Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6 proposing an amendment to Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows:

"Section 5. The principal of all bonds and other funds, and the principal arising from the sale of the lands hereinbefore set apart to said school fund, shall be the permanent school fund, and all the interest derivable therefrom and the taxes herein authorized and levied shall be the available school fund. The available school fund shall be applied annually to the support of the public free schools. And no law shall ever be enacted appropriating any part of the permanent or available school fund to any other purpose whatever; nor shall the same, or any part thereof ever be

appropriated to or used for the support of any sectarian school; and the available school fund herein provided shall be distributed to the several counties according to the scholastic population and applied in such manner as may be provided by law."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots that have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8 proposing an amendment to Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection which reads as follows:

"(d) No law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless notice of the intention to introduce such a bill setting forth the general substance of the contemplated law shall have been published at least thirty (30) days and not more than ninety (90) days prior to the introduction thereof in a newspaper or newspapers having general circulation in the county or counties in which said district or any part thereof is or will be located and by delivering a copy of such notice and such bill to the Governor who shall submit such notice and bill to the Texas Water Commission, or its successor, which shall file its recommendation as to such bill with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker

of the House of Representatives within thirty (30) days from date notice was received by the Texas Water Commission. Such notice and copy of bill shall also be given of the introduction of any bill creating a law creating or governing a particular conservation and reclamation district to such bill (1) adds additional land to the district, (2) alters the taxing authority of the district, (3) alters the authority of the district with respect to the issuance of bonds or (4) alters the qualifications or terms of office of the members of the governing body of the district."

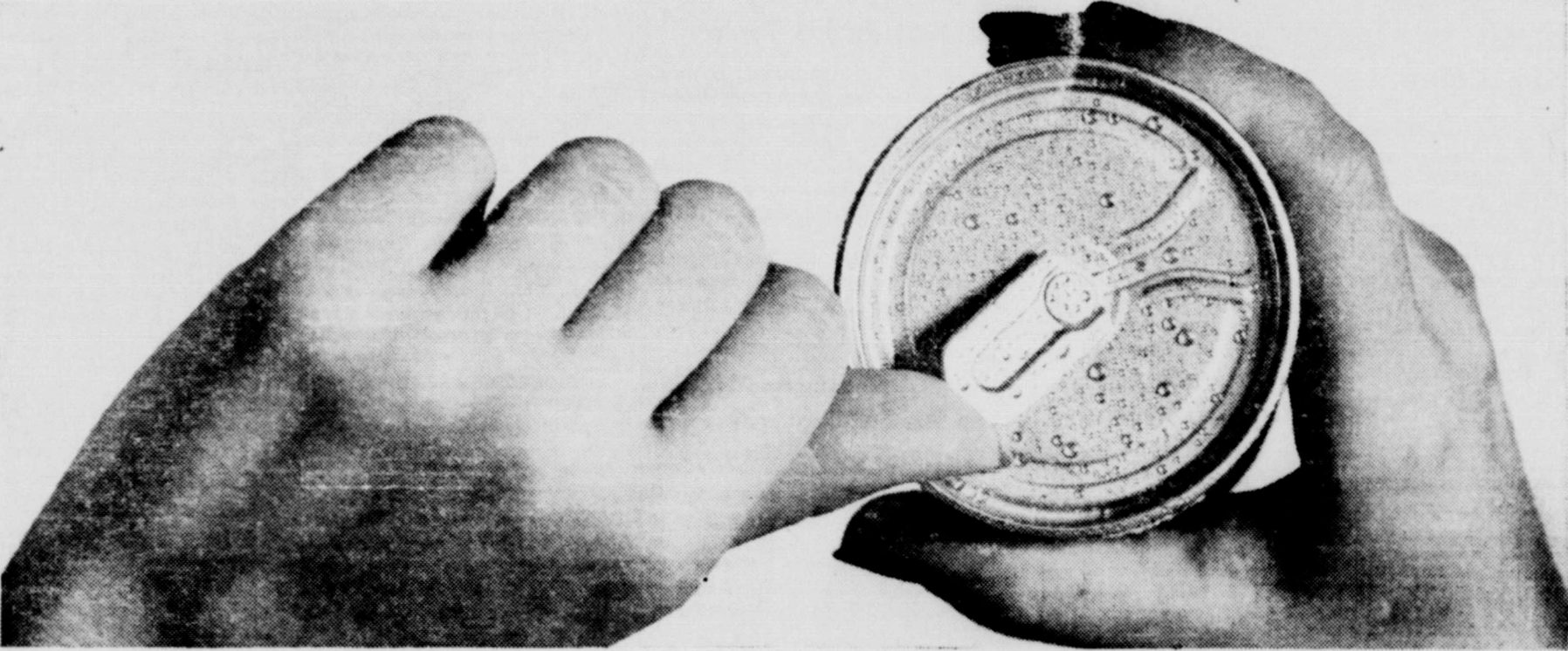

Library Plans to Classify, Catalog Volumes

...Lindsey, field representative from the Field Services Division of the Texas State Library, will catalog new books but plans are being made to use volunteers to help catalog the backlog of several thousand volumes.

29, to help the Foard County Library take preliminary steps in classifying and cataloging the library. The library was partially classified at one time, but plans are to complete the classification of all non-fiction books and to set up a more complete card catalog. Books are divided into 10 major classifications under the Dewey Decimal System and then further divided within each classification. For instance, all books having a number in the 300's will be books on social science. Books in the 390 section will be about manners and customs and books numbered 394.2 will be about holidays of a people or area.

Lindsey emphasized the importance of following standard library practices in order to make the books more useful to the community. He also said that classifying and cataloging will take time and effort, but pointed out it will cost very little except the price of extra cards. The library field man visits Crowell at least once a year but the Wednesday meeting was a special trip to help set up cataloging and classifying plans. No fee is charged for the service which is available to communities all over the state. The Foard County Library is also interested in the state's cat-

aloging consultant. She will spend up to three or four days in a community helping catalog a library, without cost to the community. Mr. Lindsey was asked to see how soon the consultant can visit Crowell to assist in the local project. Two to four new cards will be made for each book owned by the Foard County Library. When cataloging is complete it will be possible for patrons to find the title of all the library's books about the United States Civil War by looking under the heading in the file. This will save time for both librarian and patrons. Mrs. Ventrice Brock, librarian,

will catalog new books but plans are being made to use volunteers to help catalog the backlog of several thousand volumes. Mrs. Robert Kincaid, Library committee chairman, was unable to attend, but Lindsey spent Wednesday morning in conference with Mrs. Brock, Mrs. L. A. Andrews, Garden Club representative on the committee and long-time chairman, and Mrs. Jack W. Brown, president of the Foard County Federation of Women's Clubs, which sponsors the library. Wednesday afternoon he worked with Mrs. Andrews, Mrs. Brock and Mrs. Sandra Glover in preparing the young people's department for classifying and cataloging. Mrs. Glover serves as assistant librarian.

False Report Tells of Plane Crash

Don Brown of Truscott, and student of the University of Columbia in New York City, was reported by South American papers to have been killed, along with two companions, in a light plane crash in Peru, according to a letter received by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Brown of Truscott.

The day after William Holden's brother was reported to have crashed, Brown and his friends, Kenneth Laws and Larry Holland, flew along the same route from Lima to Pisco. Weather conditions were not too good so they flew on to Nasca, inland a bit. They arrived at 4:08 p. m., and estimated time of arrival was 4:05 so they encountered little trouble on the trip. However, en route, they had talked with another plane and asked the pilot to close their flight plan to Pisco for them. He failed to do so.

Monday night they were walking around Nasca and struck up a conversation with a policeman. He told them about the most recent plane crash. The more they talked, the more the victims sounded like themselves. They telephoned Lima authorities of their safe arrival and forgot the matter. But next morning they were greeted by newspaper headlines declaring them crashed and dead and describing the three bachelors on holiday as "Anglican ministers."

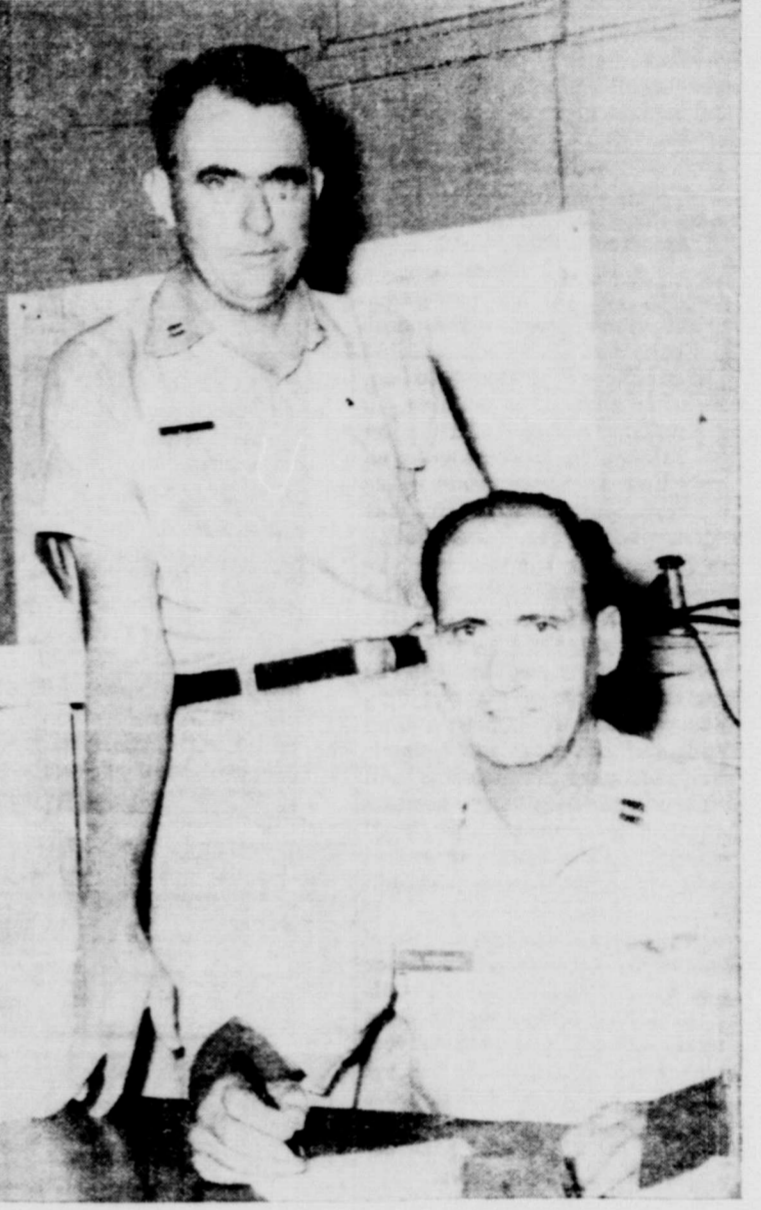
Brown said it felt very strange to read the report of your death, especially when you have been in no danger and are in perfect health. A stewardess on an airliner had reported seeing a red and white plane crashed on a mountain. The report, along with the unclosed flight plan, caused the confusion.



**Two Minutes
 With the Bible**

Glorious Deliverance

In 1 Thessalonians 1:10, the Apostle Paul, by divine inspiration, assures believers that the Lord Jesus Christ has "delivered us from the wrath to come." He refers, of course, to deliverance from the penalty of sin. But in other passages he declares that we are also delivered from the power of sin. In Col. 1:12,13, for example, he gives thanks to God "Who hath delivered us from the power of darkness and hath translated us into the kingdom of His dear Son."

This deliverance, and the glory of our heavenly position and blessings we may enjoy experimentally now, by grace, Rom. 6:14 says: "For sin shall not have dominion over you, for ye are not under law but under grace." This does not mean that it is not possible for the believer in Christ to sin, but rather that it is possible, in any situation, not to sin. Thus the same passage in Romans goes on to say that we should not yield ourselves as servants to sin, but to God, who, in grace has broken sin's power over His own.

Finally, the believer in Christ shall be delivered even from the presence of sin, for at our Lord's coming for us "we shall all be changed" (1 Cor. 15:51). Believers should long for Christ's coming for us, not merely because these bodies of humiliation will then be glorified, but because from that moment on they shall never again be tempted or defiled by sin. What a change that will be!

The apostle includes all three senses of the believer's deliverance in II Cor. 1:10, where he tells how God has "delivered us from so great a death, and doth deliver us whom we trust that He will yet deliver." This is why he could write to the Philippians about his confidence "that He who hath begun a good work in you will complete it until the day of Jesus Christ" (Phil. 1:6).

Some may not feel the need of any deliverance now; but we all need deliverance from sin and its results. Why not place your trust in Christ who alone can "deliver us from the wrath to come."
