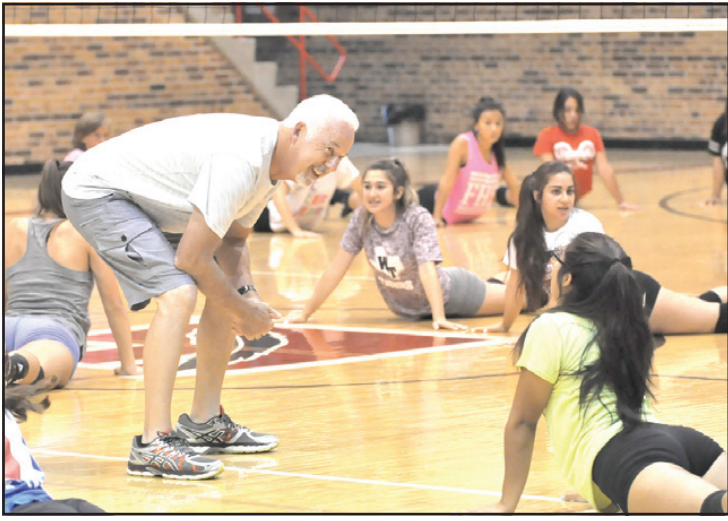

The 2017-18 school year will have students attending 175 days, which will be 77,875 minutes. There will be 12 teacher in-service days throughout the year.

Teachers will report to their campuses on Wednesday, August 9-16 for the first in-service of the year. Students will report to their campuses on Thursday, August 17.

Remember that the Texas Sales Tax Holiday is August 11-13. The law exempts most clothing, footwear, school supplies and backpacks priced below \$100 from sales tax, saving shoppers about \$8 on every \$100 they spend during the weekend.

This year, shoppers will save an estimated \$87 million in state and local sales taxes during the sales tax holiday.

Texas' tax holiday weekend has been an annual event since 1999.

It's always something!

For years, I have heard people say, "I'm not prejudice. I hate everyone!"

I think those people have taken over the media. There are people out there that hate everything, everyone and don't worry about how foolish they are perceived.

The latest hater was a man in Santa Fe that wrote a letter to the editor of the Santa Fe New Mexican that was published on July 26, 2017. He was protesting the annual 4th of July Pancakes on the Plaza event.

My first question was...How do you protest pancakes?

James Corcoran, of Santa Fe, wrote the following:

I hate to burst the bubble of Kim Alderwick ("Patriotic delight," Letters to the Editor, July 9), but Pancakes on the Plaza reeks of segregation and divisiveness. The Rotary Club, despite all of its good work in the community, has known for two years that this event isn't fit for everyone and they have chosen to ignore the facts.

Ethnic groups in our community have high levels of lactose intolerance (milk in the pancakes) including up to 100 percent of Asians and Native Americans, 60 percent to 80 percent of blacks and 50 percent to 80 percent of Latinos. Lactose (when intolerant) can cause diarrhea, nausea and abdominal cramps. Additionally, 100 percent of a large and growing population of vegans (estimated at 6,000 people) in Santa Fe oppose the consumption of cow milk and eggs for ethical, health and environmental reasons.

Why the Rotary Club ignores this social justice issue, is beyond reason. It stands to raise more money by being inclusive. The group has in its possession a cheaper, nearly five-star, vegan version of pancakes that everyone can enjoy. It's high time they flip the pancakes.

Mr. Corcoran has done his homework on race, lactose intolerance and vegan issues.

Personally, I am lactose intolerant and probably don't need the carbs in pancakes but a good stack of pancakes covered in butter and maple syrup is hard to beat.

I have cooked my fair share of pancakes for my family and with the Hereford Kiwanis. I never heard a complaint when people were lined up for their second, third, and even fifth helping of the yummy circular disks with an extra side of sausage.

If all of this was a social injustice, I need to be locked up for perpetuating the furthering of this hianus act against my fellow man.

In response, Walter Howerton, of Santa Fe, wrote the following letter on July 29, 2017:

I am a lactose lackey, a confirmed glutenist and a bonegnawing meat eater. And I am more than a little intolerant these days of pancake poobahism, virtuous veganism and the frequently self-diagnosed sub-

groups of hypochondriacs and neurotics that have puddled in Santa Fe ("No more pancakes," Letters to the Editor, July 26). These passively pushy people are like potholes — plentiful, unavoidable and in need of constant attention. Now one of them wants to save us from the reeking pancakes "of segregation and divisiveness" on the Santa Fe Plaza. A "social justice issue?" Please. Even in an age of huffy history and bou-tique-style "inclusiveness," this is too much. So pass the syrup! After a tasty breakfast we can go out — if it makes you feel better — and save a prairie dog or rescue a pooch from the pound and tether him on a short leash patiently braided from our own neuroses. You know. Fun, Santa Fe style. Meanwhile: Our Plaza, Our Pancakes, Ourselves.

The arguments they present could be applied to most festivals, fundraisers, and community centered activities around this country.

If we applied the arguments to our Cheeseburger Festival or Maize Days, Friona could become the center of all news

reports, simply because we are serving up meat, cheese, wheat products, and maize products. We are committing the ultimate of social injustices just by saying the words cheeseburger and maize. Heaven forbid that these social gatherings be seen as just that...social gatherings not social injustices.

There is so much more than the food being served at these events. There is the coming together of a community having fun and enjoying a beautiful day filled with food, games and friends.

People make up their own minds and make their own choices every day. Why is this any different?

The world is just TOO sensitive these days. Maybe those that are ultra-sensitive need to mind their own business. If they don't want to have symptoms of lactose intolerance, stay away from the pancakes or whatever bothers them. That is what I do. If I can't eat something without getting sick, I stay away from it.

I now understand the saying... "I'm not prejudice. I hate everyone!"

Salt Water Taffy: An American tradition

Who doesn't love it?! In an article I read, while waiting for a technician at my house, in the July/August 2017 Smithsonian magazine, "A Kiss of Summer", is a very interesting article about this unique 'summer' treat. In fact, it became very popular as a seaside treat because it would not melt like chocolate, but candy makers make it that flavor along with many, many others.

Named "Salt Water" Taffy because it had its beginnings near the seashore, first along the east coast and later along the west and gulf coasts, wherever beachcombers congregated. There is no salt water in the recipes, however, which are family secrets that can go back as far as the 1890's. Candy pulling machines have been around for many, many years also.

Some of the premier shops

along with some of their most popular flavors include-- Shriver's, Ocean City, New Jersey since 1898 with very traditional vanilla, strawberry and chocolate. Dolle's, Ocean City, Maryland since 1910 with flavors like peanut butter filled vanilla, chocolate and banana. Haven's Candies, Portland, Maine established 1915 serving peanut butter, sea salt caramel, watermelon, beach ball and blueberry. Taffy Shop, Estes Park, Colorado began in 1935 serving cinnamon, Texas Pecan and salted caramel. Ainslee's Salt Water Taffy, Depoe Bay, Oregon started in 1947 and has peanut butter, black licorice and hot cinnamon. Sweet's, now of Salt Lake City, Utah began in Portland, Oregon but moved to Salt Lake City to take advantage of the sugar beets grown there and uses a different

more nougat-like recipe, which is not pulled.

An average batch is about 50 pounds and from that can come 2,000 pieces of candy. From an output of 300 pounds a day in the early days, to today's 10,000 pounds per day using 120,000 pounds of sugar and 225,000 pounds of corn syrup annually. As you know, America has quite a sweet tooth. Hot weather and humidity affect both the recipe and the candy making process, so makers then cook it to a higher temperature so that it will not be too sticky.

Steps in the process are cook, cool, pull, stretch, cut and wrap. Some machines can wrap up to 500 pieces of candy per minute...doesn't that just make you hungry for some? One of my favorite flavors not mentioned is peppermint.

"They have been successful in convincing some customers that their bills are past due and the only way to avoid disconnection is to pay over the phone. Customers who are targeted in this way can simply hang up and immediately check the mobile app to see how much is owed, when the payment is due, and make payments through the secure online payment system."

The new Xcel Energy app also includes an outage map that shows where outages are occurring, how many customers are affected and when power is expected to be restored. Customers may also choose to have notifications emailed or texted to them if power is out in their area.

"It's much easier to weather a power outage if you know how widespread the outage might be, and when to expect your lights to come back on," Trammell said.

Customers may still connect with Xcel Energy by telephone and email, and also through social media, and the app has a "contact us" page listing that contact information.



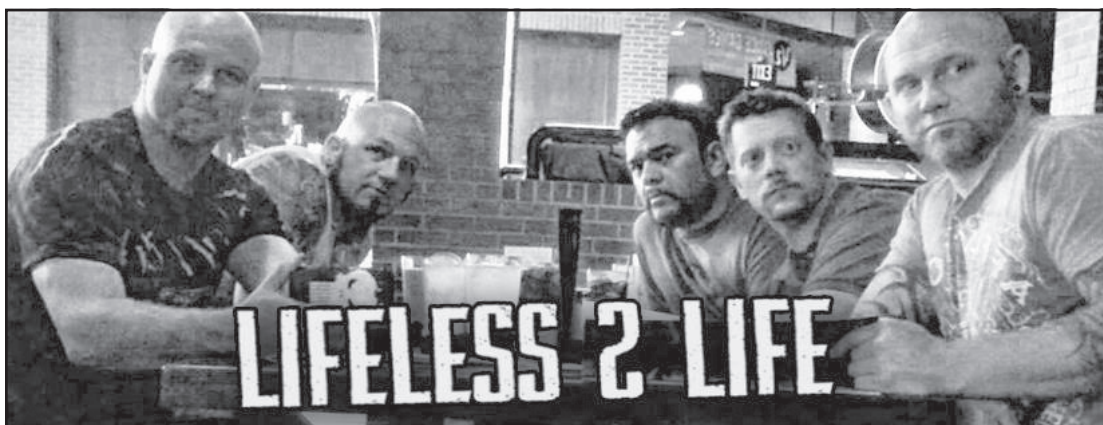
Tarango will follow with a fire-d-up, inspiring message, as only Turok can do it.

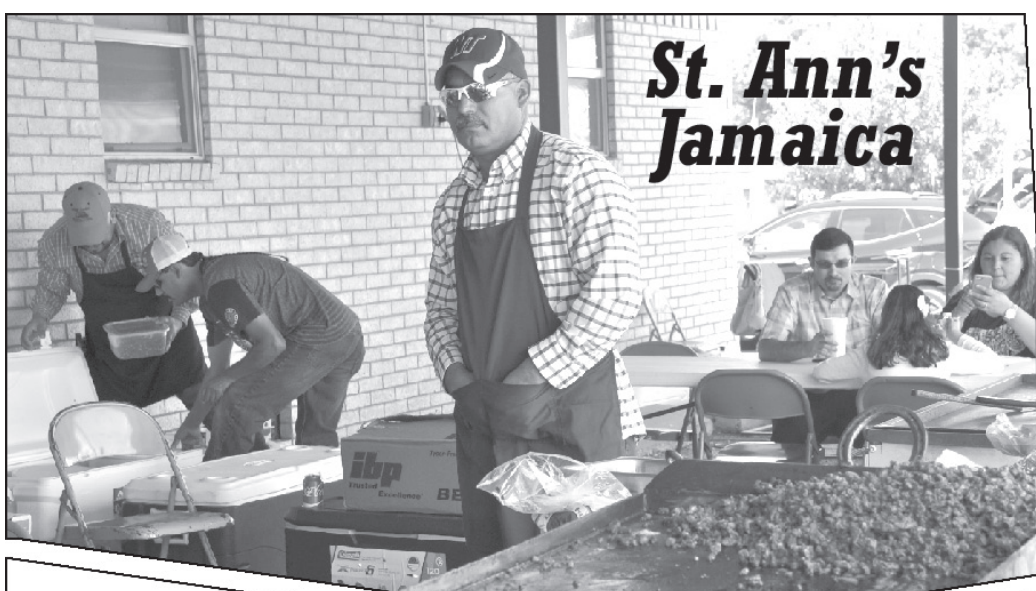

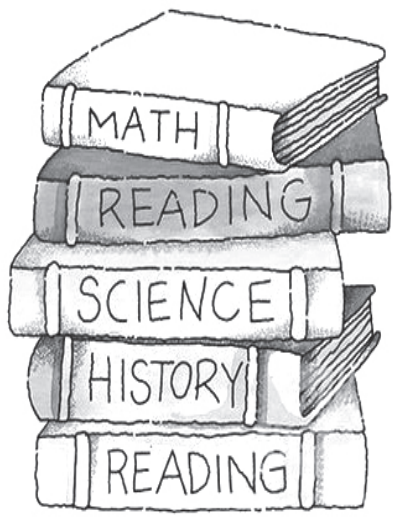
