Xcel Energy seeks to lower customer bills in Texas

Residential bills to drop by more than 6 percent May 1 to reflect cheaper natural gas

AMARILLO, Texas (April 6, 2018) – Lower prices for the natural gas Xcel Energy uses to produce electricity at area generating plants are leading the company to reduce the monthly fuel charges Texas customers pay, a move that will result in lower bills going into the summer months.

If the adjustment to Xcel Energy's fuel factors is approved by the Public Utility Commission of Texas, a typical residential customer using 1,000 kilowatt-hours per month will see an average monthly decrease of \$6.95 – or 6.3 percent starting May 1. Fuel costs on New Mexico customer bills are adjusted monthly, so New Mexico customers are already seeing these savings on their bills.

"Fuel costs make up about a third of a typical residential bill, and they include the cost to purchase natural gas and coal to fuel our generating stations, as well



as the cost of power purchased off our system," said David Hudson, president, Xcel Energy – Texas. "Natural gas prices have fallen 47 percent over the past year, which is the main factor in bringing down our overall fuel costs."

Fuel costs are dollar-for-dollar, pass-through charges that, in recent years, have risen and fallen primarily because of volatility in the cost of natural gas used to produce close to 40 percent of the region's electricity supply. Xcel Energy does not earn profit on fuel costs. Texas fuel costs increased twice between October 2016 and February 2017 when natural gas market prices were trending higher.

"Though natural gas prices are at his-

toric lows now, they likely won't stay that way," Hudson said. "This is why we are focusing our efforts on controlling fuel costs by making our generation and delivery systems more efficient and adding new supplies of wind energy."

Clean energy resources such as wind and solar have no associated fuel costs, a primary reason the company is seeking to add 1,230 additional megawatts of wind generation to the regional generating mix. The company is awaiting approval from the Public Utility Commission of Texas to build large wind farms near Plainview, Texas, and Portales, N.M. Regulators in New Mexico have already approved the plan.

"If our wind expansion plan is approved, customers can expect further fuel cost decreases in 2019 and 2020 when these new wind facilities come on line," Hudson said.

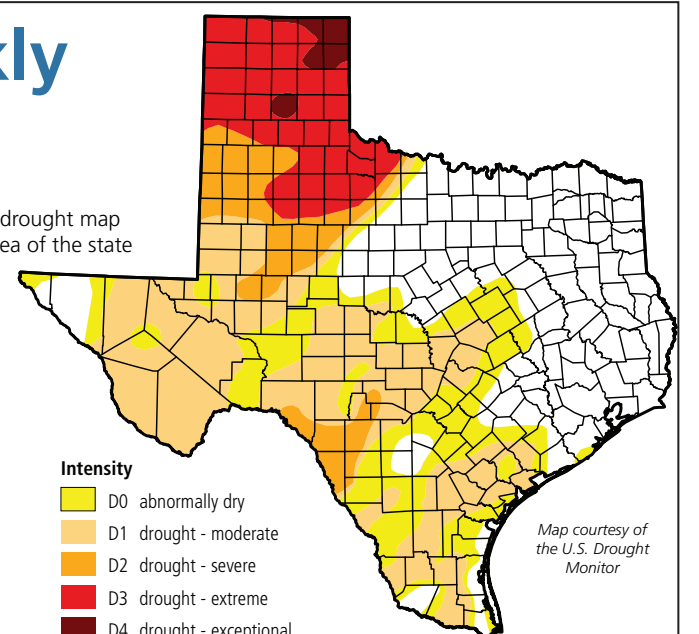

Greetings! Friona, Texas has been selected to be the official first overnight stop in Texas for "America's Run for the Fallen" planned for May 16, 2018. In one of the most comprehensive tributes ever organized, the Honor & Remember Team will run for every service member who died as recorded by the Department of Defense from October 12, 2000 to date. The run will last 4 months, covering 6,000 miles, 19 states and honoring 20,000 casualties. The run began on April 7 at Fort Irwin, CA and will end on August 5 at the Arlington National Cemetery. This is how the nationwide run will work: Each day will encompass 50 miles. There will be a pre-staked Hero Marker to identify the stop for every mile. The runner will arrive at the Hero Marker and stop, carrying a 3x5 American flag and the Hero's bio. The runner will read the rank, name, branch and the date of death of each hero. The bio will be placed on

the Hero Marker, the runner will step back, come to attention and salute. Each stop will take 90 seconds or less. The runners will pay respect to any present family members with a hug. Specific things that Friona will be providing are: Police escort from Cargill into town, stopping at Friona Inn, and an ambulance/medical staff to address any medical issues. The team will be fed dinner that evening and breakfast the next morning, and rooms will be provided for their overnight stay. Leander Davila and Chris Alexander are teaming up to organize and meet the needs and requests from the team. Mark your calendar, May 16, 2018 at approximately 4:30PM-5:00PM, and join us in showing our Texas pride and patriotism, honoring those who have served our country so that we can enjoy the liberties and freedom of this great country. If you want to read more about this great event, go to www.run-forthe-fallen.org. News Channel 10 has been notified and invited to record this event.

We will be losing a police officer—Lt. Pedro Sanchez will join the Canadian Police Department working with the K9 unit. Lt. Sanchez has done a great job and we wish him great success in his new job. His position has been posted on the Texas Municipal League website. City Manager, Leander Davila, is exploring the idea of creating a reserve police officer program made up of police officers from Bovina, and Farwell and the Parmer County Sheriff's department to help us until this position can be filled.

"Keep Friona Clean Campaign" will continue through June. The city will do specific things each month to continue supporting this campaign. Things being done in April: Republic Services will mail out a postcard to all residents specifically identifying the things that can be placed in the dumpsters

and what cannot. We will advertise the oil collection bin for the city in the Friona Star (more information in the Friona Star the week of April 19). We will inform the residents that the roll-off containers located beside the city barn will be open the first Saturday of each month. This is a free service to all citizens. One container is available to dump steel/metal, refrigerators/AC units, electronics/appliances. The other container accepts furniture/mattresses. Items that are not allowed are tree branches or limbs. In efforts to prevent any dumping issues, please call the city office and inquire about the items you wish to dump.

Chief Jimenez and the officers responded to 195 calls in March. There were 90 stops, 53 warnings, 32 citations and 6 arrests. (1-resisting arrest, 1-public intoxication, 2-driving while intoxicated and 2-no drivers license). The officers drove a total of 2,707 miles patrolling and protecting our city.

Emergency Medical Service made 29 total runs in March. There were 9 calls for emergency, 17 transfers and 3 calls ended in a "no transport". Total billing collected was \$15,792.00.

Friona's Volunteer Fire Department responded to 3 emergency calls in March. Eleven firefighters and four trucks responded to a deck fire in a backyard on March 2. Nine firefight-

ers and three trucks responded to a grass fire on March 4 and on March 22, five firefighters and one truck responded to a car accident. We are very proud and thankful for the great work the volunteers do handling all of the emergencies in our city and county.

Friona Public Library had 686 patron visits in March, an average of 42 per day and open 21 days. There were 841 items circulated and 52 new items added to the inventory. The Library is gearing up for the summer reading events. Lucy and staff do a great job each year promoting different programs in the summer.

FEMA has sent out notifications to eligible organizations that there are 10,000 meal kits available at the Fort Worth, Texas Warehouse. The meals are going to expire in 3 months. FEMA is offering these meals at \$1.00 per box, which consist of 12 entrees, 12 starches, 12 fruits, 12 desserts and 12 cutlery kits. The City of Friona is pursuing the possibility of purchasing several boxes. I have often wondered what these meals taste like that are fed to people that have been involved in a catastrophe. We will notify all citizens if we get these boxes purchased. Hopefully we can get this done and let people try these meals, those who want to.

National Work Zone Awareness important safety reminder

In recognition of National Work Zone Awareness Week (April 9-13) the Texas Department of Transportation reminds drivers that every day requires caution when driving through work zones. In 2017, work zone fatalities in Texas increased 9 percent over the previous year, resulting in 199 deaths and 813 serious injuries. With 4 percent of those fatalities being road crew workers, the remaining 96 percent was comprised of motorists, pedestrians, and bicyclists.

"We always urge drivers to exercise great caution and obey traffic laws, especially in work zones," said TxDOT Executive Director James Bass. "Doing so helps ensure everyone – motorists and work crews – gets home safely to their loved ones."

As the state's population continues to boom, the price of progress can mean more than 2,500 active TxDOT work zones at any given time. In 2017, there were 27,148 work zone crashes in Texas, an increase of 5 percent over 2016. The leading causes of statewide work zone crashes – speeding and driver inattention – are entire preventable. Fines in work zones double when workers are present and can cost up to \$2,000. "Roadside crews often work only a few feet from fast-moving traffic," Bass said. "Driver vigilance is paramount to ensuring the safety of everyone in the work zone. We urge anyone driving through a work zone to minimize distractions, give their full attention to the road and be prepared to slow down or stop on short notice." As part of its ongoing Work Zone Awareness campaign, TxDOT also reminds drivers of the Move Over/Slow Down law, which requires drivers to move over or slow down when approaching TxDOT crews, law enforcement, emergency vehicles, or tow trucks stopped on the roadside or shoulder with flashing blue or amber lights. Failure to do so can result in fines up to \$2,000.

To further help raise awareness about the need for driver responsibility in work zones, TxDOT is partnering with Austin-based Texas Mutual Insurance Company to spread the campaign message around the state. An integral part of Texas Mutual's mission – helping employers prevent workplace incidents and minimizing their consequences – aligns with TxDOT's Work Zone Awareness efforts.

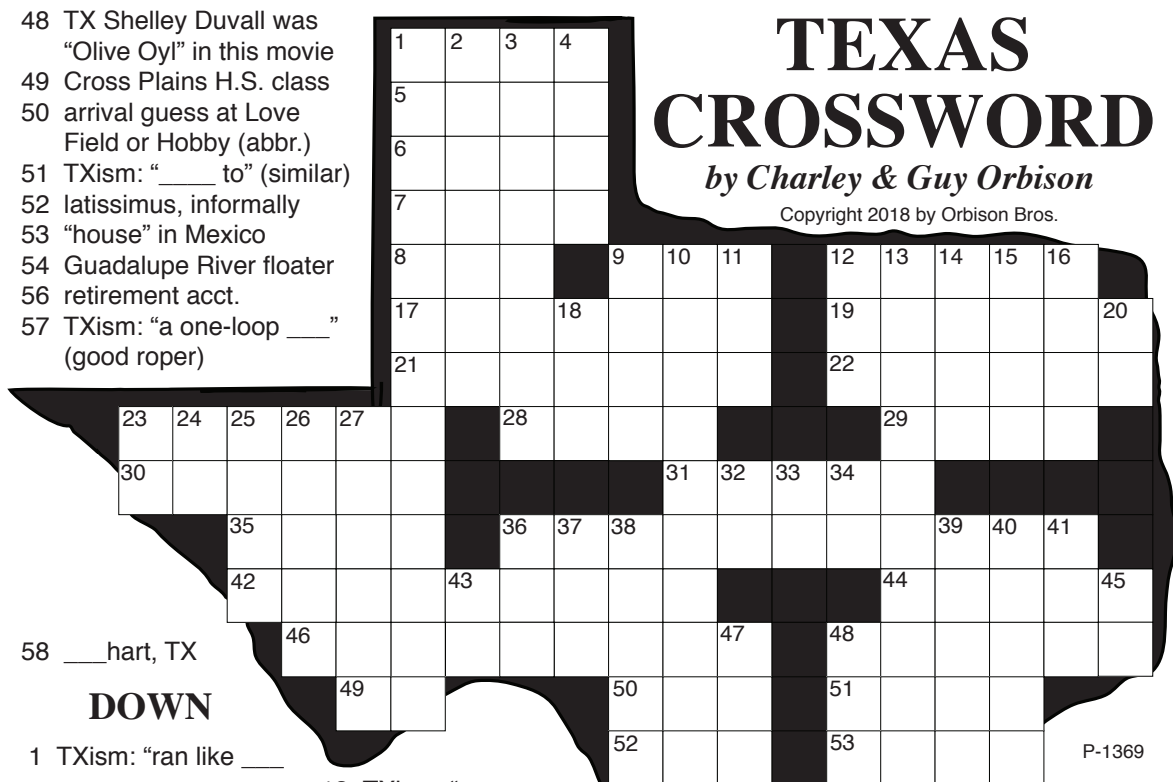

Highway 60 last weekend. Ralph Broyles operated the machine shop from the 1960s until about 2003. Ralph and his wife Dean both passed away within six months of each other in 2010. The children are liquidating the estate and may have an auction in the near future.

July 28—The Parmer/Baily County Crime Stoppers announced that they have a new coordinator for the group. Sgt. Matthew Kropp of the Parmer County Sheriff's Office was voted in at the meeting on Monday, July 16. Matthew is very interested in the group and highly motivated to help the Crime Stoppers grow and be more visible in the communities they serve.

October 6—A historical marker just east of Black was formally dedicated Sunday October 2. About a dozen folks attended the brief ceremony. The project was coordinated by the Parmer County Historical Commission. Gladys Spring, commission chairman, and her husband Don Spring welcomed the guests. Rev. Kurt Borden of the Friona Methodist Church gave the invocation. Ricky Barnett, whose family has long farmed in the Black community, gave a brief history of the area, which once had a school, grocery store, a church, and post office among other businesses.

December 1—A group of Texas Tech Landscape and Architectural students were in Friona recently to survey the Reeve Lake area and design various plans to beautify the area and make it more available for recreation activities. The project is being done as part of their course at Texas Tech. Later the same day the group will present their plans to the Friona city council and the Friona Economic Development Corporation. State Sales Tax Revenue Totaled \$2.4 Billion in March

(AUSTIN) — Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar today said state sales tax revenue totaled \$2.4 billion in March, 7.2 percent more than in March 2017.

"Sales tax revenue rose for almost all major economic sectors, indicating growth in both business and consumer spending," Hegar said. "Receipts from the oil and gas mining, construction and manufacturing sectors, as well as retail trade and restaurants, were up, while

receipts from the information sector were slightly down from a year ago."

Total sales tax revenue for the three months ending in March 2018 was up 8.3 percent

compared to the same period a year ago. Sales tax revenue is the largest source of state funding for the state budget, accounting for 58 percent of all tax collections.

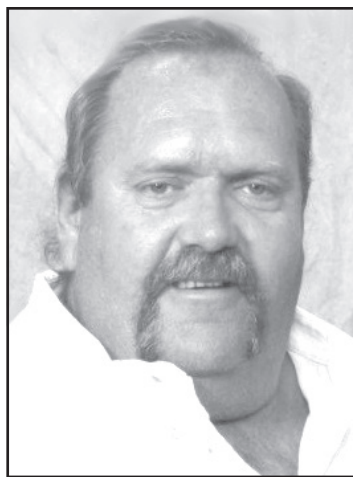

County Commissioners Open Bids on Mineral Interests

The Parmer County Commissioners Court met in regular session on Monday, April 9th at 10 a.m. in the County Courtroom of the Parmer County Courthouse in Farwell, Texas. All commissioners were present. The meeting began with prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag and Texas Flag.

The first agenda item was to open and read the bids concerning the Parmer County Permanent School Land Mineral Interests located in Gaines County, Texas. The land consists of approximately 12,133 acres and currently has 6 operating wells providing royalty income.

The two companies that submitted bids were Petroleo, LLC from Fort Worth, Texas and K&T Energy Partners from Albuquerque, New Mexico. Petroleo LLC submitted a bid of \$3 million dollars and K&T Energy Partners submitted a bid of \$355 per acre which translated into a bid of roughly \$3.9 million dollars. NOTE: Not every acre of the 12,133 total could be used in the bid calculation because of the variances required around each of the 6 current wells.

A motion and second was made to accept the K&T Energy Partners' bid and the motion passed unanimously. Attorney Jeff Atkinson was authorized to finalize the lease details with the company and the final agreement

will be published at a later date.

The minutes from the previous meeting were read and approved.

Next, the Court approved the payment of the Accounts Payables presented to them by County Auditor Larry Johnston.

Altha Herington then presented the Treasurer's Report and the Commissioners approved the report and the calculated payroll and disbursements for all county employees and elected officials.

Purchasing high-level security windows for the Courthouse was considered and postponed until the next meeting so more information about the feasibility of installing the windows could be obtained.

The Commissioners then considered and all matters concerning the Parmer County Law Enforcement Center. Sheriff Randy Geries presented his report to the Court. No action was taken.

The Court then adjourned.

All meetings are open to the public. The Commissioner's Court reserves the right to go into Executive Session at any time. This agenda may be found on the Parmer County website. - Invest for growth. Your investment strategy essentially should be based on three key factors: your goals, risk toler-

ance and time horizon. When you change any one of these variables, it will affect the others. So, if you shorten your time horizon by retiring early, you may well need to reconsider your risk tolerance. Specifically, you may need to accept a somewhat higher level of investment risk so you can invest for greater growth potential.

- Keep a lid on your debt load. It's easier said than done, but try to manage your debt load as tightly as possible. The lower your monthly debt payments, the more you can contribute to your retirement plans. Life is unpredictable. Even if you take all the steps described above, you may still fall short of your goal of retiring early. While this may be somewhat disappointing, you might find that adding just a few more years of work can be beneficial to building resources for your chosen retirement lifestyle. For one thing, you can continue contributing to your IRA and your 401(k) or similar employer-sponsored plan. Plus, if you're still working, you may be able to afford delaying your Social Security payments until you're closer to your "normal" retirement age, which, as defined by the Social Security Administration, likely will be 66 or 67. The longer you put off taking these benefits, the bigger your monthly checks, although they will max out once you reach 70. And even if you are not able to retire early, some of the moves you took to reach that goal - such as contributing as much as you could afford to your IRA and 401(k), controlling your debts, and so on - may pay off for you during your retirement - whenever it begins.

Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

Property owners have the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about:

- the appraised (market) value of your property
- the unequal value of your property compared with other properties
- the inclusion of your property on the appraisal roll
- any exemptions that may apply to you
- the qualification for an agricultural or timber appraisal
- the taxing units taxing your property
- the property ownership
- the change of use of land receiving special appraisal
- failure of the chief appraiser or appraisal review board (ARB) to send a required notice
- any action taken by the chief appraiser, county appraisal district (CAD) or ARB that applies to and adversely affects you.

Informal Review

If you wish to have an informal review of your property with our staff, please come to our office at 305 3rd Street, Bovina, Texas. Our hours are M-F 8:30am to 5:00pm (except for holidays)

Review by the ARB

If you cannot resolve your problem informally with the CAD, you file a notice of protest requesting to have your case heard by the ARB.

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that hears and determines protests regarding property appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the CAD to make the necessary changes based on evidence heard during the ARB hearing.

If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing and send you written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. If necessary, you may request a hearing in the evening or on a Saturday or Sunday. You may use Comptroller Form 50-132, *Property Appraisal - Notice of Protest*, to file your written request for an ARB hearing.

Prior to your hearing, you may ask to review the evidence the CAD plans to introduce at the hearing to establish any matter at issue. Before a hearing on a protest or immediately after the hearing begins, you or your agent and the CAD are required to provide each other with a copy of any materials (evidence) intended to be offered or submitted to the ARB at the hearing. Evidence may be submitted for any hearing type either in paper or on a small portable electronic device (such as a CD, USB flash drive or thumb drive) which will be kept by the ARB. Do NOT bring evidence on a smart phone. The ARB's hearing procedures regarding all the requirements to properly submit evidence on a small portable electronic device must be reviewed.

To the greatest extent practicable, the hearing will be informal. You or a designated agent may appear in person or you may by telephone conference call or submission of written affidavit to present

your evidence, facts and argument. If you decide to participate by telephone conference call, you must provide your evidence to the ARB with a written affidavit before the ARB hearing begins. You may use Comptroller Form 50-283, *Property Owner's Affidavit of Evidence to the Appraisal Review Board*, to submit evidence for your telephone conference call hearing or for hearing by affidavit.

You and the CAD representative have the opportunity to present evidence about your case. You may cross-examine the CAD representative. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented by both parties. In most cases, the CAD has the burden of establishing the property's value by a preponderance of the evidence presented.

In certain protests, the chief appraiser has the burden of proving the property's value by clear and convincing evidence. You should review ARB hearing procedures to learn more about evidence and related matters.

You should not try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. ARB members are required to sign an affidavit saying that they have not talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review by the District Court, an Arbitrator or SOAH

After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you are not satisfied with the ARB's decision, you have the right to appeal to district court. As an alternative to district court, you may appeal through binding arbitration or the State Office of Administrative Hearings (SOAH) if you meet the qualifying criteria.

If you choose to go to district court, you must start the process by filing a petition with the district court within 60 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. If you chose to appeal through binding arbitration, you must file a request for binding arbitration with the CAD not later than the 45th day after you receive notice of the ARB order. If you chose to appeal to the SOAH, you must file an appeal with the CAD not later than the 30th day after you receive notice of the ARB's order. Appeals to district court, binding arbitration or SOAH all require payment of certain fees or deposits.

Tax Payment

You must pay the amount of taxes due on the portion of the taxable value not in dispute, the amount of taxes due on the property under the order from which the appeal is taken or the amount of taxes due in the previous year.

Deadline for Filing Protests with the ARB*

Usual Deadline

Not later than May 15 (or within 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests are allowed for good cause if you miss the usual deadline. The ARB decides whether you have good cause. Late protests are not allowed after the ARB approves the appraisal records for the year.

Special Deadlines

For change of use (the CAD informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is not later than the 30th day after the notice of the determination was delivered to you.

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change did not result from a

protest you filed), the deadline is not later than the 30th day after the notice of the change was delivered to you.

(You may insert deadline for protests concerning omitted property if doing so would avoid taxpayer confusion.)

If you believe the CAD or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually Feb. 1) or no later than the 125th day after the date you claim you received a tax bill from one or more of the taxing units that tax your property. The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

*The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or legal, state or national holiday.

The Friends of the Friona Public Library was chartered in 1968 as an auxiliary 501 (c) 3 nonprofit organization. Its mission was to offer additional support to the library after the city took over its daily operations. Those beginning members had the ability to foresee the needs of our library and worked tirelessly to see this organization take root.

In 1982, the new library building was completed with the help of Friona State Bank which donated the land for

the new building. The Friends oversaw the painting of the Friona 1910 Main Street mural by Bobby Wied as a thank you to the Sybil B. Harrington Foundation's contribution. In 2000, the building renovation was completed with help from the Friends. Many served on the 2006-2008 Endowment Committee, which established the endowment Fund with the Amarillo Area Foundation. This endowment account now earns money that is used to fund the Founder's Memorial Scholarship given to one or two graduating seniors each year.

Fifty years later, the mission to enhance the programs of the library is stronger than ever. Although the Friona Public Library is supported by the City of Friona, without the help of the Friends, many programs would not be possible. The Friends provide financial backing for the programs for summer reading, serve the annual Veteran's breakfast as well as enhance the ESL classes at the Literacy Center, support the Senior All-Night party, help provide books in the classroom, and maintain the library garden.

Recently, I met a woman who described herself as a book-keeper. She quickly laughed at my confused expression and explained that she was a keeper of books—one surrounded by and caring for her books. The same could be said of those who are members of the Friends. We are the keepers of the books, but also much more. Without the Friends of the Friona Public Library, our library would not be the strong asset it is to our community.

The Friends library basket fundraiser is well under way, but you still have time this week to stop by the library to purchase your tickets for the basket drawing. 


