Football Banquet Held Thursday; Toye McCurley Winner of Denny Todd Award

Toye McCurley, son of Mr. and Mrs. Toye McCurley of Thalia, was presented the fourth annual Denny Todd Memorial trophy as the outstanding football player in 1964 for Crowell High School. The presentation was made by Supt. Henry Black at the football banquet sponsored by the Crowell Lions Club in the school cafeteria.

A. S. C. S. Gives Summary of 1964 Activities

A summary of ASCS activities for 1964 has been compiled by the local office, Mrs. Jean Reeder, office manager, said that under the ACP program last year, 102 participating farms were involved with cost-shares by the ASCS totaling at \$36,557.55.

A total of 397 farms out of the county's 523 farms participated in the 1964 voluntary wheat program. A total of 603 producers received payments for diversion in the amount of \$30,127.00 and price support in the amount of \$443,293.00. A total of 6,433 acres was diverted from production.

There were a total of 328 farms eligible to participate in the feed grain program with 172 participating. A total of 285 producers received payments for diversion in the amount of \$61,450.00 and price support in the amount of \$6,599.00. A total of 4,875 acres was diverted from production.

The committee has initiated a project stressing soil fertility. Under the ACP farmers may earn cost-shares for fertilizer applied to native grasses and legumes.

Under the Conservation Reserve Program in 1964, a total of 26 producers received payments in the amount of \$25,549. In the 1964 domestic cotton program, a total of 140 producers participated and received payments totaling \$15,895. A total of 1,761 acres qualified for payments under this program.

During 1964, a total of 9 wool producers received payments in the amount of \$147.51 and 4 unshorn lamb producers received payments in the amount of \$37.74. Under the facility loan program the local office made 19 loans in the amount of \$3,406.14 and a storage capacity of 33,670 bushels.

Thursday evening, a banquet was held at which time a majority of the state senators and representatives were introduced. Lt. Gov. Preston Smith and Speaker of the House Barnes were introduced and gave short talks which were well received by members of the state Farm Bureau legislative committees from all of the county Farm Bureaus. There were approximately 350 members present.

The Foard County Farm Bureau board of directors met Tuesday night, Jan. 12, and re-elected the present officers for the following year. Committees were appointed for national, state and county to help carry out the different phases of Farm Bureau work.

Funeral Services for Jack Seale to Be Held Today

Manager of West Texas Utilities Here Died Tuesday

C. R. (Jack) Seale, 62, manager of the West Texas Utilities Co. in Crowell since September of 1936, died in the Foard County Hospital about 9 a. m. Tuesday following a very brief illness.

Funeral services for Mr. Seale will be held at 2 p. m. Thursday from the First Baptist Church, with interment in the Crowell Cemetery.

The veteran utilities company employee was born in Montgomery County, Mo., on May 3, 1902, and moved to Apache, Okla., with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Ben Seale, while still a small boy. He graduated from Apache High School and from a business college in Oklahoma City. In 1923 he was employed by the Oklahoma Gas & Electric Co. in Poteau, and stayed there until he joined West Texas Utilities in 1926.

The Crowell local manager began his 30-year career with WTU at Cisco and served in Menard, Mason, Turkey, Quitaque, Childress, Dalhart, Abilene, San Angelo, McCamey and Quanah prior to coming to Crowell as manager in September, 1936. He and the former Brooks Sanders of Quitaque were married in Tulsa Feb. 7, 1928.

Mr. Seale was very active in civic affairs, having served as president of the Rotary Club, Red Cross drive chairman, treasurer of Crowell Chamber of Commerce for 3 years, chairman of the Foard County rationing board during World War II, chairman of Foard County March of Dimes, was a former member of the City Council and had been a board member of the community house for over a decade.

Mr. Seale was a member of the First Christian Church and served as its treasurer for three years. He had been a member of the Masonic Lodge since 1924.

Survivors include his wife; one daughter, Mrs. Richard Stripling of Dallas, and two grandchildren, David and Nancy Stripling.

EDITORIAL

How to Go to College on Credit

(Editor's note: Last week's editorial was written on the importance of attaining a degree from a college or of obtaining training in a technical school. If you disagreed with that article because of money problems, then read and digest the contents of this one.)

Today, to borrow money for a college education can be arranged as easily as to borrow for a TV set, a car, a boat, or the many other items called necessities. Commercial lenders, estate agencies, private organizations, foundations, businesses and other groups are now making loan money available for any capable and dependable person who wants a higher education.

One doesn't have to be financially needy to feel the strain of college expenses. Many parents in the middle and upper income bracket find it difficult to make a lump sum outlay of several thousand dollars. Of particular interest to such people is the United Student Aid Fund which has come to the aid of some thirty thousand deserving students with more than \$25 million. Self-reliance is the idea behind this non-profit organization; a group of business lead-

ers and foundation executives saw loan money as a way to help young people who wanted to help themselves.

Another way available for college financing is through scholarships. Rexford G. Moon, director of the College Scholarship Service of the College Entrance Examination Board, advises students to look first for scholarship money. "The student must consider the effects of borrowing on his future plans," he says. "Borrowed money offers opportunity; it is not a substitute for initiative."

Many schools have their own program of financial assistance for the student who needs help. Often there is little interest to pay, and the principal sometimes may be paid entirely after graduation.

Remember that the person who says "I can't go to college because I don't have the money" may be using this as an excuse. Be sure to investigate if you need help.

Evelyn Faske Named Homemaker of Tomorrow

Evelyn Faske has been named Crowell High School's 1965 Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow. She scored highest in a written homemaker examination taken by senior girls Dec. 1, and is now eligible for state and national honors.

Test papers of all school homemakers of tomorrow in the state are currently being judged. The state's highest ranking girl will receive a \$1,500 scholarship with the state runner-up to be awarded a \$500 educational grant. In addition the school of the state winner will receive a complete set of Encyclopaedia Britannica.

Later this spring, the state homemaker of tomorrow, together with a school advisor, will join first place winners and advisors from each of the 50 states and District of Columbia in a tour of Colonial Williamsburg, Va., Washington, D. C. and New York City. Climax of the week long tour will be the naming of the Betty Crocker All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow. To be chosen on the basis of original test score and personal observation and interviews during the tour, she will receive an increase in her scholarship to \$5,000. Second, third and fourth place winners in the nation will have their grants raised to \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000, respectively.

Including this year's record en-

rollment of more than half a million senior girls in more than 14,000 high schools, the total number of participants during the program's 11-year history stands at four million. Scholarship grants exceed \$1 million.

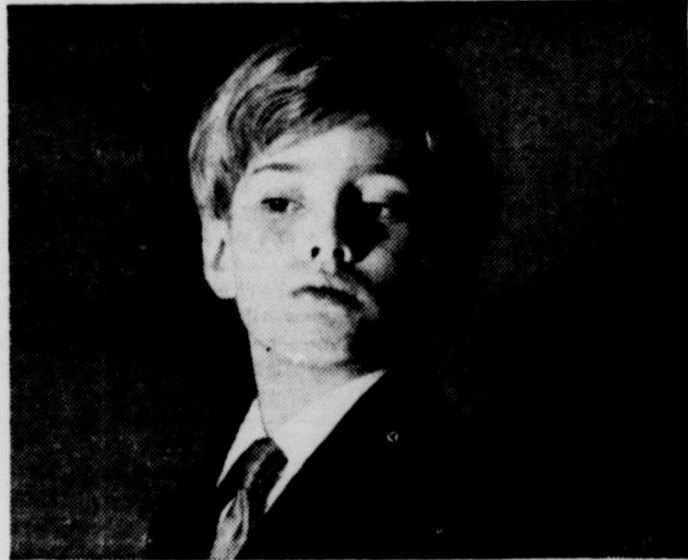

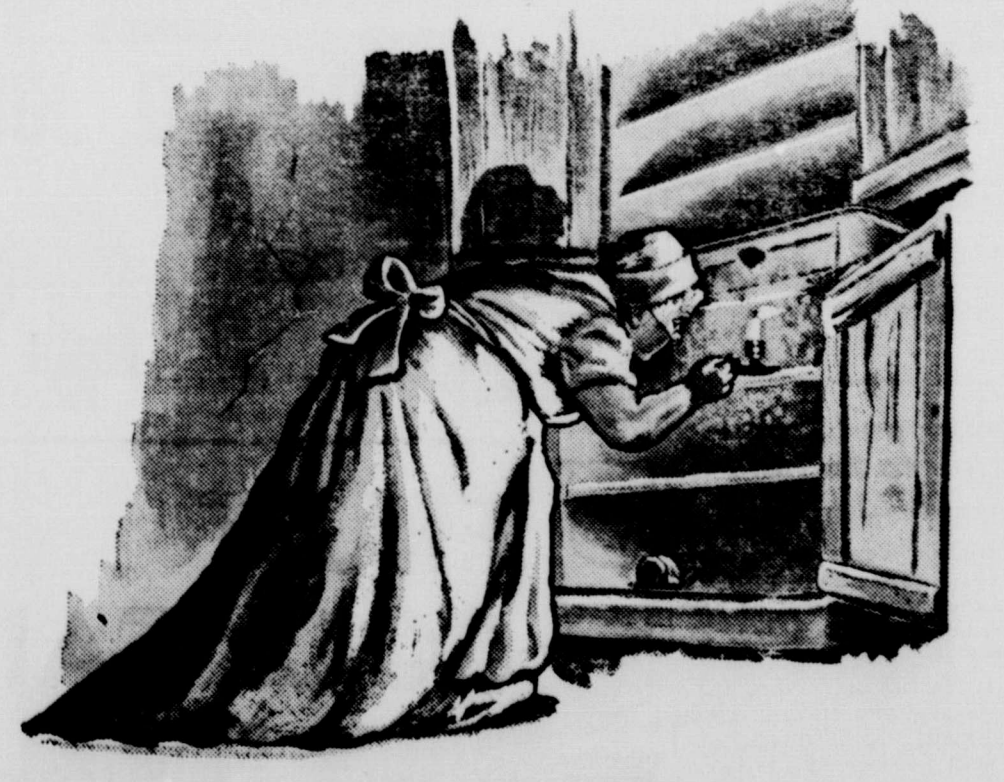

If you have a dependable supply of water in a new pond, or an old pond which is not stocked with fish, then now is a good time to turn in your application for fish. Orders for channel cat are filled during the fall; however, if you desire bass and bluegills, the order should be turned in by the first of March in order to receive a spring delivery. Several applications have been received to date.

A fish pond should be stocked correctly and with the right kind of fish if it is to provide good fishing. A pond stocked properly with bass and bluegill last spring should be ready to start fishing this spring after the bass have spawned.

Applications for fish may be obtained from your local county agent or soil conservation service offices.

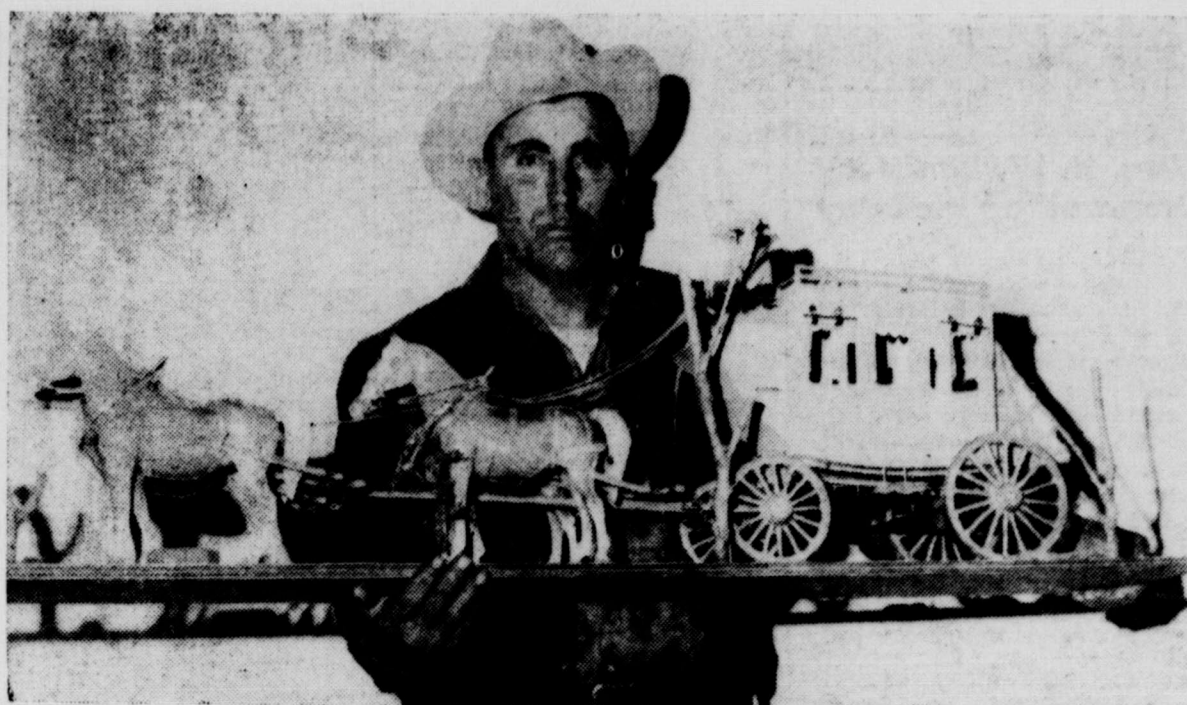

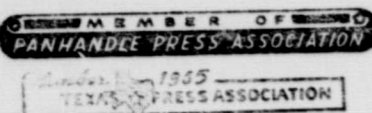

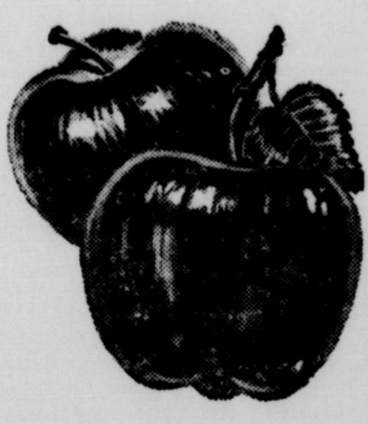

Dun & Bradstreet Releases Business Report for County

This week, A. J. Hemphill, district manager of the Fort Worth office of Dun & Bradstreet, Inc., announced statement requests were mailed to 51 businesses in Foard County. He said figures obtained from a physical count of the Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book for January, 1965.
Mr. Hemphill noted that each January business concerns in all parts of the United States are asked by Dun & Bradstreet for copies of their financial statements. This year requests are being sent to nearly three million business concerns—to the corner grocery store worth a few thousand dollars as well as to businesses worth millions.
The Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book lists those manufacturers, wholesalers, and retailers who seek or grant commercial credit but it does not include some of the service and professional businesses such as beauty and barber shops, security dealers and real estate brokers. Therefore, the figures for total business in the United States would be higher than the three million quoted above.
During the past year, Hemphill added, 30 changes were made in the Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book listings of Foard County businesses, including 10 names added, 9 names deleted, and 11 changes in the ratings of continuing businesses. The changes occurring in Foard County are about even with the rest of the country

where a change of business significance is counted about every five seconds.

When the owner or officer of a business enterprise, or his accountant, fills in and mails his financial statement to Dun & Bradstreet, it becomes a part of the credit report on his business and a factor in determining the credit rating of his business. Mailing the statement, rather than waiting for the Dun & Bradstreet reporter's call means a concern's important suppliers will quickly have the latest facts on which to make credit and sales decisions. When the Dun & Bradstreet reporter receives a business man's financial statement in advance of his periodic call, he can make a more detailed analysis of the financial condition of the business and discuss its operation more intelligently.
Back of each listing of a business in the reference book is a Dun & Bradstreet credit report. The report includes the following: a record of how the business is paying its bills; a history of the business (who owns it, who runs it, and how long it has been operating); a description of what the business does and how it does it; a financial section which usually includes the latest financial statement.
While credit reports are primarily used by business men who want to evaluate the credit risk of a business before shipping or selling, insurance underwriters, bankers, and other professionals also use reports.
