Operations are now underway in Foard County preparatory to drilling two new oil tests at points about 29 miles apart, one by the Fain-McGaha Oil Corporation of Wichita Falls two and one-half miles northeast of Thalia and the other by the Texas Company in its field 18 miles airline distance west of Crowell.

Over twenty Crowell golfers will go to Seymour Sunday afternoon for a match with the leading linksmen of that city.

The Crowell city lake was opened to the public Wednesday for fishing purposes.

A rain last Thursday night amounting to from 3 to 4 inches in the vicinity of the Texas Company's plant, 18 miles west of Crowell, resulted in Good Creek rising to such an extent that it carried away about 30 feet of the dam constructed last November by the Texas Company across Good Creek at a point about 3 miles northeast of the company's wells and natural gasoline plant.

A supply of fresh meat was received at the local relief office Wednesday from the government packing house at Wichita Falls for distribution to needy families of Foard County.

In an effort to have a dam constructed across Pease River at a point about 10 miles northwest of Crowell, The Pease River Development Association was organized at a meeting in Vernon last Friday afternoon as a preliminary step. 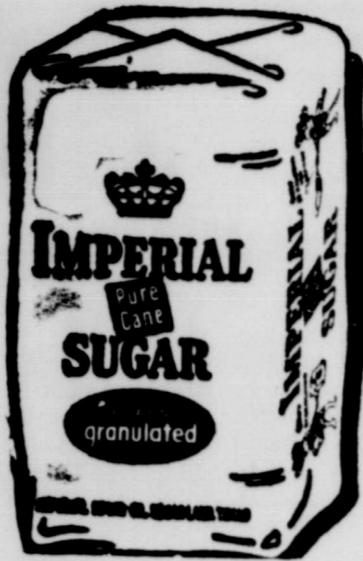

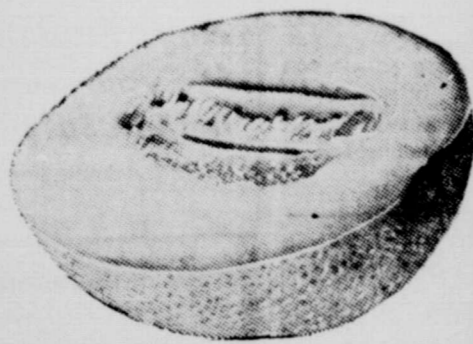
