A contract for 8.96 miles of construction on FM Road 263 and 1594 in Foard County has been awarded to an Olney firm, it was announced in Austin this week by the State Highway Commission.

A & A Contractors submitted the low bid of \$102,727.19 on the project.

Reconstruct grading, structures, base and surfacing on FM 263 from SH 283, 7 miles south of Crowell, west; and on FM 1594, from SH 283, 4 miles south of Crowell, east, is expected to take 100 working days, according to R. W. Crook, district highway engineer at Fort Worth.

George R. Wall, resident engineer at Munday, will be in active charge of the project while it is under construction.

is for local maintenance, and No. 2 will be whether or not the board shall be authorized to issue bonds of \$225,000 for school improvements, with the bonds due and payable serially, and at an interest rate not to exceed 4 per cent.

The bulk of the sum—\$165,000—would be used in the construction of a new 15,000 square foot building to house a gymnasium with modern dressing rooms and locker facilities, a band and choral room with three practice rooms for band and ample storage for instruments and music, uniforms and robes, and a classroom for health. There will be 13,000 square feet in the gymnasium facilities and 2,000 square feet for the band and health rooms.

The remainder of the sum—\$60,000—would be used for teaching aids and improvements of present physical facilities. A breakdown of how this money would be spent include the following:

Teaching aids for all buildings of the school, \$15,000. These teaching aids are books for library and English department, books for the primary department, encyclopedias, overhead projectors, record players, tape recorders, copying machine, audiometer, science movable lab for primary department, microscopes for both labs, equipment for home economics department, maps, globes, charts, additional musical instruments, music for band and chorus, math lab, additional tools for VA department, a piano for chorus, and other items deemed necessary by teachers.

New desks and chairs throughout school for every student, and modern library tables in grade school library and high school library, \$12,000.

Filing cabinets and storage for all rooms and teachers. The space to keep extra teaching aids, records, and papers, \$2,100.

Modern science laboratory, \$10,000. It was noted by the board that federal aid is available for science programs, and could possibly reduce this cost.

Other items in the proposed spending program are:

Construction of two new rest rooms in grade school and upgrading existing rest rooms at a cost of \$8,000.

Redecorating the grade school, high school, cafeteria and home economics buildings at a cost of \$4,010. This includes painting and refinishing the floors.

New lights throughout both buildings at a cost of \$5,000.

Dishwasher and equipment for the cafeteria, \$2,700.

The remaining \$1,100 would be used to pay the amount still due on choir robes purchased last fall.

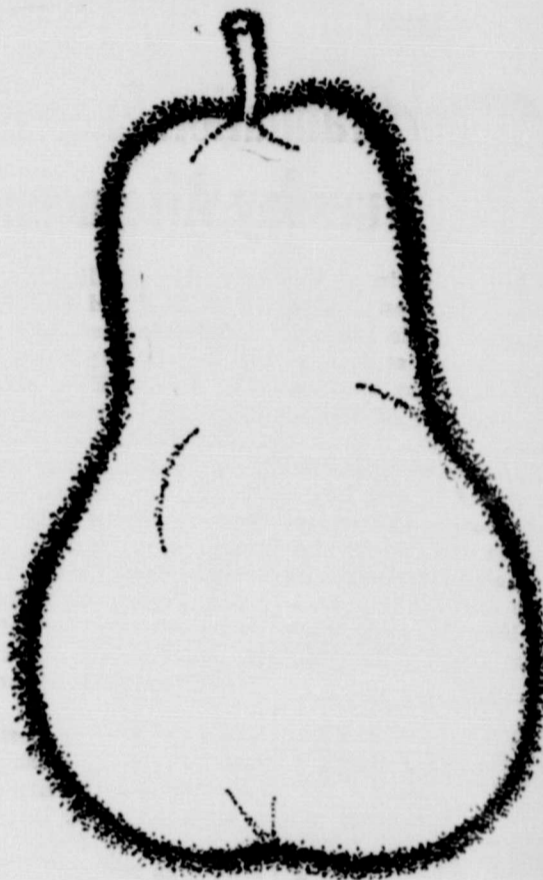
#### Railroads Add to Nation's Economy

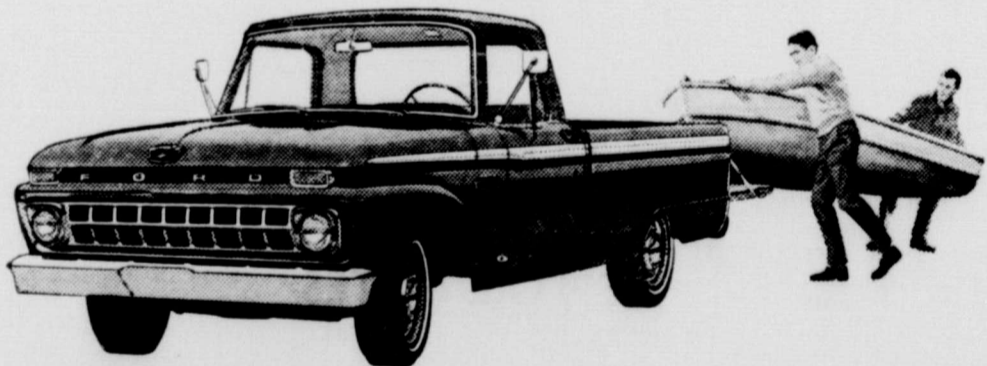
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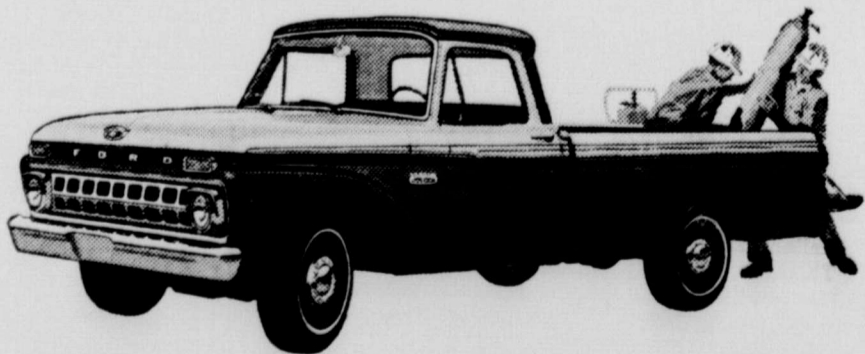

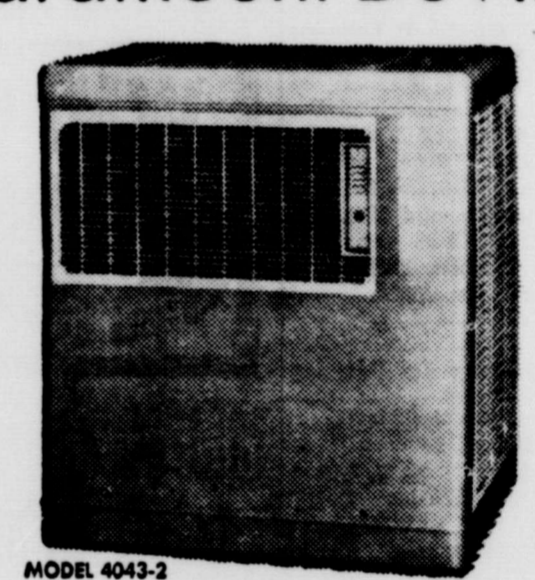

### Two Minutes With the Bible

Faith, Hope and Love

"And now abideth faith, hope, love, these three; but the greatest of these is love" (1 Cor. 13: 13).

St. Paul had been discussing, in I Cor. 13, some of the miraculous signs that were to vanish away as God's revelation became complete. But faith, hope and love, he declared, would abide as a triune evidence of true Christianity.

These three are all we need in the present "dispensation of the grace of God." Any church where faith, hope and love are found in full measure is a "full" church. It may have but a few members, but what greater blessing could it wish for than faith, hope and love in abundant measure?

Faith, hope and love are a trinity often referred to in St. Paul's epistles. Each is of primary importance in its way, and none can exist without the other two.

Faith is of primary importance. "Without faith it is impossible to please God" (Heb. 11:6), and how can there be hope and love without faith?

Hope holds the central place among the three. Hope in the Bible is more than a wish, it is the opposite of despair, and eager anticipation of blessings to come. Hope is the Christian's experience, his living with eternity's glory in

view. Love is the crowning glory of the three; it is the fruit of faith and hope, and is greatest in the sense that it is "the bond of perfectness." Moreover, love is eternal for some day for every true believer, "Faith will vanish in sight; hope be emptied in delight" and love will reign supreme.

### Volunteers Needed Here for Head Start Project

Project Head Start, to help prepare poor children for school, needs a number of volunteers who will have to be mobilized before this summer in communities like this.

Project Head Start is part of the nation's war on poverty. It is the program to help children from poor homes who are already behind when they enter. Head Start will help close the gap by broadening the child's experience with the world in which we live so that they can start school on an equal footing with more fortunate children.

In Foard County, application to the Office of Economic Opportunity for funds for this project in the war on poverty has been made by the Crowell Consolidated Independent School District. This agency plans to operate one Child Development Center.

Nationwide, the program is designed to provide one salaried teacher for every 15 children. But experts agree there should be at least three persons involved for that number of children. If projects cover 500,000 children, 100,000 full-time volunteers would be needed—or more than 1 for every five youngsters.

Volunteers who can spend full time are preferred, but if there are many who can spend only part of a day or only several days a week, as many as 500,000 different persons might have to donate time to helping with the children, officials estimate.

The great need among volunteers is for understanding and the patience to help a child who has never seen a clock tell time, the time to read aloud a story to a child whose knowledge of the spoken word is too limited, the capacity to understand and to help a child who doesn't know the differences between colors or the meaning of in or out.

Volunteers will be needed for such activities as picking up children at their homes and bringing them home after each session.

### Texans Can Now Get Personalized, Prestige Auto License Plates

Now Texans have a new status symbol: personalized, prestige auto license plates.

A bill approved by the Legislature and signed by Gov. Connally last week authorizes issuance of personalized license plates upon payment of a \$10 fee in addition to normal auto registration charges.

Not only may Texans have their automobiles identified with distinctive one-of-a-kind license plates, but the Texas treasury will get a substantial boost, too.

It has been estimated that the measure may raise as much as \$5 million—or personalized plates registered in the state. Ninety-five per cent of all fees will be paid to the state's general fund.

The measure was recommended by Gov. Connally to help finance the Texas program for tourism.

Although the bill does not become effective until 90 days after the Legislature adjourns, the Motor Vehicle Division will begin accepting applications at once. The estimated date that plates will be issued for use is on or about August 24.

Obviously, only one plate of a kind may be issued. And it will go to the first applicant. Once a specific, personalized license plate has been assigned to a motorist, it will be reserved for his use in succeeding years if his renewal application is submitted by Jan. 1.

All applications must be sent to the Motor Vehicle Division, Texas Highway Department, 40th & Jackson, Austin. Application forms now are available at the individual county tax assessor-collector's office. They must be accompanied by the \$10 personalized license registration fee. A similar fee, in addition to normal registration charges, will be required each year a personalized plate is issued.

## THIRTY YEARS AGO

News items below were taken from the Thursday, May 9, 1935, issue of The Foard County News:

The finest rain to cover Foard County in many weeks started falling last Friday night and before it stopped late Saturday night, it had averaged around two inches over the entire county. The official measurement of the down-fall at Crowell was 2.41 inches.
