is a member of the Central Baptist Church and secretary of the men's Bible Class. He is a mason and a shriner."

Soil Bank Plan Being Explained To Local Farmers

Farmers who are interested in the long term soil bank program for 1959 should contact the ASC office at once to get details of the new plan of action. Local employees of the office were in Colorado City at a meeting last week to get information on the new features of the program which are more or less complicated in regard to the various provisions offered.

The request for establishing a rate on a farm must be made and in the local office by September 26. It was announced that the rate in the county has been increased to a general average of 11 per acre.

The application for a contract must be executed and in the office by October 17. Farmers interested in the long term features of the soil bank program are invited to visit the ASC office as soon as possible and get details in regard to their place, the amount to be included in the program and the various priorities offered by the government.

W. R. (Buddy) Gray stated Tuesday the office personnel were ready to explain the program at this time and urged all farmers to get the information.

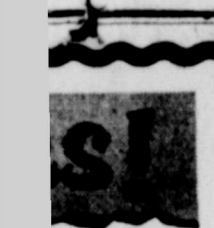

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958

HJR #1—Number One on the Ballot.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an amendment to Section 8 and 24 and authorizing a new Section of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas as to provide for annual Sessions of the Legislature; changing the compensation, per diem and travel expense of the Members of the Legislature; authorizing temporary residence of the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House in the Capitol, providing for an election; prescribing the form of ballot and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 8 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereinafter read as follows:

"Section 8. The Legislature shall meet every year, under the condition and limitation hereinafter set forth, at such time as may be provided by law, and at other times when convened by the Governor.

"During the First Regular Session of each Legislature, which shall convene in January, 1959, and each succeeding two (2) years thereafter, the first thirty (30) days thereof shall be devoted to the introduction of bills and resolutions, acting upon emergency appropriations, passing upon the confirmation of the recess appointees of the Governor and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided that during the succeeding thirty (30) days of the First Regular Session of each House shall hold hearings to consider all bills and resolutions and other matters as may be submitted by the Governor; provided further that during the following sixty (60) days the Legislature shall act upon such bills and resolutions as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided, however, either House may otherwise determine its order of business by an affirmative vote of four-fifths (4/5) of its membership.

"During the Second Regular Session of each Legislature, which shall convene in January 1960, and each succeeding two years thereafter, the Legislature shall be authorized to consider and act upon the following only:

"a. Make annual appropriations for the general operation of the State government; which appropriations may be passed by a majority vote of each House.

"b. Consider emergency matters submitted by the Governor; bills embodying such matters shall become law only if the same shall be passed by a majority vote of the members elected to each House.

"Whenever the term 'biennial Session' appears in Article 17 of this Constitution, it shall be construed to mean 'First Regular Session.'

"Any bill considered in the Second Regular Session of the Legislature must be introduced in that session."

Sec. 2. That Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereinafter read as follows:

"Section 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the public Treasury a salary of Seven Thousand, Five Hundred Dollars (\$7,500) per annum and expense of office in amount and manner as determined by law. The Legislature shall not provide for any per diem for a greater number than one hundred and twenty (120) days during the First Regular Session, sixty (60) days during the Second Regular Session, and thirty (30) days during any called Session."

Sec. 3. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section to be known as Section 25a, to read as follows:

"Section 25a. In addition to other compensation provided herein, the Lieutenant Governor of the State of Texas and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall be entitled to temporary residence in the State Capitol during their term of office in such quarters and under such conditions as the Legislature may provide."

Sec. 4. That the foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be limited to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the compensation and expenses of members thereof, limiting the per diem for each Session, and authorizing temporary residence of the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives in the Capitol."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for annual Sessions of the Legislature, prescribing the compensation and expenses for Members thereof, limiting the per diem for each Session, and authorizing temporary residence of the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives in the Capitol."

Sec. 5. That the Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

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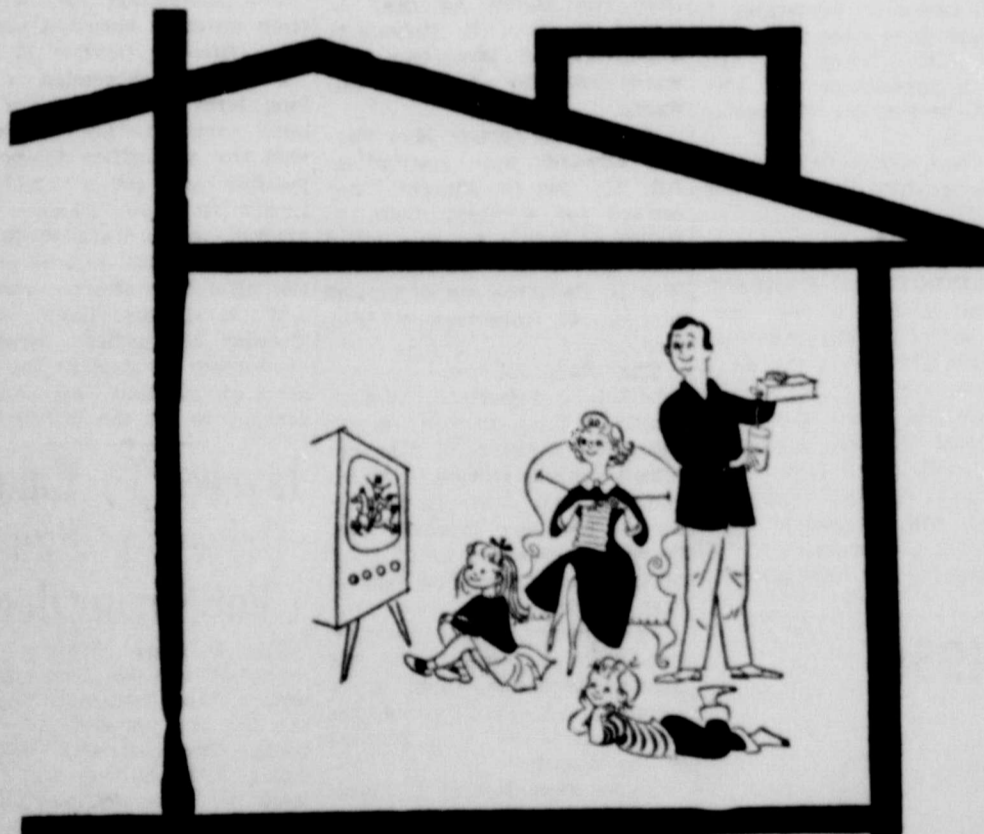

The Co-op has about 5,000 members and the group will be entertained by the Gspelaires Quartet of Abilene. A new feature for the program this year will be the selection of the winner in the beauty contest. Registration was set to start at 7 p. m. and continue until the start of the program.

Blach announced that driver education would not be included at the Bronte school this year. The board has tried to employ a teacher qualified for this subject but has been unable to and will delay the course for a year.

A large number of range fires was reported in various sections of West Texas last week. One raged for hours just northwest of Zephyr and many people and fire departments assisted in bringing it under control. Fire swept some 200 acres on the Harvey L. Hartgrove ranch nine miles southeast of Paint Rock last week. Many volunteers fought the fire which started about noon and was under control by 3 p. m. Another smaller fire was reported just east of Benoit Sunday afternoon.

Federal funds in the amount of \$113,000 have been made available for the construction of a national guard armory at Coleman last week from Washington officials and later was confirmed by General K. L. Berry from the office of the adjutant general. The state matches one-third of the cost which would indicate an armory costing about \$150,000. General Berry stated that he expected actual construction to get underway not later than November or December of this year, unless some national emergency should develop.

Directors of the community chest at Stephenville met last week and approved a budget of \$18,000. No definite date for a campaign was set but directors favored the month of October. The board approved a list of 15 organizations which will share in the funds of the chest for the next twelve months. Stephenville and Erath County have operated the chest fund for several years and have taken care of most of the calls for funds by organizations in the one drive.

Texas has 24,000 miles of gas pipelines.

Supt. James B. Nevins has announced the opening of the Winters school on September 2. A schedule of registration, pre-school faculty meetings and the first run of busses has been announced to perfect the plans for the 1958 opening. The Winters high school band has been meeting for the past week in daily rehearsals to be ready for the opening of the football season early in September. The football team will start a camp on August 25 and will work out twice daily to get in condition for the first game on September 5.

A new warehouse is being constructed by James L. Daniel at Eden and is nearing completion. Contractors stated it would be ready for use this week and would hold approximately 250,000 bushels of grain. The new structure is located just north of the new elevators along the Sante Fe tracks. It is 70 feet wide and 200 feet long. The firm now has combined grain storage of around 400,000 bushels and the warehouse was rushed to completion to help handle the maize crop now being harvested.

Rowena Lions in session last week held a discussion on a number of matters including the width of the new highway through the city. No action was taken on the matter but it will be talked with business interests at Rowena. They also started a campaign to get the city dump grounds cleaned up and asked that persons hauling there in the future use the rear of the grounds so that the front road could be kept open. The club decided to take Labor Day as a holiday in keeping with other towns of area.

The Methodist Church at Miles started a revival last Sunday which will run through another Sunday and will have a guest speaker at each service. The pastor will have the regular Sunday services and ministers from other Methodist Churches in West Texas will be with the church each week-day to bring the gospel messages. All week day services will be held at 8 p. m.

School trustees at Colorado City met last week to approve the hiring of nine new teachers and at the same time accepted the resignation of five more. Other teachers are expected to be placed on the faculty within a few days to complete the teaching force before the start of school. City officials at Colorado City also cracked down on merchandise display on sidewalks and contracted for a large parking area on the railroad right-of-way. The city has an ordinance against merchandise on sidewalks but for some time it has not been enforced.

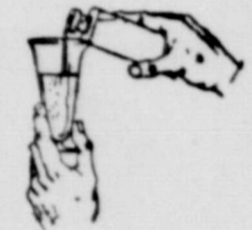

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 17 proposing an amendment to Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto a new section 45, as follows: Section 45. To provide that the Legislature shall have authority to provide for a system of retirement and disability pensions for certain retiring Texas Rangers and their widows, stating the maximum of such pension, and providing a fund from which such pensions may be paid. BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section 45, to read as follows: Section 45. The Legislature shall have authority to provide for a system of retirement and disability pensions for retiring Texas Rangers who have not been eligible at any time for membership in the Employees Retirement System of Texas as that retirement system was established by Chapter 352, Acts of the Fifteenth Legislature, Regular Session, 1947, and who have had as much as two (2) years service as a Texas Ranger, and to their widows, providing that no pension shall exceed Eighty Dollars (\$80) per month to any such Texas Ranger or his widow, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be set aside to meet the immediate payment of the amount to become due each year out of said fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said fund; and provided that the recipient of benefits from said fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, distributed by the county is retained in the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid. (b) The proceeds provided from the operation of each such person, or by the county or precinct, shall be retained in the State of Texas, or counties or precincts, and shall be held in trust by any agency of the United States government, the payment of the principal of said interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be set aside to meet the immediate payment of the amount to become due each year out of said fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said fund; and provided that the recipient of benefits from said fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, distributed by the county is retained in the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid. Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have notice of said proposed amendment and of said election published as required by the constitution of Texas and laws of this state.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3 proposing an amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto a new section 1, as follows: Section 1. Rowena Youth Is Drowned Sunday Municipal Pool

Joe Moeller Jr., 15, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Moeller of Rowena, was drowned in the Ballinger swimming pool late Sunday afternoon. This became the first drowning at the pool since it was opened.

Moeller was with his family and friends who were having a picnic at the City Park. He had been swimming during the afternoon and was missed at 6:30 when the pool closed and his clothing was still in the basket in the concession room. A check was started in the pool and the body was located and brought out of the water at about 7 o'clock. Firemen were at the scene and used a resuscitator for 45 minutes without any success.

Operators at the pool stated that two lifeguards were on duty until 4:30 p. m. Sunday and one was on the job until the pool closed. A lifeguard said he saw Moeller at about 5:30 and he considered him an excellent swimmer and diver.

When the baskets were checked it was found that Moeller had not dressed and a check was started which revealed the body on the bottom of the pool at the deepest place.

Rosary services were said at the Newby-Davis Chapel at 8 p. m. Monday. Funeral services were held at the St. Joseph Catholic Church in Rowena at 9 a. m. Tuesday with a brother, Rev. Louis B. Moeller of Lamesa, in charge. Burial was in St. Joseph's Cemetery at Rowena.

Survivors are his parents, two brothers, Rev. Louis Moeller of Lamesa, Maurice Moeller of Paint Rock, one sister, Miss Ruby Moeller of Austin.
