Bargain in Christmas Kindness

An error in a recent New York City newspaper ad offered TV sets at \$8.98 instead of the correct \$88.98. No wonder the store was besieged. Santa Claus certainly seemed to be reckoning.

Mrs. T. F. Lambert, 83, long-time Foard County resident who had lived in Vernon since 1952, died Saturday evening in a Vernon hospital after an illness of five months.

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Monday in the First Methodist Church in Vernon conducted by the pastor, Dr. Ray N. Johnson. Interment was in East View Memorial Park under direction of Sullivan Funeral Home. Grandsons served as pall bearers.

Mrs. Lambert was born Sept. 12, 1882, in Grayson County near Whitesboro. She was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Tipps.

She was married to Mr. Lambert March 25, 1900, at Whitesboro. They moved to Foard County near Rayland in September, 1909. Mr. Lambert died in 1944.

Mrs. Lambert continued to operate their farm following the death of her husband until 1952 when she retired to move to Vernon.

A son, Lois Lambert, and four other children also preceded their mother in death.

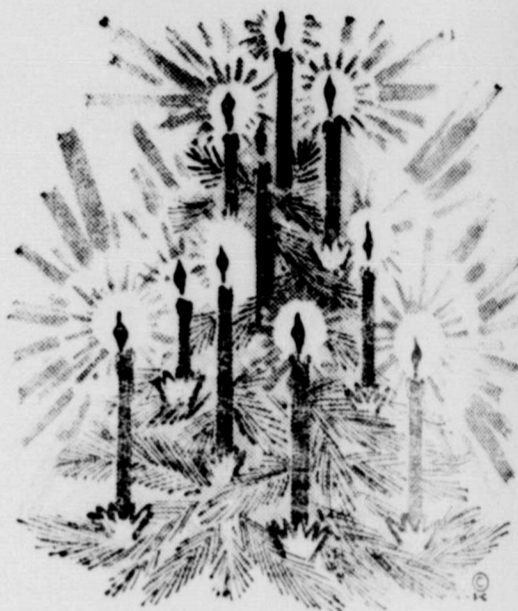

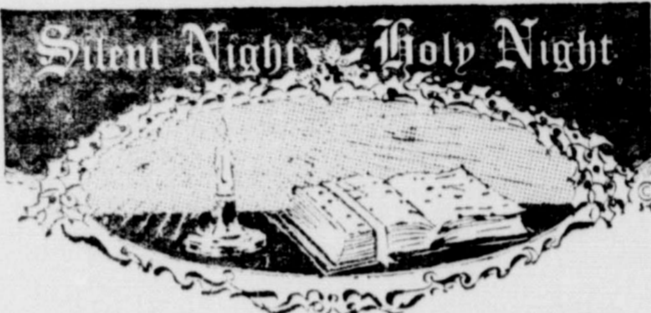

Turkeys Are in Spotlight Again

Turkeys are in the spotlight again as the Christmas season approaches, reminds Mrs. Gwen Clyatt, consumer marketing specialist at Texas A&M University.

You'll find excellent values in turkeys, with the large size ranging from 16 to 20 pounds generally the most economical. If you cannot use a whole turkey, your retailer will cut it into halves or parts at your request.

Good beef values this week include round steaks and roasts, ground beef, chuck roasts and steaks. In the pork line, picnics and pork liver are among good buys. Fryers remain the number one bargain in most meat departments.

Vegetables are in fair supply, with good selections offered in carrots, mustard, collards, turnips and greens, dry yellow onions and white potatoes. Other choices include broccoli, cauliflower and cabbage which provides good menu variety.

Large size eggs remain the best buy for holiday cooking and baking.

Fresh fruit priced economically this week includes bananas, grapefruit, oranges, tangelos, cranberries and tangerines.

Marketing of sweet potatoes is about at the season's peak. Prices have remained reasonable because of a greater than usual harvest this year. Per capita consumption of sweet potatoes has been running slightly above 7 pounds. Canned sweet potatoes make up about one pound per person of this total amount.

Whether boiled, baked, fried, mashed, candied or glazed, sweet potatoes are good in many meals. They are used, too, in pies, puddings, rolls and biscuits. They go nicely with ham, pork, chicken and turkey, as well as apples, pineapple and oranges.

Democrats Sponsor Art Contest

The third annual state Citation Art Exhibition, sponsored by Gov. Connally and the state Democratic Executive Committee, is underway. The aim of this annual exhibition, with its tangible awards for excellence, is to encourage young people to get interested in and continue their studies in the arts and humanities, and by this, and similar efforts, to enrich the personal contact between elected state leadership and all citizens in the state.

Scholarship awards, in the name of the Democratic women of Texas, will be presented by Gov. Connally and will consist of: first, \$500 purchase prize; second, \$300 purchase prize; and third, \$200 purchase prize. These scholarship awards are to be used for formal studies in the arts or humanities.

This division is open to any artist currently enrolled in a public, private or parochial school in Texas, in the 9th, 10th, 11th or 12th grades, and who is a resident of Texas and of the senatorial district in which the local contest is held.

A merit division, whose award

is \$100, is open to any artist of any age who is a resident of the state of Texas and of the senatorial district in which the local contest is held, and who does not derive more than 1/2 of his annual income from the sale of art work.

Mrs. J. P. Coleman, chairman of the 23rd Senatorial District Art committee, has appointed Mrs. Ray Shirley as county chairman. District winners will be selected on Jan. 24 at a showing in Wichita Falls. Foard County entrants are asked to submit their pictures to Mrs. Shirley by Jan. 21.

The three top entries of the district in the high school category and the one in the "merit" classification will be judged in Austin on Feb. 1. Entry blanks and additional information may be obtained from Ray Shirley.

Wildlife Show Birds for Trips

The state's only traveling bird, beast and fish show is in holiday quarters after traveling ten thousand miles during its fall tour and being viewed by an estimated quarter of a million persons.

The exhibit, sponsored by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department as a key part of its educational program, has been on the road since 1950, with times out of course for seasonal re-groupings.

The next appearance of the popular animal kingdom-on-wheels

will be at the Houston National Boat and Sports Show, January 11-16, which incidentally marked its first stand fifteen years ago. The exhibit which was launched with a small assortment of wildlife in March, 1950, now comprises four modern vehicles which transport everything from assorted live fish and bird life to poisonous snakes and wild cats.

Harley Berg, veteran game warden in charge of the project, said crowds frequently total 100,000 for a single stand at a regional fair or some such, and that school children invariably ask "the best questions."

He said the serious routine was broken at Lubbock's fair when an elderly man inspected one bird cage and muttered: "So, you're a Golden Eagle?" A game warden concealed behind a burlap drape, replied mischievously in a distorted tone, "Yes, I am." The visitor jumped to one side, walking a few steps, then retracted his route and said, "a talking eagle?"

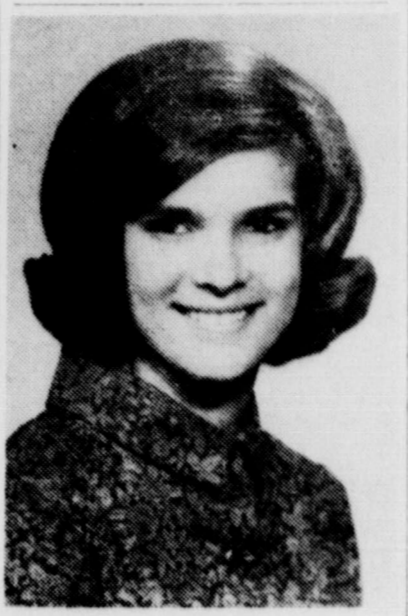
Those who served were Cloma Lee Brown, Paulette McBeath and Nancy McGregor.

Riverside H. D. Club

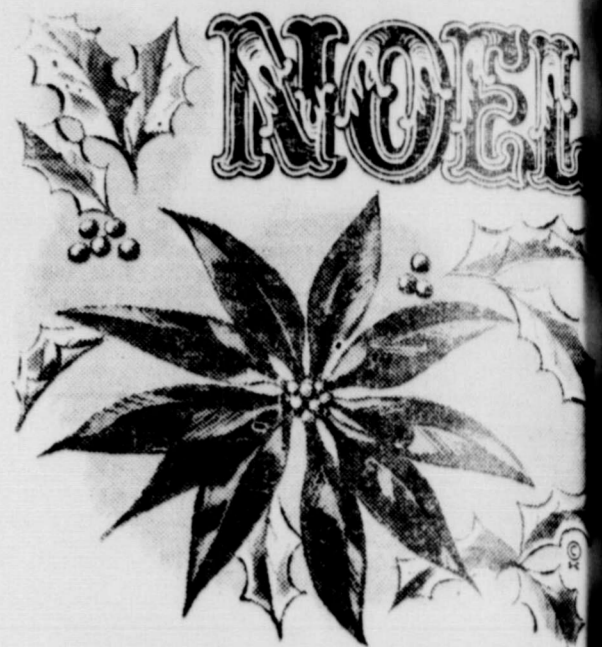

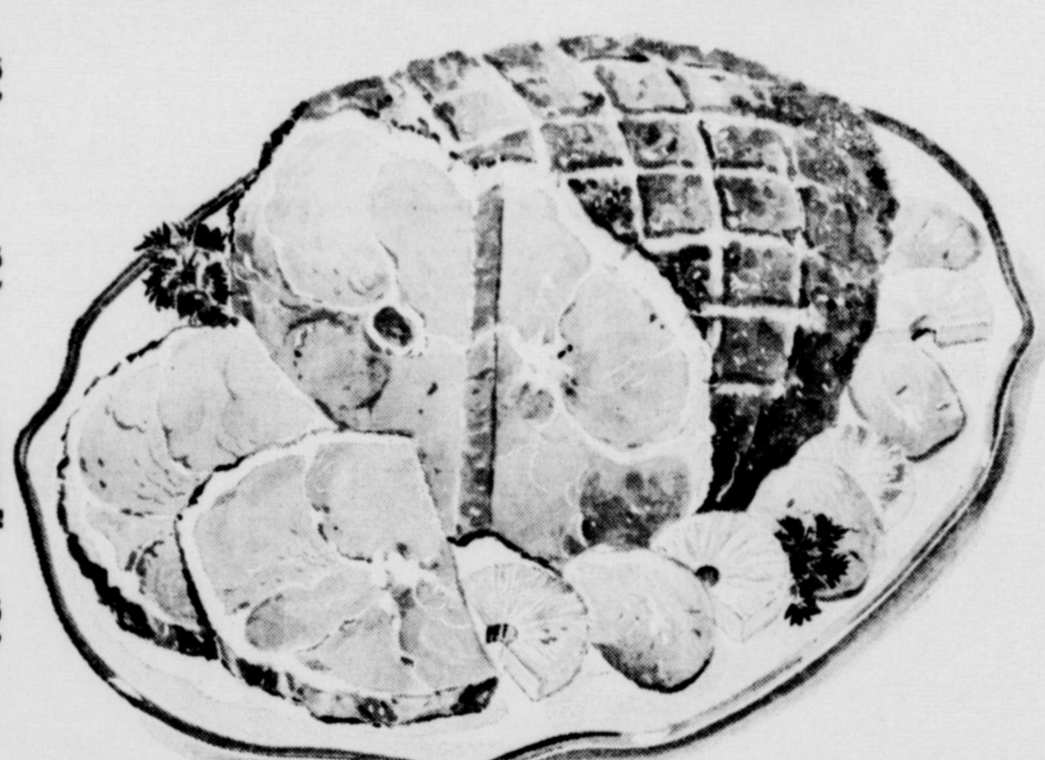
