### Senator Hightower Stays Busy with Duties in Capitol

What's a week or a day like for a Senator? During this session of the Texas Legislature, the 23rd District's new Senator is putting in many busy days. Senator Jack Hightower meets with ten major Senate committees each week as a voting member of the committees. He also chairsman one committee. Each bill introduced in the Senate must go to a committee where the public has an opportunity to express its views. So, with many committee responsibilities, a Senator's day is full. On most days the Senator from District 23 grabs a candy bar for lunch and cheese and crackers for supper. It's the only way to attend to business for the Senator who reads every newspaper from his district, answers an ever-increasing volume of mail and maintains an "open door" policy in his office at the Capitol in Austin and in the district on week ends. Hightower spends a great deal of time studying proposed bills so that when he casts his vote it will have been weighed carefully. Senator Hightower has proposed legislation of purely local interest, as well as some basic changes in laws. To date, he has authored 22 different measures. What's a typical day like on Capitol Hill? Last week, the Senate met almost all day on Monday. On Tuesday, Hightower attended first an insurance committee hearing, then a state affairs committee hearing, all before the Senate convened for the morning session. That day, he had lunch with some constituents meeting with the Texas Historical Survey Association. He participated on the program of a legislative workshop of the Baptist General Convention at 2:30 in the afternoon. He returned to the Capitol and met with Governor Connally on district leg-

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## History of Barbed Wire Tells History of Cattle Industry

The ten years following the Civil War were marked by a tremendous increase in the meat packing industry, thus the cattle ranchers needed plenty of space to expand their herds and improve their stock. Scrub cattle and mangel watering facilities resulted in poor quality stock, so the ranchers constantly improved their herds and dug water wells on the open range to insure these benefits to themselves. "Free grass" meant anybody's scrub cattle could mix with the improved ones and drink up the water. It also meant more opportunity for rustlers and brand changers.

The sheep-cattle controversy added to the need for cheap fencing. Sheep herders wanted fences to protect their flocks from the open range, and cattlemen wanted the sheep out of their way. Homesteaders, or "nesters," had use for neither and wanted only to protect their farms.

Smooth wire was no obstacle and wooden fences were too expensive; the cowboy who built the first barbed drift fence to keep his cattle from straying too far from camp during winter storms little realized what he was starting, for it opened up the era when cattlemen and farmers fought each other with wire cutters and six-shooters. A law became effective that no cowboy should carry pliers in his saddle bag.

As cattlemen accepted it, barbed wire took over and revolutionized cattle ranching; by 1890, fences were being erected throughout the cattle country and the free range was little more than a memory.

The story of the barbed wire in Foard County is by no means complete. The County Historical Survey Committee would like to have information on the first fences in the area. According to late Jim Olds, herds were once held and worked near the depot in Crowell. When the cowboys left with the herd they opened one gate about a mile southeast of the cemetery; it was the last until they reached their destination, the Witherspoon Ranch, which is now part of the Haisell Ranch.

As a boy living on a ranch in King County, Curtis Ribble remembers opening three gates between their ranch home and Crowell. Wagon roads in those days wound their way across the country. The first gate, according to Mr. Ribble, was in King County, the second was near the end of the present Farm Road 2003 in the Good Creek community, and the third was near Dixie Mound in the Wishon Ranch.

The County Historical Survey Committee has on display a collection of barbed wire in the window at Shirley-Youree. Mrs. Virgil Johnson became interested in the different kinds of wire, and it is her collection that is being displayed. In submitting this article, Mrs. Johnson asked that people of Foard County notice the collection and add to it as other productions of barbed wire are found.

A western barbecue at 6 p. m., rodeo at 8 and barn dance following the rodeo will round out the entertainment. Cutting and reining contests will come off Saturday, April 24.

**THIRTY YEARS AGO**

News items below were taken from the Thursday, April 4, 1935, issue of The Foard County News:
