
Cotton harvest could set another record

The Friona Farmers Co-Op Gin is now running at full speed. New gin manager Jeff Watkins said that with the combination of gin improvements and an above average crop, a new record for bales ginned is very possible again this year. Jeff began work as gin manager the last week of July and came to Friona from Big Spring. He has over 42 years of

experience in the cotton industry. The honor of "first bale ginned for 2018" goes to Blake O'Hair of Wild Hare Farms in Clovis, New Mexico. In the photo above, Miguel Marin is

shown operating a "telehandler" to remove round bales from the trailer. In the photos at left you can see the three ways seed cotton is delivered to the gin for processing. Shown top

to bottom they include: round bales, half-modules, and standard modules. To date 9,182 bales have been ginned with 349 modules on the yard and 907 modules in the field.

WTRT and WT Services go app!

The term "App" is shorthand for application software. Application software is a software program you can download to your cell phone, computer or Internet enabled device to perform functions, tasks or activities for the benefit of the user. The apps usually come in two formats, iOS for devices using Apple operating systems and Android, for devices using Android operating systems.

"There are apps available for almost anything you can imagine. But, we'd like to call your attention to two apps that can be extremely useful for subscribers of West Texas Rural Telephone and WT Services," says Amy Linzey, chief executive officer and general manager. "Both apps are free to download at Google Play for Android Users or the App Store for Iphone users."

Smarthub

"The Smarthub app available from WTRT and WT Services ensures that patrons have the convenience of WTRT or WT Services customer service at their fingertips, 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. It's a secure way to manage your WTRT or WT Services account. You can check your account usage, pay your bill, initiate a service call or conduct two-way communication with customer service," explains Ms. Linzey.

To use this app, customers first log into the Smarthub link on the WTRT/WTS website and create a Smarthub account

within the customer information system. This account is the "link" between customer account information and use of the app on their mobile device.

Next, customers download the app on their device. To get started, use your cell phone or Internet enabled device, such as a tablet or Ipad to access the Internet. Touch the applicable App resource icon on your device (Google Play for Android, App Store for iOS). When Google Play or iOS opens, use the search function to locate the Smarthub app.

Tap the free button for Smarthub, and then tap the install button. Depending on your device, you may need to enter your Google Account or Apple ID to confirm the download of the app. Once the app has downloaded, you will tap either GPS location or Name to identify your service provider. Once you've located WT Services/West Texas Rural Telephone, tap the confirm button.

It will be at this time you enter your Smarthub account user information to connect your app with your account information. If you'd like assistance in creating your Smarthub account, or downloading the app, please call or visit one of our office locations. We're happy to help.

Stingray

"If you subscribe to WTRT or WT Services television service, you can take advantage of the Stingray music app, too. It's all the carefully comprised, commercialfree music channels from your TV service available to you on the go, from your mobile devices. And, the app is compatible with Sonos wireless wifi, Android Auto, Apple Carplay and Chromecast. You can take your favorite music with you on the road," Ms. Linzey explained.

Android devices even allow you to set your favorite music channel as your alarm clock. So, whatever mood you're in, whatever genre strikes your fancy, or whatever event you want to create a musical backdrop for - it's all there at your fingertips. Stream music your way, as part of your WTRT or WT Services TV subscription.

Just like Smarthub, you'll find this app free at the App Store or on Google Play. Download it by going to App Store or Google Play Store on your phone, depending on whether your device is an Apple device or Android Device. Use the search function or scroll down until you find the Stingray Music icon. Click on Install. After installation is done, click on "open."

Scroll down to "sign in." Create an account: enter an email address and choose a password. Place the phone in front of your TV and enjoy.

"You will have free and unlimited access to the Stingray music app if you subscribe to West Texas Rural Telephone or WT Services television service," explains Ms. Linzey. "If you have any questions or would like assistance, we're here to help."





Parmer County FSA Updates

Safety Net Coverage in 2018 Farmers and ranchers with generic base acres in the Agriculture Risk Coverage (ARC) or Price Loss Coverage (PLC) safety net program still have time to enroll for the 2018 crop year. Producers with generic base acres have until Dec. 7, 2018, to allocate generic base acres, update yields, make a program election for seed cotton base acres and enroll farms that formerly contained generic base acres.

USDA Enrollment Period for

Since shares and ownership of a farm can change year-to-year, producers must enroll by signing a contract each program year.

The producers on a farm that are not enrolled for the 2018 enrollment period will not be eligible for financial assistance from the ARC or PLC programs for the 2018 crop should crop prices or farm revenues fall below the historical price or revenue benchmarks established by the program. Producers who made their elections in previous years must still enroll during the 2018 en-

The ARC and PLC programs were authorized by the 2014 Farm Bill and offer a safety net to agricultural producers when there is a substantial drop in prices or revenues for covered commodities. Covered commodities include barley, canola, large and small chickpeas, corn, crambe, flaxseed, grain sorghum, lentils, mustard seed, oats, peanuts, dry peas, rapeseed, long grain rice, medium grain rice (which includes short grain and sweet rice), safflower seed, sesame, soybeans, sunflower seed, wheat and upland cotton.

FSA Encourages Farmers and Ranchers to Vote in County Committee Elections

The 2018 Farm Service Agency County Committee Elections began on Nov. 5, when ballots were mailed to eligible voters. The deadline to return the ballots to local FSA offices is Dec. 3, 2018.

County committee members are an important component of the operations of FSA and provide a link between the agricultural community and USDA. Farmers and ranchers elected to county committees help deliver FSA programs at the local level, applying their knowledge and judgment to make decisions on commodity price support programs; conservation programs; incentive indemnity and disaster programs for some commodities; emergency programs and eligibility. FSA committees operate within official regulations designed to carry out federal laws.

To be an eligible voter, farmers and ranchers must participate or cooperate in an FSA program. A person who is not of legal voting age but supervises and conducts the farming operations of an entire farm, may also be eligible to vote.

Eligible voters in local administrative area (3) who do not receive a ballot can obtain one from their local USDA Service Center. Dec. 3, 2018, is the last day for voters to submit ballots in person to local USDA Service Centers. Ballots returned by mail must also be postmarked no later than Dec. 3. Newly elected committee members will take office Jan. 1, 2019.

The candidate in this year's election is Kaye Vaughan, nominated in LAA 3, Parmer County, to serve as a committee member for a 3-year term. Mrs.Vaughan resides in the Farwell area and produces corn, cotton and wheat. She is currently a member of the Parmer County FSA Committee.

USDA Microloans Help Farmers

Purchase Farmland and Improve Property

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is offering farm ownership microloans, creating a new financing avenue for farmers to buy and improve property. These microloans are especially helpful to beginning or underserved farmers, U.S. veterans looking for a career in farming, and those who have small and mid-sized farming operations.

The microloan program has been hugely successful, providing more than 16,800 low-interest loans, totaling over \$373 million to producers across the country. Microloans have helped farmers and ranchers with operating costs, such as feed, fertilizer, tools, fencing, equipment, and living expenses since 2013. Seventy percent of loans have gone to new farmers.

Now, microloans will be available to also help with farm land and building purchases, and soil and water conservation improvements. FSA designed the expanded program to simplify the application process, expand eligibility requirements and expedite smaller real estate loans to help farmers strengthen their operations. Microloans provide up to \$50,000 to qualified producers, and can be issued to the applicant directly from the USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA).

Energy-saving LED holiday lighting a bargain over time

Xcel Energy compares costs, offers tips for decorating safely with lights.

Xcel Energy is offering tips on saving money and, above all, staying safe as area residents turn their attention to stringing holiday lights for the festivities to come in December.

"Safety should always be our first consideration regardless of the type of lighting we choose," said Ronnie Walker, Xcel Energy regional manager for Community Relations in Amarillo. "And as we choose our lights, it's good to think about not only what they cost to purchase, but also how much energy they use."

Strings of LED lights still cost more to purchase than strings of traditional incandescent lights, but because LED lights use a fraction of the energy traditional holiday lights use, they have a minimal impact on a monthly electric bill, Walker said.

Energy.gov, an information website maintained by the U.S. Department of Energy, offers a cost comparison on its LED Lighting page that shows that traditional incandescent C9 lights for a six-foot Christmas tree cost about \$10 to power for 40 days. The LED equivalents would only cost about 27 cents to

estimated costs are based on kilowatthour prices very close to Xcel Energy's Texas and New Mexico residential electricity rates.

Energy.gov estimates it would cost \$122.19 to purchase and power incandescent C9 bulbs for a six-foot tree over a 10-year period, but LED lights would only cost \$17.99 to purchase and operate over that period. Similar savings can be achieved with LED mini lights over incandescent mini lights. The 10year savings takes into account likely replacement of the incandescent lights every three years because they don't last as long as LEDs.



Fat Separators: Where Have You Been All My Life?

If you watch Alton Brown then you know, he is not a fan of the one task gadget. You won't find a strawberry corer or an avocado slicer anywhere in his kitchen drawers. No, he likes gadgets that can do multiple jobs. Although a fat separator may seem to be a one trick pony, it can be used for a variety of recipes. Its main job is to do just what its name suggests, to separate fat. It allows the fat to float to the top. Then you can use the tasty liquid at the bottom of the device to make your gravy or sauce without the extra fat. It is also handy to have if you make stock or base for healthy soups.

Fat separators, also known as gravy strainers or soup strainers, can be found in three basic forms: the pitcher style/ measuring cup, a ladle with slots, and fat mops. The one we ordered is an OXO Good Gravy model. It can be found on Amazon or Bed, Bath, and Beyond. It might seem a little pricy, but it is well worth it. It has a strainer that sits on top of the separator and a handle that controls the flow out of the bottom of the container.

Bill has just recently discovered the ingenuity of this device. It has made him wonder why it took him so long to discover its existence. He uses it to make gravy from roast drippings and used it for his giblet gravy this Thanksgiving. By separating the fat, the taste of the gravy or sauce is greatly improved. Although most people probably don't need a recipe for gravy, it seemed like the right fit for this week.

Basic Gravy

Leftover cooking liquid from cooking a roast, turkey, or chicken

■ 3-4 TBSP Cornstarch

Water

Chicken or beef stock

After cooking the meat, remove it from ■ the pan to a serving dish and let it rest. ■ While the meat rests, you can prepare your gravy. If the pan the meat was in is not good to use on the stove, find a large sauté pan. Using your fat separator, pour ■ the liquid into the measuring cup through the strainer. Let this sit until the fat has formed on the top. Then add the liquid from the bottom of the separator into the pan you are using to prepare your gravy. ■ Mix your cornstarch and water in another ■ cup. Only use just enough water to make the cornstarch liquid. If you don't have enough reserved liquid available, add chicken or beef stock to make more gravy. ■ Bring the gravy liquid to boil and add the ■ cornstarch slurry mixture slowly to the boiling liquid while stirring. Add a little at a time so as not to over thicken your gravy. The boiling liquid should soon thicken and be ready to serve.

- 4 tsp. baking powder
- 2 cup flour
- ½ tsp. salt
- 2 eggs
- 2 cups milk (more as needed)
- 2 TBSP vegetable oil
- 3-4 TBSP butter for the pan

The Parmer County Commissioners Court met in special session on Tuesday, November 26th at 10:00 a.m. in the County Courtroom of the Parmer County Courthouse in Farwell, Texas. The meeting began with prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag and the Texas Flag. All Commissioners were present.

The Minutes from the previous meeting were read and approved and approval was given for payment of the accounts payables as presented by County Auditor Larry Johnston. The Commissioners reviewed the Treasurer's Report presented by Altha Herington and approved the calculated payroll and disbursement for all county employees and elected officials.

The Commissioners' Court rescheduled the December 24th meeting to Friday, December 21st at 10:00 a.m. because of the Christmas Holidays. The Court approved the payment for unused vacation days for one of the county's employees and approved water line work on County Road 7 between County Road Q and County Road R for Jake Steel-

The Commissioners received a check for \$4,187,313.00 from K&T Energy of Albuquerque, New Mexico for a 3-year mineral lease on property in Gaines County. The money was put into the Permanent School Fund that is overseen by the Court and is available to the school districts in Parmer County for capital expenditures.





Texas Weekly Fuel Update

Gasoline prices in Texas have fallen 6.6 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$2.26/g yesterday, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. This compares with the national average that has fallen 7.8 cents per gallon versus last week to \$2.53/g, according to GasBuddy.

Including the change locally during the past week, prices yesterday were 0.5 cents per gallon lower than a year ago and are 31.1 cents per gallon lower than a month ago. The national average has dropped 29.4 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 3.4 cents per gallon higher than a year ago.

"The \$1.99 club has seen its membership swell in the last week with the number of states with stations priced at that level or lower spiking to 18. Texas, New York, Missouri, Louisiana, Ohio, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Alabama, Mississippi, Michigan, Virginia, Arkansas, Kansas, Kentucky, New Mexico, Ohio, Tennessee and Illinois all have at least one station at \$1.99 or less, and the good news is it won't end there," said Patrick DeHaan, head of petroleum analysis for GasBuddy. "Oil prices have seen another weekly rout, with WTI crude oil shedding over \$6 per barrel or some 14% to close the week at a mere \$50 per barrel. While many may be a skeptic of the White House taking some credit, the Trump Administration's reluctance to punish Saudi Arabia for it's role in the murder of Jamal Khashoggi is likely leading Saudi Arabia to push against large cuts in crude oil production, fearing potential fallout from Trump. In the week ahead, motorists in most states will likely see further drops, saving the country \$125 million a day versus prices in early October."



Matthew Kube is 17-yearold senior at Farwell High School and is the son of Weldon and Mary Kube. A nine-year member of 4-H,




Matthew serves as vice president of the Oklahoma-Lane 4-H Club. He has partici-






