Ballinger Schools Ready For Opening Tuesday

Preliminary meetings and other activities are underway this week for the opening of the Ballinger school next Tuesday, September 2. All faculty members were here Wednesday morning to meet in a general assembly at 9 a. m. and from 10 to 12 in group meetings with principals. These meetings are being continued today and through Friday. Supt. Caskey stated that the faculty meetings would end at noon Friday in order to give teachers a long week-end with their families, for visits and perhaps short trips.

Coaches met candidates for the football team Monday morning and set up practice sessions twice daily until the first day of school, at which time they will drop to afternoon sessions.

Members of the high school band were also meeting for daily rehearsals this week to get ready for the opening of the football season and to be organized for the playing at the football prevue Tuesday night.

Mrs. Wm. F. Postlethwaite was also meeting members of the high school choir to start early rehearsals and have the group ready for their visit to the State Fair at Dallas early in October.

All school busses will run next Tuesday morning and schools will have a stepped up schedule so that students will be dismissed by noon. Elementary students will report to their teachers and after room assignments are made and each child given a list of needed supplies, they will be dismissed. Senior and junior high schools will operate classes on a rushed up schedule and complete their work by noon.

The lunch room will operate Tuesday for teachers and other adults who eat there. Regular operation for students will start on Wednesday when regular class sessions will be held in all schools.

This week on Monday and Tuesday all students in senior high were registered. Tuesday afternoon freshmen students registered at the junior high school. Other classes at junior high will not register until next Tuesday, September 2. School administrators are expecting a heavy first day enrollment. There are a number of new students in the school this year and there will also be eight new faculty members.

Football Practice Sessions Started With 37 Prospects

Coaches Paul Stewart and C. W. Bettis greeted 36 football candidates at the first workout Monday morning and one other joined the squad Tuesday. The coaches expect a few more to report with the opening of school to round out a squad of better than 40 boys.

Jerry Candler, who broke a leg in the final game of the season in 1957, is back with the team and is running well with no trouble from the injured leg. Candler was the main ball carrier for the past two years and much is expected of him in his senior year.

The team is being rushed as fast as possible to get in good physical condition and also to smooth out a few plays for the opening of the season on September 5 with the Brady Bulldogs at Bearcat Field.

The Bearcats have a hard schedule for 1958, meeting some of the best class AA teams in the state in their first few games. There are six home games for the team and four on the road this year.

Coach Stewart will bring the Bearcats on the field and introduce them by positions.

Rural Schools Ready To Start In This County

W. E. Elkins, Runnels County school superintendent, announced this week that all teaching personnel was filled in the rural schools with the exception of a homemaking teacher at the Norton Rural High School. Norton and Miles are to start on September 1 and Offen will get classes underway on September 2.

Mr. Elkins stated that his office has been notified by the Commodity Distribution Division at San Angelo that delivery can be expected about September 3 on a shipment of foods for the lunchrooms of the county.

This shipment will include 55 sacks of flour of 50 pounds each, 37 cases of cheese, 39 pounds to case, 63 cases of butter, 32 pounds to case, 17 cases of canned blackberries, 40 pounds to case.

The commodities are distributed to each school according to their average daily participation of students eating in lunchrooms and not on the average daily attendance of the school. The county superintendent's office serves as recipient agency for allocations to all Runnels County schools.

There are nine lunchrooms operating in the county. Two at Ballinger, two at Rowena, Winters, Wingate, Offen, Norton and Miles. Other shipments of surplus foods are expected to be received early in the school year.

WARNING TO HUNTERS

Game wardens give the following warnings to hunters who will start the new dove season next Monday.

- 1. Be sure you have a new 1958-59 hunting license.
- 2. Shooting starts at 12 noon and ends at sunset.
- 3. The limit is 10 doves per day. After the first day you may have 20 doves in possession.
- 4. Be sure to get permission from landowner before hunting on their property.
- 5. Don't shoot across roads, highways or public property.
- 6. Your gun must be plugged or hold not more than 2 shells in magazine and one in the chamber.
- 7. Look before you shoot.
- 8. Don't shoot from an automobile.
- 9. If you are inclined to be careless, check your life insurance.

Rain Over County Will Help Cotton And Stock Ranges

The rain Saturday night fell over a large part of Runnels County and farmers and stockmen were benefited by the moisture. Heaviest rain fell in the Ballinger area with 2.50 inches here, but further north of the city as much as 3 inches were measured.

Winters received a rain of over 2 inches. Rowena a good rain, Norton, Wingate, Wilmet and the east part of the county an inch and over. The fall in the Miles area was light and not enough to benefit crops or ranges.

The heaviest rain fell in the driest part of the county and will be a great help to cotton that was beginning to suffer from dry weather. Other late crops will be benefited and in most places no harm was done to the maize which is now being combined.

The only serious damage was in the Winters area where a heavy hail storm destroyed a number of fields. The stretch started just west of Winters and traveled southeast for several miles.

Most streams were up and considerable stock water was caught in tanks and small streams.

Jake Presley, chairman of the Runnels County Soil Conservation District, reports that a number of people are in the process of constructing terraces, diversion terraces and livestock ponds on their farms and ranches. He stated that these practices are a part of the overall soil, water and plant conservation program for the individual ranch and farm.

These people are receiving technical assistance from the soil conservation service and a federal cost share through the Agriculture Conservation Program in the application of terraces, diversion terraces and livestock ponds.

Oil Drilling Increased In Runnels County Area

1-Hour Parking Starting Today For Eighth Street

The city commission was in session Tuesday morning and passed a city ordinance creating one-hour parking on Eighth Street between Hutchings Avenue and Railroad Avenue. The ordinance is being published today and will become effective at once.

This action was taken after a petition of merchants on that block requested the one-hour parking but to remain angle at the curb. After one-hour parking was set up on Hutchings Avenue a large number of cars were parked on Eighth Street to take up practically all the space.

A building permit for \$300 was given to J. W. Moore to enlarge a garage on Third Street between Largent and Hamilton.

A \$5,000 permit was approved for the Third Avenue Baptist Church for the moving in of a building and improving it. The building is being moved to the location from Bethel.

Complaints were received from property owners on Thirteenth Street and also in the flat on South Eighth Street and others. The city will start building up South Eighth Street with caliche to improve the street to the negro school. This area has been underwater after recent rains and clogged drainage ditches on other streets makes it hard to get to the school.

The city was informed that the armory paving fund of \$668 was ready for the connection of pavement on Crosson Avenue. This work will be started within a short time and will make all of Crosson Avenue paved from Broadway to the City Park.

A number of other matters were discussed at the meeting Tuesday but were not completed. O. O. Bishop is speaker for Rotary Tuesday.

Of some 1500 bills introduced at the recent session of the State Legislature, between 700 and 800 became laws, but the public will vote on only nine at the November election, 77th District Representative A. J. Bishop told members of the Rotary Club here Tuesday.

Bishop briefly discussed the nine proposed constitutional amendments, saying that those he had heard the most comment on were the ones which provide public funds to be used in advertising the resources of Texas, to be matched dollar for dollar by private industry, and another requiring four-year office holders to resign before making the race for another office and providing for four-year tenures for appointive as well as elective officials.

He urged that all voters secure a copy of the nine proposed amendments and read them carefully before the November 4th election.

Several new oil locations have been announced for Runnels County and others are drilling. R. K. Stoker of Abilene has filed application to drill his No. 1-Charles Wailer, a 4,500 foot wildcat 3/4 mile south of the Anderson, Sutton & Graham No. 1-Bloxom in the Elm Creek (Jennings) field. The Bloxom well was finished on August 9 for a daily flowing potential of 219 barrels of 45 gravity oil.

George Baumgart of San Angelo has filed application to drill the No. 1-R T. Lee, a 5,390 foot wildcat 1 1/2 miles northwest of Wilmet and 1 1/2 miles southwest of the opener in the Harkins (Gardner) field.

W. W. West of Midland will drill the No. 6-Opal Bouldin as a 2,290 foot wildcat two miles northwest of Talpa.

Anderson & Graham of San Angelo will drill their No. 3-Emmie Michaels, an offset to their No. 2-Michaels, an indicated second producer in the Jennings and Fry sands in the three-pay Andermann field two miles northeast of Hatchel. The No. 2-Michaels has run casing to attempt production in the Jennings and Fry.

A fourth producer and a one location east extension in the Urban Miles (Lower Capps lime) field has been indicated with the recovery of oil at the Apping & Radley of El Campo No. 1-H A. Braden. The new well is located two miles northeast of Miles. The project will drill to 4,360 feet and run logs.

Cree Oil & Exploration Co. of Abilene has filed application to drill No. 1-Malinda Jameson as a 3,600 foot wildcat three miles north of Talpa.

Monday Holiday Dove Season To Start Afternoon

Monday will be a holiday in Ballinger and practically all stores will be closed to observe Labor Day. Ballinger schools have delayed their opening for one day so that families can be together for the holiday and they will start sessions Tuesday morning.

Labor Day is one of the six legal holidays for Ballinger firms.

Monday will also be the opening of the dove season in this area and the holiday will give many persons a chance to spend the afternoon shooting. Doves are plentiful this year, the biggest crop reported for many years. Hunters will find little trouble getting their quota of ten birds, however, the week-end rains placed water in all streams and water hole shooting will not be so good for a short time.

Special game wardens are expected in this area for the first few days of the season and hunters are warned to observe the laws. This means only ten birds per person, no shooting along the roads, no shooting from a car, no trespassing on private property and not more than ten birds in possession at one time. Shooting is legal from noon until sundown.

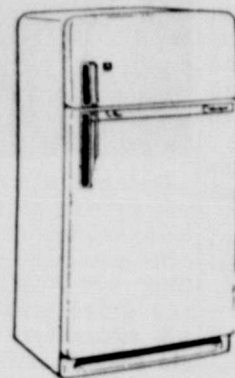

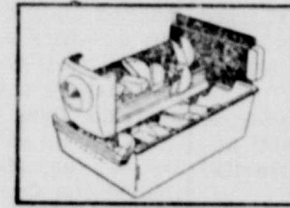

The vacation period is about over and in a few days our schools will be back at work with buildings crowded with students. The start of school makes a big change in our living in most homes. Regular schedules are established with people at home for regular mealtime, at home more at night and many other changes come about in the home that cooperate with schools and makes their children have time for study and other school work. Opening of schools also is a beginning of the fall season, a time for the buying of new wardrobes and business generally gets a boost as buying starts in most families. Church attendance also usually is increased with the beginning of school and Sunday school teachers and other leaders who have been taking vacations return to their regular jobs in the church program.

Another matter that should be remembered by everyone along with the opening of schools is the fact that traffic hazards are increased. There are other firms that belong but who do not pay into the budget a sufficient amount in comparison with other firms of their size. Let's provide the funds to give a live wide awake chamber an opportunity for service in Ballinger.

WEST TEXAS NOTES

Brownwood firms cooperated last week in a huge show for the showing of new fall styles for women and children. The show was presented in Mims Auditorium and a capacity crowd was on hand when more than 50 models displayed the latest for fall and winter. The affair was arranged and presented by the Business and Professional Women's Club of Brownwood as one of their annual activities. All firms that handle ready-to-wear were represented in the show.

Plans have been perfected at Bronte for a big labor day show which will be held in the city park and will feature a number of swimming and diving contests at the municipal pool. Labor Day will be a holiday for most Bronte stores and a large number of entries have been registered for the various water events. Bronte business firms contributed the money for the prizes and awards and Aubrey Denman is in charge of the program.

Brady opened a new swimming pool at the country club last Friday and all citizens of the area were invited to attend the first swim day. The country club was taken over by the city several years ago and is operated as a recreation center for that city. This summer a swimming pool was added and has just been completed. It was announced that the other pool at the Brady water works would remain in operation for the people of that area. An experienced operator has been hired along with lifeguards and other workers for the pool.

The maize harvest was moving fast last week in the Eden area as shown by activity at the new warehouse built by James L. Daniel. The new facilities were about one-third full last Wednesday and grain was moving fast. Eden now has some of the best storage in West Texas with room for about 750,000 bushels of grain. Before the movement of maize, some 400,000 bushels of grain were stored at Eden and the operators expect to fill the new warehouse before the

maize harvest is over.

The board of trustees at Menard passed a school budget for \$196,000 at a meeting last week. This is considerably higher than for the year before but a new school bus, repair of the heating system and a number of other necessary items were included this year. The expected income for the year was listed at \$194,278, of which \$82,979 would be local taxes. The assessed property value in the Menard district was over 6 1/2 million dollars and the tax rate was set at \$1.25 on the \$100. School will get underway at Menard the first week in September.

The Methodist Church at Miles is sponsoring a drive to collect maize to be given to Boys Ranch. Farmers who are now harvesting a good crop are asked to donate 100 pounds of maize for this cause. The maize will be stored at Miles until it is picked up by trucks. It will be used this winter to feed the livestock owned by the boys at the ranch. The plan was meeting with immediate success and a large number of farmers had already made their contributions.

Civic leaders at Coleman were notified last week that \$50,000 in federal funds had been made

available to cover a comprehensive survey of the Colorado River and its tributaries. First requests were for \$100,000 but this was sliced by Congress when the actual appropriations were made. The survey was started back about 1930 and for several years officers of the Central Colorado River Authority have been pleading for the completion of the survey. Work on the remainder of the survey is expected to get started within a short time.

Announcement was made by Supt. Roy Tomlinson that the Paint Rock school would start the fall term on September 1. A homemaking teacher is still being sought to complete the teaching force at Paint Rock. During the summer, considerable work has been underway at the Paint Rock School and this has all been completed. A program for the general public on opening day has been arranged and all people of the district are invited to attend. A group of 22 boys started football practice on August 25.

Four Stephenville service clubs, in cooperation with the chamber of commerce, will entertain the candidates for the Tarleton State College football team on September 2. The affair will start with a barbecue dinner for the prospects and included will be all the members of the four clubs and all football fans of that area. Coaches at Tarleton are expecting from 80 to 100 boys to report for football practice on that date and to attend the barbecue and welcome program. Every effort will be made to keep all the boys in school after coaches begin cutting the

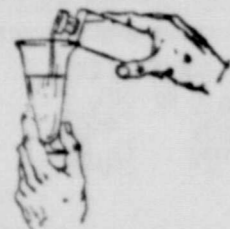

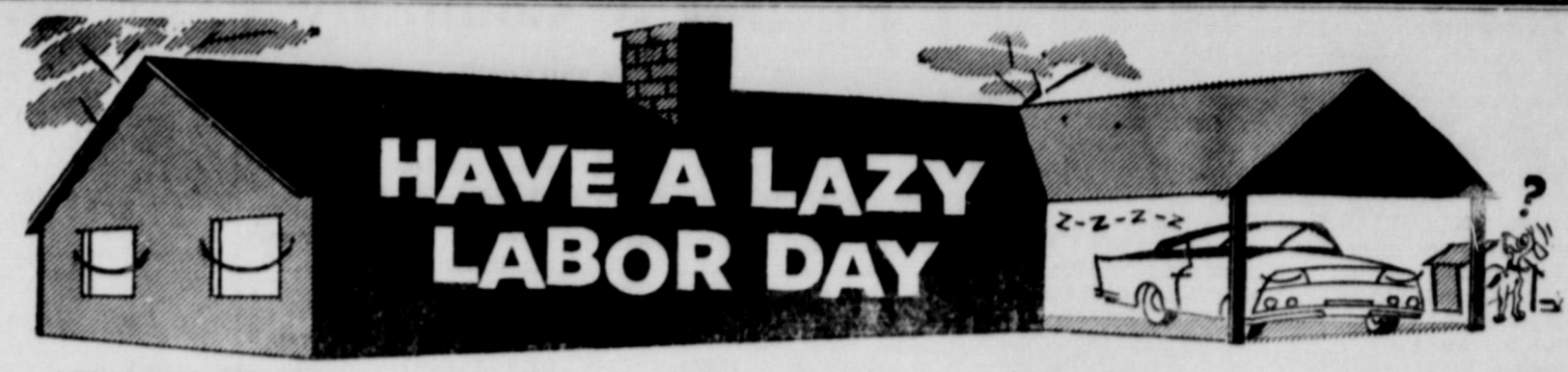

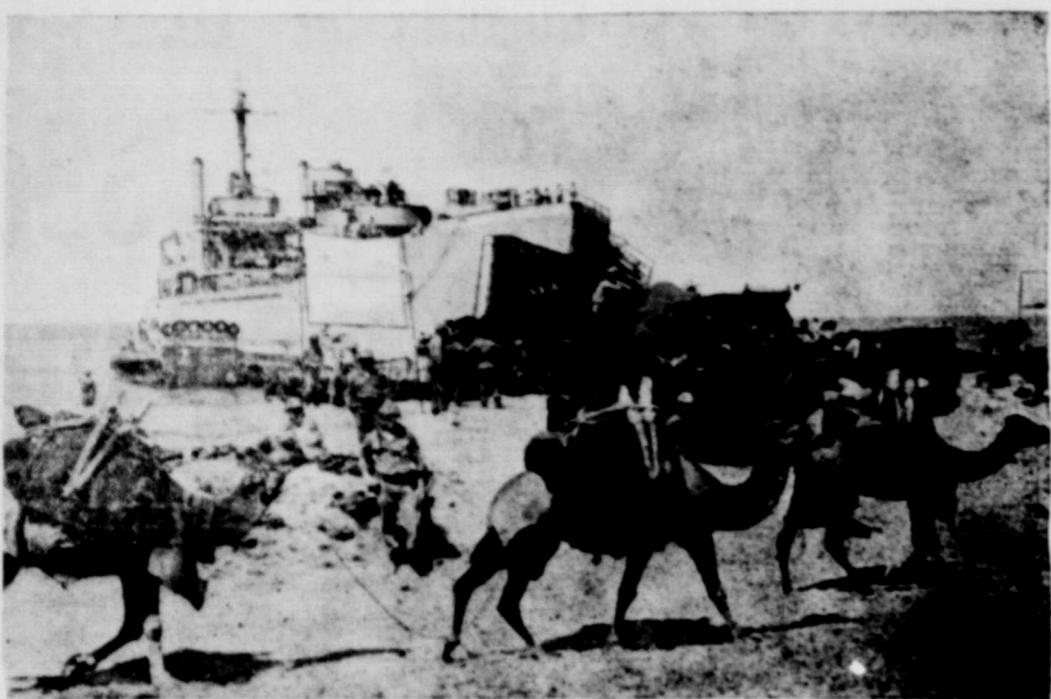
