Instructional Improvement and School Accreditation

The responsibility for determining what it takes to make a good instructional program is that of the local community. The State has the responsibility for establishing minimum standards only and to give leadership to local schools in improving the program.

In carrying out its legal responsibility, the State Board of Education in 1961 approved revisions in the principles and standards for accrediting elementary and secondary schools. These changes resulted from a two-year curriculum improvement study conducted by a state-wide committee and by local schools. The revised principles and standards became effective September 1962.

The Principles and Standards for Accrediting Elementary and Secondary Schools provide the basis for local schools to evaluate programs of instruction, to determine the extent to which standards are being met, and to locate areas for improvement. Course descriptions, grades 7-12, and a description of the program for grades 1-6, are included to assist local schools in developing courses of study.

In visiting and observing schools during Texas Public Schools Week, parents and other citizens may be interested in discussing with school personnel the effect of the revised standards on:

1. School Board Policies.
2. School Objectives.
3. Elementary School Program.
4. Course Offerings.
5. 7th and 8th Grade Requirements.
6. Graduation Requirements.
7. Preparation of Staff.
8. Teaching Methods (local guides and courses of study, teacher plans, and the like).
9. Guidance Services.
10. Special Services to Students (cafeteria, library, school buses, and other services.)
11. The Instructional Materials.
12. The Activity Program.
13. The School Plant.
14. Balance in Educational Opportunities on All School Campuses.

Two Completions Reported in Texaco's L. K. Johnson Lease

Texaco Inc. has taken official Railroad Commission tests at two recently completed wells in Foard County's Choate, North (Cisco K) Field.

The company's No. 38 L. K. Johnson pumped 67.83 barrels of 44 gravity oil, plus 9 per cent water, per day from two perforations per foot at 3876-80, 3898-3900, 3909-14, 3924-27 and 3933-39 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 775-1-1.

Hole was bottomed at 4300 feet and plugged back to 4260 feet for completion after the 5 1/2-inch production string was landed at 4291 feet.

Local Rotarians Mark Rotary's 60th Year

The 60th anniversary of the founding of Rotary, the pioneer service club, was marked this week by the Rotary Club of Crowell. It will commemorate the occasion by hearing a recorded message from the president of Rotary International.

Bud McLain, president of the Rotary Club of Crowell, in announcing the club's anniversary meeting, said, "The local Rotary club joins a world-wide celebration planned by more than 11,800 Rotary clubs and 560,000 Rotarians in 127 countries. The occasion will be marked by men of diverse languages, religions, and political beliefs, but with a common bond in the Rotary ideal of serving others."

The first meeting of the world's first Rotary club was held on Feb. 23, 1905, in Chicago. It brought together the founder, Paul Harris, a lawyer, with three of his business acquaintances: a mining engineer, a merchant tailor, and a coal dealer. In the early days of Rotary, it was agreed that only one representative from each business or profession in the community would be admitted, a principle of membership that continues today.

As its 62th year begins, Rotary is growing at the approximate rate of one club a day. The organization's phenomenal growth indicates the strong appeal of Rotary fellowship and service to men of different vocational backgrounds.

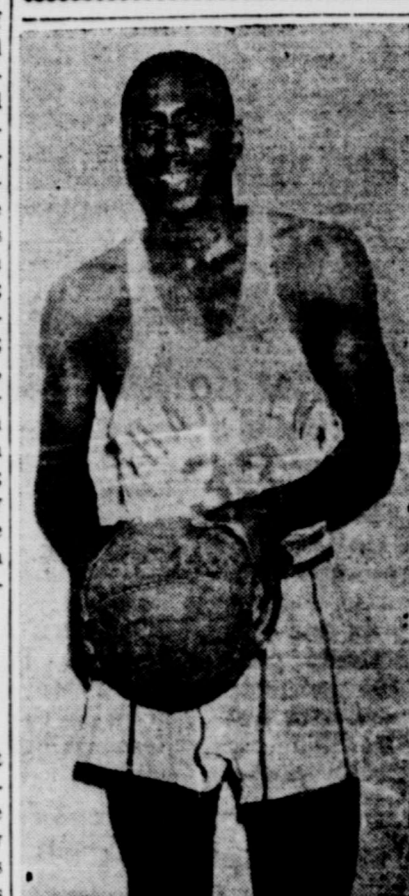

Proposed Teacher Pay Raise Causes Stir in Legislature

Public school teachers are getting a bad "image" with many members of the Texas Legislature. And the feeling appears to be mutual.

As the Legislature completes the first month of a 140-day session, tempers run high over the teachers' pay fight.

The question isn't whether the teachers deserve a pay raise. The governor, 148 representatives and 31 senators are almost unanimous in belief that the average teacher is underpaid.

In Texas, a beginning teacher's minimum pay is \$4,014 a year; the average is about \$5,500. The latter figure represents typical salary for a master's degree teacher with 12 years' experience.

Gov. John Connally is getting considerable mail concerning the teachers' pay question. Most letters to him oppose the Connally proposal—voiced a few weeks ago—for a 10-year plan of salary increases weighted principally toward more pay to the experienced "career" teacher.

The alternative, set in motion months ago by Texas State Teachers Association, is to raise 98,000 classroom teachers by \$45 a month (mostly for nine months) and 9,000 administrators (mostly on 11- and 12-month basis).

A sick leave bill, which would provide teachers with five days a year sick leave, accumulative to 30 days, will be sponsored by Sen. Ralph M. Hall in the Senate and Rep. Wayne Gibbons of Breckenridge in the House.

According to the 1964-65 Research Bulletin by Texas State Teachers Association on Salary Schedules for Classroom Teachers of Texas Public Schools, Crowell is in Group 6—schools systems having from 500 to 1,000 scholastics. There are 240 schools in this group. One hundred and fifty-four schools in this group pay the minimum salary—as Crowell does. Eighty-six pay above minimum with salaries ranging from \$100 to \$1,000 above. Eighty-four already have sick leave as one of their fringe benefits. Other fringe benefits offered by some schools are housing, low-rent housing, housing and utilities, social security (paid by school) and pay for unused sick leave. Crowell's fringe benefit is social security.

The minimum salary schedule for superintendents in a district with a 4-year accredited high school with 16 and less than 50 CTUs is computed by adding 25 per cent of monthly base salary plus experience increments to the monthly base salary plus experience increments and multiply

by 12, and for full-time principals is computed by adding 20 per cent of monthly base salary plus experience increments to monthly base salary plus increments and multiply by 11.

According to a recent article in the Dallas Morning News, Dallas School Supt. W. T. White Sr., 69, is the highest paid public official in the state with a 5-year contract that began in 1962 at about \$33,000. His tenure seems secure as long as his health holds up.

"Crowell's school system cannot be operated nine months unless substantial tax payments to the collector of the Crowell Independent School are made between now and March 15," warns the local school board.

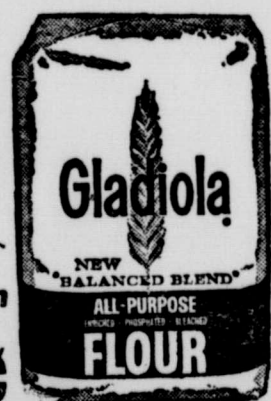

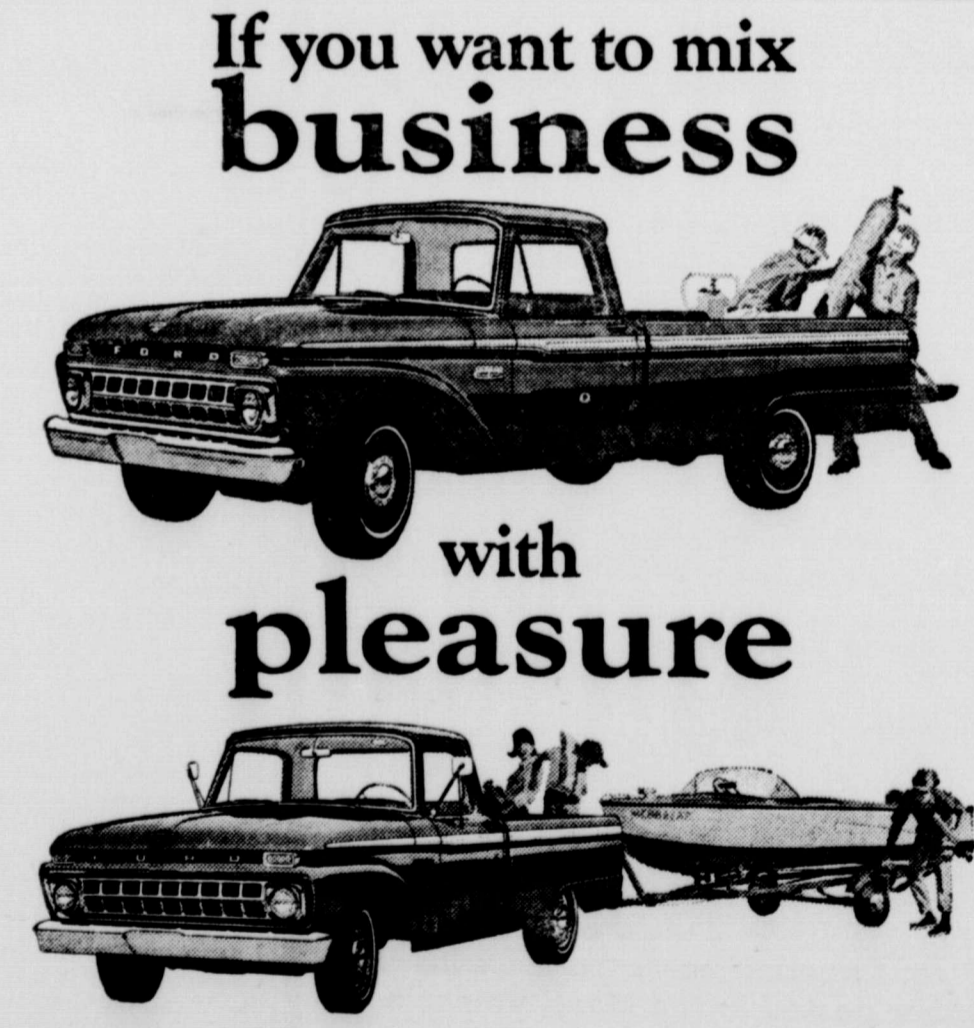

Billy Earl Lynch
Now in 16-Weeks Training Program

College Station—Billy Earl Lynch Sr. of Crowell was among sixteen men enrolled last week in the 16th Game Warden's School at Texas A&M University.

The men will receive 16 weeks of training, ranging from basic wildlife courses to law to physical education. They will spend eight hours a day in the classroom and at least two additional hours in study sessions.

Director of the school is Bob Evans, district conservation chief in San Antonio for the Texas Department of Parks and Wildlife. Other instructors will be faculty members at A&M and Parks and Wildlife officers from various areas of the state.

Currently identified as Game Warden trainees, the men who successfully complete the school will be certified as Game Wardens I, a classification they will retain for at least a year.

Evans said the school is equivalent to 23 hours of college work. Trainees are required to have at least a high school diploma. They also must be between 21 and 40 and at least five feet, eight inches tall.

Unlike college students, the trainees receive a salary while in school. They also wear khaki uniforms and caps. Although they stay in college dormitory trainees are free to eat where they choose.

The curriculum includes wildlife management practices, fish and pond management, public speaking, first aid, drivers education, records and reports, public relations, civil defense, field trips, boating and water safety. A laboratory session for the study of birds and fish is also included.
