By growing more grass and handling cattle without additional help or expense, the cross-fence will pay good dividends. 



PATCHWORK PILLOW Sew bits of cotton bag prints together to make patchwork large enough to cut triangle 18" x 18" x 15". Cut same size from plain fabric for pillow back. Sew 3/4" beading and 2" eyelet ruffling around patchwork top, run ribbon and tie bow. Cut strip 234" x 56" from solid for 2%" x 56" from solid for sides of pillow, stitch to top and bottom, leave opening for stuffing. Stuff and close pillow by hand.
