RAIL RIDE TO PADUCAH TO BEGIN ON APRIL 22

For the second consecutive year Foard County riders will make a ride to the Paducah Horse and Rodeo. Plans were made for the trail ride at a meeting of the Crowell Riding Club Monday night at the DeLuxe Cafe.

Dude Moseley Retires After 28 Years as Texas Game Warden

Veteran Game Warden P. D. (Dude) Moseley of Canadian, who retired March 31, after 28 years with the Texas Game and Fish Department, was honored at a dinner in Canadian prior to his retirement.

Mr. Moseley and his family are former Crowell residents. Hosts at the affair were the Game Wardens of Region I, which includes all of the Texas Panhandle. Nine wardens and biologists and four retired wardens were on hand for the occasion.

Jim Thomas of the Amarillo Globe-News presented to Moseley on behalf of the Globe-News, a handsomely engraved silver plaque in the shape of the State of Texas, with the legend inscribed "Warden P. D. Moseley for 28 years of service dedicated to the conservation and preservation of wildlife in the State of Texas." Warden Lake Black of Amarillo presented on behalf of Paul Timmons of the Globe-News staff an award from the Sportsmen's Clubs of Texas . . . a framed plaque inscribed to Warden Moseley.

And the host wardens presented Moseley with an Ambassador 5000 rod and reel. Senator Andy Rogers of Childress presented messages of congratulations from Governor John Connally and Senator Grady Hazlewood.

Dude Moseley started work with the Game Department in October 1937. Twenty-three years of his 28 years of service with the department have been in Canadian.

"And I've enjoyed every bit of it," Moseley said. "I've certainly enjoyed working here . . . the people are great . . . and we're going to stay in Canadian. This is home."

Funds Still Needed for Foard County's Portion of Screwworm Program

The goal for Foard County in the screwworm eradication fund drive was set at \$720.00, John Glenn Halsell Jr., chairman of the Foard County Animal Health Committee, has announced.

To date, contributions in the amount of \$625.72 have been turned in to Merl Kincaid, secretary-treasurer of the county animal health committee and screwworm fund drive. Mr. Kincaid expressed his appreciation to the good response so far; but added "we are still short of our goal and all livestock owners are urged to make their contribution as soon as possible." The funds are necessary in order to keep this worthwhile and successful program going, Mr. Kincaid added.

Joe Burkett, County Agent, said in the three years the program has been in existence, savings of more than \$168 million have been realized by producers. He said no screwworm infestations were detected or sent in from Foard County for identification during 1964. All cases sent in turned out to be non-screwworm maggots, Burkett added.

A sunrise Easter service will be held Sunday morning beginning at 6 o'clock on the east side of the court house in Crowell.

This special service is being sponsored by the Crowell Ministers' Association.

The program to be presented includes the invocation to be given by Rev. Cotton Production and Insect Control Meeting Set

A county-wide cotton production and insect control meeting for Foard and Hardeman Counties will be held at Lake Pauline Club house, about 4 miles east of Quana on Highway 287, Thursday, April 22, at 2:30 p. m., according to Joe Burkett, county agent.

Cost-cutting and the newest practices on efficient production will be presented along with results of more than 65 Texas Agricultural Experiment Station projects and experiences of numerous grower-demonstrators using various practices to cut cost of production.

This is a very important meeting and all cotton producers are urged to attend, Burkett added.

The Thalia Baptist Church will have an early morning Easter service at 7 a. m. next Sunday.


Church and Sunday school will be combined for the morning service, the pastor, Rev. W. A. Ritchie, announced Monday.

**Easter for Worship,

Philip Welch, a CHS graduate of 1964, will speak at the special Easter service to be held at sunrise at the Foard County court house next Sunday. The students and faculty of CHS are proud of Philip, and they wish to invite all in this area to attend this service.

The National Society for Crippled Children and Adults (The Easter Seal Society) is the oldest

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and largest voluntary agency service that serves the crippled. It treated nearly a quarter of a million crippled persons last year. Rehabilitation treatment, available in every state, is given regardless of creed, race, or cause of crippling. More than 1,400 affiliated units support clinics, home and itinerant therapy, rehabilitation centers and specialized camps from contributions to the annual Easter Seal appeal, to which you may make contributions to this worthy cause through Easter Sunday, April 18.

One of Christianity's most celebrated early converts, the Emperor Constantine, is credited by historians with having made the Easterite custom that has persisted through the centuries. The emperor decreed that, as a special honor to the newly risen Lord, every member of his court appear on Easter morning in new raiment. This tangible symbol of rebirth and new life, after the austere period of Lent, we observe to this day.

The egg and rabbit as symbols of the Easter season derive from the ancient festival of the Norsemen called Ostara or Eastre which commemorated the birth and divinity of spring. They represent the life-giving force in the reproduction of new species. Coloring for Easter eggs was originally practiced to capture the beauty given off by the rays of the Aurora Borealis, northern lights, and the dawning hues of the sun.

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**Purcell Praises
 Administration's
 Wheat Program**

Congressman Graham Purcell praised the Johnson Administration for its "understanding approach to the needs of the American wheat producers and their present financial problems."

"The legislative proposals put forth this week by the Administration," said Purcell, "will go a long way toward allowing the wheat farmer to share in the prosperity of our great nation. I commend the President and Secretary of Agriculture for their support of a continuation of the certificate program for wheat adopted in the last Congress, and for their desire to increase the income of the wheat farmer to a 100 per cent parity level for that part of his wheat crop which is consumed by the American public."

Purcell continued, "I know that the vast majority of Americans share my view that our farmers should not be expected to receive less than a fair share of the economic abundance of our nation."

"While we hear talk of farm subsidies, it is time we realized that the farmer of America has been subsidizing the American public for a long time. The financial hardship he has suffered has been, to a large measure, responsible for our economic growth and prosperity on a national level. It is because of the skill and ingenuity of our farmers that Americans spend less of their consumer dollar for food than is the case in any other major nation in the world."

"While our food costs have gone up over the years, they have grown up at a much smaller rate than the costs of other products. We can see why when we note, for example, that the farmer is still receiving the same price for the wheat in a loaf of bread that he received twenty years ago."

Purcell said that, although the proposed increase in the price of wheat would justify a one cent increase in the cost of a loaf of bread, "this is a very small price to pay to insure a continuation of the food abundance and econ-

omy we enjoy by allowing farmers to receive enough for products of their investment of labor to continue to give us the best food in the world for the lowest price."

The U. S. consumer pays about 19 per cent of his cost for food today, compared to 50 per cent in the Soviet Union. The wheat price increase now proposed, said Purcell, would increase food costs only \$1.35 per bushel.

Purcell, who is chairman of the wheat subcommittee of the House Committee on Agriculture, said he hopes that Congress will support the approach taken by the administration in the legislative program submitted last week.

Whooper Hop Near at Aransas Refuge

Texas' celebrated airborne wildlife exhibit—the whooping cranes—are poised for the 2,000 mile spring hop from the Aransas National Refuge on the Gulf Coast to Wood Buffalo National Park in the Arctic Circle. And Robert H. Shields, refuge manager, is anxious because he was fog-bound six days before he finally got his spotter plane airborne to determine that nothing has happened yet. That meant all 42 of the giant white birds, with their black-tipped wings, still were on location. He actually spotted only 41 but assumed the flock's odd ball was around somewhere. That's the character that put off its 1964 departure until May 16, a good month after the average take-off date. Thus the headline number in nature's mysterious migration will again challenge the countless observers, including the noted Whooper Network, to see a whooper on the northward flight. Top ornithologists have long been frustrated in trying to chart the actual route followed. It is known that the majestic birds, with their red crowns, await a favoring wind to start, travel at great altitudes and sometimes mingle in flight with almost-as-large sandhill cranes. The 1965 nesting season will be watched with unusual interest by wildlife authorities because last year's gain of ten young birds was the largest in many years. Another young whooper missed the flight southward when it side-swiped a snag in practice flights, crippled a wing and had to be airlifted to Colorado for repairs. Six whoopers are in captivity in New Orleans and one in San Antonio.



Jones' father, the late John T. L. Jones Sr., was a long-time quarterhorse breeder before his death in 1958.

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


