Capt. Eddie H. Jones Receives Viet Nam's Legion of Honor Medal

Captain Eddie Hugh Jones, son of Mrs. Hugh Jones of Childress and grandson of Mrs. M. H. Jones of Crowell, has received Viet Nam's high Legion of Honor medal from Lt. Gen. Nguyen Khanh. Capt. Jones, 33, and his Vietnamese "counterpart," Capt. Minh, had lived more than a month with the aloo Hoa Hao sect in their jungle mountain hideaway. They persuaded 400 guerillas to join South Viet Nam's fight against the Communist Viet Cong.

The whole story of what happened during that strange month in the jungle will "have to wait until I get home," Jones wrote his family. "It would take all day to tell."

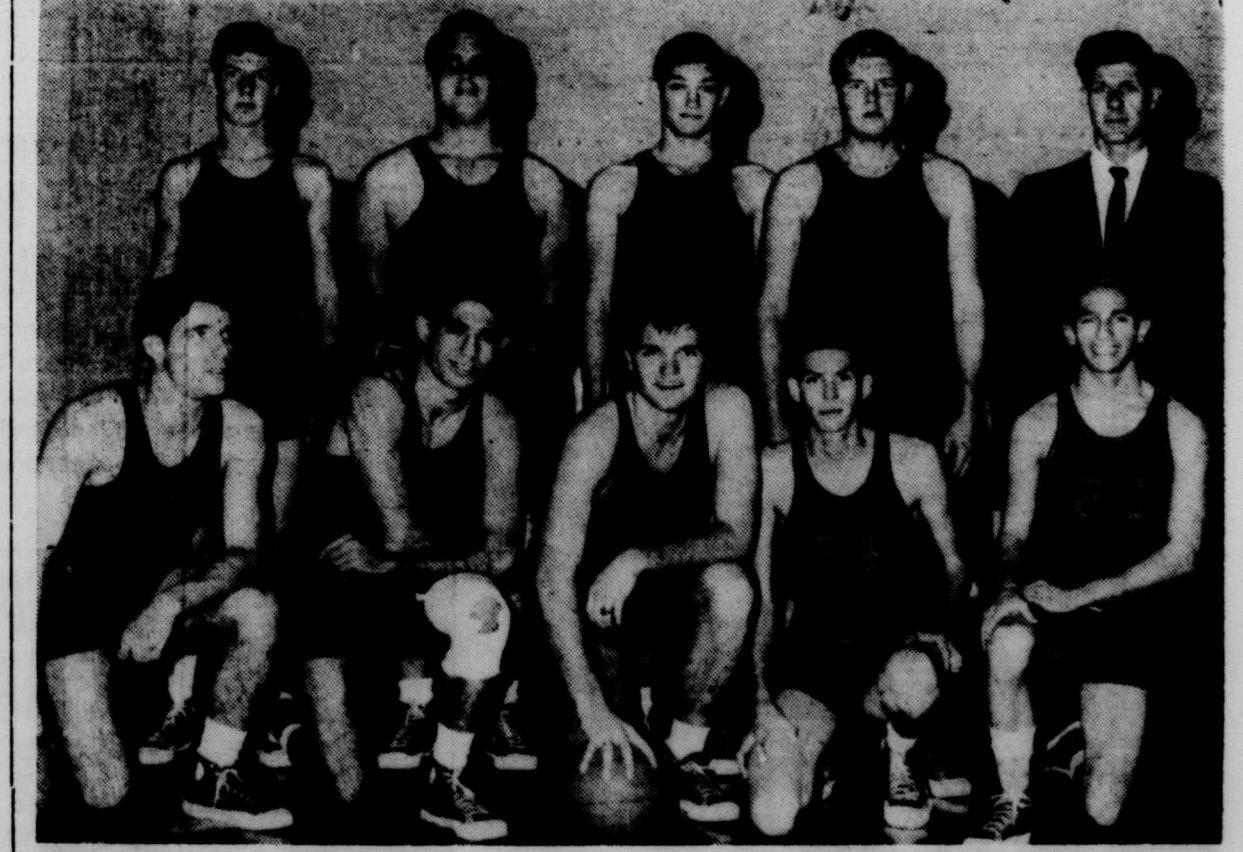
An organizational meeting will be held Feb. 23 at 1:30 p. m. in the homemaking cottage and anyone interested is invited to attend.

February, Our Shortest Month

"Thirty days hath September, April, June and November, All the rest have thirty-one, Except February, which has twenty-eight."

This simple poem states that February is our shortest month; however, in the month we celebrate five very important days: ground hog day, Thomas Edison's birthday, Abraham Lincoln's birthday, Valentine day, and George Washington's birthday.

Traditionally, Feb. 1 has been commonly known as ground hog day; it has been said that if the ground hog sees his shadow on this day, that six weeks of bad weather will follow. Although this is mere superstition, many people believe wholeheartedly in the cliché.

Thomas Edison was born on February 11, 1847. There is hardly an American alive who doesn't know why February 11 is important. This man whom we honor on this day is known for many things, but the one of most importance is that he was the "great emancipator." His many speeches and acts against slavery are recalled today almost as frequently as in his own day; even President Johnson alludes to them.

Valentine's day was observed on February 14.

In the United States, Valentine day became popular in the 1890's at the time of the Civil War. Today, though Valentine's Day is

not a business holiday, it ranks next to Christmas as the festival most celebrated throughout the world.

Feb. 22 brings to mind George Washington, the commander-in-chief of the first American army who did more than any other man toward winning the revolutionary war, and the first president of the United States.

Because of these five celebrated days, February is truly a great month.

Students View Animals of the Sea

"I'd hate to come face to face with a man eating clam or a shark (with its seven sets of teeth) in the briny deep" was typical of the expressions voiced by members of the student body last Wednesday after having listened to Phil Betzold, a noted skin diver, as he told of his many sea experiences and showed numerous strange creatures which he had collected from the vast waters of the earth.

Mr. Betzold, a representative of Southern School Assembly Association, gained much of his knowledge of diving from the natives of the fabulous West Indies; he also learned diving trades from his father.

In the display of fish were the wolf shark, sea horse, nurse, whip, hammer, and porcupine. Several specimens of coral—blue, green, yellow, rose—were shown. According to the speaker, there are 2,500 species of coral, many of which are very poisonous. The students watched eagerly as Mr. Betzold, assisted by Don Borchardt, lifted an octopus from its container as he explained, "This fellow is really different; its legs are fastened to its head and its stomach is behind its head; if something pulls off one of its legs, it just grows another." Sure enough, there it was—ugly, vicious—awful looking thing with long tentacles, one of which had been grown somewhat as an offset from the place that the original one had been torn.

At the conclusion of the program, Mr. Betzold recommended a career in skin diving to anyone interested in the seas and the many mysterious animals that make their abode there.

From the News . . .

THIRTY YEARS AGO

News items below were taken from the Thursday, Feb. 14, 1935, issue of The Foard County News:

"We find the defendant guilty of murder in the first degree," stated the foreman of the jury in the Lindbergh kidnaping case last night at Flemington, N. J., after 11 hours and 6 minutes had been spent in reaching a verdict that pronounced the solemn doom of Bruno Richard Hauptmann, charged with the kidnaping and murder of Baby Charles A. Lindbergh Jr. The announcement of this verdict made it mandatory upon the trial judge, Justice Thomas W. Trenchard, to sentence Hauptmann to death in the electric chair, which he did without delay.

For the first time in a number of years, the general fund of the County of Foard was out of debt last Friday when part of the 1934 tax payments were turned into it. At present, the fund is about two thousand dollars to the good.

The largest crowd of the season is expected at the local gym tomorrow night when the Harold Hornets invade the Wildcat den for the championship contest of the Big Seven race.

Mrs. Campbell was driving the sedan at the time and was returning to her home just east of Crowell with her three children, Doris, Lowell and C. D., whom she had picked up after school. All escaped injury.

A total of thirty-eight gallons of liquor have been taken by the sheriff's department as a result of arrests in recent weeks.

Foard County's second general rain within a week started falling Tuesday morning in a very slow manner and continued until late in the night. At Crowell, the rainfall measured .6 inch and it is reported that this is about the average for the entire county.

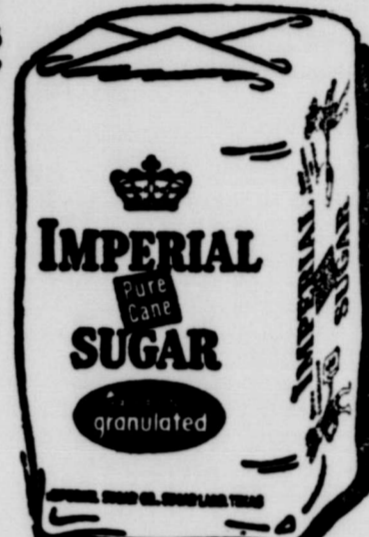

Social Security Number Must Be Listed on Tax Return

Don't forget to list your social security number on your Federal income tax return. The law requires it. If both husband and wife have income, they each should list their numbers on a joint return. If only one has income, only his number is required.

Administrative Officer Murray C. King of the Internal Revenue's Vernon office said social security numbers are being omitted on some returns. Taxpayers should double check to make sure that social security numbers are complete and accurate. Omission of the number will delay processing of your return. This is time-consuming and inconvenient for you and the government.

If you do not have a number, ask the nearest Internal Revenue office or Social Security office for application Form SS-5. Application Form SS-5 may also be secured from most local post offices.

Four Accidents in January Cause Total Damages of \$15,010

There were four rural accidents in Foard County during the month of January, according to Sgt. D. R. Dowdy, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

From these crashes resulted four persons injured and an estimated property damage loss of \$15,010.00.

This leaves 2,700,000 vehicles to be inspected in approximately two months. If the number of un-inspected vehicles were divided evenly among the 5,200 official inspection stations in Texas each would have approximately 520 vehicles to inspect in about 40 working days, or 13 vehicles per day.

Remember—no extension of the Safety Inspection deadline, April 15, 1965.

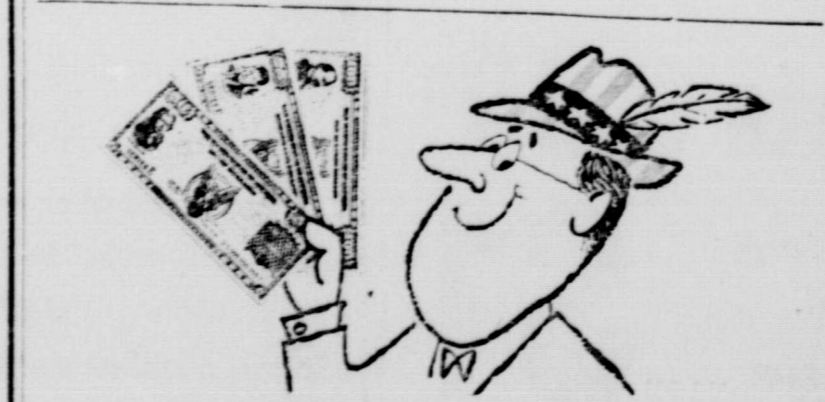
