Notice

This is to give notice of intention to introduce a bill during the Regular Session of the 59th Legislature to amend certain provisions of Chapter 35, Acts of the First Called Session of the 53rd Legislature, being the Act creating Green Belt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority. Such legislation will: Change the name of the Authority; add certain territory to the Authority, and detach other territory therefrom; authorize the Authority to acquire and develop underground water and water rights; provide for investment of the Authority's funds; provide for supplying water for users within and without the Authority; make provisions relating to the making of a contract with Texas Water Development Board under which said Board or the State of Texas will require water storage facilities (as provided in Chapter 49, Acts of the Fifty-eighth Legislature) in a reservoir to be constructed by the Authority and with reference to making provision for the accumulation of a fund for the purchase by the Authority of such storage space by fixing and maintaining adequate rates and

charges which shall be paid by cities heretofore and hereafter contracting to buy water from the Authority; repealing Section 23 of the Act; and enacting such other amendments or provisions as the Legislature may determine.

This notice is given in accordance with the requirements of paragraph (d) of Section 59 of Article 16 of the Texas Constitution.

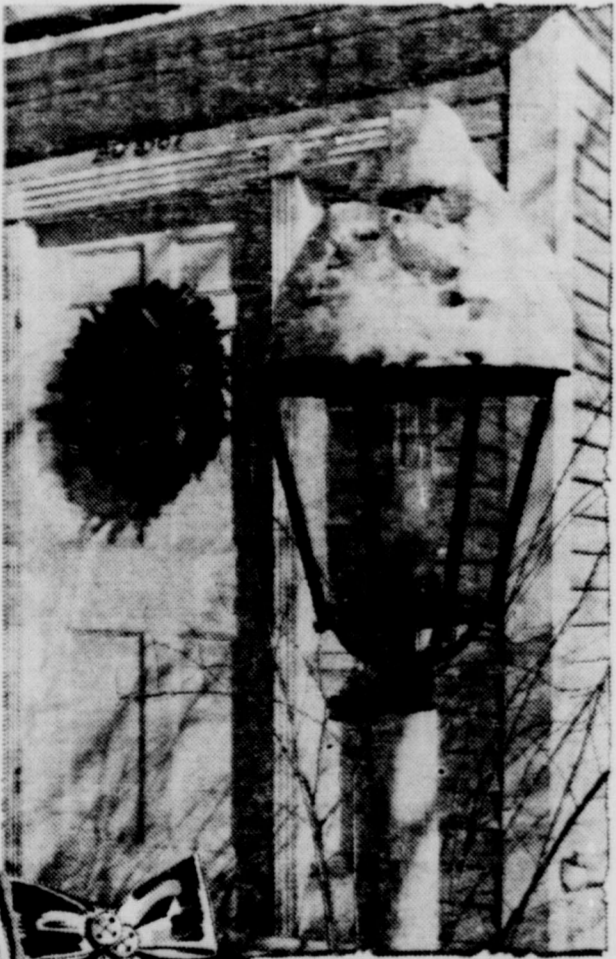

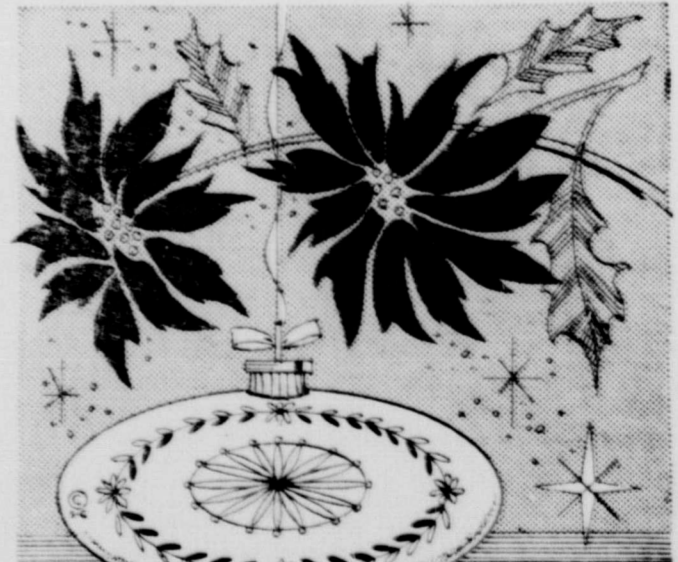
