Two Crowell women sustained injuries in a two-car collision .6 mile west of Vernon Saturday afternoon at the intersection of U. S. 287 expressway and a cross-over to Hillcrest Drive.

Mrs. E. R. Roland, driving a 1965 Ford owned by Mrs. Alva Spencer, sustained bruises and was treated for shock at a Vernon hospital and released. Mrs. Spencer, a passenger in her own car, suffered a severe head injury.

The other car involved was a 1957 Oldsmobile driven by L. L. Morrison of Amarillo. The Morrison auto was headed east on the expressway and the Crowell car was headed northeast crossing the expressway lane. Mr. Morrison and four passengers in his car escaped injury. Foard County Cotton Farmers Okay Allotments

Cotton producers in Foard County followed a national trend Tuesday of last week in giving overwhelming approval to marketing quotas for the 1966 cotton crop while also soundly rejecting transfer of cotton allotments by lease or sale to other counties.

Foard County cotton producers approved marketing quotas 107 to 9, while rejecting allotment transfers 118 to 65.

FIRST FROST OF SEASON COMES SATURDAY

Foard County received its first frost early Saturday morning, November 27. Each morning since then there has been a frost and the cotton has been killed. Within a short time, farmers will be able to strip their cotton. Defoliating this year did not prove too successful as the warm weather kept the plant alive, and before the leaves that were killed could dry out, new leaves had already sprouted. These frosts are expected to give a good kill.

The county's four gins processed a total of 176 bales last week to bring the total ginnings for this county up to 1,865 bales. Ginnings at this time last year totaled 1,668 bales.

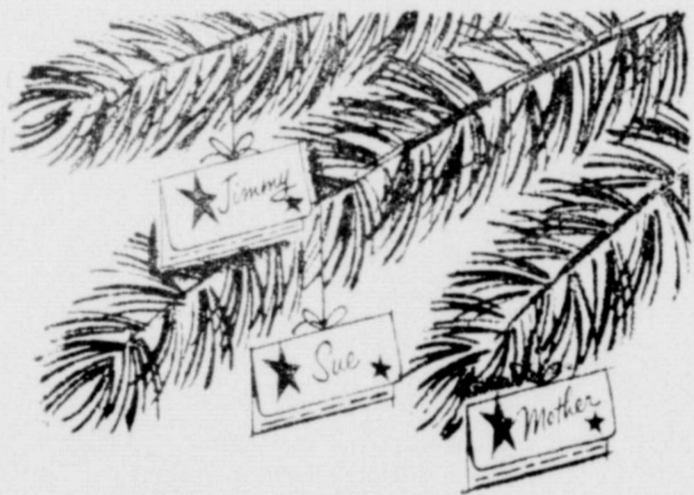

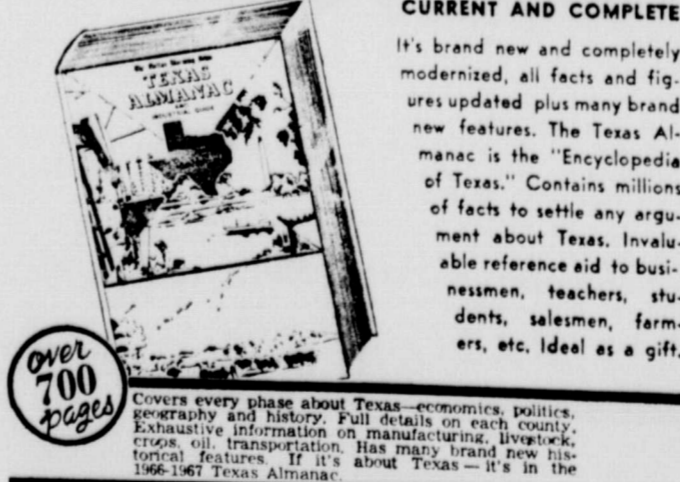

Grazing Regrowth of Sorghum Plants

A light frost on sorghum or sorghum stubble regrowth may cause it to be a dangerous pasture for cattle. Sorghum plants under stress may have a tendency to build up prussic acid in the plant. Cattle can be killed by consuming only a small amount of this prussic acid, advises County Agent Joe Burkett.

Sorghum plants or sorghum regrowth can be safely pastured within a week after the plant has been killed and there is no possibility of any regrowth from the crown of the plant. Most of the danger, says the county agent,

comes from fields that have been partially killed, but on warm days make some regrowth. Under normal conditions, sudan grass can be safely pastured. During the fall when the plant is stunted by light frost, there is a slight possibility of a build-up of prussic acid in the plant. This seldom happens, but when it does, cattle that pasture on sudan grass can be lost.

Alfalfa should be completely dormant before pasturing in the fall. There are two reasons for this: (1) The fall growth should be left on as long as the plant is growing to store nutrients in the roots for the next season's growth; (2) As long as there is green succulent growth at the crown of the plant, there is more danger of bloat in cattle pasturing the alfalfa. After the plant is dormant there is much less likelihood of bloat.

County Agent Says Leaf Rust Doing Damage to Foard County Wheat

Conditions have been just right for leaf rust to severely attack wheat this fall in Foard County, County Agent Joe Burkett says.

This year's outbreak of leaf rust can be attributed to the moist, mild weather this fall. Cold, dry weather will kill the fungus, which eats on plant leaves and is spread by wind, the agent said.

Leaf rust will not cause as much damage if the plants are generally healthy and develop a strong root system before cold weather, according to Burkett.

The best remedy at this time is to give the wheat every opportunity to develop before winter comes, according to Plant Pathologist Robert Berry, area extension specialist working out of the South Plains Research and Extension Center near Lubbock.

Berry says irrigation can help wheat with leaf rust if there is inadequate soil moisture for continued plant growth. He warns against over grazing that would put added stress on affected fields.

Grazing may appear to reduce leaf rust, but cattle are more likely to eat new, unaffected leaves than to eat the diseased ones. Replanting at this late date is not recommended.

The leaf rust spores come into this area each year from South Texas. Usually they are killed by cold weather everywhere north of the San Antonio area, Burkett said.

Most years leaf rust is not a serious problem in this area because of the dry, cold winters. However, a mild winter last year allowed it to overwinter as far north as Baylor and Knox Counties. Due to these favorable conditions for its development, rust is causing serious damage to some wheat in the county, Burkett concluded.
