
To date SP4K feeds over 7,000 food-insecure children in the Texas Panhandle.

Friona Primary Principal Ashley Smith announced recently they will hold the 2017-2018 Pre-K and new student registration April 17-21 at the Primary School from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. each day except on Thursday from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m.

Students who will be 4 years of age on or before September 1, 2017 or will be new to Friona Primary for the upcoming school year are welcome to register at this time.

Parents are reminded to bring their child's shot record, birth certificate, social security card, parent/guardian identification, W-2/proof of income, Medicaid card and proof of residency.

The proof of residency must be from the approved list which includes: Xcel Energy statement; Atmos Energy statement; Deaf Smith Energy statement; West Texas Gas statement; City Water statement; Rent/lease receipt on company letterhead; or Direct TV, Cable, etc.

Proof of Residency must be in the parent's or legal guardian's name, must display the physical address, and must be dated the current month or one month prior.

Non-acceptable proof of residency are the following: telephone statement, title to land, property tax statement, driver's license, Medicaid, disconnect notices, unprinted/ handwritten/general purpose rent/lease receipts, Texas Department of Human Services records, telephone book addresses, library cards, car insurance, P.O. Boxes or routes, or mortgage statement.

Presenting a false record or falsifying records is an offense under Section 37.10. of the Penal Code and enrollment of a child under false documents subjects the person to liability for tuition or other costs. (TEC Sec. 25.002 (3)(d).)

Even though I wanted to lose my temper and yell at the man that 'forgot' about my keys, what would it have fixed?

The day taught me that I could rant and rave like some people do, but what does it get me...a bad reputation of being a hot-head, a headache like no other headache and I wouldn't teach my granddaughter how to handle things with class.

I think teaching her a lesson of how we should act is much more important than ranting and raving about the wasted hours we spent in the store. Besides, we got to bond over flowers, food, and a big box of Easter eggs. (And, I got a column out of it!)

Distracted driving crashes in Texas up 3 percent in 2016 An estimated 1 in 5 traffic crashes in Texas is caused by distracted

driving, and the problem is getting worse. As part of National Distracted Driving Awareness Month in April, the Texas Department of Transportation is launching its "Talk, Text, Crash" campaign to remind drivers to stay focused on the road.

"People are dying on Texas roadways because drivers are diverting their attention from the road to talk on a phone, send a text, post to social media or engage in some other distracting behavior," said TxDOT Executive Director James Bass. "When drivers take their focus off the road, they put themselves, their passengers and others at risk. It's just not worth it."

Last year, there were 108,962 distracted driving crashes in Texas – up 3 percent over 2015. Those crashes killed 452 people and seriously injured another 3,068. These crashes are highest among younger drivers ages 16 to 34. In Texas, 38 percent of drivers say they regularly or sometimes serving and working with the members of the congregation, but also

use a cell phone while driving.[1] Text messaging is particularly dangerous as reaction times double when drivers read or send text seeking opportunities to make the lives of the people better and to let messages.[2] A driver texting at 55 mph will lose sight of the road for nearly five seconds, which is comparable to driving the length of a football field while blindfolded.[3] While mobile phone use is the most recognizable driving distraction, other high-risk activities that can take your eyes or mind off the road include adjusting a music player, grooming, eating or programming a navigation system.

Put away the phone - or turn it off - before getting behind the



Safety projects scheduled

The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) has started work on a \$431,448 project this week to replace safety end treatments (SETs) along several roadways throughout the TxDOT Lubbock District's 17 counties. Project contractor is Gilvin-Terrill, Ltd., of Amarillo, will begin work in Parmer County.

Safety end treatments are attachments placed or constructed at the ends of culvert pipes or boxes that allow vehicles that stray from the roadway to pass over them with little or no damage to the vehicle or passengers.

"Most of the work is expected to take place along the right of way and off the roadway," said Steve Perez, TxDOT Littlefield Area engineer and project manager. "Impacts to mainlane traffic will be very minimal, but motorists should continue to stay alert and minimize distractions when entering the work zone for their safety and the safety of the workers."

The project is anticipated to be completed in mid-June. Work will take place weather permitting.



Last week, we were blessed to hear a Messianic Jewish Rabbi speak in Hereford. He told the story of how he became a Christian.

Egg prices could rise as Easter holiday nears

Consumers might see a slight shape." rise in egg prices as the Easter holiday approaches due to increased demand for baking and dyed eggs, said a Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service ex-

Dr. Craig Coufal, AgriLife Extension poultry specialist, College Station, said eggs are plentiful and prices are low as we near the holiday.

"It looks like we're on cruise "There are plenty of laying hens producing plenty of eggs."

Coufal said the laying industry has fully recovered from an avian influenza outbreak that led to losses of around 35 million laying hens in the spring of hens were affected by the outbreak because hens are typically housed in large flocks, so if one facility is infected, many birds will be lost, Coufal said.

"Egg prices went crazy because there were so many birds taken out of production in March, April and May 2015," he said. "We haven't had any major outbreaks and those birds have been replaced, so over the past two years we've been in good

There are around 318.4 million laying hens in production as of January, up 6.4 percent from 299.3 million in production in January 2016, according to the March 2017 U.S. Flock Trends and Projections report by the Egg Industry Center in Ames,

A dozen medium Grade AA white eggs averaged 87 cents in retail stores in the South Central U.S., which includes Texas, according to the March 24 U.S. Department of Agriculture National Retail Report. USDA market news reports for the region indicate the egg market is steady, with moderate to good demand.

Eggs were 5-8 cents higher, depending on size, than the previous report, according to the USDA market news report.

Coufal said consumers could expect a price spike around the April 16 holiday.

"People will be making dyed eggs for Easter egg hunts and baking for Sunday lunches and dinners," he said. "That could mean a slight increase in prices because of demand, but prices should be back to normal soon thereafter."

April is Child Abuse Prevention Month

Last year, according to Texas Child Protective Services, nearly 60,000 Texas children were abused or neglected. April is National Child Abuse Prevention Month, a time to acknowledge the importance of families and communities working social and emotional well-being of children and families.

Children of all backgrounds can be victims of abuse. It's a problem that spans all ages, races, ethnicities, and socioeconomic backgrounds. Children ages 4-7 and 12-15 are most likely to be physically abused, but very young children are the most vulnerable to serious injuries as a result of child abuse.

If you do find yourself frustrated and angry at your child, please try the following to avoid hurting them:

Take a deep breath and count to 20 slowly.

Put your child in a safe place and WALK AWAY. The crib is usually a good choice for children who have not yet learned to climb out. For older children, walk out of the room but remain within hearing range to make sure that the child is safe.

Now that your child is safe, take the time you need to calm

down. This could just be a couple of minutes. If you need upset you are and that you need some help.

> > Discipline your children thoughtfully. It's never good to discipline a child in anger. Give yourself time to calm down, and remember that discipline is a way to teach your child. Use privileges to encourage good behavior and time-outs to help your child regain control. There is a substantial amount of literature that spanking, hitting, and other forms of physical punishment are not effective. Children disciplined in this way are more likely to be aggressive and have low self-esteem.

Examine your behavior. Abuse can reach far beyond the physical. Words as well as actions can inflict deep, lasting wounds. Be a nurturer. Actions show children and other adults that conflicts can be settled in a healthy way, without hitting or yelling.

Teach children their rights. When kids understand that they are special and have the right to be safe, they are less likely to think abuse is their fault. Then they become more likely to talk about potential abuse.
