## Knox City Hands Wildcats 30-0 Last Friday

Crowell High School football team was held scoreless by Knox City Greyhounds as the Wildcats handed the 'Cats a 30-0 loss last Friday.

This was the Wildcats' second district loss.

Back Phil Williams was the hero in the Knox City victory, scoring all four of their touchdowns in a two-point conversion, and passed to Ben Smith for a conversion.

Williams went off tackle for yards to score in the opening quarter to provide the Greyhounds with a 6-0 halftime margin. In the second quarter, Williams made 14 yards on a touchdown play that was blocked by three yards, and a conversion. Quarterback Shaver passed to Rogers for the other conversion.

The last Greyhound touchdown in the final period came on a pass to Williams.

Mike Bird, Crowell quarterback, gained most of the yardage for the Wildcats, but the offense was generally well handled by Knox City. Mike Williams, Wildcat linebacker, was outstanding on defense.

# COUNTY GETS RAIN ON ELECTION DAY

## JOHNSON-HUMPHREY CARRY FOARD COUNTY

About 1,000 Foard County voters went to the polls in the general election Tuesday and—like the nation as a whole—gave President Lyndon B. Johnson an overwhelming margin—833 to 146 for Barry Goldwater. Senator Ralph Yarborough did nearly as well as the President, receiving 794 votes to Bush's 181. Congressman-at-Large Joe Pool received 846 votes to Hayes' 124, and in the governor's race, John Connally polled 870 to Crichton's 103. Congressman Graham Purcell tallied 854 votes to George Corse's 135.

Foard County voters approved all three of the constitutional amendments: No. 1, school fund, 297 for and 164 against; No. 2, conservation districts, 275 for, and 162 against; No. 3, medical care, 435 for and 100 against.

## SANTA CLAUS TO VISIT IN CROWELL ON DEC. 4

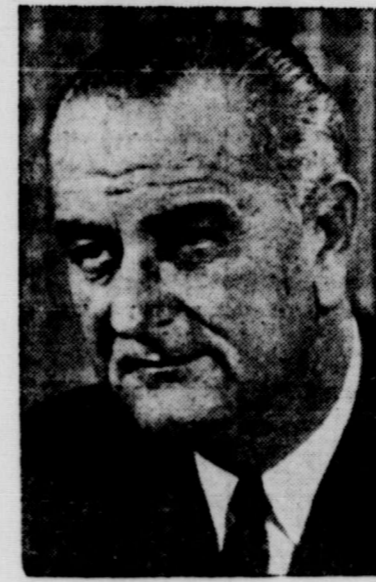

## School Board Approves Two Policy Changes

Supt. Henry Black informed members of the Crowell School Board at their meeting Monday night that two school policies had been amended. These amendments are included in the "Standard Operating Procedures and School Policies" of the Crowell Independent School District. One is that a student must meet all graduation requirements before he (or she) may participate in commencement exercises. That is, no "dummy" diplomas will be awarded.

The second policy to be amended is that the seniors are no longer limited to the boundaries of the state, but may go wherever their finances and time will permit on their senior trip.

Supt. Black said an accreditation team from the Texas Education Agency will be in Crowell on December 10. He expressed the school's need for a tape recorder, microphone and stand, and the board approved the purchase.

In other business, monthly bills were approved for payment. The tax rolls were approved and L. A. Andrews, secretary, stated that his office had collected in the last two months \$95,000 of the \$121,366.50 in 1964 taxes assessed.

A \$16.67 monthly increase in salary was voted for Allen Taylor, mechanic and bus shop foreman. A \$35.00 monthly fund formerly allocated to student janitor help, was approved for division and transfer to the regular janitors' salaries as the latter could and wanted to do the work.

The annual auditor's report covering the fiscal year ending Aug. 31, 1964, was discussed and approved.

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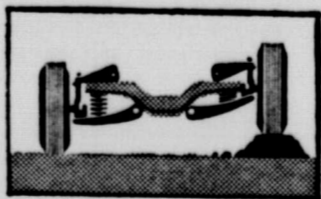

With the Bible**

**Where Art Thou?  
Where Is Thy Brother**

The first question of the Bible from God Himself as He addressed fallen Adam, hiding in His presence: "Where art thou?" (Gen. 3:10).

Adam and Eve made a great mistake in running and hiding from God, for their plight was hopeless without Him. But none of Adam's children have done any better than he. In Psalm 14:2,3 we find the Lord scouring the earth, as it were "to see if there were any that did understand (their need) and seek God," but the answer was, "No, not one."

How grateful we may be that in grace He sought us, that the Lord Jesus Christ came "to seek and to save that which was lost" (Luke 10:19) and that "we have redemption through His blood, the forgiveness of sins according to the riches of His grace" (Eph. 1:7).

But another question follows naturally. This question too came from God Himself, as He asked the murderer, Cain: "Where is Abel thy brother?" (Gen. 4:9). Cain countered with another question: "Am I my brother's keeper?" but he soon learned that he was his brother's keeper as God drove him out of His presence, not only as a punishment, but to teach us all that we are indeed responsible for those about us.

The unsaved, who have never responded to God's call: "Where art thou?" should remember that God also asks them, as He did unregenerate Cain: "Where is thy brother?" By rejecting Christ as their Savior they are also keeping

others out of heaven—others whom they might have been used to win to Christ, had they themselves been saved.

**November Plentifuls Offer Thanksgiving Dinner Ingredients**

The most important ingredient for a traditional Thanksgiving dinner will be especially plentiful this November, reports the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Look for an abundance of turkeys, cranberries and apples—all needed for that special dinner.

Also designated plentiful by the U. S. Department of Agricul-

ture's Marketing Service are beef, peanuts and peanut products.

Bigger turkey marketings during the three months preceding Thanksgiving and a larger cranberry crop than last year indicate heavy supplies of both of these foods. The apple crop estimated at 145.9 million bushels promises to be the largest since 1937.

Relatively attractive beef prices likely will continue through November, as beef supplies are expected to remain fairly large. A good peanut crop will probably send production slightly above last year, with heavy movement to market during November.

So enjoy the Thanksgiving favorites, and the other plentiful foods in November, for tops in fall eating.

At the poultry counter, fryers are still the best money stretchers. Turkeys are plentiful and are priced attractively. Chicken hens are offered at attractive prices at some markets, too. Grade A large eggs generally give the most quality for the least price when buying eggs.

Fresh fruit items in good supply at economical prices include bananas, lemons, grapes, Jonathan apples and Bartlett pears. Some first-of-the-season items such as grapefruit, cranberries and oranges are a bit higher in price.

Economical fresh vegetable items at many stores include sweet potatoes, eggplant, carrots, yellow onions, tomatoes, lettuce, collards, mustard greens and turnips.

**Trouble with Guns Afield Reflected in Arrest Report**

Sobering reminders of trouble with guns afield is reflected in the monthly arrest report of the Parks and Wildlife Department, according to J. B. Phillips, coordinator of law enforcement.

He noted that 12 arrests were made for night hunting, 25 for hunting from an automobile, 11 for hunting in closed season, 9 for exceeding the bag limit on doves, 4 for using an unplugged gun and 4 for possession of wild doe deer.

**Snags Albino**

When H. A. Jenkins of Tyler lifted a three-pound flathead catfish from the Sabine River, he found himself with a rare albino, instead of the usual mustard-brown of the typical "yellow cat."

While the degree of rarity may not be well documented, at least Jenkins knew that few people had ever seen one, much less removed one from a hook. The fish has bright red eyes, pink dorsal, pectoral and tail fins and the body color is a soft buttery-gold.

Albino channel catfish, according to Parks and Wildlife Department fisheries, biologists in Tyler, are not so rare, but the Jenkins fish is the only known flathead albino that has been taken in the area. The biologists hope to use the fish for spawning purposes.

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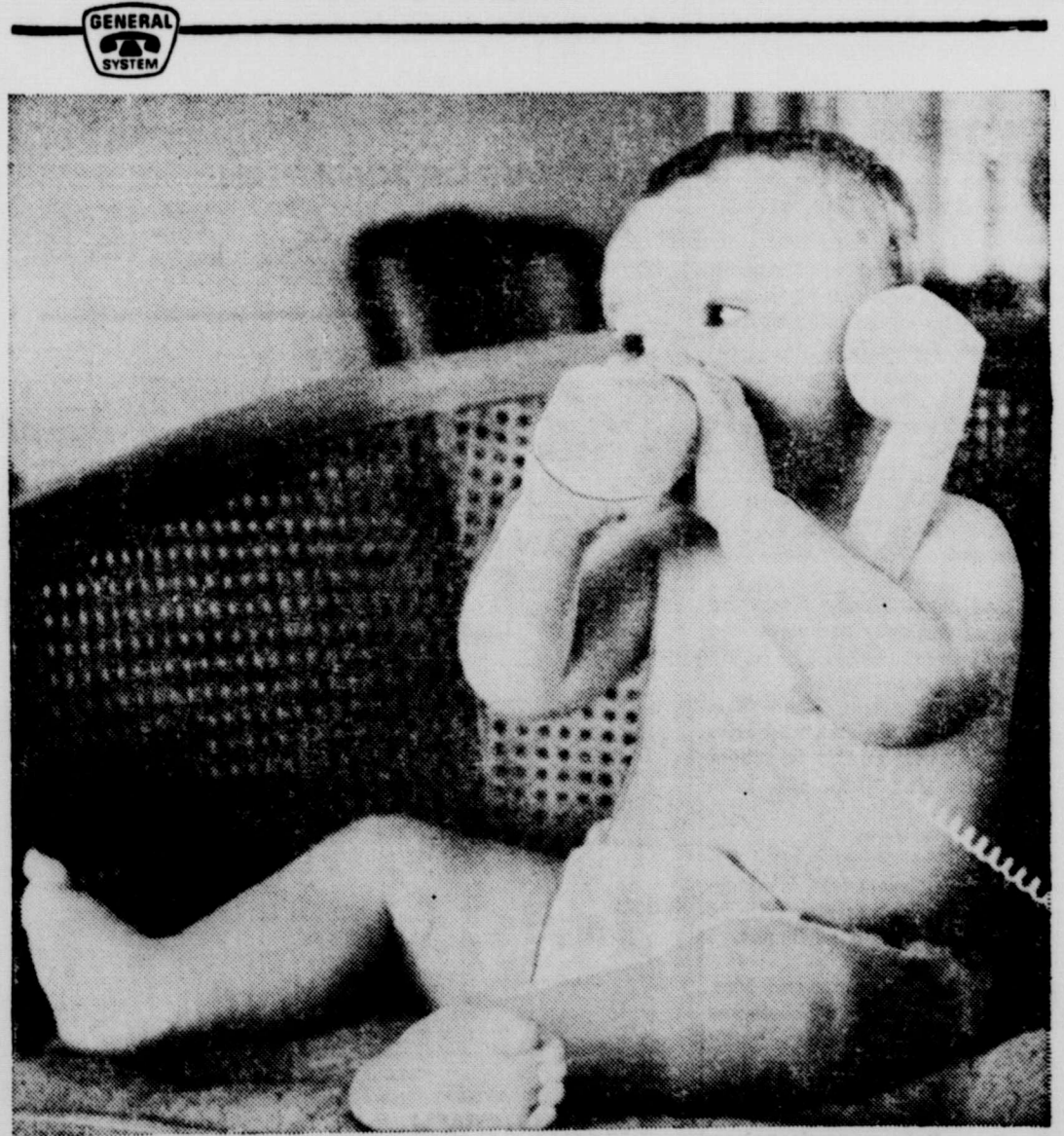

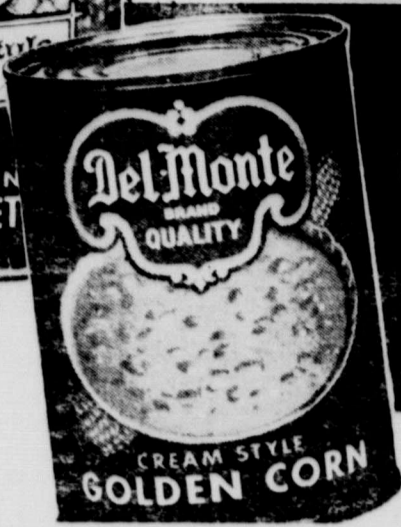

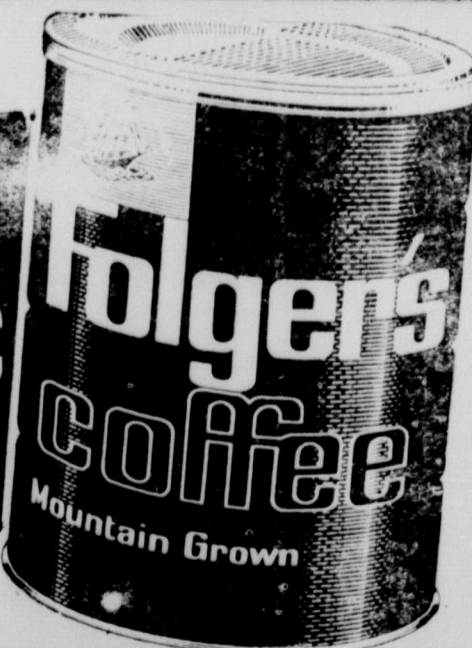

**Guns Boom Over Vast Texas Area**

Bullets and scattergun shot have begun pelting the ozone in Texas as a variety of targets became available as of October 31 and November 1, said J. B. Phillips, law enforcement coordinator for the Parks and Wildlife Department.

Statewide wild geese became legal game October 31 and sandhill cranes were fair prey in a limited West Texas area also on October 31. The big game season kickoff was set for Nov. 1 in two deep South Texas counties—LaSalle and McMullen—and in one east Texas County—Freestone.

Quail also gets into the line of fire as of November 1 in the two south Texas counties. Meanwhile, the north zone dove

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season ended Oct. 30, and the special archery deer season opening Oct. 1, closed on Oct. 31. The main big game season and quail season open in regulatory authority counties east of the Pecos on Saturday, Nov. 14. The counties covered by state law have legal deer hunting opening Monday, Nov. 16, and quail shooting beginning Dec. 1. There are some local variations which should be checked with game wardens. Goose hunters were cautioned that duck season does not open until November 25.

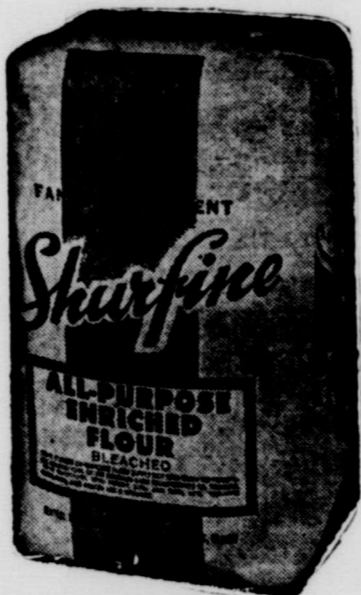

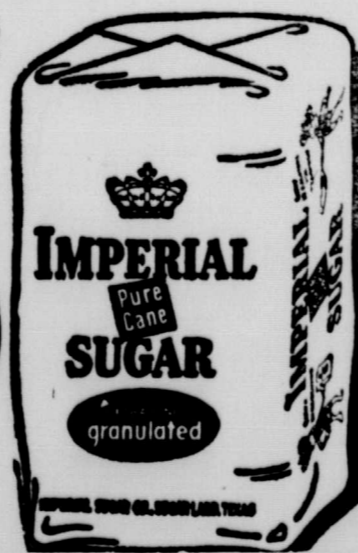
