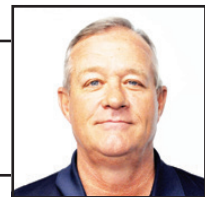

Mayor's Minutes

I want to begin by honoring and recognizing all of our veterans living in our community for their service to this great country, for their dedication and sacrifice to preserve our freedom that we enjoy everyday of our lives. The high school administration, band, high school choir, Jr. high choir and students did a fantastic job honoring the veterans last Friday in the high school gymnasium.

On Wednesday, November 11th Emily Note, Emergency Response Coordinator from Panhandle Regional Planning Commission (PRPC), coordinated and supervised a "mock" winter storm exercise. In the event the City of Friona has another major winter storm, we want to be prepared and equipped to handle any situation and to respond to public issues. The exercise took place at the Friona Police Department and there were representatives from EMS, Fire Department, Police Department, City, Bluebonnet Home Health & Hospice, Library, Friona ISD

and John Gurley, Emergency Management Coordinator. This was a great exercise and want to thank Lee Davila, City Manager for coordinating and Emily Nolte for supervising this useful event.

Glen Hegar, Comptroller of Texas, has reported another great month for Sales Tax Revenue. The City of Friona received \$38,920.63 in October a 3.10% increase compared to October 2017. Total dollars received for this fiscal year is \$384,454.01 an 8.70% increase compared to last year to date through October.

A couple of months ago, the Friona High School Administration asked the city to rename the street that runs in front of the school to "Chieftain Way". The application needed has been completed. The home owners effected will be notified of a public hearing to express any concerns and have the opportunity to approve or disapprove. This item will be on November's City Council Agenda.

Chief Jimenez and the police department responded to 150

calls in October. There were 137 stops, 58 warnings, 46 citations, 10 arrests. (1-public intoxication, 3-warrants and 6-no drivers license). The officers drove a total of 2507 miles patrolling protecting our city. Officer Denise Garcia has moved back to Laredo, TX to take care of her father during his illness. We thank Officer Garcia for her short service and wish the best for her father.

Volunteer Fire Department responded to eight emergency calls in October. On Oct. 1st, there were two calls, a grass fire and a farm implement fire. On Oct 7th, there were two calls, weather watch (tornado) and a vehicle fire. On Oct 8th, a vehicle fire and on Oct 13th, another vehicle fire. On Oct 16th, a transformer sparking and lastly on Oct. 19th, a gas meter damage. All volunteers did a great job responding and handling every emergency call without incident.

Judge Campbell had 52 new cases filed in October. There were 31 guilty pleas. Total fines collected was \$10,269.73. The city kept \$6,989.79 and \$3,279.94 was remitted to the state. Collecting fines are more difficult today than in years past. Here is an example. If you are assessed a fine and are unable to pay the full amount of the fine, you may request alternative methods of

satisfying the fines and costs assessed. If the court determines that you are indigent or that you do not have the income to immediately pay all or part of the costs, the court may: allow you to make payments on an installment plan (an additional \$25.00 fee will be applied if any payment made more than 30 days after judgment); waive all or part of the fines and costs; grant an extension for payment; or allow you to perform community service in lieu of paying all of the fines and costs. Please contact the court directly to discuss these alternative options. Court days and hours, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday 9:00AM to 4:00 PM located 105 West 7th, (806-250-2198).

Emergency Medical Service responded to 32 calls in October. There were five calls for 911, nineteen transfers and eight calls ended in a "no transport". Ambulance billing totaled \$39,164.68 and the City collected \$9,165.48.

Accounts Payable totaled \$195,191.85 for the month of October. All bills were paid and the City is in good standings. Friona Public Library had a total of 894 patron visits in October an average of 43 per day and was open 21 days. There were 747 items circulated and 222 new items added.

Pet Owner or Criminal?

Several weeks ago, a woman messaged Parmer Paws volunteer, Lupe Salinas, asking us to take her dog. Both the Friona and Bovina pounds were overflowing. All five of our fosters were full. At the time, Parmer Paws was responsible for twenty-four dogs and 6 cats, and we do not even have our shelter built yet. Lupe told her to please foster the dog until we could transfer or rehome some of our animals and to text her a picture so we could list the dog on our FaceBook page. Later, the woman saw Lupe at a local gas station and threatened to let the dog roam around town if Lupe did not take it right then. If the woman had, she could have been charged under Texas Penal Code 42.09 Animal Cruelty, a Class A Misdemeanor with up to a \$4000 fine and/or a year in jail. Just like whoever left the box of puppies by the dumpster or abandoned a German Shepherd in the country, she could have been charged. If you allow your animals to roam instead of keeping them in your house or yard, you are breaking the law, too.

However, keeping dogs chained or tied up comes with certain requirements. According to Texas Health and Safety Law 821.076-081, it is a misdemeanor to "leave a dog outside and unattended by use of a restraint that unreasonably limits the dog's movement during certain times of day or during extreme weather," which means that all the owners of dogs that have been tied up outside during the recent cold front are breaking the law. When a weather advisory of any kind is issued, dogs must be taken inside. Furthermore, "a restraint unreasonably limits a dog's movement if the restraint is a length shorter than the greater of 5x the length of the dog or 10 feet. Also if it's in an unsafe condition or causes injury to the dog." The length of the dog covers the tip of the nose to the tip of the tail, not just the body length.

My point is this: if you cannot provide safe, comfortable, enriching conditions for your dog, not only do you not need to own one, you could be fined and serve jail time. Dogs are not livestock. If you see an animal suffering from these unsafe conditions or being abandoned, take photos or videos, and then call the police to investigate. Parmer Paws does not have the power to issue citations any more than you do, so contact the police.

The mission of Parmer Paws is to educate and protect, but be assured we are not a dumping ground. Neither Lupe, nor the rest of the volunteers, will be threatened into taking animals into our homes and yards. Fines and fees are now applicable and we are considering petitioning for additional county laws to protect animals and residents in Parmer County. Do your part. Be responsible.

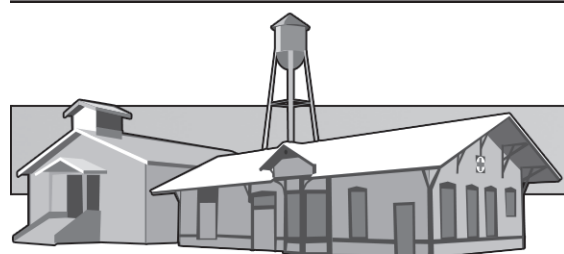

From the Friona Star Archives

November 15, 2007

The Friona Chapter of Future Farmers of America (FFA) has had a busy schedule lately. Adrienne Osborn and Emily Allen attended the National FFA Convention in Indianapolis, Indiana October 23-27. Several FFA members competed in leadership events Wednesday November 7. The senior chapter conducting team consisted of Andrew Stowers, Andy Bently, Chris Boyzo, Tyler Shields, Emily Allen, John Torres, and Garrett Clark placing 4th. Kathleen Wyly competed in creed speaking and placed 6th. John Torres, Adrienne Osborn and Emily Allen placed 2nd in radio broadcasting and will compete in the area competition November 17.

November 13, 1993

A time to be thankful is once again upon us. It seems that during the Thanksgiving period, most people are trying to get home to their loved ones. This is a time when families reunite and gather for big turkey dinners and it's a period of time when we give thanks for being able to get together and enjoy ourselves. This also brings on an increase of traffic on our streets and highways. The Texas Department of Public Safety needs everyone to use extreme care this year, so that we can live to have another Thanksgiving. It is true

that many Texas citizens will become a statistic during this holiday period and that many planned gatherings will be ruined by the tragedies. Give yourself plenty of travel time and plenty of rest stops. Be a defensive driver and watch out for the other person at all times. Remember, no matter how good a driver you may be, you cannot control the person that you are meeting. Drive as if each driver will do the unexpected. It is also the time that hunters will be on the highway. That will also add to the congestion of the streets and highways. Take the time to be a courteous driver and keep your mind in the right frame.

November 24, 1985

Farmers in the area have received a break from the weather during the past week, which helped considerably in keeping harvest operations going. Although the area was hit with a blast of arctic air early in the week, which caused temperatures to plunge, there was no moisture with the system, which allowed area's maize, cotton and sugar beet harvesters to continue at full swing. Holly Sugar Corp. spokesman Cal Jones said Thursday that the sugar beet was about 75 per cent complete. The sugar content dropped somewhat on the beets, due to the rain

received after harvest began. However, the tonnage is up, so this could be an evening out process.

October 7, 1973

Mrs. C.B. Looper, whose son, Durward, was buried on October 5 1972, has reported to the Star incidents of desecrating graves at Friona cemetery. She said at least six pictures have been shot out of headstones, including a picture of her sixteen-year-old son who had died following a boating accident a year ago. Found around headstones at the cemetery were shots from a shotgun shell. Mrs. Looper said she did not think anyone would deliberately shoot graves or headstones, but it was her thinking that careless hunters had shot into the cemetery, damaging pictures on headstones. The incidents apparently have occurred within the past two weeks, as Mrs. Looper said Friday morning the pictures were not harmed two weeks ago. "It is my idea that a cemetery is private property and it should be treated as though it would be a person's own yard. I don't think anyone would deliberately shoot into the cemetery, but I do think hunters should be reminded not to shoot around the graves. It is quite a shock to be in the cemetery and see shotgun damage."

Winter Sun Safety: What to Know About Protecting Yourself During Colder Months

The Skin Cancer Foundation Shares Tips on Staying Sun Safe Year-Round.

Fall is finally here, and many parts of the country are already experiencing cooler weather, more precipitation and more overcast days. It's easy to associate vigilant sun protection with summertime, when the sun is shining intensely. This shouldn't be the case: Sun protection is necessary every day, regardless of the weather or time of year.

"Even when it's cold or overcast, UV rays that cause skin aging and skin cancer are reaching your skin," says Deborah S. Sarnoff, MD, president of The Skin Cancer Foundation. "In the right winter weather conditions, you can sustain sun

damage just as easily as during the summer."

Winter Sunlight

UVB rays, the main cause of sunburn, are the strongest in the summer. However, UVB rays can burn and damage your skin year-round, especially at high altitudes and on reflective surfaces such as snow or ice. Snow reflects up to 80 percent of the sun's UV light, so the rays hit you twice, further increasing your risk of skin cancer and premature aging.

UVA rays remain constant throughout the year and can penetrate through clouds and fog. UVA rays can also penetrate glass, so it's still possible to damage your skin while spending a bright winter day

indoors.

Staying Sun Safe

Your first line of defense against this sun damage is clothing. Covering up is easier in the winter — it's cold! — but the face, head and neck tend to remain exposed year-round, and this is where most skin cancers occur. Don't forget your UV-blocking sunglasses and broad-brimmed hat before heading out. Sunglasses protect your eyes while also fighting snow glare, and a hat keeps you warm while keeping UV rays from damaging your scalp.

Apply a broad-spectrum sunscreen with an SPF of 15 or higher daily to all exposed skin, and make sure to cover often-missed spots like the tops of your ears, around the eyes and near the hairline. Consider choosing a moisturizing sunscreen with ingredients like

lanolin or glycerin to combat dry winter skin. Finally, try to avoid the peak sun hours between 10 AM and 4 PM, and seek shade when you can.

Winter is approaching, but that's no reason to let up on the sun safe habits you practiced during the summer. Continuing sun protection efforts through the colder, cloudier months of the year reduces your risk of developing the most common cancer.

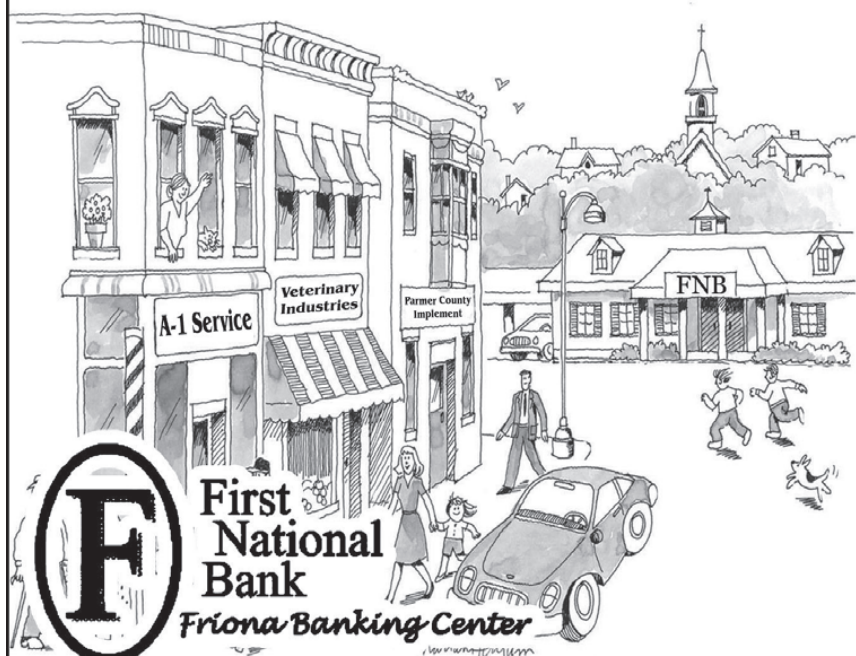

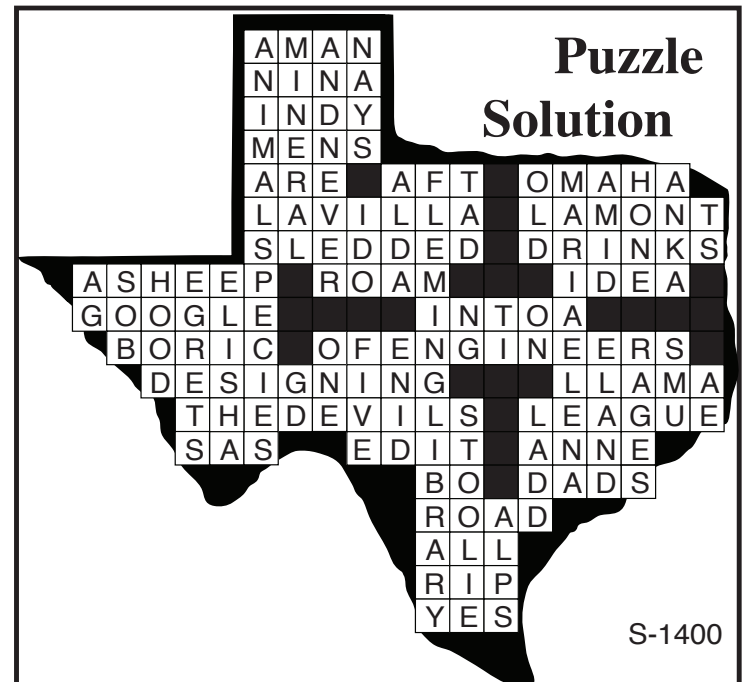

The Integration of Military Service and Personal Study

By Walter V. Wendler, President of West Texas A&M University

In 1783, New York Governor George Clinton, proposed that in every state at least one public college should train people for entry into military service. In 1862, President Abraham Lincoln signed into law the Morrill Act that said in part

...the maintenance of at least one college where the leading object shall be, without excluding other scientific and classical studies, and including military tactics, to teach such branches of learning as are related to agriculture and the mechanic arts, in such manner as the legislatures of the States may respectively prescribe, in order to promote the liberal and practical education of the industrial classes in the several pursuits and professions in life...

The nineteenth century British military leader Sir William Francis Butler supported the views of both Clinton and Lincoln. He opined, "The nation that makes a great distinction between its scholars and its warriors will have its thinking done by cowards and its fighting done by fools."

President Faust of Harvard University said when celebrating the return of the Naval ROTC program to Harvard, "...as citizens we have an obligation to understand our military and to

ensure that it and its members do not stand apart from our national life."

The recent passing of Veterans Day serves as an annual reminder of the value, benefit and purpose for the defense of liberty and freedom of thought. The importance of individual rights and the greater value of protecting those for all is the mission of our armed forces.

The G.I. Bill, first implemented by President Franklin D Roosevelt and modified a number of times since, integrated military service with higher education providing a benefit to those who served in defense of our liberties.

A robust program that couples military service and traditional academic coursework is possible and desirable. At the time of enlistment, a new member of the Armed Forces could also begin coursework at a community college or four-year college that would allow the enlisted personnel to simultaneously study and accumulate credits towards a college degree while engaged in active military duty.

The accumulation of college credits towards a specific degree while on active duty is a powerful opportunity to integrate military service and study. There are a number of challenges for veterans who return from active

duty service and enroll in college. Military life is a labyrinth of bureaucratic processes that are impenetrable for the average person, and many educational institutions are among the most bureaucratic organizations in existence. An integrated approach to service and study might diminish transition from one bureaucratic environment into another.

For veterans to be successful after mustering out and entering the higher education environ-

ment, a number of the issues must be addressed. Veterans who enter college are often non-white, increasingly female, and own a set of experiences that are unlike the average high school freshman who graduates from high school and enrolls at State U three months later.

In these contrasting cases, universities must extend a thoughtful and deliberate orientation process that is unlike those typically offered for "typical" freshman. Particularly important for

veterans is familiarization with campus offices and appreciation for the process of identifying appropriate majors, selecting courses and finding support services both on and off campus that create a seamless transition to campus life.

It may be surprising, but veterans, like transfer students from community colleges, want the powerful aspects of a traditional campus experience. These would include opportunities to be challenged intellectually; fraternization with groups of people that share common interests (and those who don't); and exposure to a worldview that builds or reinforces basic facets of the human condition such as faith life, family views, attitudes about work and belonging to a community. Learning experiences focused solely on cognitive skills, understandings and abilities that are devoid of the social milieu and personal perspectives fall short.

If a simultaneous military service and study experience existed whereby a new enlistee is also a new freshman taking college

courses towards achieving a particular degree while performing military duties, the distinctions and anomalies between military life and academic experiences would be diminished. The acclimatization challenges for veterans into university experience would be reduced.

Simultaneous enlistment and enrollment.

Coupled with these thoughts about integrated military/educational experience is the value of experiential learning that has been the tradition for training in the military. According to the Lumina Foundation, the Army has been especially effective at competency-based education that equates some aspects of military service and training with study.

While an integrated study/service paradigm is no panacea, it provides a powerful way to serve students in attainment of their life aspirations while simultaneously serving their nation, not one and then the other, but both together.

Simultaneous national service and personal study—a win-win.

Mule Deer Season, November 17 - 25

Lubbock and surrounding area counties- Lubbock district Game Wardens will be dedicating extra patrol hours and state assets to the Mule Deer season which occurs in southwestern panhandle counties and runs this year from November 17th -25th. With the new season comes new changes both to specific county antler restrictions as well as Lynn County opening a season for the first time.

The west Texas mule deer attract hunters from across the state and around the country into the southern plains to have a chance at harvesting a buck. The 9-day general season is open to hunters with a valid Texas hunting license and permission to hunt on property. Legal harvesting methods include the use of permitted firearms, or archery equipment. The bag limit is one buck per legal hunter, and does not allow the take of a mule deer doe unless a special MLD permit is obtained.

Texas Weekly Fuel Update and Outlook

Gasoline prices in Texas have fallen 5.7 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$2.41/g yesterday, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. This compares with the national average that has fallen 5.9 cents per gallon versus last week to \$2.67/g, according to GasBuddy.

Including the change locally during the past week, prices yesterday were 10.9 cents per gallon higher than a year ago and are 24.8 cents per gallon lower than a month ago. The national average has dropped 22.1 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 12.2 cents per gallon higher than a year ago.

"The last week has seen

another notable decline at pumps in nearly every state with average prices again plummeting, in some places to \$1.99 per gallon or less, following oil's longest losing streak in nearly 34 years," said Patrick DeHaan, head of petroleum analysis for GasBuddy. "Every single day, Americans are spending nearly \$100 million less than just 30 days ago- a significant and impressive feat as the national average gas price has shed over 20 cents per gallon over the last month. Oil's demise has partially been due to the U.S. issuing waivers to countries buying crude oil from Iran, making sanctions moot, but also because ahead of those waivers, OPEC agreed to increase production to soft-

en the potential blow from the Nov. 4 re-imposition of sanctions, yet now, OPEC is upset and may again cut production to the move by Trump to allow temporary waivers. What's it all mean for motorists? The plummet at the pump may continue for now, but all eyes will be on OPEC to see what move they make to pump oil prices back up."

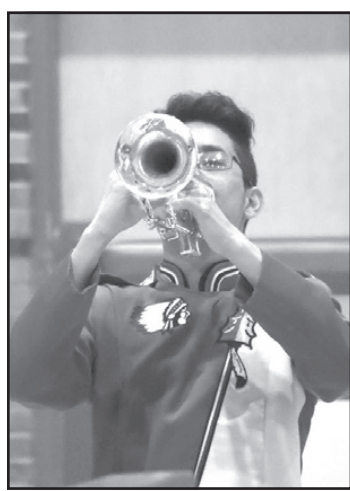

Small Town Cookin' By Jeri Lynn White

Pie

My grandmother taught me how to make pie crust. Every time I roll out a crust, I think of her. She could make four thinly rolled crusts from one recipe. An impressive feat for sure. I know that there is an easy way to make a pie crust. Just go to the store and buy a pack of two. But for me, I enjoy the challenge of rolling out the perfect disc, transferring it to the pie plate, and crimping the sides. All too often I have rolled it too thin, tore a hole in the crust during the transfer, or had the sides droop during the baking. But ever so often, the perfect crust is formed. Just the right thickness and flaky and the perfect balance to the sweetness of the filling.

This is the crust recipe that my grandmother used. It is easy to work with and can be re-rolled if needed. Just remember you may need to add

more water a little at a time depending on the dryness of the dough. I also use a trick I learned from Alton Brown. After poking holes in the crust, I line the inside of the crust with parchment paper and fill it with dry pinto beans

to keep the crust from falling inside itself. I leave the beans for about 15 minutes until it is set. Then I carefully remove the beans and finish baking the crust. I save the beans to reuse the next time I bake a pie.

This recipe is based on a Splenda recipe I found online when I was trying to find a dessert for my dad since he became diabetic. I changed it up a little to make it as much like regular pecan pie as I could.

Low Sugar Pecan Pie

Jeri Lynn White

- 3 large eggs, lightly beaten
- 3/4 cup Splenda brown sugar blend
- 3/4 cup sugar free pancake syrup
- 2 Tbsp. melted butter
- 1 tsp. vanilla extract
- 1 1/2 cup pecan halves
- 1 9-inch unbaked pastry shell

Preheat oven 350oF. Combine eggs, Splenda brown sugar, syrup, butter, and vanilla, mixing well until blended. Stir in pecan halves. Pour filling into pastry shell. It will be a thin mixture. Bake for 50 minutes or until the center no longer jiggles.

This is Bill's favorite pie. Sharon fixes this for our family often. Just remember to temper your eggs by adding them slowly to a small amount of the hot pudding mixture in a separate bowl before you add them to the full pan of pudding or you will get scrambled eggs in your pie filling.

Chocolate Meringue Pie

Sharon White

- 3/4 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup corn starch
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 3 Tbsp. cocoa powder
- 2 cups milk
- 3 eggs, separated
- 1 Tbsp. vanilla

Mix sugar, corn starch, salt, cocoa powder, and milk in a medium sized pan. Cook on stove top until thick, stirring constantly. Then separate 3 eggs and beat yolks. Add a small amount of hot pudding to egg yolks to temper eggs. Then add eggs to mix and cook well. Take off heat and add 1 Tbsp. vanilla. Add filling to baked pie shell. Then top with meringue. You can also cook the filling in a double boiler. It takes a little longer to get thick, but the mixture is more forgiving if you stop stirring for a minute or two.

Pie Crust

Dorothy LaFrance

- 3 cups flour
- 1 cup Crisco
- 1 scant tsp. salt
- 1 egg
- 1 large Tablespoon vinegar
- 7 Tablespoons water

Cut the shortening into the flour and salt with a pastry cutter until the shortening and flour are well combined and pea-sized lumps form. Then beat together the egg, vinegar, and water. Add slowly to the flour and shortening mixture. Blend with a spoon until the flour is all moistened and the dough forms a ball. Add more water if the dough does not stick together. Divide and roll out crust. For unfilled crusts, prick sides and bottom of crust, and then bake at 375oF for 20-22 minutes or until brown. This dough can also be stored in the refrigerator for up to two weeks in an air tight container.

Seldom Weep Meringue

More Calf Fries to Caviar by Janel Franklin and Sue Vaughn

Separate in glass or metal bowl and have at room temperature, 3 egg whites, Add 1/2 tsp. cream of tartar. Beat at high speed; after one minute add gradually one tablespoon at a time. 1/4 cup plus 2 tablespoons sugar. Beat until stiff peaks form and sugar is dissolved. Beat in 1/2 tp. vanilla, Spread meringue over hot pie filling. Make sure to seal to edge. Bake in preheated 350°F oven for 12-15 minutes or until brown. Cool, away from drafts. Let cool completely before cutting.
