### Parmer County Cancer Coalition 'Pink Out' Oct. 27

As part of Breast Cancer Awareness Month the Parmer County Cancer Coalition (PCCC) will once again be sponsoring the "Pink Out" football game in Friona. This year the Pink Out game will be Friday, October 27 as the Chieftains host the Muleshoe Mules. Show your support and Pink Out Chieftain Field. T-shirt orders are being taken until Monday, October 2. Order forms are available at the Chamber office and the Friona Public Library and in the Friona Star. Forms will be distributed to the Primary and Elementary schools as well.

October 1-31 is Breast Cancer Awareness Month. In 1985, the American Cancer Society and the pharmaceutical division of Imperial Chemical In-

dustries (now part of AstraZeneca) formed a partnership. The aim of the partnership was to promote mammography as the most effective weapon in the fight against breast cancer.

National Breast Cancer Awareness Month is an annual international health campaign organized by major breast cancer charities every October to increase awareness of the disease and to raise funds for research into its cause, prevention, diagnosis, treatment and cure.

The pink ribbon that is so visible today was established as the symbol for the Breast Cancer Research Foundation by Evelyn Lauder, Senior Corporate Vice President of the Estee Lauder Companies. In 1991, the Susan G. Komen

Foundation handed out pink ribbons to participants in its New York City race for breast cancer survivors.

Parmer County Cancer Coalition was founded in May 2010. They have a seven-person board that governs the registered 501 (c)3 charity.

PCCC raises money locally to fund a grant program to financially assist residents of Parmer County that are being treated for cancer. The application process is simple and the funds can be used for everything from rent to utility bills, to transportation costs and medical bills.

PCCC averages about \$10,000 a year in grants given out since 2010. Over the past seven years, they have given out approximately \$70,000.

Each year PCCC contributes 10 percent of their revenue to the American Cancer Society to help the bigger cause of cancer research.

Yearly fundraising events include a "Coins for a Cure" drive at the schools in May and the Pink Out games during October. For the past several years, they have been the beneficiary of the Pudge Kendrick Memorial Golf Tournament.

PCCC accepts memorials and donations at any time of the year. No other funding sources exist except through the generosity of Parmer County residents.

In the past, PCCC has been honored by the Amarillo Area Breast Cancer Coalition as their "Charity of the Year" and have worked with them to promote free mammograms to uninsured county residents.

PCCC will be running a grant application in the Friona Star throughout the month of October for those that may need funding.

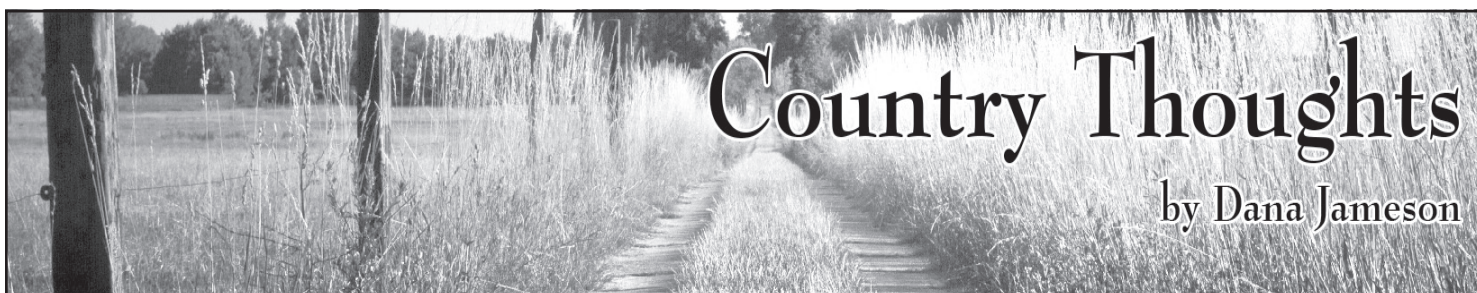

# Country Thoughts

## Small town vs. Big city

Living in a small town is pretty much all I have ever known. I grew up in Muleshoe. (Please do not hold that against me.) I have spent time in Olton, Dimmitt and Hereford. Yes, I even lived in Lubbock for four years but I missed small town life most every minute of those four years.

There are drawbacks to living anywhere.

In a small town, your choices for dining are few. However, the best food in the world comes from a small town, home-owned restaurant. There seems to be more love put into each dish. Moreover, it is served with a smile and good conversation.

In the big city, your choices are infinite. I found that I usually wound up going to the same restaurants and ordering the same thing on a regular basis but not really enjoying it.

In a small town, your choice of grocery stores is pretty limited to...ONE! Nevertheless, everyone in that store knows you and smiles when they meet you in the middle of an aisle. When you check out, the person checking your groceries will carry on a conversation about more than what you bought. In fact, they will talk to you about the latest football, volleyball, or basketball game. (Or, in my case, what was in the newspaper this week!)

In the big city, there are grocery stores on every corner. Depending on what groceries I was looking for, I would go to the same store and very rarely ventured into a new store once I found the closest thing to a small town grocery store.

Entertainment in a small town is usually driving around checking out someone's beautiful yard, looking at Christmas lights, checking out the water level of Reeve Lake or just staying home with

family having a cookout or just watching television together.

Entertainment in the big city is frustrating. There is something to do every minute of every day. Living in the big city was like being on overload all the time. There are movie theaters all over town so you could see just about anything at any time indoor or outdoor. If you were in the frame of mind for an alcoholic beverage, there was every kind of establishment from sports bars to dive bars. Concerts were plentiful but finding the money to attend them was sometimes a bit difficult so I would stay home and enjoy my lawn, family and just relax before going back out into the hubbub of the city on Monday.

Traffic in a small town is four or five cars held up at the light. If I need to run to the grocery store, I just jump in the car and I am sitting in front of the store in less than 5 minutes. Work, for me, is less than 5 minutes from home.

Traffic in the big city is something that has to be planned. In Lubbock on Texas Tech game day or a concert evening, I learned to avoid that part of town because going -2 miles per hour is the norm. You have to plan traffic and parking into every outing. Running to the grocery store takes on a new meaning of frustration.

When I lived in Lubbock, I knew that work was 15-30 minutes from my home and would allot 45 minutes. I lived on 19th Street and worked on 50th Street and it was a straight shot from home to work by way of Milwaukee Street and should have taken 10 minutes ... tops. However, there is a Starbucks on that route and there was ALWAYS an accident in front of it. (I have never been to a Starbucks for coffee...I drove by it for 4 years and determined that coffee

was not that important if having an accident was part of the routine.)

Special occasions, like festivals, draw in thousands of people in Lubbock. So many people in fact that the only people you know are the ones that came with you. You are lost in a sea of people whose only interest is themselves.

Special occasions in a small town, like Maize Days or the Cheeseburger Festival, draw in their share of people. But in most cases as I walk through the park taking pictures, I know many of the faces and there are genuine smiles. I do not feel lost in a sea of people and know that if something happens there will be someone there to help.

I still go to Amarillo or Lubbock occasionally to enjoy some of the flavor and activities but I am always glad to see the Friona city limits and know that my home is here.

In my humble opinion, small town life is the best. The stresses are fewer. And best of all...the people are nicer.

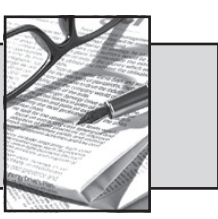

## Chiefs thump Mustangs 48-13

The Friona Chiefs hosted the Bovina Mustangs for Homecoming 2017 last Thursday, September 14 and came away with a resounding 48-13 win. The game was delayed during the second quarter due to lightning.

Sergio Flores carried the ball 41 times for 273 yards and four touchdowns. Quarterback Marco Monreal carried 19 times for 86 yards and one touchdown. Julius Orozco carried 8 times for 50 yards and one touchdown. Rodrigo Munoz carried for 44 yards in four carries. Marco Maldonado carried for 64 yards in six carries while Eduardo Chaves carried once for two yards.

Maldonado led the Chiefs in receiving with two receptions for 33 yards. Jonathan Hernandez had three receptions for 24 yards. Rocky

Barrios had on reception for 20 yards while Munoz had one reception for 13 yards.

Monreal had 10 completions in 20 attempts for 98 yards and one touchdown. Punter Jonathan Hernandez punted twice for 73 yards. Kicker Sergio Flores completed six of seven attempts for extra points.

The Chiefs executed 99 plays for 617 yards, which is an average of 6.2 yards per play.

For the season, Flores leads the Chiefs with 77 carries for 550 yards and five touchdowns. Maldonado leads in receptions with 10 for 196 yards and three touchdowns. Hernandez has punted three times for 120 yards and Flores has completed 14 of 16 extra point attempts.

The Chiefs travel to Floydada this Friday to take on the Whirlwinds at 7:30 p.m.

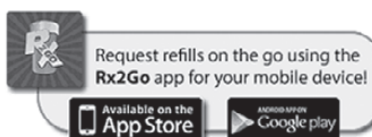

The thing that scared me the most was this plane ride, because I've never been on one before. When I was told "you're going on an airplane", I went home and search "what to experience on your first flight," and as Google works I was re-directed to a page with about 5,190,000 results in about .59 seconds. This number did not give me any sense of comfort. I read all the articles and watched all the YouTube videos I possibly could before it was time to go on the trip, to understand what was going on. Thank you all once again for giving us this wonderful experience that allowed to become more responsible citizens for our cities, state and nation.

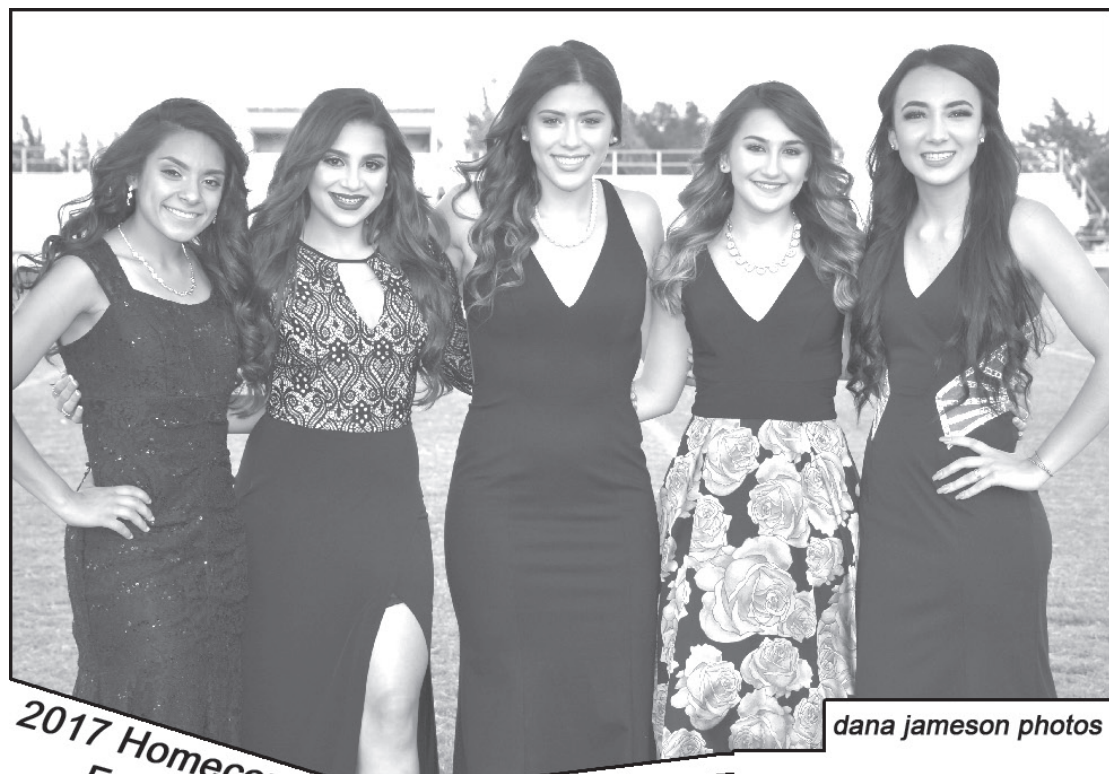
## Guadalupe Macias, Friona

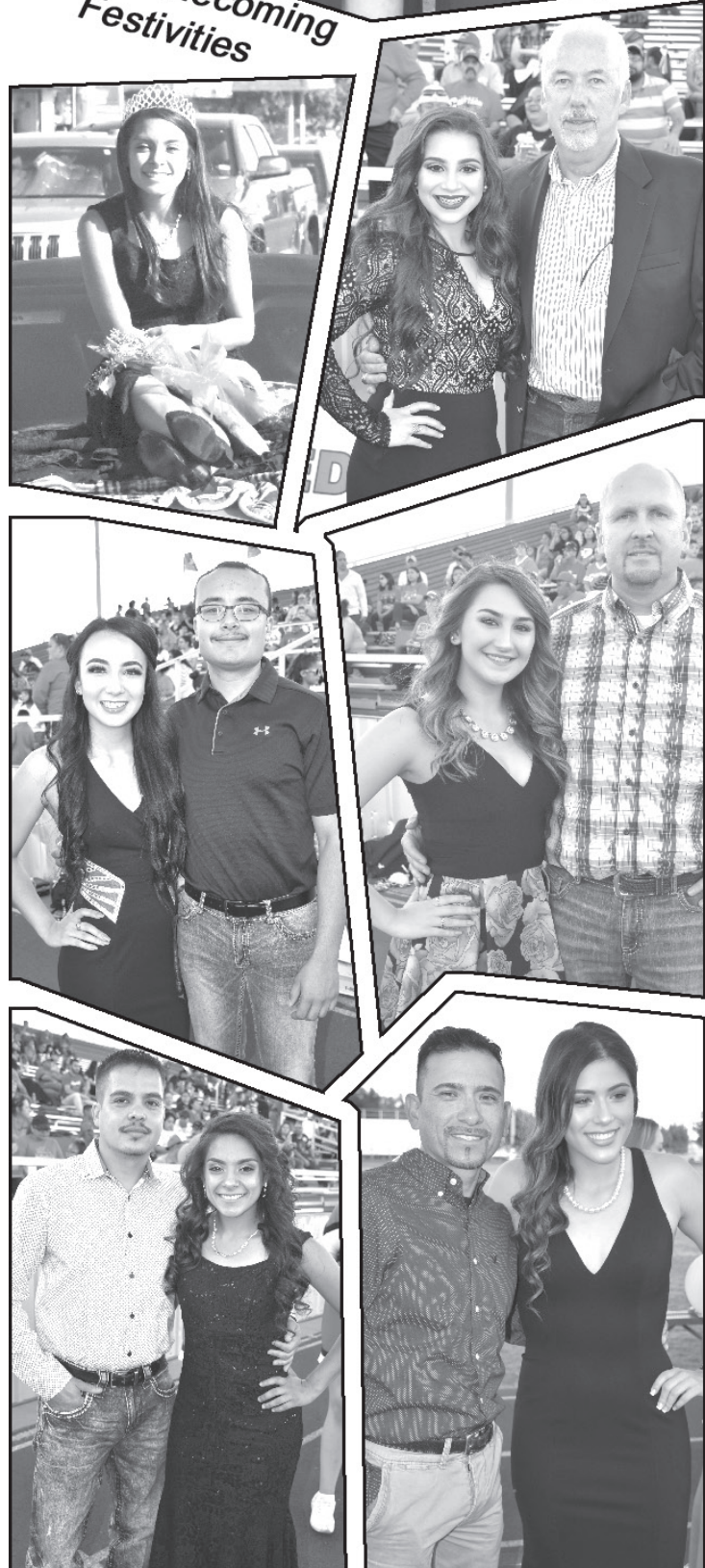

### PUBLIC NOTICE Brief Explanatory Statements of Proposed Constitutional Amendments Special Election, November 7, 2017

#### Proposition Number 1 (HJR 21)

HJR 21 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the Texas legislature to expand the circumstances under which a partially disabled veteran or their spouse may qualify for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of part of the market value of the veteran's residence homestead. Currently, the Texas legislature may provide that a partially disabled veteran or their spouse is entitled to an exemption from ad valorem taxation of a percentage of the market value of the disabled veteran's residence homestead only if the residence homestead was donated to the disabled veteran by a charitable organization at no cost to the veteran. The amendment would allow the Texas legislature to provide that the exemption also may be taken when the residence homestead was donated, sold, or transferred to the disabled veteran by a charitable organization for less than the market value of the residence homestead. The amendment also harmonizes certain related provisions of the Texas Constitution.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of part of the market value of the residence homestead of a partially disabled veteran or the surviving spouse of a partially disabled veteran if the residence homestead was donated to the disabled veteran by a charitable organization for less than the market value of the residence homestead and harmonizing certain related provisions of the Texas Constitution."

#### Proposition Number 2 (SJR 60)

SJR 60 proposes a constitutional amendment to require that certain conditions be met for the refinancing of a home equity loan to be secured by a voluntary lien on a homestead. The amendment also would: redefine what is excluded in the calcu-

lation of the cap on fees associated with a home equity loan, lower the cap from 3% to 2% of the original principal amount of the extension of credit, and specify that such fees are in addition to any bona fide discount points used to buy down the interest rate. The amendment would further specify the list of authorized lenders to make home equity loans, change the threshold for an advance of a home equity line of credit, allow agricultural property owners to acquire home equity loans, and update technical terminology in the Texas Constitution. The amendment would be effective on January 1, 2018, and applicable only to a home equity loan made or refinanced on or after that date.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to establish a lower amount for expenses that can be charged to a borrower and removing certain financing expense limitations for a home equity loan, establishing certain authorized lenders to make a home equity loan, changing certain options for the refinancing of home equity loans, changing the threshold for an advance of a home equity line of credit, and allowing home equity loans on agricultural homesteads."

#### Proposition Number 3 (SJR 34)

SJR 34 proposes a constitutional amendment that would prevent certain office holders from serving indefinitely beyond the expiration of their term. Office holders who are appointed by the Governor and confirmed by the Senate and receive no salary would only be able to serve until the last day of the first regular session of the Texas legislature that begins after their term expires.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment limiting the service of certain office-holders appointed by the governor and confirmed by the senate after the expiration of the person's term of office."

#### Proposition Number 4 (SJR 6)

SJR 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Texas legislature to require any court that is hearing a challenge to

the constitutionality of a state statute to notify the attorney general of that challenge, if the party raising the challenge notifies the court that the party is challenging the constitutionality of such statute. Additionally, the amendment would allow the Texas legislature to set a period of not more than 45 days following the notification to the attorney general that the court must wait before rendering a judgment that a state statute is unconstitutional.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to require a court to provide notice to the attorney general of a challenge to the constitutionality of a state statute and authorizing the legislature to prescribe a waiting period before the court may enter a judgment holding the statute unconstitutional."

#### Proposition Number 5 (HJR 100)

HJR 100 proposes a constitutional amendment to provide a more detailed definition of "professional sports team" for purposes of their charitable foundations, which the Texas legislature may permit to hold charitable raffles. The amendment also deletes a requirement that an eligible professional sports team charitable foundation permitted by the Texas legislature to hold charitable raffles had to be in existence on January 1, 2016.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment on professional sports team charitable foundations conducting charitable raffles."

#### Proposition Number 6 (SJR 1)

SJR 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Texas legislature by general law to provide that a surviving spouse of a first responder who is killed or fatally injured in the line of duty is entitled to receive an exemption from ad valorem taxation from all or part of the market value of the surviving spouse's residence homestead, as long as the surviving spouse has not remarried since the death of the first responder. It would also allow the Texas legislature to provide that the surviving spouse, who qualifies

and receives the exemption and then qualifies a different property as the surviving spouse's residence homestead, receive an exemption from ad valorem taxation of the different homestead in an amount equal to the dollar amount of the exemption of the first homestead for which the exemption was received in the last year in which the surviving spouse received the exemption for that first homestead. Like the initial exemption, this benefit will only remain available if the surviving spouse has not remarried since the death of the first responder. The proposed amendment would apply only to ad valorem taxes imposed for a tax year beginning on or after January 1, 2018.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a first responder who is killed or fatally injured in the line of duty."

#### Proposition Number 7 (HJR 37)

HJR 37 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Texas legislature to make an exception to the law regarding the award of certain prizes. Currently, the Texas Constitution requires the Texas legislature to pass laws prohibiting lotteries, raffles, and other programs where the award of gifts is based on luck or chance. The proposed amendment would make an exception to this general rule to allow the Texas legislature to authorize credit unions and other financial institutions to institute programs which, in order to encourage savings, would award prizes based on luck or chance to the credit union's or financial institution's customers.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment relating to legislative authority to permit credit unions and other financial institutions to award prizes by lot to promote savings."

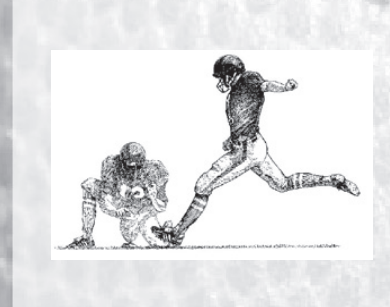
