Empty Stocking Fund



City Council creates Building Standards Commission

The Friona City Council met in regular port from the Friona Police Department session on Monday, November 12th at 6:30 p.m. in the City Council Chambers at 619 Main in Friona, Texas. The meeting began with a roll call, an invocation, and the Pledge of Allegiance.

A time for public comment was the first order of business and one individual addressed the Council with concerns about the Parmer County Hazard Mitigation Plan. Next, the minutes of the October 9th, 2018 regular meeting were approved.

The Council approved the resolution to adopt the 2018 updated Parmer County Hazard Mitigation Plan. An added benefit of adopting such a plan is that it streamlines the process to receive disaster funds. Also approved was the renewal of agricultural leases with Rest & Relax Farms, Inc. and R&J Farms for the 2019-2020 crop years. Next, the monthly regiven by Chief Jimenez.

The Council approved the reappointment of Andy Alexander, Holly Campbell, and Henry Clark to the Friona Economic Development Board of Directors for two-year terms. Also approved was a FEDC recommendation that a \$25,000 grant be given to the Friona Pioneer Museum to help in the purchase of an elevator for the building.

The purchase of a trailer-mounted sewer rodding machine was approved. The equipment will cost approximately \$42,000 and includes a 10-year warranty on the pump. The pump on the machine that the City now utilizes cannot be repaired if and when it quits working.

The Council approved Gayla Fullerton as Auditor for the city providing service

for one year ending September 2019. The Council voted to amend its policy on Substandard Buildings and other Structures. This amendment created a Building Standards Commission and provides an appeal process for the public. Ricky White, Brent Loflin, and Greg Lewellen were appointed to the Commission.

The Council approved the Accounts Payable and Financial Statement for October 2018 and City Manage Lee Davila informed the members on upcoming zoning projects. The meeting was then adjourned.

County Commissioners hear from highway officials

The Parmer County Commissioners Court met in special session on Tuesday, November 13th at 10:00 a.m. in the County Courtroom of the Parmer County Courthouse in Farwell, Texas. The meeting began with prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag and the Texas Flag.

In the first item of business, the Commissioners heard from State Highway Department representatives Steve Perez and David Harper. The state plans to realign FM 145 with CR 3 and add a new railroad crossing. This new route would allow for the closing of the old underpass. This underpass has been hit numerous times by trucks in the past few years and the collisions were threatening the integrity of the railroad tracks and therefore the safety of everyone. The project is slated to be completed in 2020. Also discussed was plans to begin work on Highway 60 starting at Bovina and going west to the state line. The work would begin in March 2019 and the westward progression of the project would be contingent on state funding.

The Minutes from the previous meeting were read and approved and approval was given for payment of the accounts payables as presented by County Auditor Larry Johnston. Accepted a donation from Mighty Vac, which provided the port-apotties for the Sheriff's National Night Out event. The Commissioners reviewed the Treasurer's presented by Altha Herington and approved the calculated payroll and disbursement for all county employees and elected officials.

The Commissioners canvassed the votes from the November 6, 2018 General Election and approved the results. They next voted to adopt the 2018 updated Parmer County Hazard Mitigation Plan. This plan must be updated and approved every five years.

The Court next approved a Lawn Maintenance Contract for the Courthouse and Law Enforcement Center. The contract is with Andria Griswold and the cost is \$700 per month which is divided equally between the Courthouse and Law Center. The agreement also includes the application of ice melt during the winter months.

Next, the Commissioners approved Larry Kelsay, Farwell Chief of Police, as Parmer County's rabies control authority. They also designated approximately \$19,211 of state donated surplus road materials to Precincts 3 and 4. This annual benefit, which is rotated between the four precincts, will provide around 40 dump truck loads of "RAP" to be used at the discretion of the two precincts.

Sheriff Randy Geries reported that the Law Enforcement Center was currently housing 43 inmates and that 16 of those being held are from other counties. He also stated that there were numerous accidents due to the recent snowstorm but that none of them involved serious injury.

Texas' Unemployment Rate Hits Historic Low 3.7 Percent

State has experienced 28 consecutive months of employment growth

Texas' seasonally adjusted unemployment rate fell to 3.7 percent in October, down from 3.8 percent in September 2018, reaching its lowest level since the state unemployment data series began in January 1976. The Texas economy added 32,300 seasonally adjusted nonfarm jobs in October. Annual employment growth for Texas was 3.1 percent in October, marking 102 consecutive months of annual growth.

"The Texas economy continues to remain strong by adding 32,300 jobs in the month of October. These numbers highlight the strategic job creation efforts of our Texas employers, and provides our worldclass workforce with career options in a variety of growing industries," said Chair Ruth R. Hughs. "Texas is a state that always welcomes new employers and also supports our homegrown businesses, offering them the tools they need to succeed and build on our continued success as a global economic leader."

Corn harvesting resumed following recent rain events but were on hold again. Wheat plantings were expected to continue when conditions dry. 



Lions club member Jaime Benavides informed the club that his family was helped by the Ronald McDonald House of Lubbock in January of 1993.





She explained to us that the kitchen was full of food and to eat anything we wanted from the pantry or the refrigerator. She told us that some guests will cook and we were more than welcome to come down to join them at the table to eat; we are all family here at the Ronald McDonald House. We were both so emotional and felt so loved. We felt so special. Everyone was so nice. Who knew strangers could be so kind.

The lady then proceeded to say that there was also a charter bus that could take us to UMC Hospital so we could see our baby at anytime we wanted. Ronald McDonald House treated us so well and made us feel welcomed in every way possible. If it wasn't for Ronald McDonald House I don't know what we would have done. We stayed for almost 2 1/2 months! My daughter was very well taken care of at UMC and I was treated like a queen at Ronald McDonald House. Thank you Ronald McDonald House, we appreciate you so very much!



Texas milk production booming, thanks to many

A reporter called recently asking about the status of the Panhandle dairy industry in the almost three years since Winter Storm Goliath and whether dairies were prepared for another extreme winter.

Recall that the storm in late December 2015 hit a region that was home to about one-third of the state's dairy cows. It killed an estimated 15,000 livestock in addition to taking an emotional toll on local dairy farmers.

First of all, I stated that we hope to never see another Goliath-type event in our lifetime. It is not really possible to prepare for an event of that magnitude. We then discussed milk production in the region – both before and since the storm – and I must admit that, though I know how much we have grown in statewide milk production in the last few years, I was taken aback by how much milk production has grown in Texas since Goliath.

In January 2015 - about a year before the storm - Texas produced 895 million pounds of milk. Following the storm, 831 million pounds of milk were produced in January 2016, with some of the impacted counties down as much as 19 percent from the previous January. By comparison, 994 million pounds were logged in January 2017 and 1 billion pounds in January 2018. This is an incredible increase in production. Today, production has increased about 25 percent from the January 2016 production level.

With that production comes a big risk on the part of the transportation and marketing side of the industry.

When I was a dairy farmer, I don't know that I ever understood the magnitude of work that cooperative staff undertake to market and move additional milk produced every day. Finding a home for additional milk that turns a profit is always a

struggle. The success of our state's dairy farmers is not just in their hands, but also in the hands of all of the people involved in getting your milk to the market.


We should all respect all the effort that goes into moving and marketing our product – a growth in production means more truck loads, more truck drivers, more contracts, more sampling, more processing, etc.

Because Texas dairy farmers are producing much more milk than before, we are now the nation's fifth largest dairy state. That won't last long. While dairies in other parts of the country are faltering, Texas milk production will continue to grow.

It won't be long before Texas likely will become the fourth largest dairy producing state, thanks not just to farmers and their herds, but to everyone in our industry who is working hard to help us achieve this





Musings on Thankfulness and Turkey Day Leftovers

Several years ago, I discovered the writings of Henri Nouwen and have since fallen in love with his works. One of Father Nouwen's favorite topics was on gratitude. He said, "The discipline of gratitude is the explicit effort to acknowledge that all I am and have is given to me as a gift of love, a gift to be celebrated with joy."

Thanksgiving is supposed to be about that kind of gratitude. All the food and time spent with family is great, but mostly I love the idea of stopping to remember all the things for which we should be grateful.

Gratitude is a funny thing. It's really all about perspective. The more we dwell on the things we don't have or on negative circumstances, the worse our lives seem. But when we focus on the times and people, even the smallest moments, that bring us joy, our lives seem to be inexplicably filled with blessings. Henri Nouwen reminds us, "Gratitude as a discipline involves a conscious choice."

He notes, "The choice for gratitude rarely comes without some real effort. But each time I make it, the next choice is a little easier, a little freer, a little less self-conscious." Being thankful is not always easy especially when you feel

like you are waiting for the next shoe to drop, waiting for the next phone call with bad news or expecting the terrible test results from the doctor. Sometimes it feels like we can only expect things to get worse. But those are the times when it is most important to look for the small joys in life. It may be as simple as listening to your favorite song or enjoying a cup of coffee in the quiet of the morning. There are many ways to take note of things for which you are grateful. You can make a gratitude list in your journal or even write them on a slip of paper and keep them in a jar. But taking time to recognize our blessings, makes all the difference. Father Nouwen goes on to say, "Acts of gratitude make one grateful because, step by step, they reveal that all is grace."

Possibly, by the time you read this article, the turkey will be carved, the pie plate licked clean, and your dishes washed and put away. All that will remain are happy memories and probably some turkey. I pray that your holiday was filled with a choice to find gratitude and ultimately joy. And since this article is really supposed to be about food, here are a couple of recipes to help you finish off that turkey.

Turkey Tetrazzini www.campbells.com

Ingredients

2 tablespoons olive oil

1 small onion, diced (about 1/4 cup)

8 ounces mushrooms, sliced (about 3 cups) 1 stalk celery, finely chopped (about 1/2 cup)

1 medium carrot, peeled and sliced (about 1/2 cup)

1 clove garlic, minced 3 tablespoons butter

¼ cup all-purpose flour

cup half and half or heavy cream

1 ¾ cups Swanson® Chicken Broth or Swanson® Chicken Stock

2 tablespoons dry sherry

2 tablespoons chopped fresh parsley

4 cups cubed cooked chicken or turkey

½ cup frozen peas

4 cups cooked thin spaghetti (from about 8 ounces dry)

Add the chicken, onion mixture, peas, spaghetti and cheese and toss to coat. Season to taste. Heat the broiler. Broil 4 inches from the heat until the chicken mixture is hot and bubbling and the top is browned.

Farm Bureau Survey: Thanksgiving Dinner Cost Down for Third Straight Year

The American Farm Bureau Federation's 33rd annual survey of classic items found on the Thanksgiving Day dinner table indicates the average cost of this year's feast for 10 is \$48.90, or less than \$5.00 per person. This is a 22-cent decrease from last year's average of \$49.12.

"Since 2015, the average cost of Thanksgiving dinner has declined steadily and is now at the lowest level since 2010," said AFBF Chief Economist Dr. John Newton.

The featured food on most Thanksgiving tables - the turkey - cost slightly less than last year, coming in at \$21.71 for a 16-pound bird. That's roughly \$1.36 per pound, down 3 percent from last year. The survey results show that retail turkey prices are the lowest since 2014.

"Thanks to an ample supply, turkey remains affordable for consumers, which helps keep the overall cost of the dinner reasonably priced as well," Newton said.

The shopping list for Farm Bureau's informal survey includes turkey, stuffing, sweet potatoes, rolls with butter, peas, cranberries, a veggie tray, pumpkin pie with whipped cream, and coffee and milk, all in quantities sufficient to serve a family of 10 with plenty for leftovers.

Foods showing the largest decreases this year in addition to turkey were a gallon of milk, \$2.92; a 3-pound bag of sweet potatoes, \$3.39; a 1-pound bag of green peas, \$1.47; and a dozen rolls, \$2.25.

A 12-ounce bag of fresh cranberries was \$2.65; a 30-ounce can of pumpkin pie mix was \$3.33; a 14-ounce package of cubed bread stuffing was \$2.87; two nine-inch pie shells came in at \$2.47 and a 1-pound veggie tray was \$.75. A group of miscellaneous items including coffee and ingredients necessary to prepare the meal (butter, evaporated milk, onions, eggs, sugar and flour) was also up slightly, to \$3.01.

There was no change in price for a half-pint of whipping cream at \$2.08.

The stable average price reported this year by Farm Bureau for a classic Thanksgiving dinner tracks with the government's Consumer Price Index for food eaten at home. But while the most recent CPI report for food at home shows a most affordable in more than a decade.

New this year, to capture the diversity in Thanksgiving meals across the U.S., American Farm Bureau also checked prices on a 4-pound bone-in ham, 5 pounds of Russet potatoes and 1-pound of frozen green beans.

"Adding these foods to the classic Thanksgiving menu increased the overall cost slightly, to \$61.72 or about \$6 per person," said Newton.

A total of 166 volunteer shoppers checked prices at grocery stores in 37 states for this year's survey. Farm Bureau volunteer shoppers are asked to look for the best possible prices, without taking advantage of special promotional coupons or purchase deals, such as spending \$50 and receiving a free turkey. Shoppers with an eye for bargains in all areas of the country should be able to purchase individual menu items at prices comparable to the Farm Bureau survey averages.

Farm Bureau also surveyed

the price of a traditional Thanksgiving meal available from popular food delivery services. This revealed that the convenience of food delivery does have a larger price tag. A 16-pound turkey was nearly 50 percent more expensive at nearly \$2 per pound when purchased from a food delivery service. Nearly every individual item was more expensive compared to the Farm Bureau average and the total

cost of the dinner was about 60 percent higher at about \$8 per person.

The AFBF Thanksgiving dinner survey was first conducted in 1986. While Farm Bureau does not make any scientific claims about the data, it is an informal gauge of price trends around the nation. Farm Bureau's survey menu has remained unchanged since 1986 to allow for consistent price comparisons.
