Beliefs About Plants Need to Be Corrected

Erroneous folk beliefs about plants need to be corrected to pre vent accidental poisonings, according to an article by Shirley Baughman O'Leary which appears in an American Medical Association publication. Coin-Operated **Machines Increase** Food Sales

Food sales through coin-operated vending machines have increased greatly during the past 15 years, reports Mrs. Gwendolyne Clyatt, Extension consumer marketing specialist.

It is estimated that by next year, total dollar sales will be up to \$4 billion, compared with \$2.5 billion in 1960, she said.

Soft drinks make up about a third of the automatically vended products. Candy, gum, cookies and crackers account for another quarter of the sales. Milk and ice pipeline from Lelia Lake Creek cream have been popular items for years, and coffee, soup and sandwiches have increased in importance.
