Commissioners double subsidies to county EMS

The Parmer County Commissioners Court met in regular session on Monday, May 8 in Farwell at the County Courthouse.

The first order of business was to double the subsidies to the county Emergency Medical Services. Currently each month Friona EMS receives \$800, Bovina EMS \$400, Farwell EMS \$400 and Lazbuddie \$400. As of January 2018, these amounts will double pending a budget meeting and any unforeseen circumstances.

Parmer County received a favorable report on the 2016 audit conducted by Michele Kirkland. The county has increased their operating surplus from five months to seven months. The county has shown a turnaround in the incoming funds being more than the outgoing funds. This is the first time the county has had a balanced budget in 6 years.

The commissioners heard reports from Larry Johnston and Altha Herington and approved to have the Texas Association of Counties to use the Affordable Care Act Reporting and Tracking Services (ARTS) to run the numbers on the effect of Obamacare.

The commissioners did not approve a Memorial Day fireworks period. It was determined that this period fell during peak wheat harvest and would pose a fire danger.

Sheriff Randy Gerries reported that the daily attendance in the jail is running between 27-30 inmates with no outside prisoners being housed in the jail facility.

The commissioners will meet again on May 22, 2017 at 10 a.m. at the County Courtroom at the courthouse in Farwell. All meetings are open to the public.

The FISH Board of Trustees met in regular session on Monday, May 8 at the FISH Administration Building will all members in attendance.

Beverly Ingram and Annette Frye presented their students that are participating in the Reading Recovery Program. The students read to their writing projects to the board. Ingram and Frye went on to explain that the program, Summer Reading program, Mighty Writers and summer school in August. Currently they are conducting the fourth club contest, which awards these young writers. The students are asked to write a fun story that contains the theme of "Writers play with words to make their stories fun!" The deadline for these stories is this Friday, May 12.

Friona Junior High School Principal Mark Sundre presented his last activities report before he retires at the end of the school year. He explained to the board how the Junior High will combine the English Language Arts to use one teacher to instruct both English and Reading to provide more continuity.

"This has been a great Spring! It has gone really well," stated Sundre. "I've really enjoyed my nine years here. This is a comfortable town."

FHS Principal Erika Montana stated that they are done with STAR testing and that attendance for the testing was 100 percent. She

went on to state that at the Senior Awards held Sunday, May 7 there were \$60,000 in scholarships from the community. Each student that applied for a scholarship got one.

She went on to report that the FCCLA will be conducting a "Dude Be Nice" project and recognizing the FHS Cafeteria Staff this Friday. CASA will honor the senior class with a hot dog dinner at the City Park on Friday, May 2 from noon to 1 p.m.

Montana spoke with the board about the Ag Advisory Committee and their efforts to fill positions in the Ag Department at the High School. They look to fill the position by the end of this school year.

Primary Principal Ashley Smith updated the board on the security improvements that are being made at not only her building but also the portable buildings and the ECE building. She stated that the new cameras and locks have been installed and are connected to the computer in her office. The issue with the telephone system is being dealt with. Speakers have been installed to transmit outside the main building, cafeteria, and playgrounds.

FHS Athletic Director Jimmy Arias gave an update on his department and informed the board of upcoming camps for boys and girls basketball and volleyball. He stated at this point his staff is steady.

FISH Superintendent Dr. Pam

Ray informed the board that enrollment is at 1,132 students

The board approved the consent agenda and to pay the April bills.

Montana addressed the board about amending Honor Graduate criteria. The board tabled the issue until a policy could be written.

The board addressed the One-to-One iPad Initiative for 2017-2018 and after a detailed debate decided to table the issue until a survey of teachers could be taken

to determine the usage of iPads in the classroom in additional grade levels.

A 3.5 percent raise for custodial, maintenance, secretarial and paraprofessional staff was tabled at this time.

A contract with Lubbock Sports Medicine was discussed and approved for athletic training services to continue.

The board voted to retain the current board policy concerning

hiring authority of certified teachers and to align board policy with procedures regarding operating procedures.

The trustees will meet May 15 at 7 a.m. to canvas the ballots of the recent election and consider bids.

The next regular meeting of the board will be Monday, June 12, 2017 at 7 p.m. at the administration building. Meetings are open to the public.

Water level measurements reveal average decrease

Annual water level measurements indicate an average decrease of -0.52 of a foot in the groundwater levels of the Ogallala Aquifer within the 16-county High Plains Underground Water Conservation District (HPWD) service area from 2016 to 2017.

The 10-year district average change (2007-2017) is -8.84 feet while the five-year district average change (2012-2017) is -3.94 feet.

Water level measurements were made from December 2016 to March 2017 in 1,377 privately-owned water wells completed into the Ogallala/Edwards-Trinity (High Plains) Aquifer. In addition, HPWD personnel made water level measurements in 32 wells in the district's Dockum Aquifer observation well network.

"These current data are now available for viewing on the interactive web map at map.hpwd.org. We encourage area residents to visit the website and view charts of water level changes as well as the saturated thickness for each of the observation wells in the networks. Our online tools can help people understand the variability in saturated thickness and groundwater levels within the district," said HPWD General Manager Jason Coleman.

Results of the 2017 HPWD water level measurements are also presented in an 84-page report available for online viewing/downloading at www.hpwd.org/reports. A limited number of print copies are available by contacting the HPWD office at (806) 762-0181.

The HPWD Board of Directors and staff thank the many landowners and operators who continue to support the water level observation network by providing access to their wells for water level measurements each year.

"These measurements provide a wealth of important information that assists the district with its water conservation efforts. We greatly appreciate everyone's assistance," Coleman said.

Honorees from the Friena area were Treylin Griswold, Kenlea Barnes and Jayden Shearer (all from Farwell FFA); Chelsie Gomez and Tristan Castillo (both from Friena FFA); and Rachel Hromas (Lazbuddie FFA).

Of these, Kenlea Barnes, Jayden Shearer and Rachel Hromas each received a \$1,000 AgYouth Scholarship through a random drawing.

"Wednesday evening, we honored some of the

best and brightest young minds in Texas with this program," said AgTexas Farm Credit CEO Tim McDonald. He adds, "These students represent the next generation of agriculture in Texas and the United States. It's our privilege to pay tribute to their achievements thus far and encourage them for the future."

According to McDonald, the 4-H and FFA programs help introduce many of their participants to agriculture, allowing students to learn and apply science and technology to make farming and ranching more productive and offer promising futures.

"We are very pleased to have created the AgYouth of the Month program because it brings positive attention to young people who are investing in our state and nation as well as their own futures," added McDonald. He adds, "We have doubled last year's number of scholarships to benefit more of these deserving students."

Featured speakers were Hall-of-Fame Rodeo Announcer and AgTexas spokesman Bob Tallman, and John Smithwick, Texas State FFA Vice President and 2015-16 AgTexas AgYouth of the Month and scholarship recipient.

Farm Credit reports net income of \$46.8 Million in first quarter

Farm Credit Bank of Texas (FCBT), a wholesale bank that funds 14 rural lending cooperatives in five states, reported strong earnings and loan volume in the first quarter of 2017.

Loan volume increased 2.7 percent from year-end 2016 to \$16.3 billion at March 31, 2017. Total assets increased 2.6 percent to \$21.8 billion. Credit quality remained very strong, with 99.8 percent of the bank's overall loan portfolio classified as acceptable or special mention.

"Credit quality is among the best I've seen in my career," said Larry Doyle, FCBT chief executive officer and a Farm Credit veteran. "With highly diversified loans and strong capital, the bank remains well-positioned to provide the steady funding that is so essential for agriculture and rural America."

The bank funds locally owned Farm Credit lending cooperatives that provide financing and related services to farmers, ranchers and other rural bor-

rowers. It also participates with other lenders in loans to businesses that ag producers and rural communities rely on, such as food processors, agribusinesses and rural infrastructure companies.

Growth in earning assets contributed to the bank's \$46.8 million in net income and \$61.7 million in net interest income for the first quarter of 2017, increases of 11.1 percent and 8.4 percent, respectively, compared with the same period of 2016. The quarter's earnings also benefited from a \$1.6 million decrease in provision for loan losses.

Capital and liquidity levels continue to exceed the regulatory requirements set by the bank's federal regulator, the Farm Credit Administration. Cash and investments totaled \$5.2 billion, providing 207 days of liquidity.

"The bank focuses on staying strong and agile so we can meet the needs of people in agriculture and rural communities," said FCBT Board Chairman Jimmy

Dodson. "Farm Credit's mission is what sets us apart from other financial institutions."

The bank and its affiliated cooperatives across Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi, New Mexico and Texas constitute the Texas Farm Credit District, which reported combined loan volume of \$22.9 billion in the first quarter of 2017, an increase of 2.0 percent from year-end. District total assets were a record \$28.5 billion. At the end of the first quarter, 98.4 percent of district loans were classified as acceptable or special mention, compared with 98.5 percent at year-end.

Together, the district institutions reported \$111.7 million in net income for the first quarter of 2017, an increase of 13.3 percent from the same period in 2016.

The district is part of the Farm Credit System, a nationwide network of cooperatives established in 1916. Nationally, the System reported combined net income of \$1.24 billion for the first quarter of 2017, compared with \$1.16 billion a year earlier.

Parmer County named outstanding Conservation District

The Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District (Parmer SWCD) was established in 1949 with the goal of better assisting the farmers and ranchers of Parmer County in the conservation of its natural resources. In this past year the directors of Parmer SWCD have been motivated to make a difference in their community and to demonstrate that water conservation is attainable.

In the spring, they noticed a long-term problem of water run-off at the Farwell post office and decided to remedy it. They donated material and labor to install a drip irrigation system that minimized runoff and allowed the ground to soak in water. The result was a lush, tall garden, mostly made up of flower seeds that had overwintered in the soil from the previous year.

Parmer SWCD was active in seed sales last year, helping to save producers money. They have a plotter printer available to print large scale maps of farms and counties for their producers. Parmer County is also one of the few districts that offer a college scholarship every year to help

offset the cost of college to first year students pursuing agricultural studies.

Last year was a great year for Parmer SWCD in wind-break tree sales. They sold 967 trees and made a total profit of \$5,500. They also helped other nearby SWCD districts by offering to arrange shipping for their trees in order to cut costs.

Every year Parmer SWCD participates in the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board poster and essay contest. In 2016, they distributed 450 coloring pages with the theme of soil conservation for Kindergarten to 1st grade classes. Each entry was declared a winner and received a prize. They also supplied schools with 325 blank poster boards for the poster contest. The theme was "Local Heroes-Your Hardworking Pollinators" Each winner of the poster contest on the local level received a kit to grow their own Venus Fly Trap plant, and was entered in the Area Poster Contest.

Kiya Eddins, of Friona, was recognized at the annual banquet held Tuesday, May 2 in

Plainview. She earned second place with her entry in the junior category.

The Conservation Activity Program is one way that the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board can monitor the involvement of districts in the community and with other each other. Parmer SWCD was able to claim 9 out of 10 of their activities last year. They participated by implementing a local awards program for their first place poster winner, NRCS award winner and scholarship winner. Additionally they attended the Area Awards Program with their Wildlife Conservationist Award nominee, who won runner up. They helped to co-host a field day for producers, and sponsored an educational field day for high school students. The board members decided to send their clerk to Leadership Development training in Temple and were also able to get their county to officially declare April 24 to May 1, 2016, Soil Stewardship Week.

This year the Zone 1 Association meeting was held in Parmer County and the district did a fine

job of securing a venue, informative speakers, decorating and hosting the other Soil and Water Conservation District directors and clerks from their zone. They obtained a sponsor and were able to supply an excellent barbeque lunch. At the meeting, Parmer SWCD's chairman was nominated and accepted as a member of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board.

Because of the district's financial prosperity, in spring 2016 the board members began looking into ways that they could use their money to educate producers and preserve the local water supply. As farmers themselves, they were interested in the idea of drag line irrigation and the actual results and yields that it could bring with minimal water usage. So they began an experi-

mental program where they set up drag line at different lengths and intervals on a sprinkler to find out which way was the easiest and the most productive. They began keeping records and followed the progress of the experiment from the beginning of a corn crop through to the end. Then they documented the different yields in each different span. Because of this project they are more able to recommend and advise farmers on the viability, adaptations and limitations of this new means of water conservation.

The board members of Parmer SWCD are committed to making a personal and positive change in the way people consider conservation. Through education, financial support, community involvement and demonstration

they have been active throughout Parmer County.

The members of the Parmer Soil and Water Conservation District are dedicated to making a personal and positive change in the way people consider conservation.

At this year's Conservation Awards Banquet on Tuesday, May 2, 2017 Parmer County Soil and Water District was recognized as the winner for Outstanding Conservation District. While they were very active in the community this past year, the one project that pushed them over the edge for the award was their Highly Efficient Drag Line demonstration project.

They have set up a farm in Parmer County with drag line to test out the feasibility of using this particular water saving option in this climate. They will be testing the system out in many different situations and settings in a three year time frame and reporting on the results, yields, and water usage. This year starts the second season. Accepting the award were Mike Miller, Garrett Clark, Kevin Welch, Dennis Anthony and Todd Christian.

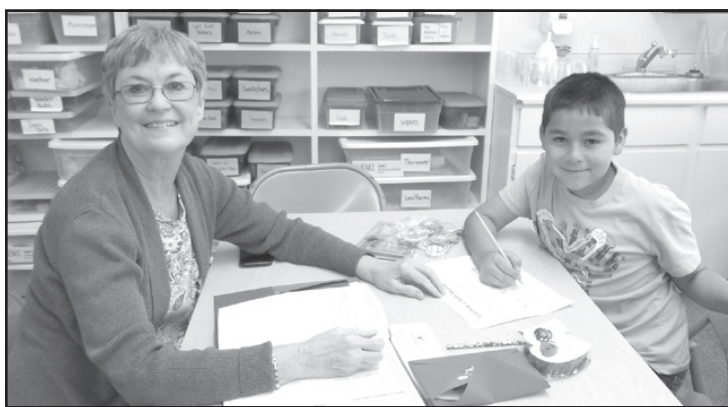
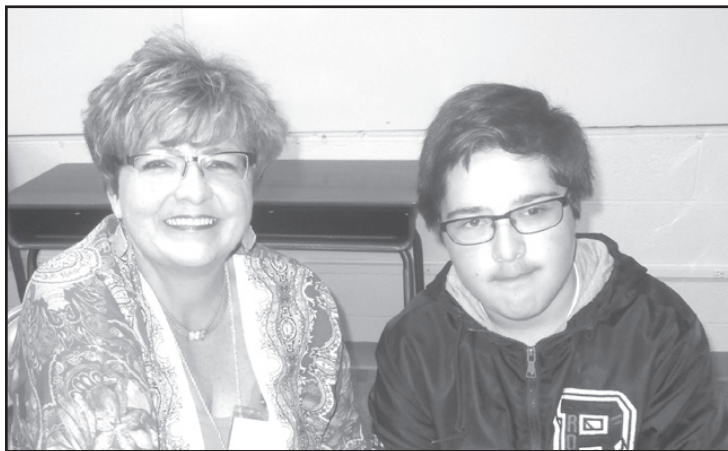
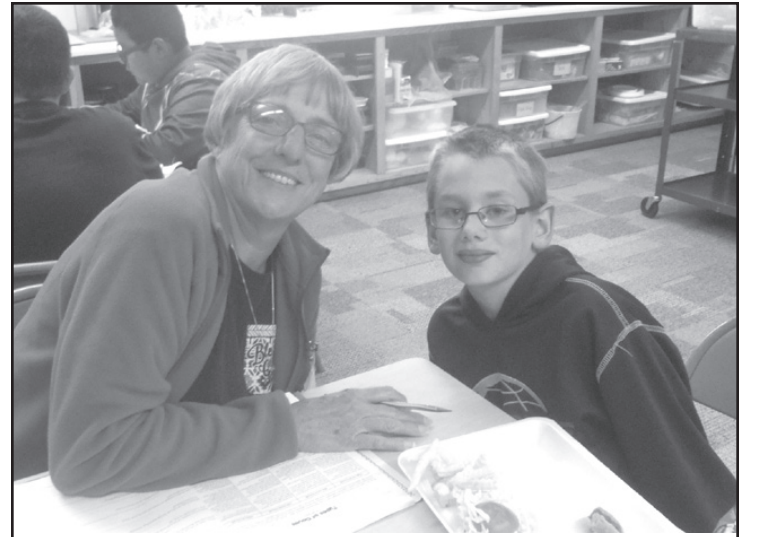
During the school year on Wednesday of each week, the students and their adult mentors, called BIGS, ate lunch together

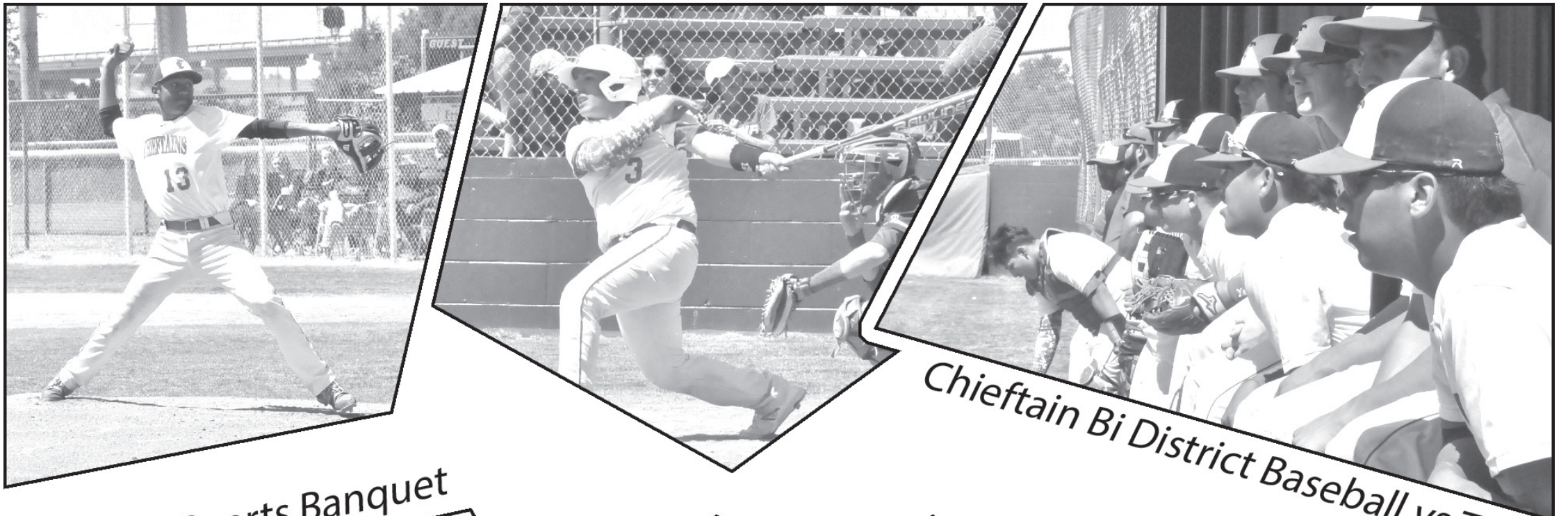
at school and worked on grade level math, reading or homework. They also participated in Hi-Pro's project sending gifts to soldiers and had two science days.

Pesina was named 2011 Texas Counselor of the Year before retiring from the Hereford school system.

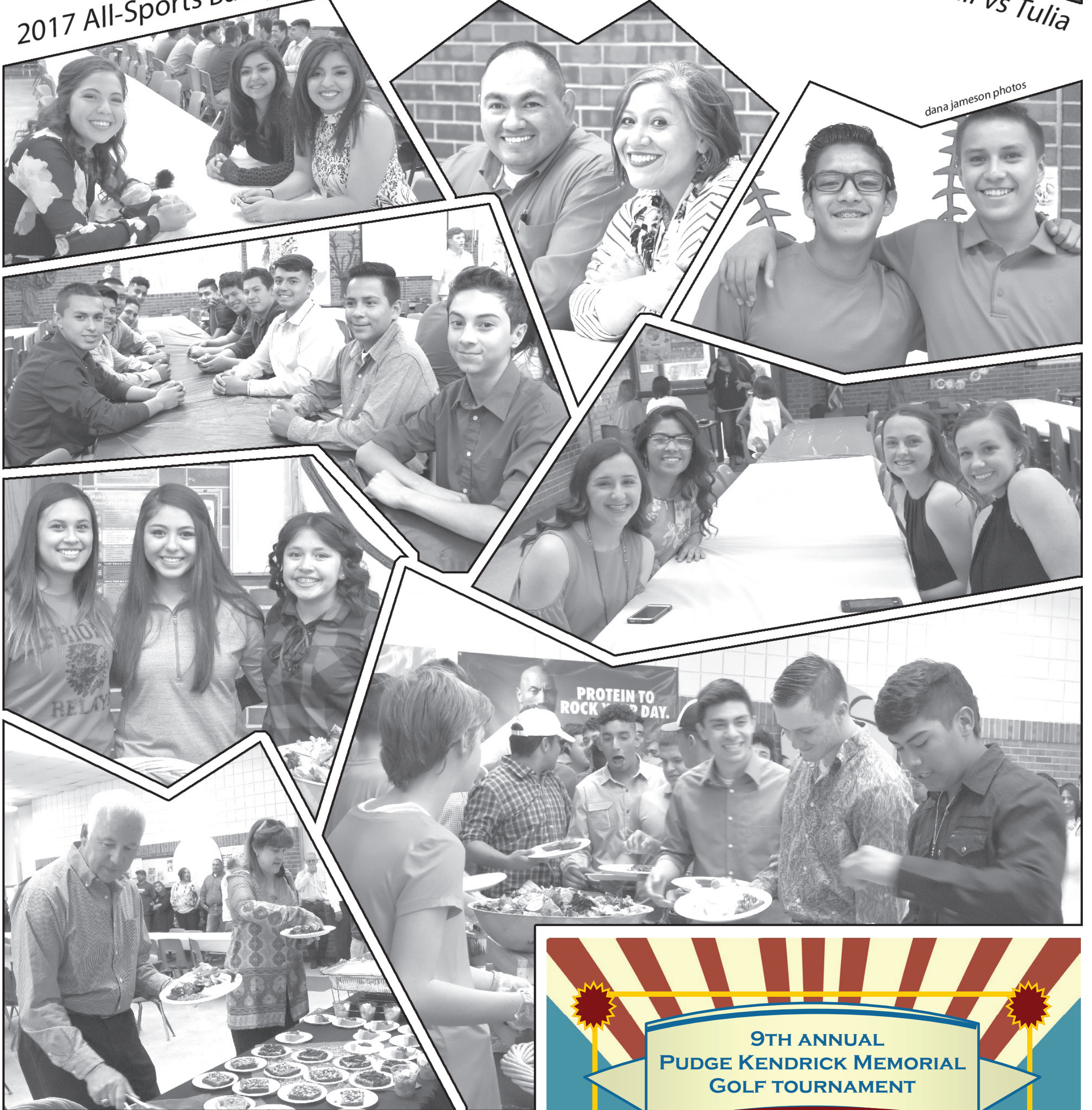
